**To Ask Appellate Court  
Where the Jurisdiction  
In Trial of Perry Man**

The Court of Appeals will be asked to decide where Buster Fugate should be tried on a murder charge. Authorities of both Perry and Jefferson counties are seeking to try Fugate on the charge filed in connection with the fatal shooting of Wallace Ambury, of Hindman.

Ambury, 23, was shot in front of a roadside near Hazard, July 15. He died several days later in a Louisville hospital.

Perry authorities said the trial should be held at Hazard because the shooting took place in Perry county. Jefferson county authorities said it should be held in Louisville because Ambury died there.

A warrant from Jefferson county where the grand jury last week indicted Fugate on a murder charge was taken to Hazard. Judge Charlie Duff said he refused to release Fugate for trial in Louisville.

"In holding the prisoner for trial in Perry county," said Duff, "Perry County Judge Taylor Witt had ordered Fugate held for Perry circuit court."

The fall term of court opened at Hazard Monday.

In Louisville Commonwealth Attorney Frank A. Ropke said a writ would be filed asking the Court of Appeals to prohibit trial in Perry county.

Ropke said he was advised of the writ's return by C. W. Napier, one of the special attorneys employed on the case by Ambury's family. Ropke said he had agreed to cooperate with the special attorneys, who, he said, estimated they could not get a fair trial in Perry county.

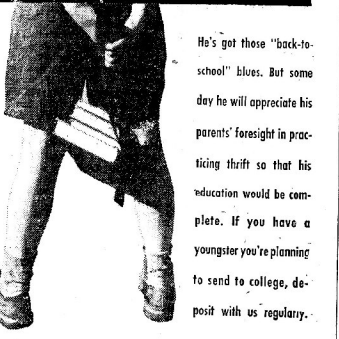

**As the Sparrow's Fall**

LAST week's destruction of fish in the Beaver Creek section of this county was a local tragedy which is as the sparrow's fall in the nationwide extermination of water life through stream pollution.

The nation's tragedy, affecting hundreds of streams, great and small, presents a picture so appalling that one localized incident becomes insignificant to all except a relative few.

SPORTS AFIELD in its current number starts a series on stream pollution, and the first of this "serial story" in the United States deals with a part of the South. This is no pleasant story to read but is one which should be read.

The Shenandoah river in Virginia is known No. 1 in this case history of man's violation of nature. That stream, once among the most beautiful in the land and a mecca for sportsmen, is from Front Royal, Virginia to the Shenandoah empties into the Potomac as dead as the Dead Sea.

Industrial wastes spewing into the stream at Front Royal has not only killed every fish in the Shenandoah over this distance—there remains alive today not a May fly, a caddis fly, a dragonfly or even a mollusk.

And on the trail of death, marked by man's debauchery of nature, flows—to the Potomac, with the city of Washington, the nation's show window, the contrast of its raw sewage, to the rivers of North Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, and other states the black death runs.

Florida, a state thriving on tourist trade and the money of sportsmen, is among this list of states where dying streams present a major problem. There, as elsewhere in the South, manufacturers of textiles, chemicals, papers, etcetera, have moved in, close to the source of raw materials. There they have moved with full panoply of plans for production but with few plans for conservation.

The St. Johns, one of the nation's most famed fishing streams, is now so polluted that sportsmen shun it from Jacksonville to its mouth.

This destruction is not wanton. It is the result of sins

of omission as much as commission. We must have industry, officials are told. A few fish are as nothing when compared with the prosperity of a section.

"They forget that the industrial production made possible by human ingenuity and industry could be more profitable to the nation and its people if some of this know-how and energy were diverted to the big principle of conservation."

Man, for instance, has developed a score or more uses for coal. Chemists can produce not only the various types of fuel from coal—they can make from it a perfume smelling of a fresh-mown meadow. They can harness the atom, for war or peace.

But for the conservation of natural resources and some of the things which are necessary to keep man from becoming an industrial automation, caged in his work-prisons of stone and steel, bound as a galley-slave far from the windswept reaches of water—to this their indignity and industrial capacity are foreign.

Even the national Congress has failed in the fight on water pollution. Drinking water will continue to be naught but doctored sewage; the swimming hole, flowing human excrement mixed with a small part of the pristine purity that fell from the heavens.

The water pollution bill the Congress recently enacted has been described by Congressman Karl Mundt as having the approval of the worst polluters "because it is the answer to the polluter's prayer." It has aptly been described as legislative chicanery which does not forbid the adding of new pollution to the sickening flood of human and industrial waste.

Rather, it provides federal officials with quasi-authority and shifts the responsibility to the taxpayers to bear the cost of developing techniques for neutralizing industrial wastes manufacturing plants create at great profit.

Even as last week's localized stream tragedy was a passing occurrence in the national pigment of destruction, this comment is but a faint echo of the few voices raised in protest over the country against such conditions. The public can, however, speak in such volume and with such effect that, one day, and before it is too late, lawmakers and those who are enjoined with the duty of enforcing the laws will hear and heed them.

The court set today (Thursday) for a visit to Frankfort and a conference with Governor Clements, Commissioner of Highways Wilkes and others, but Judge Davidson was informed Wednesday by Assistant Attorney General Carl Perkins that a meeting with both officials will be impossible this week. A conference will be scheduled for some time next week, it was said.

After the move to have the bridge this built had failed, Magistrate Roberts proposed that the span be condemned and advertised for sale. He and Magistrates May and Stumbo voted for this measure. Magistrate Birchett favored condemnation of the bridge but opposed its advertisement for sale.

The court named District Highway Engineer R. L. Parker as its representative in negotiating with U.S. engineers on the abandonment and relocation of certain roads in the Dewey reservoir area. His actions are subject to approval of the court. A check for \$1,000 was directed to be issued to the Big Sandy Valley Association as the county's contribution in the fight for canalization of the Big Sandy river. At the same time the court voted an appropriation of \$50 a month for rent of a building and for utilities expense of the Floyd County Library Association.

State Police Chief F. D. Potter and Benjamin J. Music, of 780 S. Main, near Louisville, which last week completed the first state police course held in Kentucky.

State Police will symbolize courtesy to the traveling public, Commissioner Guhrke F. Crowe said this week.

In line with that idea, Crowe said, each policeman will carry a can of gasoline in his automobile to assist stranded motorists to reach the nearest service station, as well as a first-aid equipment for sick and injured persons.

“It is our purpose to help, not to hinder the public,” Crowe said. “We intend for each trooper to carry a can of gasoline which he can siphon into the empty tank of the unfortunate motorist. This will enable him, to get to the nearest filling station with little effort. Each car will be equipped with first-aid supplies and a stretcher for the more serious cases. For the purpose of all ends will be given traveling permits.”

Crowe has been promised the utmost cooperation of Governor Earle C. Clements in the organization of the state police.

“Outrigger Crowe has been charged by me with the selection of men who fit precisely the standards required of state policemen,” said Governor Clements. “I shall in no way interfere with his efforts in attaining that end. I want an efficient police force that will redound to the credit of Kentucky.”

Governor Clements has defined the duties of the police as primarily those of a highway patrol. He wanted state police against getting in ahead of local authorities.

The cat's submerging shape and bottom feeding habits make him the perfect crayfish, clam or diving bug catcher. You'll have better luck fishing Nov. 4 at Olive Hill and Parks.

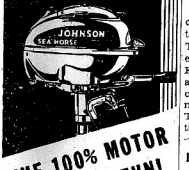

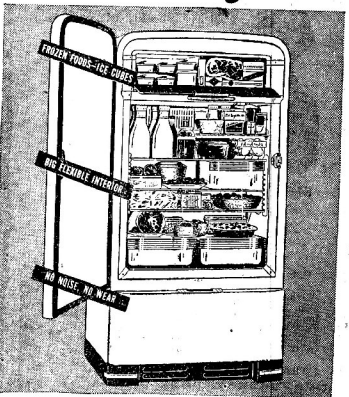

## OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

Increased rates of compensation now are being paid to veterans with service-connected disabilities which were incurred in pestonite service. Veterans Administration announced this week. The increases were authorized by Public Law 876, which specifies that post-time rates for compensation shall equal 80 per cent of the comparable rates for wartime service. Under the old law, the percentage rates averaged about 75 per cent of the wartime rates.

Compensation rates are based on the percentage of disability suffered by the veteran, from 10 per cent in degree in multiples of 10, plus additional allowances for amputations, blindness, etc. Wartime monthly rates range from \$13.90 to 10 per cent disability to a maximum of \$50. The new law raises the monthly rate for 10 per cent disability from \$10.35 to \$11.04, and the maximum, from \$27.0 to \$28.8, with comparable increases throughout the scale.

The increases are being made automatically and veterans entitled to them need not apply or write to VA offices.

Veterans Administration recently advised veterans to give their National Service Life Insurance policies periodic "three-way check" to make certain that their insurance programs are consistent with their plans, obligations and incomes.

The "three-way check" should cover (1) beneficiaries, both principal and contingent; (2) manner in which proceeds are to be paid to beneficiaries; and (3) amount of type of NSLI in force. Many veterans fail to name new beneficiaries after the death of a beneficiary, VA said.

If a veteran dies without naming a beneficiary, or if no designated beneficiary is alive at the time of his death, proceeds of the insurance go into his estate and are subject to inheritance taxes. Final distribution of the proceeds may not be that which the veteran would have desired.

Changes in family status or family income often require a veteran to change the method of NSLI settlement. He may elect to have his NSLI proceeds paid to his beneficiary in a lump sum or in equal monthly installments ranging from 36 to lifetime income.

**PICKS TURNER AS PREDICTED**  
**Governor Appoints Officials for New Judicial District**

As had been predicted since early days of the move in the General Assembly to redistrict this section and create a new judicial district, Governor Earle C. Clements last Thursday appointed Ervins Turner, of Jackson, Circuit Judge of that new district, the 39th.

The new Circuit Judge took an active part in the legal administration over validity of the Legislature's act which separated Floyd and Knott counties, made of Boyd a separate district and otherwise check up district lines in the section. Judge W. B. Arbery, Tuesday of last week, ruled the legislation constitutional.

J. Douglas Graham, of Campbell, was named Commonwealth's Attorney for the new district.

The district as created by the legislative act, which still is under attack in the courts, includes Breathitt, Wolfe and Powell counties. Circuit Judge W. B. Arbery last week held constitutional the act, which also made Boyd county, a separate judicial district with a court of continuous session. The act revamped five districts to make the 39th. An appeal from Judge Arbery's ruling is being prepared for final review by the Court of Appeals.

The legislation became effective June 17, 90 days after adjournment of the General Assembly. A suit was filed against the act about that time. A restraining order issued then preventing the Governor from making appointments, was dissolved by Judge Arbery as he upheld the act. Turner, a former state Senator, was chief clerk of the Senate at the 1948 session.

Graham said the Democratic committees of Breathitt, Wolfe and Powell counties had nominated Turner and him for the posts. To date, they have no opposition in the Nov. 2 general election.
