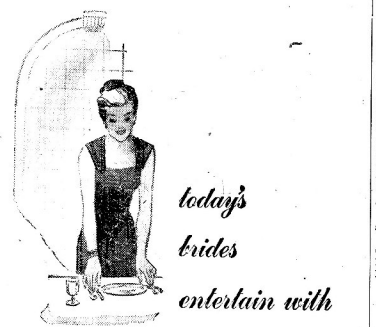

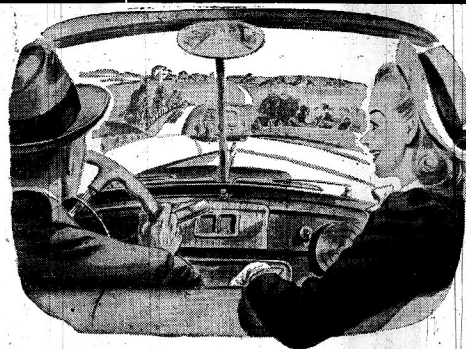

Mr. Woods, a senior, is a member of the mystic Thirteen Fraternity, and as a member of the varsity basketball team has been rated among the nation's leading scorers.


### Lackey Man Gains Rank of Captain



### KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY  
Tom Gregory, managing editor of the weekly Central Record, furnishes me with the text for this week's little piece, which is about Lancaster's method of inviting a second small factory needed to absorb its surplus male labor. I like the Lancaster interest because it is both candid and honest.

The Garrard County Board of Commerce got a work clothing plant for its plant near Hartsville, Ky. So the next move was for a factory employing men. The clothing manufacturing concern, with approximately 100 applications of men in its files, cooperated with the Board of Commerce in making a survey.

Cards were mailed all over the county and a thorough canvass was made in Lancaster. A check-up showed there were easily 150 male laborers available.

In its general statement the Board of Commerce gives its own census figures, based on a house-to-house canvass. The population is 2,327. No exaggerated claim. No empty boasting. A new county hospital is under construction and the town has good schools and active service clubs.

I'll lay you a ten-to-one Lancaster gets the factory it wants. In recent years thousands of trade in Kentucky, towns and small cities have learned a lot about bidding for new industries. One of the first things they do nowadays is to ascertain their labor resources. Electricity comes second, maybe. Then schools, hospitals and recreational facilities.

After which they try to publicize what they have to offer—make their message reach possible factory-bidders.

When I was a newspaper reporter in Henderson 40 years ago, the methods of a board of trade were quite different. Every now and then local business men would work themselves into a lather. Their enthusiasm was admirable but their procedure was pitiable. They were eloquent in praise of their city. They chartered trains and went on booster tours. Maybe they would get 100 men to come to the town. The crowd had a good time, of course. But they reached nobody who would even think of building factories in their town. Naturally, nothing happened. Enthusiasm would sag and in all probability the board of trade would fade out completely. Then in two or three years a bunch of business men would organize under another name and repeat the performance. The trouble was that these men didn't know how to put their message across. That, however, was a long time ago. Today Henderson is a rapidly growing city.

Ten years ago I urged a board of trade manager to write the industrial advantages of his city in a 90-word classified advertisement and run it in a magazine like Business Week, or some other periodical reaching industrialists. A periodical with 125,000 circulation would reach 30,000 industrial executives. If the advertisement cost \$30, that would mean reaching possible factory bidders at a cost of \$1 per thousand. The suggestion is as good now as when I first made it.

The 100 or more Kentucky cities and towns seeking new industrial plants must make themselves heard beyond their county lines. The Kentucky Chamber of Commerce will help these towns be heard.

**The Proposal Unthinkable**

A Courier-Journal writer recently proposed that Kentucky go all-out after tourist trade and build permanent trunk-line highways instead of resorting to the important expediency of "getting Kentucky out of the mud."

For those sections of Kentucky which already have good roads that argument will have an undoubted appeal. But to the people as a whole it is unacceptable, almost unthinkable.

The people who pay Kentucky's taxes are those for whom roads should be built, and those taxpayers are not from California or New York or Florida.

A sound economy in Kentucky is not predicated on the money spent by transients, but on an integrated system of traffic by highway with all sections linked together by year-round roads, with the farmer able to get his produce to market in all weathers, the laborer able to travel in his own car to and from work, the business man or firm connected with the highway with outside sources of market and supply.

We shall be longer true in getting but those desired permanent-type highways while trying to reach the fellow in the outlying precincts; but by road construction the first all Kentucky will be a part of Kentucky, all with hope of a better Kentucky.

North Carolina is a state visited annually by thousands of tourists. It is a great vacation-land. But super-highways are not what made it so. The roads of that state are far from the ideal mentioned in The Courier-Journal article. Thus, it would appear, the roads Kentucky has and which it can build without incurring the huge task of building for all, are sufficient to attract a great tourist trade—if the state makes its "mouse-trap" good enough.

A section such as the Smokies in North Carolina—beautifully wooded, mountains abounding with game, brawling mountain streams stocked with trout, unpolluted lakes, a variety of outdoor sports, a combination of the pristine and the luxurious—will attract the visitor within our borders. The money we have and those we shall build will not reneal him.

And, meanwhile, we Kentuckians will not be content to ride out on our miles to the highway to watch the tourist whiz past.

**Kentucky's Disgrace**  
Kentucky's Forgotten People are those who languish and suffer in the state's mental hospitals. The state's neglect of these human beings who are sick in mind, even as you or I could be, is a public disgrace.

Dr. Louis Foltz recently emphasized this shame when he pointed out that Kentucky spends a hundred times more on its convicts in penitentiaries than it does for those whose crime is nothing more than becoming sick in mind and having not the resources to finance private and expensive treatment.

Less than a dollar a day is spent on the care and treatment of these, our Forgotten. On that piece they cannot be properly fed, not to mention the cost of providing the special treatment, care and nursing their condition demands.

As a result of the lack of money to provide trained attendants for the mentally unbalanced, patients in mental hospitals have been killed by other inmates. The deranged killers are unaccountable, but Kentucky is.

The word, "asylum," connotes, literally speaking, a retreat. In Kentucky it means not retreat or sanctuary but incarceration in a horror-house.

Poorfortunates deserve better than that. And the people of Kentucky surely will demand better than that for them.

### DAIRYING FAVORED IN MORGAN COUNTY

Many farmers as well as businessmen in Morgan county are recognizing that dairying is one of the most promising farm enterprises in the county, stated Farm Agent Charles Dixon. As a result, 59 farmers are selling milk and 100 farmers, cream. Mrs. Arnold Cox, who has three grade Jersey cows, received \$62 for milk sold over a five-week period this summer. That left an income of \$62 above feed costs for that time, plus all the milk her family of five used.

Another example cited was that of Dockie Murphy, who received a net income above feed costs of \$162 in one month from six grade Jersey cows. Mr. Murphy figures that this income of \$5 per day for less than two hours' work, done with the aid of his small son, is the easiest money he makes.

As a result of lessons in sewing, Hart county homemakers tailored 1,322 garments this year and remodeled 837 pieces.

### ORDINANCE

An ordinance granting to Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company, Incorporated, its successors and assigns the right, privilege, franchise and authority to acquire, construct, maintain and operate in the streets, alleys and public places of the Town of Wayland, Floyd County, Kentucky, and its successors, lines for the distribution of electric energy to the town of Wayland and the inhabitants thereof, and persons or corporations beyond the limits thereof, for light, heat, power and any other purpose, and for the transmission of same within, through or across said town.

The Board of Trustees of the Town of Wayland, Floyd County, Kentucky, do ordain as follows:

Section One: There is hereby granted to Kentucky & West Virginia Power Company, Incorporated (its successors and assigns hereinafter called grantees) the right, privilege, franchise and authority to acquire, construct, maintain, correct and operate, in, above, under, across and along the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places (as the same now exist or may hereafter be laid out), of the Town of Wayland, Floyd County, Kentucky, lines, poles and equipment for the distribution of electric energy and by means of overhead or underground conductors, with all the necessary and desirable appurtenances for the purpose of supplying electric energy to said town and the inhabitants thereof, and persons or corporations beyond the limits thereof, for light, heat, power, or any other purpose or purposes for which electric energy is now or may hereafter be used and for the transmission of the same within, through or across said town.

Section Two: Said lines and appurtenances shall be constructed so as to interfere as little as possible with the traveling public in its use of the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places. The location of all poles or conductors shall be made under the supervision of the proper board of committee of the town government.

Section Three: The right, privilege and franchise shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty (20) years from the date of the passage of this ordinance.

Section Four: The grantee of this franchise shall save the town harmless from any and all liabilities and claims in any way from negligence in the erection, maintenance or operation of said lines and appurtenances.

Section Five: Whenever the grantee of this franchise shall begin the erection of any lines or other equipment it shall promptly and diligently prosecute the work to completion and leave the streets, thoroughfares, alleys, bridges and public places where such work is done in as good condition of repair as before such work was commenced.

Section Six: Wherever in this franchise, either the Town of Wayland, or the grantee of this franchise is referred to, it shall be deemed to include the respective successors, or assigns or either, and all rights, privileges and obligations contained in such franchise shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the respective successors and assigns of said town, or said grantee, whether so expressed or not.

Section Seven: The grantee of this franchise may make such rules and regulations covering the distributing of said electric energy as may be fair and reasonable and consistent with the standard practice of the grantee. Said grantee may charge such rates for electrical energy as shall be fair and reasonable. The said grantee shall render service under said franchise of like quality, that is, adequate, efficient and reasonable to that customarily rendered to towns of the class in question.
