Among those facing the inevitable or, at best, long months of a grim battle for life there are no unbeliefers in this movement which has for its aim the conquest of one of humanity's greatest scourges.

Two such as these, both residents of one comparatively small Floyd county community, a few days ago attested in letters to the Floyd County Tuberculosis Association to their desire not to receive the seal to help the Christmas Seal cause. It might be well for humanity if all of us could, in some way, see the other fellow's suffering through the sufferer's eyes.

Wrote in part one of these who is fit of tuberculosis: "In my opinion it would mean a lot to be remembered at Christmas by some friends who may have forgotten you, and I think this might be possible through the purchase of Christmas Seals. I hope everybody can see the need of others."

"Thank you," wrote the other, "for sending me the Christmas Seals. You see, I am a victim of the dread disease and I know just what his likes. I have been a sufferer for thirty months. I wish all the people of Floyd county knew how important it is to them they may break this year that ever before to help fight tuberculosis."

Both sent \$2 in full payment of Seal making them. What have the rest of us done?

JUDGES HEAR ROADS TALKED

Governor Says Program On One-Road-at-a-Time Basis Is State's Plan

Kentucky county judges meeting in Louisville last week heard state officials discuss a tentative program for distribution of the new road revenue accruing from the seven-cent state gasoline tax.

Governor Earle C. Clements, Highway Commissioner Garrett L. Withers and Rural Highway Commissioner Emerson Beauchamp met with the judges at the opening session of the annual meeting of the Kentucky County Judges Association. They urged the association to select from its own membership a committee to counsel with the department on expenditure of the new money.

"Kentucky's economic future depends upon a wise and equitable distribution of this new fund," Governor Clements told the judges. This is not a managerial, district matter, he said, but must be decided except on a one-road-at-a-time basis. The money will be expended only on roads that are needed to assist farm-market service roads. Counties may suggest a program covering a three-year period if they wish.

The 1949 legislature increased the gasoline tax from five cents to seven cents and specified that two-sevenths of the tax must be spent on rural roads.

Commissioner Withers told the group that the new income distribution plan is as ready as possible on the basis now used for the distribution of the annual \$5,000,000 rural highway legislative appropriation.

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SUIT TO TEST ENTRY WAIVER LEGALITY SEEN

Roadhouse Supervisor To Call on Operators Not Seeking Licenses

As the Wednesday deadline passed for the filing of applications for roadhouse license under new and stringent regulations required by County Judge Alex L. Davidson, only 15 operators of places of entertainment had filed.

At the same time there was talk of a suit to test validity of the Judge's action requiring roadhouse operators to waive their rights under the law of search and seizure superior "rights" sought by officers at any time.

Personally, I will be glad if a suit is filed, County Attorney W. W. Burdett said. "If we are wrong, we want to know it. So far, I haven't found where we are, and I have found considerable reading on the subject."

Judge Davidson estimated, Dec. 1, when he announced the new roadhouse regulations and set Dec. 15 as the deadline for filing for licenses, that there are 300 places of entertainment or gathering places in the county which come under the broad description of roadhouse. Not one, he said, has filed a license.

What will do in those scores of cases where no application for license was made before the Wednesday deadline? Judge Davidson indicated this week he will ask that Deputy Sheriff Harold Coon, who is paid \$1,500 a year by the state to enforce the law, hold a hearing to determine whether the places are to be closed or whether the license application order.

In some cases, property-owners leasing buildings to law-abiding operators of restaurants and other places falling within the roadhouse category refused to sign the statement required of them for the application of license to be complete.

This statement acknowledges that the property-owner is aware of the law which provides that the owner of property where illegal whiskey is sold may be forfeited and sold by the state.

Judge Davidson explained that the property-owner is in no danger of loss of his or her property, unless he or she permits illegal whiskey traffic to be conducted on the premises with his or her knowledge, a second offense after a roadhouse owner had been convicted of a second offense, for instance, would constitute grounds for forfeiture, it was explained.

FLOYD SCOUT ADVANCE TOLD

Finance Chairman Says Supporters of Scouting Get Returns for Money

SOME PARENTS BALK AT CODE

Health Co-Ordinator Says Physical Tests Of Children Opposed

Enforcement of the state health code requiring physical tests of pupils to undergo physical examination is giving Callis S. Brannan, health co-ordinator, Floyd County Board of Education, renewed headaches.

Mrs. Brannan said the parents of a hundred or more first-graders in rural school districts have refused to have their children examined.

She added that the health code has the full force of the law which would make subject to prosecution parents refusing examination of their children.

"We don't want to go to jail," she said, "and the co-ordinator said, 'The trouble is, many parents, unable to see anything physically wrong with their children, at this time, are unable to see any reason for an examination.'"

The county health department, Mrs. Brannan said, makes examinations of school children of this age group only on Mondays and Tuesdays in the homes of individual families who cannot come here for examination.

Examinations have been examined by private physicians to whom Mrs. Brannan has appealed for help.

routes; (c) rural mail routes; (d) our own traffic counts and the possible increase in traffic after the proposed road development; (e) population to be served and (f) importance of the road in the local picture.

"The new legislation directed the department to work out this program. It is felt that the Kentucky General Assembly wished an equitable distribution based upon the factors which we have considered. As a consequence of this, and in view of the legislative approval of the existing formula on the present \$5,000,000 rural appropriation, we tentatively have adopted the old formula for the new income.

"This arrangement divides one-third of the possible income equally among all counties, one-third in accord with rural population and one-third based upon area. Due to the possible variation in the income as provided in the law we will be unable to do more than approximate the amount available for each county.

"A fact which should be remembered, and which will directly affect the results obtained is the difference in the dollar value. A road today costs almost twice as much as it did in 1940.

Beatchamp assured the judges, "The road to be built first will be the road that is needed most. The new rural road program requires a basic plan. There are many miles of rural roads urgently needed. Many of these miles serve fine communities and will develop more travel after improvement.

"Present high road building prices will make necessary careful selection, low-cost planning and thoughtful distribution of the funds available.

"We feel that we have this worked out. First in every possible instance, money will be used to match federal aid secondary funds on important farm-to-market roads. This work, however, will require designed standards based upon the present and possible future traffic flowing over this type of highway.

"On all other roads, careful consideration will be given to the present location. We will make minor changes in alignment, eliminate curves, excessive grades, correct drainage. This means fewer right-of-way purchases, less location and engineering costs, and the great advantage of using the old road base.

"As in the past, we will consult frequently with the county officials and interested road users."

HOLBROOK, TRUCE VIOLATION VICTIM, RETURNED TO COUNTY FOR INTERMENT

Body of Pvt. Henry Lewis Holbrook, who was killed in Italy at the age of 22 while conducting a search for a wounded American officer, was laid to rest Thursday afternoon in the family cemetery overlooking the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Holbrook, on the Middle Creek road.

A Nazi violation of a flag of truce was reported during the war as leading to young Holbrook's death. After rescue parties had failed to locate the wounded officer, victim of a mine explosion, he volunteered to accompany a patrol to continue the search. Though under the protection of a white flag, the patrol was fired upon. Holbrook continued the search over two minefields blanketed by snow. Then German soldiers opened fire with machine guns again, this time at close range. The Floyd county man fell dead.

He was posthumously awarded the Bronze Star for "heroic achievement in action."

The victim, member of the 88th "Blue Devils" division of the Fifth army, was graduated from Prestonsburg high school in 1940. He had many relatives and friends over this section. Surviving besides his parents, are his widow, Mrs. Juanita Holbrook, Davis, Indianapolis, Ind., one sister, Mrs. Lloyd Brown, Prestonsburg, a half-sister and a half-brother, Mrs. Ellis Hale, of David, and Joe W. Holbrook, Prestonsburg.

Funeral rites were conducted by the Revs. B. W. Craft, Ted Green and Forester Prater, The American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars conducted military rites at the graveside. Burial was under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

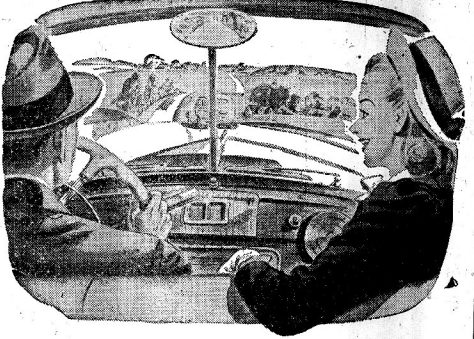

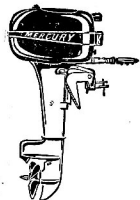

TVA FISHING UNAFFECTED

Survey Says New Levels Of Lakes Not Harmful To Spring Spawning

Lowering of the water level in TVA lakes this year will not have an adverse effect on fishing in those waters, Maurice Henle, chief of the information section, Tennessee Valley Authority wrote last week in reply to an inquiry from Thomas Hereford, of Prestonsburg.

During 1948 Henle explained, requirements for navigation and electric power, coupled with a relatively light rainfall, resulted in a "considerable reduction" in the water levels of all TVA storage reservoirs. Studies, he added, have been made for several years in an effort to determine if drawdowns of the water level has any effect on fish population. A recent TVA report expressed this conclusion:

"Population studies just completed at Norris, Cherokee, Douglas, Hiwassee, Nolichucky and Ridge Ridge reservoirs indicate that high fish population in these waters was good. To date there is no evidence that spring drawdown has adversely affected spawning in TVA storage reservoirs."

Many familiar with the TVA lakes contend, however, that drawdown of the water sometimes leaves the spawn high and dry, severely crippling fish propagation, and also that many small fish are trapped in small pockets where life is impossible over a long period.

W Wright, Frankfort Defeat Black Cats In Net Games Here

Remainder undefeated the Wheelwright Maroons extended their winning streak to seven games in a row here Friday night at the expense of the Prestonsburg high school Black Cats, 42-28.

Playing on even terms in the second and fourth quarters, the Wheelwright scoring punch in the first and third quarters established a margin too great for the Cats to believe. Bobby Hall led the scoring for the victors with 14 points with Paul Harmon, Prestonsburg, collecting 10 points. R. Curry, Wheelwright, and Gene Boyd, Blackcat forward, collected nine points each.

Leading the Blackcat encounter the Maroons have scored this year, 370 points to their opponents' 227. Prior to the game here they defeated Maytown, 49-22; Johns Creek, 47-22; Garrett, 62-28; Betsy Layne, 57-38; McDowell, 42-39; and Mayo Vocational School, 51-34, to serve denotations that they may be "the" team in Floyd county this year, and a potential regional powerhouse. 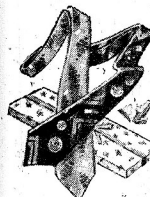

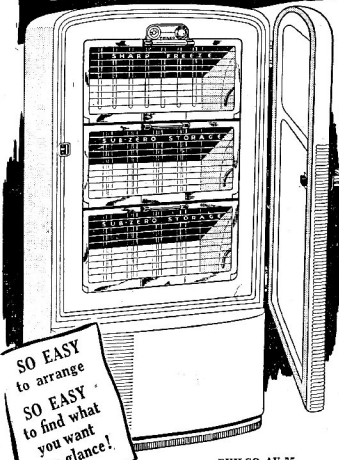

**KENTUCKY
ON THE MARCH**

By EWING GALLOWAY

You may recall that, three years ago, a report on the deplorable condition of the public school system of Kentucky jarred the people like an earthquake. At that time we were just drifting along — so, we were slipping backward rapidly — with teachers paid less than domestic servants. That report, for the Committee for Kentucky, was made by Dr. Maurice P. Seay, Dean of the University of Kentucky.

Lately Dr. Seay has been checking up on progress made by our public schools since the original report was published by the Committee for Kentucky. The gains are heartening indeed.

Enrollment of children of school age for the 1946-1947 term showed 88 per cent as compared with 78 per cent in 1941-1942. Fifteen per cent under a perfect score is still too big a margin.

In the last three years attendance has increased 5 per cent.

In the last four years the average length of the school term in Kentucky has moved up from 159 to 176 days.

Since 1945 the number of teachers employed has increased from 17,710 to 18,500 with a decrease in emergency certificates of 37.

The average pay of teachers and principals has gone from \$942 to \$1,890.

Home economics enrollments increased 2,271 in five years.

In three years ending with the 1947 term bus transportation was provided for 11,253 additional rural pupils.

In four years the amount spent per pupil increased from \$59 to \$83.94.

The foregoing gains are encouraging, even though they have not kept pace with rising costs of practically everything else the people pay for. But certainly education in Kentucky is making wholesome gains.

Dr. Seay's only remuneration is the public's gratitude plus pleasure in a job well done.

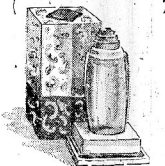

'GRANDMA' SPROUSE AND YOUNG SPOUSE IN COLUMBUS, O., WHERE CHILDISH BRIDE SAYS CATT ONLY CIVILIZED PLACE LEFT

"Grandma" Sprouse, the childish bride from Catt Fork, Lawrence county, was back in the news last week as she and her 21-year-old spouse, Delbert, visited "folks" in Columbus, O., and she held forth to a newsmen on a sin-cursed world.

She told newsmen "Catt Hollow is the only civilized place left in the world—and even it's beginning to taint around the corners."

After "Grandma's" marriage on June 8, 1946, in Louisa, she and her young husband, whom she calls "Short," got more publicity than they had anticipated. Afterward, while the nation's interest in the May-December marriage was sustained, she said she "got out of the hollow" for just about the first time in her life for trips to Eastern cities including a two-week stay in New York.

But as far as she and hubby are concerned they'd better get out of back in the hollow.

"Sounds funny," she related, "I said I got married so I'd have someone to stay on the farm with me and here we are in Columbus." After a winter visit here—three months or so—she and her husband are going back to the farm.

"Grandma" was not reluctant to speak about her travels. "She said she saw some interesting things in New York and 'there are some real clever people there.' Places like Coney Island only confirmed her opinion that the end of the world is not only coming, 'just like it says in the Scriptures,' but 'we're into it a right smart piece,' she believed.

"I never was so beat in my life," she recalled, in speaking of the New York playground. "They'd go in swimmin', old gray-haired men and women, them come parading' right back through town without puttin' anything else on. It was an abomination if I ever saw it."

"Grandma," rocking comfortably, did all the talking while "Short," now "just going on 21," sat reading a magazine.

Mrs. Sprouse had 10 children, seven still living, by her first husband. She has 50 grandchildren and, she said, as near as she "can keep track," 25 great-grandchildren.

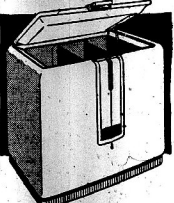

WE TURN BOOK REVIEWER
What does it mean to be a reviewer of any sort functioning in these parts, the Great American Sport isn't what one would call an ideal subject for this column, the price and scarcity of newspaper being what it is. But I have just finished a baseball book that I think is a good one for some sort of another.
It has to do with one Larry Murdoch and from his mound takes the book draws its title, "The Strike-Out King."
Now, this Murdoch was a nice-enough guy—in fact, it occurs to me the book makes him a wee bit too nice. He didn't smoke, he didn't drink, he didn't curse even when that villainous Brayton plunked him between the shoulders with a rock. And his pitching adventures were interesting enough.
What floored me was what those stalwarts of Carson College and Pennfield College did or didn't do on the diamond, according to the author whose name, somehow escapes me.
For instance, the writer of that story lays this situation:
"Brayton (the granddaddy) started off the ninth for walk, old Carson by drawing a fair, Pete Torrence connected for a single, Brayton stopping at second. The next man up (and I quote) 'was Gene White, a weak hitter... The Pennfield pitcher threw up a slow, easy-looking curve that any heavy hitter would have murdered. The best that he could do with it, however, was to send a weak pop fly to short."

Again:
"Mickey O'Brien was the first man up for Pennfield in his half of the seventh and he opened the inning by smashing a triple high against the centerfield fence. With O'Brien in scoring position, Don Lemon, the Pennfield shortstop, was given the signal for a squeeze play."
Bear with me a moment while I ask what do you think happened then. I'll even tell you that Lemon laid his bunt down. Still you don't know what happened. Read:
"...but Larry (that Murdoch our hero) deided the bunt in time to get Lemon at first, and Sam Leonard's fast throw to the plate went O'Brien as he slid in" (the exclamation point strictly ours).
Another thing funny about these columns: Nobody ever advanced farther than one base on a single, or farther than two bags on a double. No, strike—if you were on first and somebody whaled the ball for a double, you circumspetively stopped at third—not once in a while, but every time. The boys may have been wearing their croakskin coats while tearing madly around the bases. I dunno; but the author fails to say so as he should. I do know I have in my day, covered more ground playing that highly argumentative game, known as "Round-Town" than these guys did.
Then in the Big Game, the championship encounter, this guy Murdoch (with the help of the author) proves he's entitled to the title, "Strike-Out King." Larry goes out there, all down in the dumps because he hasn't slept for two or three nights in a row while hunting for Mildred, his sweetie-pie, who has been kidnaped through the perfidy of that onery Brayton. Mildred still hasn't turned up; and even a ransom note has been delivered. It's enough to make a guy cut Math class, and Larry just doesn't feel up to the business of dialing around with baseball. The opposition spunk him good and heavy, the first two innings. It looks like he'll not be around long.
But here! What's this? There's a bit of color up there in the stands that wasn't there, a minute ago. A hand waves to him. It's—Mildred. Oh, happy day!
The old soubpone gets new life, the blood is sound—Mildred's worth livin'. And Larry rars back and starts pitchin'—and how!
What does he do the next seven pitches? Not a great deal, except face 21 men—strike every man—jack of 'em out and while doing so pitch off of his heels!
The whole thing makes this saga of Slivash seem just like so much eye-wash.
But I read the book through without having it down. A right interesting book, after all.

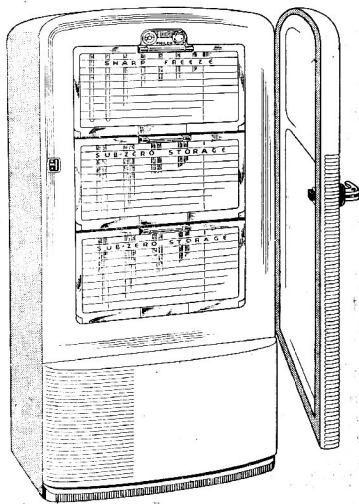

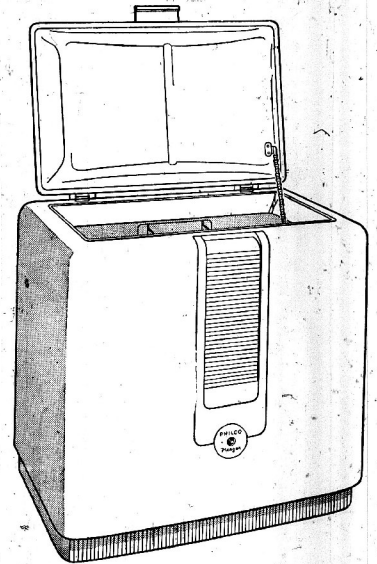
