'Town Hall' Gathering Hears State Health Official Outline Plans for Ringworm Battle

Wide newspaper publicity and mounting concern over the ringworm epidemic in Prestonsburg resulted Monday night in one of the community's "Town Hall" meetings, with a gathering of approximately 250 worried parents exchanging views with health and school authorities.

Out of this meeting and the subsequent session, Tuesday morning, of the County Board of Health, emerged a definite plan for combating the scalp infection from which approximately 60 Prestonsburg pupils are suffering.

Children who have ringworm will not be banned from school; rather, will be obliged to attend.

Infected schoolchildren will be required to have their heads clipped and to submit to regular care and treatment, either from their parents or from the Health Department clinic.

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FIN AND CONVICTON

Of Dry Law Breach, Simpson Points Out To Pike Officials

Conviction on liquor-law violations in a long-continued territory court trial and jail sentence, Assistant Attorney General William F. Simpson said last week.

Simpson's opinion went to J. A. Runyon, Commonwealth's Attorney at Pikeville. In his report on a statute-interpretation dispute among officials between the county and the state, Simpson agreed, Pike county is dry.

The statute specifies that a first liquor-law offender must be fined \$20 to \$100 and jailed 30 to 60 days. Second conviction imposes a \$40 to \$200 fine and 60 to 120 days in jail.

The third conviction of the same offender carries a subsequent conviction, bringing a one- to two-year term in the penitentiary.

First offenders are subject to the discretion of the court as to putting up a peace bond. But peace bonds are mandatory on second convictions, Simpson said.

Chick Experts at U.K. List '12 Commandments'

Lexington, Ky., Feb. 9.—Poultry specialists at the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture and Home Economics today released a list of 12 "commandments" for farmers to follow when brooding chicks.

- The commandments are:
 1. Keep the fire burning in the brooder stove two or three days before putting in the chicks. Regulate heat to 90 degrees at edge of the canopy. Don't overheat.
 2. Feed chicks when they are put into the house. If not fed, they may get lister and develop digestive troubles.
 3. Use only feeds of good quality in chick raising.
 4. Allow enough feeder space to avoid overcrowding—an inch for each chick during the first three or four weeks and two inches thereafter.
 5. Clean feeders daily when liquid milk is fed.
 6. If milk can't be had, then dried buttermilk or dried skim milk may be used and the chicks given clean water to drink.
 7. If commercial mash is fed, it is not necessary to feed milk. Give chicks water to drink.
 8. Use litter 2 to 4 inches deep at the start and add to it from time to time until it is 8 inches deep.
 9. Clean litter and clean feed to help prevent disease.
 10. Provide ventilation. Don't make the mistake of having the house closed too tight.
 11. Put in low roosts when the chicks are 3 or 4 weeks old.
 12. Provide plenty of feed, shade and water in summer.

Railroad-Pass Holders Barred From Office

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 10.—You can't hold a railroad pass and be a public officer, Assistant Attorney General James Keller said today. The opinion went to George L. Riddell, Concord Lewis county, who asked if a C. & O. Railway employe, holding an annual railroad pass, is eligible to serve as a member of a Board of Education.

Chasing the Constitution, Keller said a man cannot be a member of a Board of Education and hold a railroad pass. Forfeiture of office is provided for acceptance or use of a pass, Keller said.

One out of every 150 Americans isn't on speaking terms with himself, and Mom is mostly to blame, Mrs. Rena Levy says.

Mrs. Levy said she had some firsthand information on the subject, because she has spent most of her 62 years wasting a civil war on herself as one of the nation's 1,500,000 stutterers. Hardly anyone realizes it, she said, but that affliction is a major psychological problem, and in many cases out of 10 the blame can be placed right in the laps of domineering mothers who try to make pal dogs of their children.

Until she was well past 40, Mrs. Levy was in a social milieu, because of her stammering. She was in some pretty illustrious company, including the King of England, but she decided she'd never even be tried of her own home unless she could govern herself, so she taught herself how to speak correctly by learning to breathe and relax.

Now that she can rattle off "Peter Piper picked a peck of pickled peppers" without stumbling on a single syllable she is teaching other handicapped persons how to talk straight.

"The stutterer is in conflict with his environment and then he starts fighting with himself," she said. "He strains muscles. His voice fights with his body. He talks against his breath release instead of with it. His eyes bulge when he tries to talk. His mouth is distorted. He is really a 'person to pity.'"

That's why Mrs. Levy starts correcting the handicap with breathing exercises. Then she gets her pupils to sing sentences, because no stutterer ever stammers when he sings, and a lot of famous singers can't utter a single sentence without stuttering.

After that she goes into "relax and enjoy life. In anywhere from three months to a year, her pupils can utter a peanut-butter sandwich without the slightest difficulty.

"If a person is going to stutter, he usually starts in at about the age of five," she said, "but a lot of nervous and upset people begin in middle age. Many men got out of the armed forces because they were unable to admit themselves to new environments in a hurry."

When a child is born, she said, he's afraid of only two things—voices and falling. But by the time Mom is through with him, he's likely to be afraid of everything, including himself.

"It's like a snowball, but fortunately the snowball can be melted," Mrs. Levy said. "Parents unconsciously direct children too much and want to hold their too long hands make them dependent. They do it in good faith, but they carry it to far when they want to think for their children even after they are married."

"The parents of the pupils don't like me for just that reason. They accuse me of taking their children away from them, but actually the children are merely growing up."

Gallagher said Beatty, a negro, had a long criminal record and was wanted for burglary and grand larceny at Hazard.

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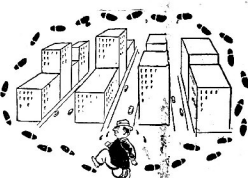

**Two Floyd-Co. Miners
Among First 8 Cases
Sent to Washington**

The first group of paralyzed coal miners to be hospitalized in Washington will arrive in the nation's capital Friday from their homes in Kentucky and West Virginia.

The eight cripples, two of whom are Floyd countians, are victims of paraplegia caused by mining accidents. Because of the injuries to their spinal columns, suffered in falls and similar mishaps in the mines, some of them are paralyzed from the waist down.

They are being taken to Washington for treatment under the program of the United Mine Workers of America Welfare Fund. The man will be taken to the George Washington University hospital, 801 23rd Street, N.W., for medical care and necessary surgery and physical rehabilitation.

Names of the injured miners, their ages, home towns, their local union numbers and the dates of their injuries follow:

**OF INTEREST
TO VETERANS**

Veterans in industrial and on-the-job training who submit changes of address to the Veterans Administration should indicate if the changes are temporary or permanent. VA said this week.

In cases of permanent changes of address, so specifying will speed up the transfer of the veteran's record to the regional office having jurisdiction over the area in which he will be located.

Trainees who are going on short vacations and have no subsistence checks due to arrive during their absence should submit a change of address, with a notation that it is only temporary so that their checks will be forwarded.

The Veterans Administration recently urged World War II veterans to keep appointments in their respective cases. Broken appointments frequently cause unnecessary delays in medical or dental care.

Medical examinations must be given within the period specified on the authorization certificate. While any subsequent treatments are scheduled by the dentist at his discretion, but within a reasonable period of time.

Under existing legislation, veterans may be furnished out-patient medical or dental care in VA clinics, in private offices of physicians or dentists or in their own homes only for disabilities recognized by VA as incurred or aggravated in line of duty in active service.

World War II veterans who believe they are eligible for medical or dental care at government expense may make application at any VA office presenting a discharge certificate which is other than dishonorable.

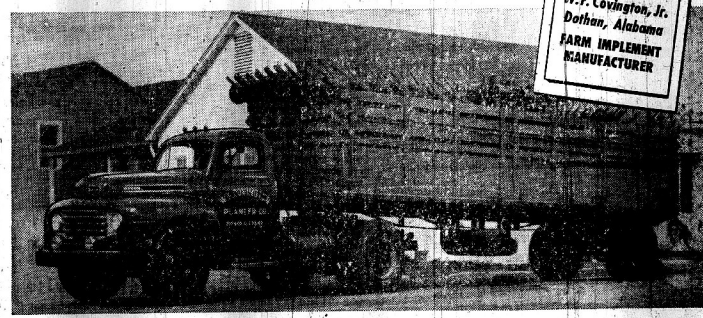

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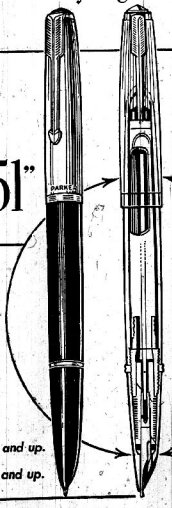

(Continued from page One) Washington before Christmas to assign a special attorney to the case... was done in the case of the Haslan county election frauds several years ago.

City declared "we should hate to see Bourbon become a paradise for ballot thieves, which is exactly what will happen if this case is not vigorously prosecuted by federal authorities."

He declared the whole county "is interested in the outcome of this case. Thirty or more election officials are under suspicion until the matter can be cleared up and gulf established so as to remove suspicion from innocent persons."

City said there had been "several contradictory statements in the press by Federal District Attorney Stephens or members of his staff" regarding status of the case.

In Washington, Attorney General Tom Clark told Representative Tom R. Underwood, Lexington, the Federal Bureau of Investigation might need several more weeks to complete its investigation.

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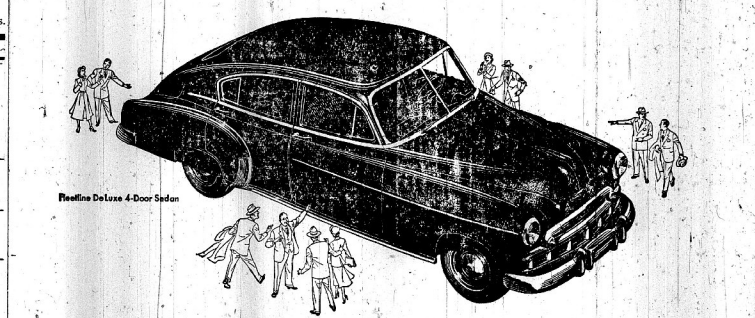

U. K. Coach Looks Back on the Olympics

Third in a series of articles in which the University of Kentucky's veteran coach looks back on the 1948 Olympics and views world basketball in general.

A SALUTE TO LOMBARDO

Many great athletes competed in the Olympic games last summer, of course—the cream of the crop from each of the nations competing, and a number of brilliant performers in addition to our own U. S. players appeared in the basketball tournament.

In a previous article I mentioned Purfuro of Argentina as one of the standouts. First of all, he was an uncanny shot; a fellow able to put the ball through the hoop from two points from just about any range or any position on the floor. In addition, he had a lot of speed, and he also enjoyed the happy faculty of being able to make the defensive man foul him often.

Just about all the same talents belonged to Lombardo, of Uruguay, and I believe that all of us associated with the United States team would agree that he rated as the best player to perform against us.

Lombardo stood about six-three, fought excellently to get an advantageous position near the basket, could shoot with either right or left hand, and could jump like a kangaroo.

In the game with Canada he scored 28 points, getting 14 on seven field goals and missing only two out of 18 free throws, so we knew that we would have to stop him if we hoped to beat Uruguay since that team was built around this clever player and his teammates fed the ball to him constantly. We succeeded pretty well in keeping the ball away from him, but he managed to score a lot of points against us just the same.

Almost every team in the Olympic tournament used a zone defense except the U. S. The others usually presented the 2-1-2 pattern; with the front line dropping back to about the depth of the free-throw circle. The zone operated rather well.
