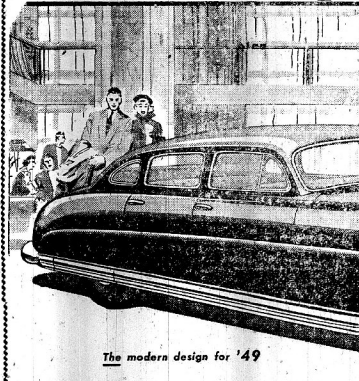

In his confession Daniels established the claim of self-defense. He said he boarded the caboose near the railway depot, in control of the "camp" addition to Martin. When he entered, he said, Collins was firing the stove, and he followed, with Collins ordering him out and shoving him against the door of the caboose. He claimed. When Collins struck at him with the hammer, he continued, he struck the other with his fist, and the elder man then threw the hammer at Daniels. He said he knew what the hammer and struck the other. Asked how many times he struck Collins, he said he did not know.

Constable Brady Shepherd, who arrived at Wheelwright Junction at 5:45 a.m., said Collins had been dead from four to six hours. The estimate was corroborated by Daniels' confession which placed the killing at around midnight. Collins lay on his back, his gloves still on. He had, officers said, been dragged a distance of approximately five feet. The fire in the stove had died out.

Every C. & O. agent in this section was immediately placed on the case, working with Detective Thompson and members of Sheriff Trey B. Sturgill's force. The mystery became, apparently, more profound when it became known that no one member of the train crew had been in the caboose or had seen Collins, its only occupant, since departure from the Martin depot. The train had made three stops, en route, and officers were confronted with covering the 20-mile distance from the depot to Wheelwright in search of the slayer.

But there were those in the home town of the two men who suspected Daniels. They were talk-precursive trouble while the two Daniels was watched while the body of the victim lay in the Collins home. The man who had to have stopped calling on Collins some three ago, stayed at the Collins residence while the body was kept there. He and another man took the hammer found in the caboose to state police headquarters at Pikeville. He is said to have helped dig his victim's grave.

Two hours after the victim had been buried, officers called at the Collins home where Daniels and other members of the family were eating supper. Detective Thompson asked him the whereabouts of the clothing he wore on the night the slaying occurred. He quickly agreed to go to his home with them and get these.

"I'll tell you," he later said, "where blood on 'em, but it's chicken blood." He explained he had killed a chicken, two weeks earlier, in daylight. His statement was believed. Later, before being jailed here, he told County Attorney Burchett he might have something to tell, and officers pointed out to him that the stains on his clothing would be checked against Collins' blood.

And so wound the trail of circumstances leading up to the confession. Even with Daniels' confession in hand, authorities submitted exhibits to the F. B. I. for analysis and comparison. Working with Sheriff Gurrell and Detectives Harold Conn, Tom G. Dingus, W. L. Rice and Epp Lavery were Detectives Thompson, C. & O. Agents M. L. Marcum, G. L. Gray, W. H. and Charles Potter, G. E. Smith and J. P. Brod, Jr.

Collins, a native of the Left Beaver Creek section, had been employed by the C. & O. Railway Company 29 years, beginning work with the opening of the Long Fork branch between Martin and Westbury. He had been promoted to the post of conductor but was working as a brakeman on the night of his death. His superior employer having returned to work the same run. He was a son of W. R. Scott Collins and Frances Collins.

Mr. Collins was a member of the Christian Church and was a veteran of World War I. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Gray Compton Collins, two sons, Ernest Collins, of Martin, and A. O. Collins, of Ashland, and three daughters, Mrs. Joseph Stanger, Ashland, Mrs. Flovia Harrison, Langley, and Mrs. Virginia Meade, of Hi Hat. Two half-brothers, Hankley and Andy Scott, both of Garrett, also survive.

The funeral from Martin high school auditorium, which was conducted by the Revs. S. C. Honeguy and Julian Hunt, and burial was made in Martin cemetery under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home. The burial was under auspices of the American Legion post at Martin.

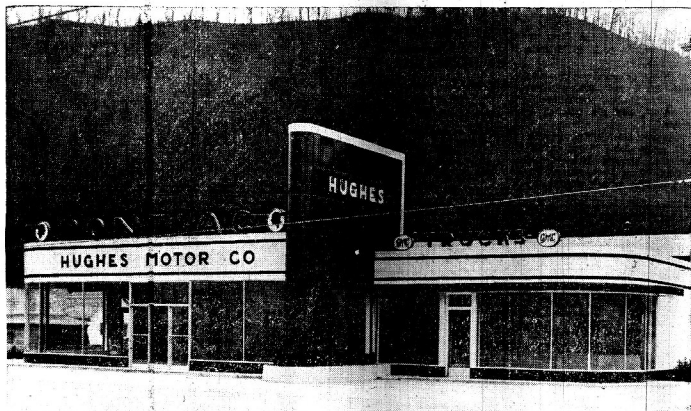

Our country could not have selected at random a collection of college or AAU stars and gotten the same polished teamwork that was shown by our units in the last Olympics.

**Garrett Black Devils Hit Stride Defeating Three of State's Best**

**Magistrate Can Vote To Hire Himself for Job**

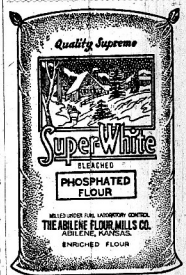
Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 16 — Assistant Attorney General Walter C. Herdman today said a magistrate can vote to hire himself as a county road supervisor. His sons \$2 a day each day he works.

The opinion went to M. L. Turner, Campbellsville, who asked if a magistrate, in his capacity as a member of the fiscal court, had a right to break a tie vote on a proposal to appoint himself as road supervisor.

Herdman cited Circuit of Appeals decisions giving magistrates and county commissioners that right.

Herdman also reminded Turner that beginning in January, 1950, magistrates and county commissioners will not receive pay for services on roads.

This law was passed in 1946, but because the Constitution prohibits any changes in pay and fees of officers during their terms, it won't become operative until the next four-year term starts.

## Early Study of Bill To Alter Levies Ends

Frankfort, Ky., Feb. 11—The Legislative Research Commission here today finished its preliminary study of a bill repealing the laws governing the levy and assessment of property taxes.

The tentative measure was written by the Revenue Department. It will be re-drafted and returned to the commission for further consideration.

The commission is scheduled to meet again Tuesday morning and consider proposals for changing the laws on the school equalization fund.

Boswell B. Hodgkin, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, and William D. Cline, director of school finance, are scheduled to appear before the commission to discuss these proposals.

Revenue Commissioner Clyde Reeves and William G. Hoebel, director of revenue research and statistics, met with the legislative group most of the day. The assessment-revision bill worked on today still is marked "confidential."

If the commission can agree on improvements for assessments and equalization-and distribution, the agreements will provide the basis for calling the General Assembly into special session. Only Governor Earle Clements can do that.

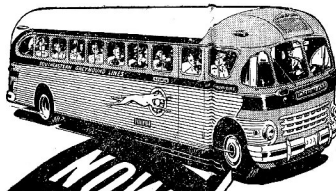

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**OBITUARY**

Isabella Justice Allen, daughter of Jackson and Darcus Patton Justice, was born March 10, 1860. She died this day Feb. 8, 1949, aged 88 years, 10 months and 28 days. She was one of a family of four sons and three daughters. Her four brothers and three sisters passed on before her.

Her father, Jackson Justice, was captured by Rebel soldiers during the Civil War in his home and remained in his weeping wife and children, never to return to them again. The subject of this sketch was very young Marshall, the grand old prisoner, but she never did forget her last look at him. This event saddened her young life and imposed many hardships on her and on all of this fine family, especially on her good mother. Of this sad event the writer has often heard her speak.

She was married in the month of December, 1879 to Sanford H. Allen. Unto this union were born nine children—four boys and five girls. Two died in infancy. Her husband followed them on Oct. 21, 1935, aged 75.

The four sons and three daughters who survive her are: Warren, Henry, Joe, Tom, Vina, Ellen and Lora, with 22 grandchildren, 26 great-grandchildren and five great-great-grandchildren.

Near the age of 34, she professed repentance toward God and faith in Christ and was baptized by Elder John Marshall, the grand old preacher of the Christian Church, at Maytown. During the many years that followed she was sweetly solvent toward every friend and neighbor who differed with her religious views.

Often during the last seven years she called on Regular Baptist ministers to sing and pray in her home. She seemed to enjoy it and would praise God and say, "I am glad salvation is free." Yet she was firm in her belief and loyal to her church. She often talked of death and of going to a better home.

The writer has heard her pray the Lord many times to take her away. She met death bravely and we believe she was sweetly trusting in the Lord.

Goodbye, mother, goodbye for a little while. We would not disturb your rest and peace. But we do hope to meet you "where troubles never come."

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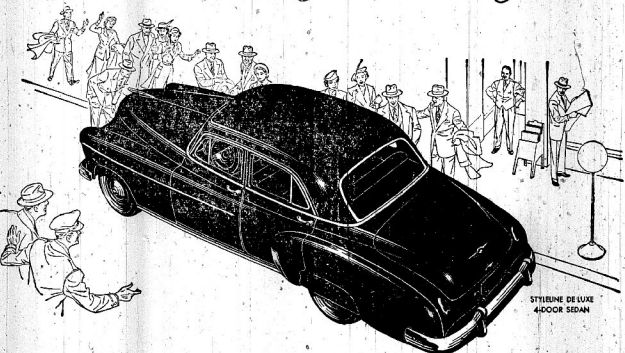
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
