Kentucky Near Top In Reducing Deaths From Traffic Causes

Kentucky is near the top in reducing traffic deaths. The State Highway Department's public figures Tuesday showing the Bluegrass state ranks fourth from the top among the 20 states reporting decreases in fatal highway accidents.

The report, from the National Safety Council, is based on returns for the first 11 months of the last year. It shows Kentucky lost 437 lives during that period—16 per cent fewer than the 544 recorded during the first 11 months of 1947. Ranking above Kentucky were Rhode Island with a 41 per cent decrease, Massachusetts with 28 per cent, and Nebraska with a 21 per cent drop.

The National Safety Council report to the Highway Department added: "The reduction in the traffic toll was accomplished in the face of zooming travel figures. Mileage for the first 11 months of 1948 is comparable with the entire year of 1947. Public Roads Administration estimates through Oct. 6, 1948 indicate that travel approximated 332,000,000 miles. Yet the national-mortality death rate continues to be the lowest in history."

(Continued from Page One) and secondary education is this: The federal government has a fundamental interest in, and is at least partly responsible for, the general education of the national citizenry.

"The very preservation of our form of government depends upon an adequately educated population. Democracy cannot function at home, much less carry its heavy international responsibilities, unless its citizens obtain the basic education to permit intelligent participation in the life of the nation."

The Congressman then pointed out that the birth rate is highest in areas where economic conditions are poorest, and educational levels are lowest. He added: "If we continue to draw each succeeding generation in disproportionately large numbers from those areas, and if we fail to make good the deficit by positive educational measures, the effect on our culture and our representative political institutions will be appalling."

"More enlightened self-interest demands that the richer states protect their citizenship and economic security by promoting the level of education in the poorer communities from which they inevitably draw a part of their population and upon which their prosperity otherwise largely depends."

Salt for Curing Meats Unlike Poisonous Types, Says State Health Head

"Special brands of salt sold and used this fall to put up country cured meats are not the same as the poisonous salt substitutes removed from the market recently," Dr. Bruce Underwood, State Health Commissioner, has stated. The name of the special salt used for curing is similar to the name of one of the poisonous salt substitutes mentioned in dispatches recently.

Worried farmers are inquiring whether or not their home-cured meat should be destroyed. "There is no need for doing this," Mrs. Sarah Vance Dugan, director, Division of Foods, Drugs and Hotels, State Department of Health, says. The salt sold for curing meat was sodium chloride, a pure salt sold in 25, 50 and 100-lb. bags and purchased by farmers for the purpose of meat curing. If the meat curing has been done properly, there is no danger involved.

The products which were withdrawn from the market were sold only in drug stores in Kentucky in two-pounce and 16-ounce packages. The only one found in Kentucky which was of the poisonous salt substitute type was "Westal."

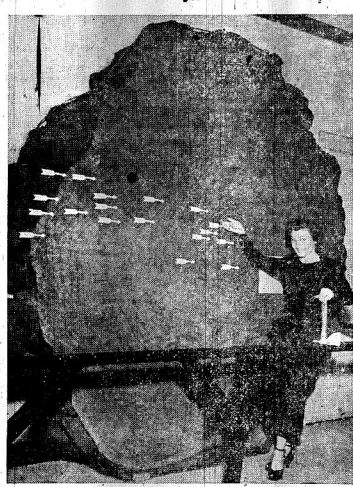
