WOULD RETAIN SCHOOL HEAD

City Board Hires Cook On Basis of 11 Months For Term of Three Years

ANNEXATION IS OPPOSED

From Two Quarters; Answers Filed Claim City Over-Ambitious

Action taken by the City of Prestonsburg to annex adjoining territory to its northern limits and to that part of the corporation embracing West Prestonburg met opposition from two points this week in the form of answers to the annexation suits filed in circuit court.

City Attorney Alex T. Conroy said there was no opposition to annexation of the area at the upper city limits extending to "Ball Alley Road" and including a part of Trimble Branch, but the going is rougher in West Prestonburg and the Porter addition.

Answers to the suits for annexation of these areas contain the city's over-ambitious and has no reason to expand to cover any such area. Also, the city of Prestonsburg has the facilities to serve the proposed additions.

The answers were filed by Graham Porter and German Miller, city City Attorney Conroy has filed no motion to require the two litigants to name the other persons represented by the abbreviation, "etc."

A hearing on the two suits being contested is slated, Saturday.

Names Dr. Nordenhaug, Former Local Pastor, Zurich Seminary Head

Dr. Josef Nordenhaug, onetime pastor of French Fork Methodist Baptist Church here, has been named president of the International Baptist Theological Seminary at Zurich, Switzerland, which will convene next week by the Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

He left Prestonsburg to become pastor of the Vinton, Va., Baptist Church, and from there moved to the pastorate of the Rivermont Avenue Baptist Church at Lynchburg. Since September, 1948, he has been pastor of The Constitution Baptist foreign mission church, Richmond, Va.

A brilliant student and an accomplished linguist, Dr. Nordenhaug engaged, while in training, a German-printed book into the Norwegian, and vice-versa. He was married while pastor of the Prestonburg church to Mrs. Gertrude E. Baker, Hamp, of Louisville. They have two children, Ted, 11, and Karin, 9.

is set aside for the hearing of civil cases.

Denver Wells was acquitted Friday of a murder charge in the "federal triangle" slaying here recently of Earl Frazier, Bonanza man.

The defendant was the only eye-witness to the shooting to testify in the trial. He claimed that when he entered the darkened apartment occupied by him and his wife he saw a man whom he could not recognize rise and move as if to pick up a chair or some other object. The shot followed. He admitted that, had his wife not struggled with him, he might have fired again.

Mrs. Wells, whom her husband recently sued for divorce, was not present for the trial. Commonwealth testimony consisting of statements by witnesses telling of Wells borrowing a .22-caliber rifle from Billy Hughes and buying a box of cartridges at the C. H. Nannery store here, shortly before the shooting. Wells claimed he got the rifle and shells to kill a rabbit.

In the trial of Hughes both the defendant and his young son, Willard testified that Willard shot Stephen at the home of Jack Hughes, brother of the defendant, while the latter was bending over Billy Hughes and striking at Hughes with a knife. Billy Gibson, however, testified Stephen was sitting in a chair after having been aroused from sleep at the time of the shooting. She identified Billy Hughes as the man who killed Stephen.

The Hughes, father and son, contended the trouble started after a little girl had told Billy Hughes of seeing Stephen and another man in bed with a woman. The defendant said he took his shotgun, jabbed Stephen and told him he should leave after such behavior. Stephen knocked the gun aside, flung Hughes and was trying to cut him when the boy fired the defense claimed.

The Commonwealth contended the elder Hughes and Stephen had been in a minor dispute, earlier in the night, further up said block, when Hughes, disgusted with a comparison of Stephen's and a letter informing Hughes he "would die" for his friend, this evidence claimed Billy Hughes went home, got his shotgun and returned to the Jake Hughes home with his son who was armed with a revolver.

Trial of Willard Hughes, who was charged jointly with his father, is expected to be set for the September court session.

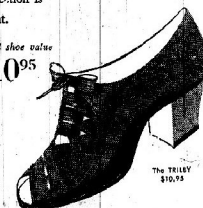

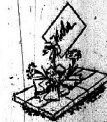

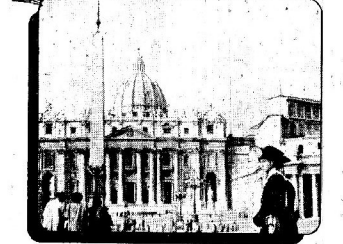

SESOQUI PLANS FOR 15-COUNTY CELEBRATION SHAPE UP WITH GROUNDWORK UNDER WAY

Prestonsburg will be the hub July 1, 2, 3, 4 around which a 15-county Sesquiennial Celebration will swing, affording residents and visitors the high event of its kind ever staged in Eastern Kentucky.

Present plans of numerous Sesquiennial committees are rapidly unfolding into shape and give every indication that Prestonsburg and friends from all the surrounding area will have a "big time" during the four-day-long celebration, according to Franklin Moore, general chairman of the celebration.

General Chairman Moore pointed out this week that while Prestonsburg will be the centerpoint of the 15-county area, every person residing in the original Floyd county should look upon the celebration as his very own, individually and collectively.

Those counties which, in whole or in part, made up the original Floyd county are, all of which are expected to play an important part in the coming celebration, are: Breathitt, Elliott, Floyd, Johnson, Knott, Letcher, Logan, Magoffin, Martin, Menifee, Morgan, Perry, Pike, Rowan, and Wolfe.

One of the unique features of the celebration, included in the so-called comprehensive history book of that territory now being compiled here, is the plan to include the names of all living residents of the original Floyd county area on special pages of the volume devoted solely to that purpose. Moore announced.

Proper application for inclusion of the names of all living residents of those counties in the memorial history book will be made through the offices of the Sesquiennial Celebration offices, Court street, Prestonsburg. Additional details as concerns these names will be announced later, Mr. Moore said.

Mrs. Beatrice Collins, Lackey, of the Lackey-Garrett Women's Club, agreed to head a group of club women who will contact the various women's organizations throughout the district. Among those who have enthusiastically accepted responsibility for certain names are: Mrs. Winifred Blackburn, Prestonsburg, president of the F.W.V. Auxiliary; Mrs. Ora Hamilton, president of the Prestonsburg Women's Club; Mrs. Winston Ford, Prestonsburg, acting deputy commissioner, Girl Scouts; Mrs. Nancy Webb, Prestonsburg, worthy matron of the Eastern Star; Miss Alice Harris, president, West Prestonsburg Civic Club; Mrs. Anna Belle Harris, West Prestonsburg, Elizabeth Lodge; Miss Sara Clay Stephens, Prestonsburg, president of the Junior Woodchick Club; Mrs. R. D. Prando, Prestonsburg, director, The Kiwanians; and Mrs. J. R. Camilla of the same organization.

One of the interesting sections of the historical book will be a section devoted to all "Sesquiennial Babies"—this being appropriately illustrated pages containing the name of every baby born in the 15-county territory since the first of the present year and up to the time of publication of this historical volume.

Henry Sealf, widely known Eastern Kentucky historian, is now putting the finishing touches to the manuscript of his history of this area. More than 15 years of almost constant research into historical corners and crannies by Mr. Sealf has revealed to him, and thus forming this valuable work, a story replete with folklore, legend and frontier Kentuckians.

Meanwhile, other plans of the Sesquiennial Celebration committee are rapidly forging ahead. Among these is a beauty contest, details of which are now being worked out by its sponsors, the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Bob Williams and Paul C. Hayes are the committeemen who are now handling details of the beauty contest. They plan to have several important announcements ready within a few days. It is planned to have a representative beauty from each of the celebrating 14 counties from which a Sesquiennial queen will be chosen to compete in the Miss Kentucky Pageant at the Atlantic City Beauty Pageant.

A beauty contest, the winner of which will be crowned King of Beards, and will rule over the July celebration with the beauty queen, will be another feature of the Sesquiennial Celebration.

A beauty committee to work out plans for the whiskered contest was named today by General Chairman Moore. This committee is composed of Thomas Hereford and Tilden Hayward Friend, representing the Prestonsburg Lions Club; and Marshall Mahan and Paul Combs, sponsored by the Kiwanis Club. That committee will contact Lions and Kiwanis Clubs in the 14 celebrating counties with a view to obtaining bewhiskered contestants from each.

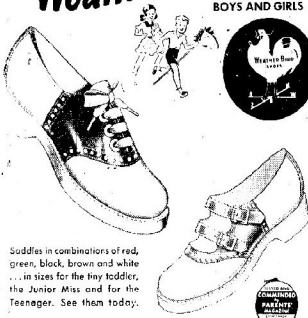

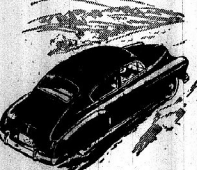

SEIZING OF MINNOWS FOR COMMERCIAL USE IS DECLARED ILLEGAL

Emergency Action Taken Became Effective Monday

Frankfort, Ky., May 8 (Sp.)—Seizing of minnows from Kentucky streams for commercial use became illegal on Monday, May 1. Earl Walla, director of the Division of Game and Fish, reminded would-be offenders today. This came as a follow-up to his previous announcement following the filing recently with Secretary of State George Hatcher of an emergency regulation to that effect.

Wallace pointed out that studies of streams and in minnow conditions in the state have revealed that the streams are rapidly being depleted of various species of minnows by commercial dealers and that depletion of these minnows will cause a crisis, since other types of fish in these streams depend on minnows for their food supply.

The Fish and Game director emphasized that the regulation does not mean that a resident of the state cannot catch minnows from these streams for his individual use. Only the seizing of minnows for commercial purposes is barred, he declared.

Sports Afield

No one has a right to call himself a real catfish angler until he has concocted some bait unlike all others except for having an offensive stink, the secret of which he refuses to divulge for less than a thousand dollars or so.

It would of course be disgraceful for any two cat fishermen to make bait alike, but angling authority Jason Lucas took a good grip on his nose and came up with the following, which is the base for all blood baits:

Go to a slaughter house and get a bucket of fresh blood of anything from chickens to elephants. Put this into a light, closely woven cloth sack and hang it up for five or six hours until all the plasma has drained out and what's left is about as thick as liver. This can be cut in pieces, placed in glass jars and stored in the refrigerator.

From there it's up to you. Some fishermen mix feathers or cotton wool in the blood so it will be tougher some use a half cup of powdered alum. But the secret is the big secret. You can have your choice of all of them, but the best is a mixture of blood with a run in the eighth. Good together with the "brothers at Allen," the record books show 20 articles compounded. It does seem to be a fact that the more horrible the smell, the better the catfish like it.

The term stink bait distinguishes other bait from blood baits. And that they smell any worse—how could they? Here you start out with a bucket of minnow and let it all until there's nothing left but a thick, oily mess. Sliced bananas are considered a fine ingredient for bait, but some prefer oil of this mess but some prefer oil of creative genius as in blood bait: A piece of sponge or rag dipped in this seems to be a catfish's notion of an exquisite heaven.

Some cat fishermen are so totally lacking in pride that they use nothing but plain liver. Others use "blood mints" which is an aromatic term for spiced some swear by chicken entrails and other things, which are considered best when they have reached the most advanced stage of decomposition that will permit their use to remain successful.

ANGLERS HIT GIGGING RULE

To Voice Opposition To Regulation; Claim Bass, Pike Suffered

As the period for gigning rough fish ended Friday midnight, Floyd county sportsmen were vocal in their opposition to a renewal of gigning next year and promised they would express their opposition to any such practice when the League of Kentucky Sportsmen meet at Cumberland Falls this month.

The ruling of the Division of Game and Fish permitting gigning of rough fish failed to achieve its purpose, those fishermen declare. Reports received from all parts of the Seventh district and scattered reports from all parts of the state as a whole indicate that promiscuous gigning of game fish took place, whether accidentally or intentionally.

Said Floyd County Conservation Officer Bernard Baldridge: "One man came to me and told me he had gigned a bass. He said, 'I saw the flash of a fish. I gigned and it was a bass.' He killed a game fish by mistake. Scores of others killed them because they were out to get fish—any kind of fish. I reminded the man who had killed the bass that the Division's regulations required him to return it to the water, but that didn't repair the damage already done."

One sportsman questioned wisdom of the regulation with "How many gigning were done? For every one there was one, at least a dozen bass or pike!"

Baldridge warned that the gigning season closed on May 8 and that no person is allowed to have a gig in his possession while fishing; moreover, that the carrying of gas in tackle boxes is in direct violation of the law.

6 Weeksby Foremen Among 1,100 Honored For Safety Records

Washington, May 9 (AP)—Of 1,100 coal mine foremen in hundreds of bituminous mines across the nation who are being honored this week for perfect safety records, almost one-third are with a single mining organization, Eastern Coal & Fuel Associates, which in Floyd County, Ky., has its coal operation at Weinsburg.

This was revealed in records released today by Earl F. Weiler, safety director, safety division, National Coal Association.

There are 347 mine foremen at 20 BCFPA mines who have supervised their crews from one to 20 years without a lost-time accident, the list repeats. These and about 780 foremen from other bituminous coal mining organizations in the United States will receive certificates of citation for their perfect records from the safety division of the National Coal Association.

Safety Director Maize estimates that there are probably 2,000 bituminous coal mine foremen in the industry who are eligible for recognition but not all have been reported. This would mean no lost-time accident records covering 150,000 miners, he states.

U.M.W. To Resume Payment Of Pensions Next Month

The United Mine Workers' welfare fund payment of \$100-a-month pensions to retired coal miners will be resumed next month under a stricter benefit policy, it was said a few days ago.

Fund officials said pensions will go to all miners at least 60 years old who have worked 20 years in the industry, provided they worked a full calendar year immediately before their retirement.

Under the old arrangement retroactive pension payments were made to miners who had not worked the year before they retired.

The fund also will renew \$100 death benefits to beneficiaries "who were actually dependent" on the miner who died.

The previous fund operations permitted death benefits also to persons who had helped support the miner before he died.

Where a miner leaves no dependents, the fund will give his local union \$50 for funeral expenses.

A union spokesman said the trustees had taken no action yet on resumption of disability, medical, and hospital payments.

He said the pension-and-death benefit plans were approved some time ago by the trustees. Details were explained to 100 U.M.W. and welfare-fund officials and employees last September. Payments will be resumed under a new fund established by the 1950 soft-coal contract. The new fund replaces the 1948-49 fund.

Death benefits will be paid immediately to dependents of miners who have died since September 17. They are reported to be in the mail this week.

The fund is supported by 20-cent-a-ton royalties paid by the producers. The 1950 soft-coal contract raised the royalty from 20 cents and set up a new board of trustees. Members are U.M.W. President John L. Lewis as miners' trustee, Charles Owen as operators' representative, and Atlas Josephine Roche, fund director, as neutral trustee.
