of public convenience and necessity for a much broader territory in Floyd, Johnson, Pike and Letcher counties. He has taken the Consolidation Coal Company exchange at Jenkins, and he proposed to build several more exchanges.

He estimates the lines would serve something over 4,000 subscribers, about 3,600 of whom would be new. Goodman says he believes there will be a considerable development market in the southern part of the United States; that there will be 4,000 subscribers under present economic conditions and more if conditions improve.

Congressman Perkins has received a great many letters and resolutions from the area asking his support of the project. He said he felt it had great merit and that he would do what he could to assist it.
Under the new rural-telephone plan, private companies are given the first opportunity to develop an area. Southern Bell has written the commission of its agreement to Goodman having the territory. Loans to small private concerns and co-operators are made at 2 percent interest for 45 years. The developers may use R.R.A. poles where that is possible, and Goodman says he plans to do so.

A number of applications have been made in Kentucky under the new law, but this is the first company to receive a certificate from the commission.
The visit to Wickard was the first, though there has been correspondence on the subject. The R.R.A. must make a field survey and all financial conditions must be studied before Wickard can approve the loan.
Goodman said it may be several months before he knows whether the project will be approved.

BIDS SOUGHT ON 2 ROADS

In Floyd as 168 Miles Advertised for Bids To Be Opened June 23

Two Floyd county roads totaling a distance of 84 miles are listed under the 168 miles of road projects on which the Highway Department called for bids this week. Bids will be opened at 10 a.m. on June 23.
The Floyd routes are: Stephens Branch-Alum Lick, from end of improved section of Stephens Branch road, near Manion, across the mountain to Alum Lick on Middle Creek, a distance of 63 miles; reconstruction and rock surfacing, Wayland-Szemore Creek, from end of bituminous surface in Wayland, extending northwest, 2.8 miles; reconstruction and rock surfacing. The proposed work includes 45.7 miles of U. S. highways, 42.3 miles of state roads and 78 miles of rural highways. Biggest project of the lot calls for high-type surfacing of the 29.8 miles of Ky. 80 between Hyden and Manchester.
Other projects in this section on which bids are asked are:
Pike county - Stone-McVeigh-Phelps road from U. S. 119 near Huddy to McVeigh, 6.1 miles; Pond Creek-Alex-Malewan road from U. S. 119 near mouth of Pond Creek up the fork through town of Lecksville. Bituminous surface planned for both roads.
Kane county - bridge construction and approaches over Carr's Fork on Sassafras Creek road.

IS IT A CRIME TO WORK "REGULAR"?
Editor, The Floyd County Times:
Employees of the Princess Bilkhor Coal Company have been fortunate in that company being able to operate five days a week since the signing of the new contract. Some of the reasons for this good record aside from the quality product, is that this company is equipped with modern mining and preparation machinery and has an efficient and progressive management whose interest in, and whose benefits to, all its employees has become something of a legend in this section of Kentucky.
Princess Bilkhor, now only 10 years old, has grown with the years until there are now approximately 600 employees on the payroll. By June, 1948, production had increased to the point where the No. 1 preparation plant could not handle the coal which was being mined without increasing the working time of the tipple. Consequently, this was accomplished by increasing the number and staggering the working time of employees in order to keep the plant running for 9 1/2 hours on the day shift. Each tippie man continued to work from 7 1/2-hour shift, and until recently there had been no objection to this arrangement.
Now, we have a situation on hand where representatives from the Pikeville UMW office have caused five employees to quit their duties two hours before their quitting-strike, thereby forfeiting their jobs, in order to limit the working time of the machinery at the No. 1 tippie to 7 1/2 hours per shift.
It does not take an economic expert to figure out that the company cannot continue to mine coal that cannot be processed and prepared through the tippie. Neither does it take an expert to realize that if the tippie-work is restricted, so also must production be limited. In order to do this, enough men inside the mine will have to be held out their jobs to bring production in line with the lowered preparation schedule as set up by these "hard working field representatives".
Just whose interests are these Pikeville interests serving? Is it for the interest of the five tippie men who gave up their jobs at the reported insistence of the UMW "leaders"? Is it for the interest of the additional inside men who too they give up their means of livelihood? Certainly it couldn't be these men, nor their families, whose interests are served by such arbitrary, irresponsible leadership. When 50 or 60 men are deprived of good paying regular jobs, does it help business? Does it help the community? The "good" the nation?
What kind of creed is this that promotes scarcity and penalizes progress—that advocates dissension and encourages fear?
Is it a crime to work regularly?

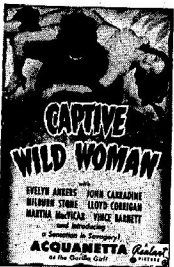

to be not self-executing and that the Legislature has not provided that acceptance of a pass forfeits an official's right to office. This, he contended, is necessary to make the section enforceable.

In addition, he declared, a criminal conviction is necessary before institution of an onster proceeding. Hobson argued that Dr. Allen did not use the pass, that he returned it to the railway company, and that the Constitution was intended to penalize an official upon acceptance and use of a pass, not the mere acceptance.

Judge Hill is expected to make a decision this week. Meanwhile, injunction actions instituted recently still stand. At this time James Green, West Prestonsburg, is the only member of the Board not under direct legal attack or restraint. Green is an ally of Dr. Allen in the warring Board. The Board did nothing at its scheduled Tuesday meeting, and the hiring of teachers now becomes a past due item.

Rape charge against Robert Green, 24, filed away for lack of jurisdiction when a 14-year-old girl, described as "afflicted," could not state definitely that the crime took place in Jefferson county.

James F. Willett, 19, charged with burglary after a complaint that he entered a house to commit a mornis offense against a boy, entered a plea of guilty and received a two-year suspended sentence.

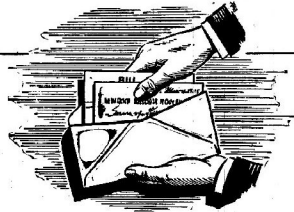

Three from Weeksbury Are on Counsellor Staff Of EGFA Summer Camp

Three persons from Weeksbury will be among the 45 who will comprise the counsellor staff at Camp Thomas E. Lightfoot this summer, it is announced by Virgil M. Beckel, camp director. They are Vivian Penix, Ernest Goble and Bonnie Sue Moody.

Located on the Greenbrier river near Hinton, W. Va., the camp is owned by Eastern Gas and Fuel Associates and is operated as a recreation center for the children of its mine workers. Four two-week camping periods will be conducted between June 27 and August 24, with 200 boys and girls at each session. Camp dietician will be Bernice H. Huddleston, North Fork, W. Va., member of home economics in the North Fork high school and supervisor of the school cafeteria. She has been selected, according to Mr. Beckel, because of her knowledge of the food needs of growing children. A staff of cooks will assist her.

Teachers and advance students from four West Virginia colleges and universities and from educational institutions in Kentucky, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Missouri and Michigan will compose the senior counsellor staff of 21 persons. Intermediate and junior staffs, largely composed of children of EGFA mine workers who have passed camping age, make up the remainder of the 48 counsellors, an average of about one supervisor for each four children. Counsellors sleep in the same cottages with the children and are with them throughout the day so that they have constant supervision, Mr. Beckel said.

"If a motorist intends to turn either left or right, a signal of intention must be given continuously for not less than 100 feet before making the turn," Crowe said. "Also, if a person is to decrease the speed of his vehicle or stop, he must first give an appropriate signal to the operator of any other vehicle approaching from the rear."
The new law, passed by the 1950 session of the General Assembly, is calculated to promote traffic safety.

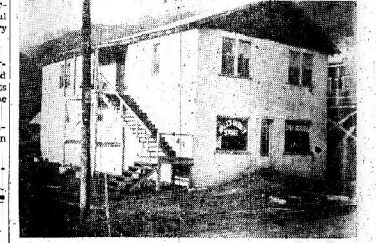

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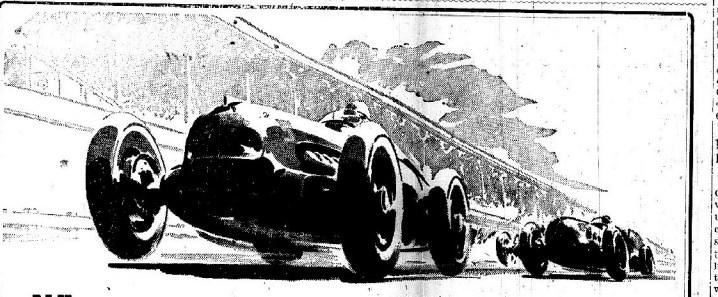

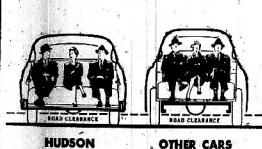
