BAPTISTS WIN IN CHURCHES' LOOP OPENING

OFFICIALS OKEH RULES

Prestonsburg churches softball league fired its opening guns Monday evening on the playground field. When the Baptists opened the 1949 League Presbyterians, 18-3.

The competing Baptists are conducting their winning ways by a narrow margin Tuesday afternoon by defeating the Methodists, 10-7, to lead in the league game going for the year.

The league is composed of the Baptist, Presbyterians, Methodists, Porter Addition Methodists and the West Prestonsburg Assembly of God.

League officials met Thursday night to set the schedule and adopt rules. Rules checked are listed as follows:

1. Age limits, 9-12 and 12-15.
2. Twelve-year-old boys will have their choice of playing with the 9-11 year old group or the 12-15 group. Their choice will be final. They must play the whole season with the age group they select.
3. Every team will provide a full list of players, giving the name of the church or Sunday school they attend. The players' full name and date of birth. A copy of this list is to be given each manager.
4. A large trophy will be given the team in the 12-15 year old team which wins the final playoff series.
5. A small trophy will be awarded the team in the 9-11 year old group winning the final playoff series.
6. The church league season will begin June 28th.
7. Any boy playing on an independent league team June 26th or later is not eligible to play in the church league.
8. Boys can play only on their own church or Sunday school teams.
9. To be eligible to play, a boy must attend church or Sunday school the week he plays. His attendance must be at least one day previous to his playing ball.
10. The use of baseball spikes is prohibited during games.
11. Team managers will set ground rules before each game. Managers will in turn insure compliance of ground rules before each game.
12. Attendance at Sunday school or church during season or section may be excused at discretion of the team manager when evidence is presented that player did attend these required services.
13. Use of profane language, unnecessary roughness, or unnecessary arguing by players will result in suspension from balance of game by managers or umpire.
14. Managers will be responsible for selecting and having umpires for each game.

\$11,000,000 Expected In State Income Taxes Increase for This Year

Frankfort, Ky., May 8—Stronger law enforcement and better compliance by citizens will bring Kentucky about \$11,000,000 of state income taxes this year, William C. Herzog said recently while acting as Kentucky Revenue Commissioner. Last year \$10,000,000 was collected by the state on personal incomes.

Herzog said \$9,179,000 had been received in 1949 earnings by the end of April. He estimated there is \$1,125,000 of unprocessed returns in the mail bags at the Revenue Department.

Late returns and penalty payments will bring the total up to \$10,000,000 he predicted.

Herzog said 102,000 persons paid state income tax in 1948 and 143,000 in 1949. This year about 180,000 will pay, he said.

He attributed the large increase of taxpayers to the Revenue Department's enforcement efforts by its field agents and to the program of public education.

Motion picture shorts explaining the tax system to those who have for it were shown in many Kentucky theatres. Herzog said the press and radio have cooperated in the compliance drive by disseminating stories about the tax.

He said many people have volunteered into the department in the years in which they were liable but failed to pay.

Milk Production Estimated Health Films Now Available Free To Floyd Countians

Dr. Miriam Ransdell, county health officer, announces that 2 to those requested in case the desired may already be in circulation.

Plans should be returned as soon as possible after being shown. Special permission is necessary if films are to be kept longer than a week. Not more than two films should be borrowed at one time, unless a program requiring more films is planned.

Dr. Ransdell stressed the importance of allowing ample time for ordering films. "In this way," he said, "the person or persons wishing to borrow the film may avoid last minute disappointments."

Operators Licenses Go On Sale in July Throughout Kentucky

Frankfort, Ky., June 27. (Sp.)—Renewals of Motor Vehicle Operator's License for 1950-51, commonly referred to as "operator's licenses," will be on sale at the circuit court clerk's office in each county during July. Paul Boyd, of the Operator's License Section, Department of Revenue, announced today.

Boyd called attention to two important changes in the law. Kentucky Military Extension Permits become void on July 1, 1950. Operator's Permits from the United States are good only while operating official vehicles in the course of service. Military personnel must have a regular State Motor Vehicle Operator's License the same as a civilian, when operating any privately owned vehicle on the highway. On and after July 1, the holder of a Military Extension Permit and a motorcycle will be identified, such on the face of the license and cannot be used for the operation of a regular automobile.

Applicants for any type of operator's license between 16 and 18 years of age must have the father or legal guardian sign that he assumes responsibility under the Operator's License Law, Boyd said.

Origin of the title, which appar- ently came to Floyd county from Virginia and North Carolina with those earliest venturesome folk who sought homes in the wilderness that now is represented by 15 Eastern Kentucky counties, is obscure. Some hold it may have been a variation of the title, "Stur," with which nobility was addressed in Europe; others, that it was originally "grand sire" meaning grandfather. 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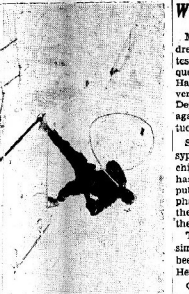

State — Begins V. With Mass Testing

Mass blood testing of school children and a new filter paper blood test for syphilis are the new techniques inaugurated by Dr. Robert Hansen, director of the division of venereal disease control of the State Department of Health, in the drive against congenital syphilis in Kentucky.

Since the majority of congenital syphilis is not detected until the child is past infancy, Dr. Hansen has begun mass blood testing in public and private schools and orphanages, through cooperation of the State Department of Health and the county health units.

The filter paper blood test is a simple, easy-to-obtain test that has been developed by the U. S. Public Health Service. Out of 27,247 cases of syphilis reported in Kentucky the past five years, 973 have been cases of congenital syphilis—the type that is passed on to unborn babies by their infected mothers.

"This figure represents only an estimated one-third of the cases of congenital syphilis in Kentucky. Unfortunately, too many cases are unknown or unreported," said Dr. Hansen. Since penicillin appeared on the scene in 1945, the discovery and cure of other types of syphilis has passed out of the public health picture. But no comparable decline has been shown in congenital syphilis.

This situation has alarmed national and state public health authorities and has sent Dr. Hansen on the trail of congenital syphilis in Kentucky. "The earliest and saddest aspect of syphilis concerns the babies who are born with the disease," Dr. Hansen said. "The disease is transmitted to the unborn child sometime after the fifth month of pregnancy."

The treatment when started before the eighth month prevents the transmission of syphilis from the mother in at least nine out of ten cases. If the infected expectant mother receives no treatment, the child stands only about one chance in eight of being born healthy, he emphasized. "When no treatment is given the expectant mother, the child is often born dead, usually prematurely. If born alive, the infant may die shortly after birth," Dr. Hansen added.

Children found with congenital syphilis may obtain treatment from their family physicians or the Kentucky Rural Treatment Center in Louisville. When infected children fail to get treatment, the disease often strikes them in their teens or early adulthood, with blindness, deformity, insanity, heart-disease or crippling paralysis.

NO STOCKING

Fisheries Biologist Says Bass Plentiful; Tests Made This Week

Dewey Lake tests no stocking of bass, Bernard Carter, fisheries biologist, Kentucky Division of Game & Fish, declared here Monday.

He arrived at that conclusion after only two sweeps of a net. A fishing crew dipped into the Tandy's Branch "slow" Monday afternoon, and what they saw convinced them this year's natural hatch of fish in those waters is heavy.

"The bass reproduction in the lake," said Mr. Carter, "is extremely good. Natural reproduction is not only high; the condition of the fish is good." To add bass fry from state hatcheries or to buy active bass for the lake would be a waste of money and might throw the fish population of the waters out of balance, he added. "You might add a million fry to the lake for the carp and gar to feed on, and the result would not be any improvement in the natural reproduction which already is going on," he commented.

The Division of Game & Fish added 2,000 largemouth fingerlings to the lake, Saturday. Plans of sportsmen over the section to purchase adult bass in an effort to hurry along heavier catches in the reservoir have been discouraged by Minnie Clarke, superintendent of fish management for the state Division of Game & Fish. Five thousand adult crappie are scheduled for release in the lake next month.

Less week's heavy rains brought the reservoir several feet above the conservation stage, and it is still a foot or two high. As a consequence, few bass have been caught within the last week.

STATE OFFERS HEALTH SHOW

To Be Held July 6-7 Featuring Exhibit On Heart Disease

Something new in health education will be offered visitors to the Kentucky Rural Electric Cooperative's farm show caravan when it arrives in Prestonsburg for a two-day stand, July 6-7. Besides the attractions planned by the RECCO, the State Department of Health will have exhibits on heart disease, venereal disease, tuberculosis and sanitation.

The show will open at a site on the main street of Prestonsburg at 1 p.m., on July 6 and run until 10 p.m. The second day, the schedule is from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m. Feature of the heart exhibit will be the movie, "Be Your Age," which will run continuously. The 11-minute short tells the story of how one man recovers from a heart attack and learns how to adjust himself to living with a handicapped heart. "Everyone who visits the booth will be urged to weigh to determine any degree of overweight, an important factor in heart disease. A special audiotape unit set up on the grounds will show top-grade films on entertaining and informative" said Dr. Robert Hansen, director of venereal disease control. "The mobile x-ray unit of the division of Tuberculosis Control will offer free x-rays for all over 15 years of age."

Sanitation will be represented by a model farm home complete with septic tank and cistern. Lights flash to show pure water coming into the house and waste water leaving. Sanitarians from health units in the area will be in the booth to confer with those interested. Coffee grounds make a good sweeping compound for concrete floors.

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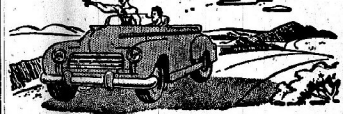

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY

You may recall my flagging at Henry, W. Va., newspaper columnist's day of June 1950. You had signs to help people from outside the state find the great scenic wonders in Kentucky.

Well, everything is a jape now. At least for the present. No more bronze equestrian. Mr. Ward gets the kind of letters that thrill the souls of actors, and cause many public speakers to keep on talking when they should shut up and sit down. From your humble correspondent a lot of letters and telegrams.

Mr. Ward says he has had his own troubles getting the signs. That is to be expected in view of the fact that special arrangements had to be made.

A letter from Commissioner Ward follows:

"I appreciate your interest in continuing to put out that adequate signs have not been placed directing motorists to Kentucky Dam and Kentucky Lake. You may be surprised to know that 30 signs have been erected along the highway, not the two that you mentioned in your article recently.

"The trouble is that there are so many highways which must be considered that 20 do not make a dent in the picture. Twenty-five new signs have been on order for several months, and I have just placed an order for 40 additional. These will be large metal signs in 8-stichite, so that they will be effective at night as well as in the daytime.

"The delay in acquiring signs has arisen from the fact that the Highway Department has been unable to furnish us with signs and standard letters had to be made for their manufacture elsewhere.

"I hope that you will continue watching this situation and calling attention to any shortcomings." Maybe in a year or two we can get all the signs that are needed to direct people to the big scenic attractions in the state. That might mean 500 metal signs 14x20 inches. That number wouldn't make a dent in the state's treasury.

"The delay in acquiring signs in Mammoth Cave and Kentucky Dam should be over the border in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Tennessee. I have never seen one of two Mammoth Cave signs in Indiana.

Road signs are the cheapest advertising the state can buy.

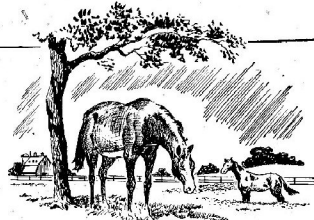

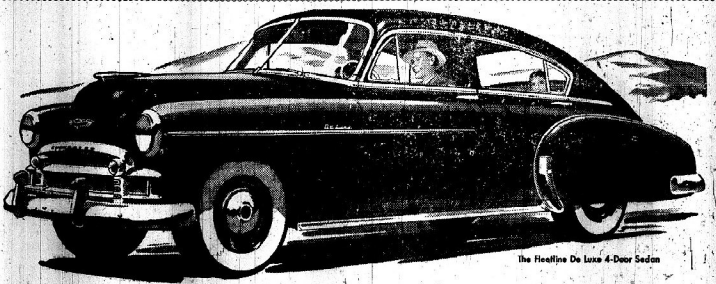
