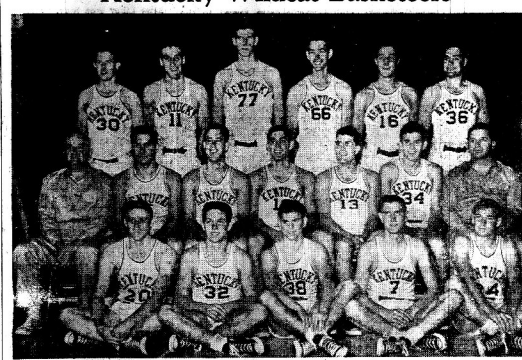

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COACHES VOTE FLOYD STAR THIS AREA'S BEST PLAYER

Here's a good question for basketball fans of this section: "Whom do you consider the best basketball player in this area today?" Compare your answer with that which 92 per cent of the net coaches of Eastern Kentucky gave to the same question when it was handed them in a recent poll conducted by Gordon Moore, Prestonsburg. That overwhelming opinion consensus replied, "Frankie Crum, of Betsy Layne." And several coaches added that Crum is possibly the all-time greatest in the history of Eastern Kentucky basketball.

When asked, "How would you rate him with Pikeville's all-time great Dickie Prater and Meade Memorial's Albert White?" the majority of replies favored Crum because he was a better all-around defensive player, ball-handler and rebounder.

What has Crum done to draw this praise? Thus far in 23 games he has hooped 610 points for a nifty 26.5 average. With eight season games remaining and then the tournament, he may go above 800.

Crum, who stands 6 feet, 2 inches tall and weighs 175 pounds, is destined to be the champion painter of the Eastern Kentucky team before he finishes his high school career. The popular senior is playing his fourth year as a starter and may have inherited his uncanny shooting from his dad, Palmer Crum, who made the all-state cage team in 1932 when he

Betsy Layne made the state tournament trip to Lexington. Asire from being a star first baseman on the baseball team, he has made the all-tournament team of every tournament he has appeared in and was also named on the all-state baseball team in the state high school baseball tournament in Louisville last May.

Crum has the reputation of being unstoppable. His average of 21 points in 27 games last year is proof enough that he is master of all defensive set-ups.

Apparently the fact Eastern Kentucky teams have watched him for three previous seasons hasn't hurt his effectiveness. If he can get the ball he can score. Only twice this season has he gone under 20 points—16 against Pikeville Academy and 11 against Martin—when he should have been in bed with a severe cold. He has topped the 30 mark four times with the victims being Garrett, Boley, Castlesburg and Fleming.

His coach, Ted Akers, a Western pre-dict, says, "Crum is the finest team man on the squad and often passes off when he should shoot. Our shot chart records he has 48 per cent for the season, with 20 per cent the lowest and 79 per cent the highest."

**State Tourney Fans

Followers of the hardwood sport who plan to attend the state high school basketball tournament at Lexington March 15-17 are advised to order their tickets and obtain room reservations immediately. That was the word this week from Ed Wilder, secretary of the Lexington Chamber of Commerce which is actively promoting the tournament.

Sale of tickets, books good for all seven sessions of the tourney is proceeding rapidly, but approximately 5,500 seats remain. These include about 500 sidestand seats priced at \$10 and approximately 2,900 end-zone seats priced at \$8. Tickets for single tournament sessions will not go on sale until March 1.

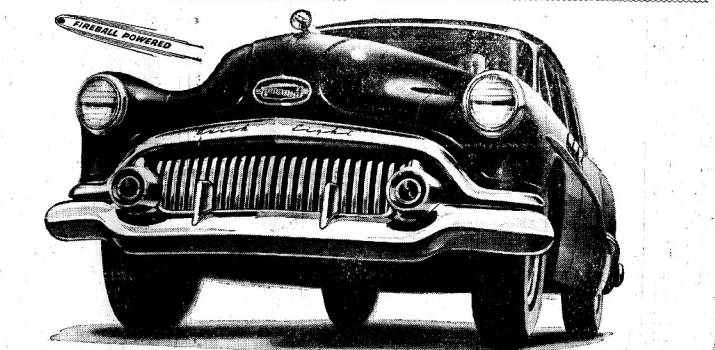

NOTICE TO FLOYD COUNTY TAXPAYERS

It shall be the duty of all persons owning or having interest in any property taxable in this state to list or have listed with the Tax Commissioner of the county in which the property is located between January 1st, and March 1st, 1951.

KRS 132-230:
Any property which has not been listed for taxation, for any year in which it is taxable, by the time the board of supervisors completes its work for that year shall be deemed omitted property.

(2) Omitted property consisting of money in hand, notes, bonds, shares of stock, accounts or other credits, secured or unsecured may be assessed retro-actively, either voluntarily or by action, at any time within ten years from the date when it became omitted. All other omitted property may be assessed retro-actively in the manner provided by law at any time within five years from the date when it became omitted, but the lien thereon by accruing on any such property except real property shall not prejudice the rights of bona fide purchasers acquired in the meantime.

(3) All omitted property that should have been assessed prior to July 1, 1949, shall be subject to the same penalties and rate of interest as provided by law for the years when the property was not assessed. All omitted property that should have been assessed as of or subsequent to July 1, 1949, shall be subject to a penalty of ten percent of the amount of the taxes and interest at 1 per cent per month from the date when the taxes would have become delinquent had the property been listed as required by law, until the date the tax bill is prepared in accordance with KRS 132-230 and 132-340, an additional penalty of twenty percent of the amount of the original tax, interest and penalty shall be collected for the purpose provided in KRS 132-340 and paid into the State Treasury. All other penalties and interest shall be distributed in the same manner as the tax, (1949, et seq., c. 2, effective June 28, 1949). KRS 132-370 (469a-11; 4691; 4691; 4693).

ATTEMPTS TO EVADE TAXATION: PENALTY.

(1) No person shall wilfully make a false statement, or, to avoid taxation, make a temporary investment in securities exempt from taxation, or convert any tangible property into nontaxable property outside of his state, or resort to any device to evade taxation. Any person doing so shall be subject to three times the amount of tax upon his property, to be recovered by the Sheriff by action in the name of the Commonwealth in the county in which the property is liable for taxation, or by the Department of Revenue, when the taxes are payable to it. In the Franklin circuit or quarterly court.

(2) No person shall transfer or assign of record any mortgage note bond or other evidence of indebtedness, secured by any recorded instrument, for the sole purpose of evading the taxes thereon. 1-25-41

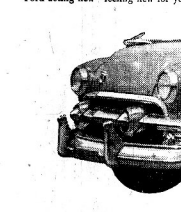

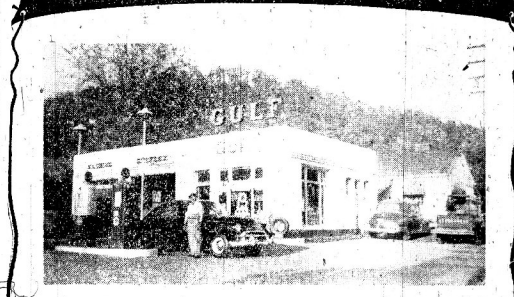

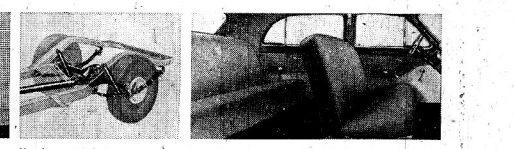
