money for use of their cars on official business. Wagers explained that the bill would be similar to one introduced in the 1950 session of the General Assembly. That bill was passed by the Senate but failed to get through the House of Representatives.

Subjects not specifically included in the call for the special session cannot be acted upon by the Legislature. Brown, said, however, that the Governor can amend the call to include additional matters any time before the session ends.

Ky.-W. Va. Affiliate At Work on New Plant

Work on a new electric generating plant was started this week by a sister company of Kentucky and West Virginia Power Company. The site of the \$4,000,000 plant of the Ohio River Power Company is located on the Muskingum river near McConeysville, Ohio.

Philly Sporn, president of the American Gas & Electric Company, told civic officials and newspapermen the ground-breaking ceremony that construction of the new plant is being accelerated to meet anticipated needs of defense industries in Ohio, West Virginia, Virginia and Kentucky.

The new plant will initially consist of two 200,000 kilowatt units which, in addition to supplying power for the Ohio Power Company, will also make available additional capacity for Kentucky. It is the second 400,000 k.w. generating plant to be started within six months by American Gas and Electric Service Corporation. Construction was started on the Karawha river plant near Charleston, W. Va., by the Appalachian Power Company in October, 1950.

With full load, it is expected that Muskingum River's 400,000 kilowatts of capacity will consume 1,000,000 tons of coal per year. Mr. Sporn pointed out that the units at the new plant will be among the largest and most efficient generating units in the nation.

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH
BY EWING GALLOWAY

"Congratulations on your last article," writes Andrew J. Norfleet, editor of the Times Journal of Russell Springs. He means the one about the shocking inequalities in the assessment of real estate in many Kentucky counties.

"I have just finished reading your column, and I agree with every word of it," Mr. Norfleet continues. "It is an insult to honest taxpayers the way some of our county governments are managed."

Well, Mr. Norfleet and other patriotic Kentuckians your correspondence is only a voice in a wilderness of low-grade politics and public indifference but there must be a glimmering, flickering hope for fairer taxation so long as the voters are not allowed to forget the ardent tax evils that plague most of our 120 counties. Ancient is right. Kentuckians have been assessing \$15,000 property at \$1,000 ever since property owners began evaluating their own belongings, and they will go right on doing it until public opinion is aroused and courageous men and women take the situation in hand.

The whole tax system was set up originally with the idea of offending as few property owners as possible. Its enactment was a political job. Property owners were put on their honor for the most part. Assessors have been taking people's word for it ever since our county governments were set up. When the commissioner's job is finished a board of equalization usually goes to Frankfort to see to it that the county's rate is not raised.

Our county tax commissioners are to blame for the evils that plague property taxation in Kentucky. Maybe if they took the bull by the horns and raised assessments they knew to be outrageously low, they could get away with it. Maybe they would be shot from ambush. But we should not expect reforms until the public is aroused at least enough to back up the legislature in enacting a better law.

Tax reform in Kentucky calls for the best brains in the state, and maybe the advice of tax experts from outside. It is not a job for newspapermen. The duty of the press is to help arouse the public to the need of better tax laws and then give encouragement and moral support to the General Assembly.

Until the system is reformed! Kentuckians will continue to thank God for whatever state is forty-eighth in progress. That is, if it are not forty-eighth ourselves.

BATES PULLS OUT OF RACE

Says Work in Congress During Crisis Is More Important Than Ambition

Congressman Joe B. Bates, of Greenup, Saturday announced his withdrawal as a prospective candidate for Governor of Kentucky.

"Believing I should continue to render service from the national level during these trying times, I have decided not to become a candidate for the governorship of Kentucky," Bates said in a statement.

Bates announced in Louisville last Dec. 2 his intention to run for Governor.

However, he said, he did so with the reservation that he might withdraw if the crisis facing the country did not subside.

"It is my belief that some progress has been made toward achieving peace," Bates said, "but we must all recognize the world picture continues dark and there appears little hope that the threatening war clouds of possible global conflict will dissipate in the foreseeable future—certainly not by the time of this year's primary election in Kentucky."

"This is no time for any member of Congress or any person holding a position of trust in the national government to place his aspirations before service to his country."

Bates said that since his original announcement, he has become a member of two subcommittees of the House Appropriations committee handling "all funds for the defense and preparedness program, with the exception of that granted directly to the military."

"All appropriations for European recovery, National Production Authority and other defense agencies are cleared through these committees," Bates said.

That's the number of degrees awarded by the school during its life span. Of that total, 14,884 were granted to men, and 7,581 to women. Bachelor's degrees have gone to 18,885, graduate degrees to 3,495, and honorary degrees to 164. During that same period the number of faculty and staff members rose from 21 to its present size of approximately 800, and the student body grew from 190 in 1866 to more than 10,000 in 1950.

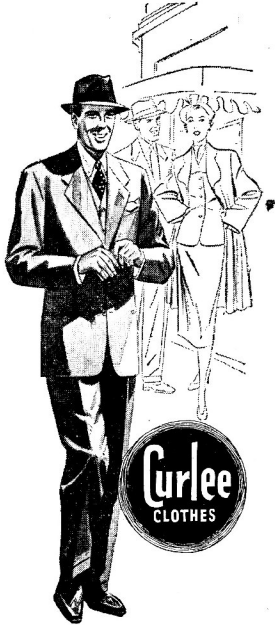

Previous to Elder Romney's current position, he was active in the auxiliary organizations of the Church, having served as Sunday School superintendent and president of the 33rd Quorum of Seventy. In 1936 he was appointed bishop of the 33rd ward. In 1938 he was appointed president of the Booneville Stake, a position he held until being appointed an assistant to the Council of Twelve.

He has had an active career in Church and legal circles in Salt Lake City for several years. He was born in Sept., 1897 in Colonia, Jaerez, Mexico.

He came to Salt Lake City with his family in 1912 and since then had an active career both in Utah and Idaho. Graduated from the University of Utah, receiving his B.S. in 1926 and his LL.B. in 1932.

He entered the Utah Bar in 1930 and in addition to his practice has served as assistant to the county attorney, the district attorney and to the city attorney.

Elder Romney filled a mission to Austria from 1929 to 1933.

One of the objectives of this program is to "help others to help themselves."

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IT'S A GOOD WORLD

Many are wondering how good the world is as they view the course of present events and the falling efforts to preserve world peace, which remains at present an empty dream.

Citizens are asking if Russia should be invited to the Big Four Conference, scheduled to meet in the near future. The Soviets are concerned now that America has at last decided to arm Europe and to increase U.S. divisions already there. It is an initial step to check further expansion of the U.S.S.R. by her favorite method of occupying helpless nations or making them satellites.

The idea of rearmament in Western Germany does not appeal to the Kremlin, for both British and American sectors are close to her. The Iron Curtain has protected the Eastern sector, which she occupies. Russia now claims to be in favor of disarmament, but actions speak louder than words. Or does she mean disarmament for the rest of the world? Who can afford to accept her word? Would her signature in a treaty have any real value since she has broken 28 treaties and alliances in the past 25 years? Representatives from the U.S.S.R. have upset practically every meeting of the United Nations since its beginning, despite the fact that for the most part they have been handling with gloves. While Russia continued to grab all the territory possible, to indoctrinate other nations with Communism, America and Great Britain have been granting independence to colonies and islands. Yet, the Soviets accuse the United States of being a warmonger, stirring trouble in the Far East. Had this been true we certainly would have had more manpower and equipment available in Korea than in the case. If America had wanted war, we never would have disposed of billions of dollars worth of army equipment at the close of the war.

While it is well known that the immediate goal of the U.S.S.R. is the Eastern Hemisphere, composed of Europe, Asia and Africa, students of Russian history are fully aware that Soviet leaders for centuries have dreamed of conquering the world.

History bears the record of four previous world empires, which have risen and passed into oblivion: the Babylonian, Media-Persian, Grecian, and the Roman, under Caesar. A fifth, according to the prophets, is yet to rise into existence. Daniel foresaw it and described it in the dream he interpreted; moreover, it will be composed of the common class of people. Is this fifth and last world empire now in the making? It's the lowest class in the Communist seeks first. They not only outnumber all the others but they are the most susceptible to aims and propaganda of all sorts. Russia uses subtle methods, but her unique tactics do have a definite pattern. She invades quietly and gradually first, and then attacks from the inside out, but many nations are too glib to discover this. Her fifth column activities in Italy have been as deliberate and as well planned as any military campaign that was ever waged. Her two-point formula of promoting internal discord and of creating war internally, or between other nations, is a handiwork. She scatters the armies of potential enemies, weakening the nation economically, while building her own war machine to perfection.

America has been right to expect world peace, but God does not expect anyone to ignore the inevitable, or quietly to submit to another Pearl Harbor. There is only one way to avert a single night. We have waited years to recognize and grapple with the real problem. Must we now permit Russia to seek further compromise, and stalling, to offer new promises to be broken as a Soviet style?

The cost of an entire war never pays for the life of the poorest, most illiterate soldier who dies in its course. Why not lay it on the map, tell Russia to step on the dotted line or else, that she can tear the entire string of nations she has occupied since the war ended. Lift the Iron Curtain NOW, prove she is disarming, and then we will talk peace and other matters with her?

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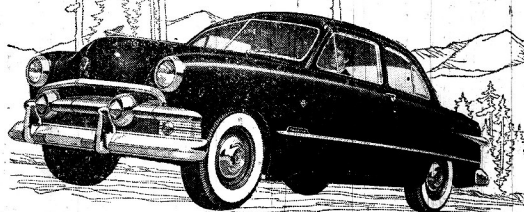
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
