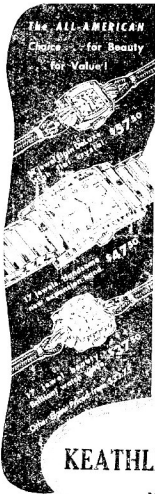

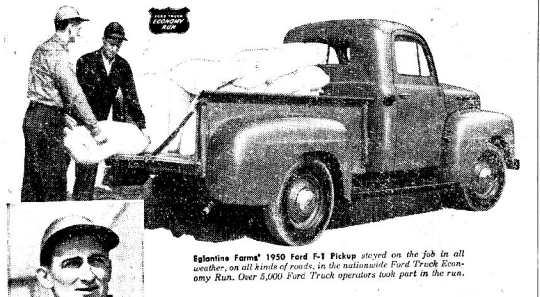

A crowd estimated by Judge Stumbo at 2,000 persons heard the merits of Allen and Prestonsburg at the public hearing held on the proposed Allen site, Saturday afternoon. Except for the hearing of two Prestonsburg speakers, the hearing was orderly. Some estimate of the crowd did not reach 1,000.

Dr. Underwood opened the meeting by commenting, "I think it is a wonderful thing that we live in a country where we can discuss things in a democratic way." In this statement he suggested that the 75-bed hospital facility for Floyd county could be split into two hospitals—50 beds at Martin, 25 beds in Prestonsburg.

The Prestonsburg delegation was allotted the first 45 minutes of the hearing, with Allen speakers allowed the following period of the same time. Rebuttal for each side was limited to 20 minutes each, with each speaker given three minutes.

Views expressed by principal speakers, in brief were:

A. I. May, moderator of the Prestonsburg group: It is a long pull to make the hospital a success, and there has been a greater increase in population in Prestonsburg than elsewhere in the county. Prestonsburg has the greatest number of facilities—schools, churches and recreational activities—all important to nurses and hospital staff.

Mayor Curtis Clarke: Prestonsburg people were first notified of the chance for the county to get the hospital, and he called the meeting at which County Judge Henry Stumbo was present to apply for funds and contacted the architects. Prestonsburg men contributed \$500 toward informing the people of the hospital issue and 53 have pledged \$400 each to equip rooms in the hospital. Cited water and gas supply here, removal of water company to give \$40,000 in the way of extending lines. Community has police force, drug stores, pharmacists, ambulances, hotels, bakery and other facilities.

Mrs. Regina E. Mayo: There are nine registered nurses in Prestonsburg. The town is good as a permanent residence, which would attract a turnover in hospital personnel and thus assure better and more efficient work.

Dr. C. L. Huttschiller: Cited need of pharmacists and told of calls for such services from other parts of the county. "We should fight for the whole of Floyd county and not for any one part."

Rev. L. W. Benedict: Cited the number of ministers of all faiths who could call on patients at Prestonsburg hospital. "I want what I think everyone wants, and that is what is best."

Paul Hayes, moderator of the Allen group: Argued that the hospital should be located near the mining section on the Beaver Creek.

Dr. Russell Hall, Wheelwright: "Wheelwright has everything Prestonsburg has, but I'm not asking for the hospital to be put up there. Wheelwright is six miles from the Pike county line, and Prestonsburg

is six miles from the Johnson county line. Both are too far from the people."

Carson Hibbits, UMW representative, Pikeville: More mines are closed below Allen than above. Wants hospital at Allen because of mines it would serve. Nine miles difference in distance may be difference between life and death. He added, however, that the UMW would support the hospital if it is located in Prestonsburg.

The Commissioner Clive Akers: 77 per cent of taxes come from sections above Allen. Motive should be moved, not money.

Wayne Raliff, Wheelwright: Distance of nine miles strong contention. The highway between Allen and Prestonsburg is the most congested in the state. Necessity will make available facilities now lacking at Allen.

Noah Howard, Wayland: There is plenty of coal left to provide work for families needing services of the hospital. He referred to the payment of Mr. May to the effect that the coal industry is "stuck" and that too much dependence cannot be placed on it to assure the success of the hospital.

After a series of brief rebuttals all present to go home. "I think this matter over and tomorrow morning go to the church of your choice. The spiritual means more than the material."

In a meeting here Wednesday afternoon, Prestonsburg business men issued the following statement which they said, was made to clarify their position on the hospital site contention:

"Saturday afternoon at Allen, we stated our case as plainly and factually and as dispassionately as possible. Certainly, there was nothing of hatred in our attitude toward others contending against us. We still maintain that if the hospital is to be the success it must be in order to serve the county as it has been planned to serve, it must be located in or near Prestonsburg. We have no quarrel with others who do not accept that view."

"Now that the State Board of Health has heard the opposing views as an arbiter in the matter, removed from the scene of contention and thus able to see all angles in the proper perspective, we are willing to accept the Board's decision as final. We challenge all others to join us in this spirit."

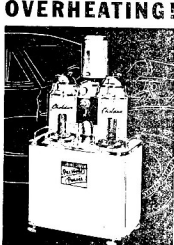

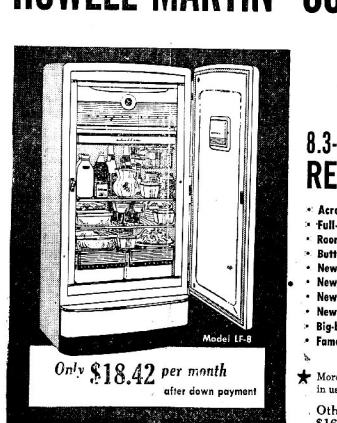

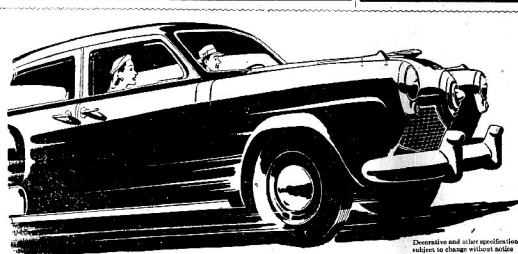

### Jest Among Us...

By Jack W.M.

Coler fishing?—"Fishing"—"Fishing? If so, are you worried about the snakes you might meet up with?"

William R. Allen, biology professor at the University of Kentucky, supplies the answers to some oft-asked questions about "em."

What are the really poisonous snakes in our part of the world? There are four kinds: the 15 or more species of rattlesnakes, the copperhead, the water moccasin, and the coral snake of the South.

How high will a snake strike? Barely above the knees, generally below.

Does the snake have to coil to strike? No, but the coiled snake will be able to reach farther and strike.

Does the rattlesnake always rattle before striking? Usually, if there are any rattles, it is awake. But if stepped on, the rattlesnake does not take time to rattle.

Why does a snake threaten you with its tongue? The answer is that it does not. The snake sees poorly at best, leaves very little at all, and because of its early skin has a poor sense of touch. Its best means of finding out where you are is by feeling the air waves with its tongue.

What is the truth about hoop-snakes? There isn't and there aren't.

Why do we have a fear of snakes, and is it a necessary part of us? Many people think it is, from birth. But such is not the case. A baby who has never seen or heard of a snake has no fear of it, and even wants to play with it. We are taught to be afraid of snakes and of the dark, and of many other things, and our imagination paints these dangers as vividly for us as though they were really true.

Suppose I make that fishing trip on that lake or go on that picnic—what are my chances of losing my life to a snake bite? Well, there are about 150,000,000 people in the United States, and maybe 150 of them will die of snake bite this year. If you could live so long, it might be a million years before you meet a snake destined to take your life.

Now go on and enjoy that outing.

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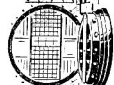

#### "MALE AND FEMALE CREATED HE THEM"

A student of folklore does not around Fidelity felt that drawing pictures was even wicked, sure to endanger one's happiness in the next life.

May I make a confession, a sissy confession? I have always loved dolls, all kinds of them. I never owned one doll in my life, a quaint old-fashioned one with sawdust body and china head and feet and hands. But I loved that doll so well that all other dolls seem sacred. I enjoyed the numerous dolls that Santa Claus and other friends brought my daughter and much later, my grand-daughter. Dolls, as any little girl will tell you, have personally just like folks. All the dolls that I have known will certainly have been as individual as most people. Playing with dolls was a fearful tabu for boys at Fidelity; and I could hardly play with them—thanks to the protection of some older brothers, who did not like the dolls but who would not allow any brats to run over me—, as long as dolls were around. It was a sad day when my sister put away her dolls, away in some of the numerous places where people store things too sacred to burn or give away. It was an even sadder one when I helped store my daughter's dolls. Little creatures that had been a distant part of our family for a decade and more. If he had done such a reprehensible thing, the big boys would have paddled him at recess and threatened his life if he ever told his teacher.

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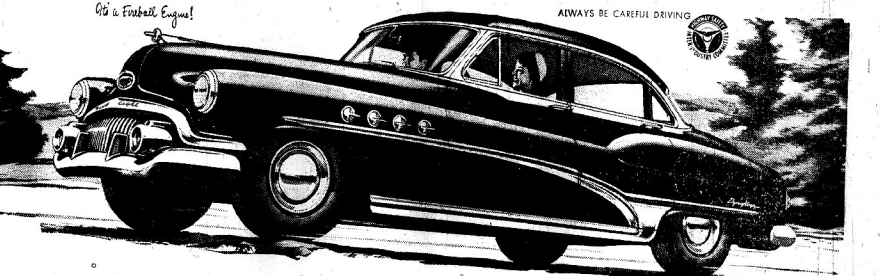

**SPORTS AFIELD**

When a car or trailer is being packed for a trip afield, one of the first pieces of camping equipment to be stored within easy reach is a camera. But frequently, carrying a camera and all its accessories into the field is a nuisance. Commercially-made gadget bags of leather are handy for carrying photographic accessories, and some sportsmen have even built plywood compartments in small suitcases and shoulder packs for toting their equipment. These safeguard the "sensitive" marbles, but often are hard to get into quickly.

But now camera expert Ormal Spragman reports that a friend of his has hit upon a new carry-all idea for outdoor photographers... a vest.

Few photographers have been bothered by their inability to keep camera accessories and extra film where they will be handy when most needed. The small gadget bag is all right if you don't mind something dangling at your side all the time.

However, the carry-all vest has advantages over the gadget bag for portability, convenience, comfort and capacity. It is especially adapted to carrying film holders and accessories for the larger cameras—2 1/2 x 3 1/4 to 4x5.

Packaged along the lines of a hunting jacket, the chief feature of this utility vest is its numerous pockets. The two large inside front pockets will carry at least three film holders each. If film packs or cut film magazines are used, these pockets will carry extras.

The four outside front pockets are, handiest for the small, frequently used items, such as the exposure meter without case, filters, notebook, pencil and steel measuring tape. The double bag in the vest provides the largest pocket, with openings at both sides, for carrying an extra lens or two, film, flashlight bulbs, focusing cloth and lens hood.

This gadget vest is particularly useful on trips after nature and wildlife pictures. And in cool weather it can be worn under a jacket and just the front pockets used.
