TO A QUESTION**  
Editor, The Floyd County Times:  
What protection is afforded Mr.  
Averette Kentucky Motorist by Ken-  
tucky's "Financial Responsibility  
Act"? This law came to be the  
SIXTY-FOUR DOLLAR QUES-  
TION.

Kentucky State Police statistics  
show 26,000 accidents in 1950, an  
increase of 20% over 1949—677 of  
these were fatal—46,655 drivers were  
involved with 35,615 of these pro-  
viding financial responsibility and 16,000  
not providing financial responsi-  
bility.

The present so-called "Financial  
Responsibility Act" now require-  
ment of financial responsibility  
after involvement in an accident  
is a serious and necessary provision  
of financial responsibility in order  
to operate a motor vehicle in Ken-  
tucky.

With 577 of Kentucky's motorists  
being financially responsible and  
677 remaining responsible we are  
wondering you, Mr. and Mrs. Aver-  
ette, Kentucky, to write a letter  
stating whether or not you own  
and operate a motor vehicle whether  
or not you carry public liability  
insurance or a certificate of self-  
insurance, and whether or not you  
feel a motorist should have to  
provide financial responsibility before  
or after the "damage" is done.

Your immediate response to this  
question will go a long way toward  
whether or not the 1952 Kentucky  
General Assembly will plug up the  
hole in the present law thus  
denouncing the "FLAGRANT IR-

### Few People Infected by Polio Develop Paralytic Symptoms

**Editor's Note:** This is the first  
of a series of articles written for  
known by out-standing scientists  
covering present-day knowledge  
about polio, based upon the last  
thirteen years of research sup-  
ported by the National Foundation for  
Infantile Paralysis.

The first time the virus of polio  
was isolated was in 1908. It is a  
filterable virus which enters the human  
body. It causes no symptoms of the  
paralytic disease at all for most  
people. Instead, most of us develop  
an immunity that protects us in  
later contacts with the virus.

If the virus did this for every-  
body, its extensive spread, about  
which little can be done in a prac-  
tical way, might be a good thing.  
But, unfortunately, the infection  
does cause paralysis in a few of the  
many who are exposed to it. Thus  
it may be even more important that  
we know why the virus causes  
paralysis in the few than to know  
how it spreads to everybody.

**Susceptibility in Host**  
The question of who is susceptible  
has been studied for some time by  
scientists supported by grants from  
the National Foundation for In-  
fantile Paralysis. It is now believed  
that the reason for such a great  
difference in the result of exposure  
to the virus is not necessarily in the  
virus itself, as was once thought,  
but can just as well be explained  
by conditions of and in the people  
who are exposed.

**Climate Factor Seen**  
The same virus may attack without  
paralytic results in one person  
and bring about extensive paralysis  
in another. Among the many who  
now are known to be exposed to the  
virus, paralysis follows more  
often in those living in cooler cli-  
mates than in those living in warm-  
er climates. The reason for this is  
not understood, but it might well  
be in some fault in bodily adapta-  
tion to the wider variation in sea-  
sonal in cooler climates and India,  
where the virus seems to cause para-  
lysis somewhat more often in in-  
dividuals of a certain type than  
it does in others. The disease in  
general does not pick those who  
are "run down" in the ordinary  
sense. If anything, it seems to pick  
those who are "run up." It is fre-  
quently seen in the "strongest  
and healthiest" children—even those  
boasting on the road. Exposed  
cases in the same family line sug-  
gest that this "constitutional sus-  
ceptibility" at times may be a fam-  
ily trait.

Other seemingly predisposing  
conditions that cause paralysis in  
individuals who are infected with  
the virus are: the operation to re-  
move tonsils, excessive exertion or  
fatigue and, according to very re-  
cent studies, possibly such simple  
things as the injection of vaccines.  
(The question of inoculations as a  
predisposing factor has been re-  
ported in England and Australia,  
and is being studied in the United  
States now, without definite find-  
ings as yet.) There also is in-  
creased susceptibility in women during  
pregnancy.

**Need Test for Susceptibility**  
Now, of course, all these condi-  
tions are very common and not  
dangerous in themselves. It is only  
in the exceptional instances, when  
they coincide with the wide-spread  
presence of the virus in the com-  
munity, that the conditions play  
a part in converting what would  
have been a harmless infection, re-  
sulting in increased immunity to  
later infections, into the paralytic  
disease.

Even when taken all together,  
these factors explain only a small  
proportion of cases of poliomyelitis.  
Some of them can be taken into  
account in setting up precautions  
during epidemics to prevent at least  
some paralytic cases. But the fact  
that paralytic polio is found in re-  
latively large numbers of people in  
all parts of the world.

"First thinking that fluorine in the water supply might reduce tooth decay came about 40 years ago when the Colorado Springs Dental Association studied the molar condition of the teeth. It occurred in children and adults who had lived in the area during the first eight years of life, but not in persons who had moved there, nor in residents of nearby communities with a different water supply. "People brought up in the over-fluorinated areas had few cavities despite the molar. Later the U. S. Public Health Service found that in less concentrated form, fluoride in the water helped prevent decay without the harmful effect. . . Fluorides, by the way, is extracted from fluorapatite and 50 per cent of the nation's supply is mined in Kentucky."

**MOUNTAIN SLAYER IS BEST RISK AS PAROLEE, CLAIM**

Frankfort, Ky., June 11 — The prisoner most likely to make good when paroled is a Kentucky mountaineer man sent up for a killing. Most of them are farmers.

The worst parole risks are men convicted of fraud and extortion, including forgery.

That's the conclusion reached after several months' study of 1,022 white men paroled from LaGrange Reformatory between January 1, 1936, and August 31, 1940.

It showed that approximately 75 per cent of all those released to take promised jobs before their terms ended behaved themselves. The other 25 per cent got into trouble again and were returned to prison.

The study showed more failures among the better-educated prisoners than among those with little education.

State Probation and Parole Director Darrell B. Hancock said today the results of the survey will be passed on to the State Legislature Research Commission and made available for the General Assembly's consideration. A similar study is being made of the records of boys and girls paroled from the Kentucky Houses of Reform at Greendale. Later, a study is to be made at Edinville Penitentiary.

Hancock emphasized that predictions based on the survey will not influence the Parole Board any more than other features of prisoners' cases. But he said the survey will be there if the board wants it.

John E. Conner, administrative assistant to Hancock, made the survey and used it to write a thesis for his master's degree at the University of Kentucky.

The survey bears out views of 63-year-old Reynolds Hamilton, head of the Automobile Reformatory. He has been in charge of stamping out these plates for 25 years and has concluded that the best workers in the shop are killers. The explanation given is that men kill in anger and then try to make good again.

Pikeville, Ky. — A husband and wife are among the 24 Floyd county students who have registered for the first five-week summer term at Pikeville Junior College, President A. A. Page of the school announced recently.

The term, ending July 7, will be followed by a second five-week session which will close with the annual summer commencement August 11.

All but 20 of the college's 148 summer students are teachers and prospective teachers in the public schools, Dr. Page said. Twenty-two of the Floyd countians, including Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Hall, Byrns, are enrolled in the teachers' course, and one each in scientific and business courses.

Six Kentucky counties and two in West Virginia are represented in the new student body at Pikeville. The Floyd county group is outnumbered by Pike county's 89, of whom 82 are in the teachers' course.

Marion county has contributed 13, all teachers, and others from Letcher, Johnson and Knott counties, Ky., and Mingo and Logan counties, W. Va., are included.

As might be expected, women far outnumber men. There are only 36 men to 113 women in the student group. Floyd county men are in the minority 18 to six.

## CAPITAL Funding

Licenses are required for fishing in private waters by persons other than the owners, resident members of their families and tenants according to a ruling of the Attorney General's office.

High-level prestige, inspired by the Korean defense efforts together with more efficient tax enforcement were cited by the Departments of Revenue and Finance as contributing factors resulting in the largest revenue collections in the history of the state.

General fund collections for the eleven-month fiscal period ending May 31 were \$63,135,976, an increase of fifteen per cent over receipts at the same point last year, while road fund receipts totaled \$45,908,929, an increase of five per cent. The special rural road fund—financed by the two-cent added gasoline tax—has yielded \$9,916,395 since last July 1.

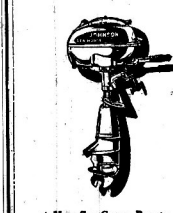
Commissioner of Industrial Relations Edwin C. Willis promised in July to determine whether to make compulsory a non-mandatory wage order setting higher wage scales for hotel and restaurant help. Several months ago, Willis issued an order prescribing higher wage scales in these fields. The order is under legal attack in the Courts. The law provides that when an order is made, that it may be made mandatory if a subsequent hearing develops widespread violations.

The Kentucky Public Service Commission began a survey to determine the number of farms in each county having electric and telephone facilities, to determine the extent of rural progress in the utility field. It called on all county farm agents to assist in the endeavor.

State Veterinarian L. L. Brock warned all stockyards that beginning July 1 all sheep returning to the farms which pass through the yards must be dipped—or the yards will be quarantined.

And there was the other case of a young mother of 23 who left Hazelwood, she might be left with her baby. In a hasty whisper she told the nurse her story. But this fateful decision did not return her baby to her. Within a few months her case became so acute that her husband wisely sent the babe to stay with an aunt to prevent infection. So it was that the young mother lost her battle for life and a lifetime with her baby. Mrs. Mayo keeps a map of Floyd County, which tells a story, too. There are 175 black ticks on the map, and each tick represents a life claimed by TB. As it glances the 175 black ticks on the map, she wrote, "I wondered how many would not have been there had they known and heeded the 'Crisis' Story of TB' several years ago."

boats other than those which the victims themselves operated or occupied as passengers, and the other was simply an automobile wreck, the eight-mile speed limit has not been observed and boats have been operated recklessly. "A few people overlooking the rights of others can jeopardize the enjoyment of thousands," said Col. Krueger, adding: "It would behoove these few to stop now and consider their future course of action." Colonel Krueger's formal statement dealing with the situation follows: "In view of the expressed willingness on the part of the local people in the vicinity of Henry reservoir to cooperate with respect to operation of boats at speeds not exceeding eight miles per hour, the limit of boat speed on boats at DeWitt was removed by the Corps of Engineers in the spring of 1950 on a trial basis. Failure on the part of the visiting public, in whose recreation we are all interested, to operate boats within a safe limit will force reconsideration of the limitation on horsepower."

Policing of the reservoir with a view to enforcing a safe speed limit and an orderly operation of boats will, in all probability, not be undertaken. Compliance by the visiting public with the rules of safety and the obligation to consider the rights of others will be stressed, instead, and failure to comply will result in lowered power of motors, it was indicated. The Corps of Engineers arranged for a conference here Monday with interested citizens and officials, seeking a solution to the problem created by lake traffic. The increasing number of drownings in the waters of the Tennessee and Cumberland valleys has so forcibly impressed the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, that Col. Henry Walsh, chief of the Nashville district office, has accepted the responsibility of forming a Water Safety Commission, intended to formulate an effective program "to reduce this useless loss of life." Congressman Carl D. Perkins, along with representatives from various state and federal agencies, boat dock owners, educators, officials and others, was invited to the organizational meeting in Nashville, Tuesday of this week.

### SOIL CONSERVATION

By L. R. JOHNSON  
Soil Conservation Service

Vern J. Smith, of Allen, J. B. Charles, Prestonsburg, and Mill Stanley, Bonanza, have seeded demonstration plots of lespedeza sericea on their farms. This seed is an improved strain produced by the Soil Conservation Nursery.

One hundred-fifty pounds of lespedeza sericea seed was furnished to the Floyd County Soil Conservation District.

Sericea has proved valuable in erosion control. The U. S. Government has used tons of sericea seed during the past few years in soil conservation work. The vigorous roots of the thick top growth and the coating of fallen leaves which the seed receives, prevents erosion.

It is a perennial, leguminous plant, long lived with strong stems and well supplied with leaves. It is suited to a comparatively wide range of soils and will produce normal growth on soil much too low in fertility for red clover, and thrives on poor soil where other crops will not even grow. If mowed at the right stage, it will make excellent hay. It also makes better pasture when properly managed.

Like most other crops, it will do better when seeded on good ground, limed and fertilized and seeded on a firm seed bed.

A few acres of lespedeza sericea on any farm will insure pasture added when other farm crops are drought-killed.

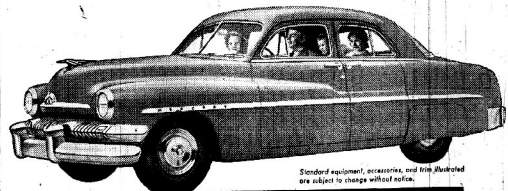

### Another Interstate Bridge Needed

The news that a half-million-dollar bridge, constructed jointly by the highway departments of Kentucky and West Virginia and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads across the Tug fork at Williamson, brings to mind that toll-bridge between Louisa, Ky., and Fort Gay, W. Va., which spans both forks of the Big Sandy.

Is it too much to hope that, one day, the two states will get together and eliminate that imposition on the traveling public?

Old, narrow, antiquated, it has been a veritable sold mine for its private owners but for the traveler it is a headache and he leaves it with his blond pressure bouncing for having had to pay for the right to cross such a makeshift euphemistically known as an interstate bridge.

### Why We Know So Little of Law and Other Matters

The layman isn't expected to know what our statute books contain, most of the laws are so seldom used. Did you know, for instance, that this was written into the Kentucky statutes, seven years ago? — "Instruction in all phases of conservation and preservation shall be included in the curriculum of the public schools of Kentucky; and text books regarding the proper use and protection of forests, soils, waters, minerals and wildlife shall be prepared or selected by the State Textbook Commission for this purpose."

Except for the Agriculture classes which are a part of the curriculum of some high schools, how much has this law meant to the public schools of Kentucky and to the state's wildlife and soil conservation programs? True Junior Conservation Clubs have been organized in the high schools of this state, but not by teachers. These are conducted by conservation officers working with the Kentucky Division of Game and Fish.

Pointing out that no textbooks have been provided and that it can discern no earnest effort anywhere to comply with this law, the League of Kentucky Sports commented editorially in a recent number of "Happy Hunting Grounds":

"If those charged with the education of Kentucky's youth is slow in providing for this particular type of instruction called for by the statutes, perhaps some enterprising individuals can carry on until the Rip Van Winkle brush the embryos from their brows and carry out the law.

"A lesson might be learned from New Hampshire where instead of giving the children a general course in conservation, the schools cooperating under the program study their own community from the standpoint of its dependence upon natural resources. This demonstration needs no text book.

"And a short story with a moral concerns a group studying conservation education problems who came upon a country school house in a mountain community. The building was perched upon the lip of a huge eroding gully which was nibbling at its foundations.

"When the teacher was asked by one of the group if she ever taught her pupils about soil conservation and erosion, she replied, 'It would be an excellent idea, but the Board of Education never has provided us with any material on the subject.'"

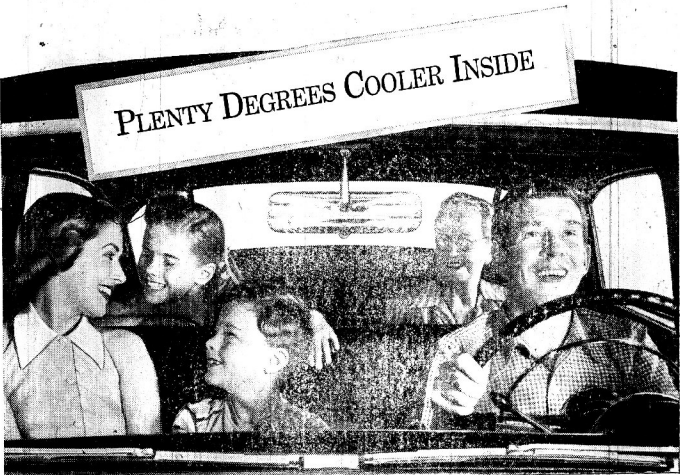



**Deadline for Loans From VA for Homes, Farms Is June 30th**

World War II veterans planning to apply for direct home or farm loans from the Veterans Administration were reminded by VA today that the direct government loan program ends by law on June 30, 1951.

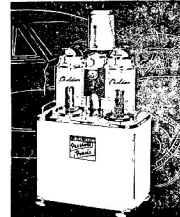
VA said it would severely be possible in most instances to process applications before the June 30 deadline that are received by the VA regional offices after June 15.

The Housing Act of 1950 authorized VA to make direct loans up to \$10,000 at a direct interest to World War II veterans with whom to buy or build a home, or to build or improve a farmhouse. The act stipulated that VA was to make these direct loans in those areas of the country where the regular GI loans were not available from private lenders. The law further required VA to estimate the areas as eligible for direct loans.

As of May 19, about 90-million dollars of the 150-million dollars authorized for the program had been disbursed or reserved under pending applications for direct loans to veterans.

Since the direct government loan program ends June 30, 1951, the regular GI loan program does not expire until July 25, 1951. Both programs are subject to the same minimum down payments imposed by the credit control announced October 12, 1950.

**OPS NOTES**

**Grocers Cooperate, Restaurants**

In twenty-six of Kentucky's 120 counties not a single restaurant operator has complied with OPS regulations by filing the required data with his office, John W. Manning, Kentucky Director of the Office of Price Stabilization, said. In contrast to this "disappointing situation" he cited the unusually high cooperation of Kentucky grocers, a seventy-one per cent of whom have filed OPS reports from every county in the State. Under the regulations, every restaurant should have filed by April 30 a statement of its food-cost-per-dollar-of-sales. The number which has done so represents only sixteen per cent of the total, Manning revealed.

**Apparel Maker's Prices Regulated**

Practically all types of men's, women's, children's and infants' apparel is brought under price regulation by the Office of Price Stabilization, the Louisville District Office announced.

Purpose of the new regulation which manufacturers must comply with by August 15 is (1) to roll back any cost margins that may have been widened since pre-Korean days, (2) to reduce normal cost-price relationships, and (3) to grant makers any needed relief from the general freeze order.

In addition to most kinds of garments and underwear, the regulation controls prices on bathing suits, handbags, neckwear, scarves, ear muffs, garter supporters, hat bodies and other items important in the family budget. The apparel manufacturers ceiling price regulation is another step in the planned program of providing "balanced" or special OPS regulations to cover the needs of each industry and to further hold the value of the buying power of our dollars. Homer C. Lewis, District Price Executive, said.

**Price Regulation for Veal Studied**

The Office of Price Stabilization is now engaged in a study of dollars and cents price ceilings as a wholesale for veal. The proposed wholesale and retail ceiling price regulation of veal will be issued together and will be patterned after the beef regulation now in effect. The Louisville District OPS Office explained that before any regulation is issued OPS discusses the problems involved with processors of the industry, large and smaller packers, and wholesalers make up the thirteen-man advisory committee on veal.

**Price Lists Posted June 25**

Official charts of retail beef ceiling prices will be posted in meat shops throughout the State on June 25, the District OPS Office at Louisville, announced. This date for posting ceiling prices is a week later than previously announced, and was selected to allow for last minute price revisions and distribution.

Businesses can refer to the price charts, which must be posted by retailers in a readily visible place, to be sure that they pay no more than the ceiling price for beef sold for their area. OPS explained that the ceiling prices for beef cuts have been determined by comparable areas and the listed prices are for the cuts that are locally required by the agency. In addition to the posted price charts, retailers are required to have separate grades in separate trays with each tray labeled with its correct price.

New price charts showing lower prices will be effective August 1, and still lower prices will go into effect October 1. After the last reduction beef will be selling at retail from eight to ten cents under current prices. Cattle prices will still be about twenty-five per cent higher than parity.

Naval Ship Yard, Portsmouth, Va., undergoing minor repairs.

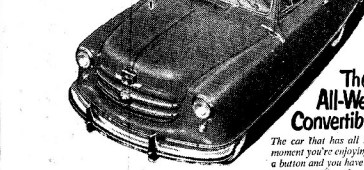

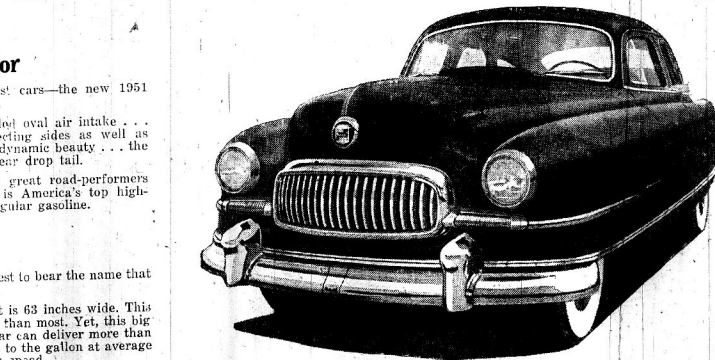

**Combat Engineers Do 'Impossible' in Korea; Floyd Man With Them**

WITH X CORPS, US ARMY IN KOREA—The big brass in Peiping and Moscow probably never heard of Pfc. Clarence R. Terry, 20, of Lackey, but he is nevertheless one of the reasons why Red China has failed miserably in its attempt to push UN forces into the yellow Sea.

Terry is now neck-deep in the toughest engineering war in history, with his "unit," the 116th Engineer Combat Battalion, playing a key role in upsetting the Communist timetable. They're building roads and bridges in "impossible" sectors to speed troops and ammunition into the battlefield.

The engineering miracles pulled off by Terry's battalion during the recent Red offensive, when the men behind the Iron Curtain launched one of the biggest mass attacks in history, were instrumental in the successful stand by Allied forces. Over a thousand truckloads of ammunition rolled over Engineer-built roads each day to slaughter many thousands of Reds, and hurl back the May offensive.

Terry, a member of the battalion's mess section, was rushed to this Oriental theater of war with the 116th last February. He enlisted in the Army last August in Indianapolis.

The Kentucky soldier attended high school in Garrett and was employed at the Kendallville Foundry in Indianapolis before joining the army.

His father, Sam Terry is a resident of Yellow Mountain, Clarence formerly resided in Lackey.

This time he saw four of the cars departing. These cars came to a stop well off the main grade and were beyond recovery that day.

Everything was fine then except that at McClure's, near Paragon, they hit more soft track and lost another car. The faces of the crew who brought the two-car train into Clearfield at dusk must have been as red as any switchman's lantern.

Upon another time, a ten-car southbound freight train arrived at Wiggley and the conductor walked back to cut off the rear car, only to discover that the car wasn't there. They found it on the return trip to Clearfield, reposing in the waters of the North Fork.

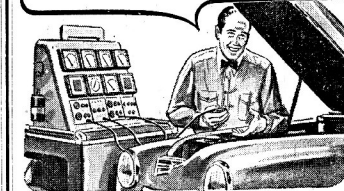

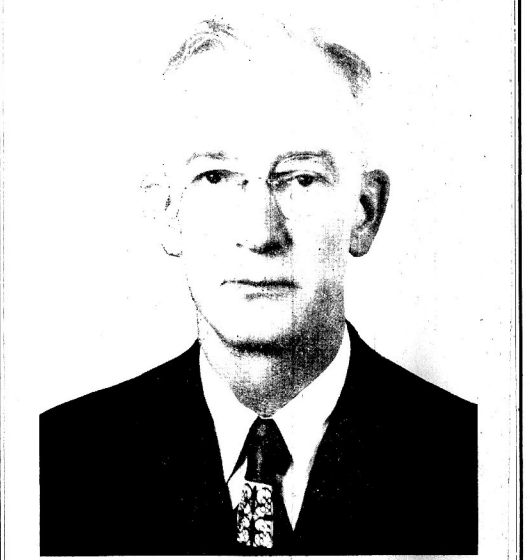
