KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH
BY EWING GALLOWAY

For ten years getting landowners to heed my warnings against the inevitable ruin of their fertile level lands by Johnson grass looked like a futile, thankless task, until this spring. I felt very much like a prisoner rattling the door of his cell in an effort to arouse a stone-deaf turnkey. But responses to my recent article in this space about how to obtain and use chlorate of soda. These requests have come from nearly all over Kentucky.

Two or three years ago I tried to get something printed in the Courier-Journal. Evidently the farm editor took me for a goofy guy trying to alarm people over a pest that really didn't exist. But last week the C-J ran a photograph of John grass ten feet high and a brief story, which I had turned in last week. Incidentally, I'd like to get that picture printed in KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH, but that would be too expensive.

A few minutes ago a very old lady in Henderson telephoned for the address of a manufacturer of sodium chlorate. She has a share-cropped farm in a fertile district seven miles from town and she thinks there must be as much as an acre of Johnson grass on it. The grass is spreading rapidly. I told her she would probably need 400 pounds of sodium chlorate, which would cost her \$10 a hundred and a mechanical spray.

I wish the agricultural brain trust in the University of Kentucky could get a few telephone calls like the one that came to me from that old lady. It might arouse the Experiment Station boys to the point of millions of acres of Kentucky's richest land and get them started doing the kind of work I have been doing for a decade. They will do it eventually, but that may be when thousands of fields look like canyons.

It is not too late to poison Johnson grass. It will take more sodium chlorate to get the seed in the tops. When I had Johnson grass on the place I broke down the stems so the seed would get a wetting.

Persons who cannot buy chlorate of soda locally may write to me, enclosing a return envelope or postal card. I'll answer all the inquiries if I have to put Mrs. Galloway to work with our other typewriter. As I have said before, there is no profit in this for me.

SOIL CONSERVATION

By L. R. JOHNSON
Soil Conservation Service

Conservation farming is better farming. Soil and water conservation is proper use and care of land and water. It means that a farmer uses each piece of land for the things it is best suited to produce over the years. At the same time he follows practices which will protect the land from damage and make the best use of the water.

To do a complete job of soil and water conservation, a farmer must control erosion. He must drain excess water from wet land that is to be used for crops and pastures. He must keep a good supply of plant food and organic matter in the soil. He should manage his pastures and hay land to get better ground cover and more feed for live stock.

Different kinds of conservation measures are needed to do all those things. No one practice is enough to conserve soil and water on most agricultural land. A combination of practices usually is required. This means that a farmer should have a definite plan to make sure that one practice fits with another and all dovetail together on the farm as a whole.

If you own or operate a farm, you may request help from your local soil conservation district supervisors, Billy Merritt, Virgil Smith, R. C. Barnett, J. B. Clarke, and Mr. Stanley. They can arrange to give you the help of the Soil Conservation Service farm planner stationed in your district. You and the farm planner use the information provided by the S.C.S. and your own knowledge about your land to determine the best and most profitable use and treatment of each piece of land. With the help of the technically trained farm planner, you develop and put into effect a plan acre by acre and field by field based on scientific facts, in preparing your plan, you probably will work with a group of your neighbors, so the farm planner can help more farmers at the same time.

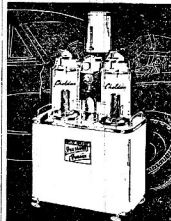

CAPITAL Roundup

A reduction in Workmen's Compensation rates exceeding \$700,000 a year was announced by Commissioner of Insurance Spalding Southall who attributed the reduction to the substantial stride made in industrial safety during a past year.

"The fewer the accidents, the less compensation claims to be paid . . . and consequently a reduction," said Southall. "Credit for this record belongs to employers, employees, safety groups and a safety program being sponsored by insurance companies." The reduction averages around ten per cent of the yearly premiums.

Rate increases were won before the Public Service Commission and Department of Motor Transportation, respectively, by the Indiana Home Telephone Company and Cincinnati, Newport and Covington Railway to allow the companies to "earn a fair return" on investment. Protesting groups already have served notice of an appeal to the commission.

Meanwhile, the Louisville Transit Company proposed an increase in fares from ten to fifteen cents—two five-cent fares for twenty-five cents. The case will be heard before the Department of Motor Transportation.

Stevan-ling of Kentucky's legal Code of Practice will be discussed at a series of district bar meetings arranged by the State Bar Association for August and September. It was announced by Henry H. Hornet, secretary-treasurer of the Bar Association.

State Fire Marshal William L. Marshall warned that promiscuous fireworks demonstrations will be out. "Letting speaking—July 4. Sales of fireworks to individuals under the guise of wholesale transactions, he declared, has been held to be an evasion of the law. The anti-fireworks law provides only for planned fireworks demonstrations to be sponsored by organizations, with the prior approval of either the county judge, mayor or fire chief.

The Court of Appeals upheld prison terms imposed in Laurel circuit court against Herman (Fats) Helton and Nathaniel (Beano) Johnson growing out of the beating of three men during a labor disturbance in Floyd county last year—denouncing the act as a "horrible example of mob brutality." Helton was sentenced to serve prior terms aggregating thirty-four years; Johnson ten years.

Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby called on the Senate committee investigating vice and gambling conditions for copies of his reports on Northern Kentucky communities where it was alleged a "sordid condition and 'law enforcement breakdown' had taken place. He promised to study the reports, then seek advice as to his legal powers in the matter.

The Department of Economic Security formally signed its first contract with a local governmental unit embracing its employees within the terms of the Social Security Act. The unit, The Lexington Board of Education. Several hundred more are expected to be included shortly.

Kentucky employers were asked to let members of the National Guard in their employ attend summer camp, at Fort Knox August 12-28. Major General Boscoe L. Murray said that giving the men time off to attend camp would be a big contribution to national defense and that he hoped to have 100 per cent attendance at the camp.

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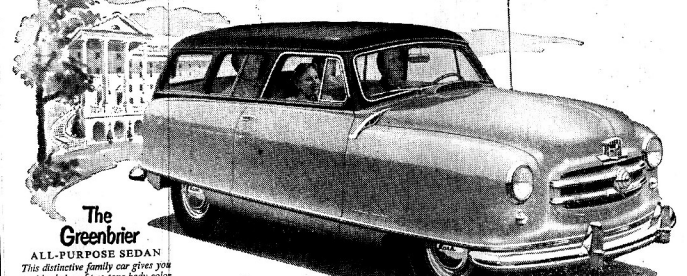

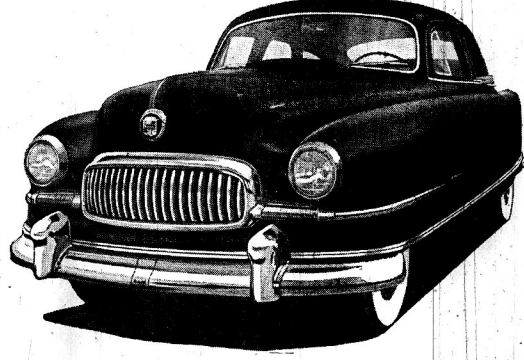
