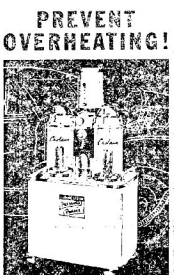

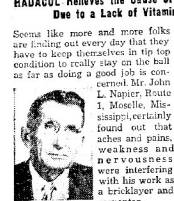

and request all persons and organizations concerned with the land to unite with the local soil conservation district supervisors in a full realization of the desperate need for conserving our soil and water resources

I especially urge our soil conservation district supervisors to increase their activities during this period to reach the greatest number of citizens in our county.

"One of the greatest advantages in securing this examination," said Mrs. Wellman, "is that the parents may accompany their children to the doctor, and discuss personally with the doctor any correction that should be made for the benefit of their child's health."

Cards which will be used as a record in the schools for these tests may be procured from Mrs. Wellman at the Superintendent's office if the examination is to be made before the beginning of school.

Toss of Coin Caused Withdrawal, Sturgill Says in Statement Here

Upon his return here last week following his withdrawal from the race for the Democratic nomination for Clerk of the Court of Appeals, Ex-Sheriff Troy E. At least two companies are interested in producing the "talking clock" invented by Duke Griffith, crippled Prestonsburg Jeweler, who has received a patent on the device.

The patent, granted May 22, lists the invention as a "control system for annunciators." The clock, by an ingenious record attachment, automatically announces the time, and can readily be adapted, says Mr. Griffith, to use with public address systems in train or bus terminals, or for advertising purposes.

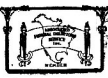

ment of the Prestonsburg lawyers was Henry C. Harris and he took the aspiring young lawyer from Morgan into partnership with him. Perceiving that M. Elliott was highly pleased to be honored as the junior partner of Harris, for his mentor, opened a lucrative practice. Harris specialized in land litigation and veterans' pensions, being ably assisted by his junior assistant, who matured fast in the profession that was to lead up to the highest honors of the Kentucky judiciary.

This partnership continued until 1847 when Harris moved to Covington, Ky. where he thought the accessibility and greater population of the section would increase his practice. By this move to Covington, Harris had removed himself from the political and local affairs of Floyd county. We gather from certain old suits that sometimes contain most surprising and non-germane bits of information, that the move had been long contemplated and that he only waited the expiration of his term as State Senator, which ended in 1847.

The political and legal mantle of Harris now fell upon the young John M. Elliott and he was elected to the Kentucky Legislature, the year the partnership ceased. This entrance into politics, at the age of 27, was but the beginning of a brilliant political career that led through the turbulent period of the Civil War and beyond into the after years.

In 1848, he married Susan Jane Smith, daughter of William M. Smith, of Johnson county. Just where in the city of Prestonsburg they set up housekeeping is not clear, but on June 17, 1850, William M. Smith, the father-in-law, executed a deed to them for a house and lot No. 5, on First Avenue—residence of Mr. Street and running out to the banks of the Big Sandy River and being same herein said Elliott and wife now reside.

This property, acquired more or less, we suspect, as a gift from Smith, was added to throughout by the initiative of Elliott himself. In 1857, he bought from John Friend lots No. 4 and No. 7 and the same deed became the owner of fifty acres below the mouth of Sugar Loaf Creek. These old lots, consisting of about one-half acre and dating back to the near-legendary John Graham, who laid them out, have long since yielded to the pressure of land values and had disappeared as a real estate entity.

Mrs. Evelyn Salisbury, who is quite an authority on them, states that John and Susan Elliott resided at about where Oliver M. Stumbo's home is now located, that a lane between No. 3 and No. 4 to the river, and that Hugh Harkins lived on Lot No. 2. This was the better part of the town at that time and well-suited the rising Elliott.

(Susan Smith Elliott had a brother James, who being of a phlegmatic disposition and disinclined to hurry through life like his immediate associates, had been given by them the nickname "Spinning Wheel" because of his father of a daughter, Marie, and due to what may have been the death of her mother, his daughter entered into the home of her aunt Susan and was reared by her and John Elliott. Marie afterwards married Louis H. Gormley, pioneer in the Big Sandy oil and gas field and they were the parents of Oriole Gormley, wife of the geologist and historian, Willard Rouse Johnson, of Frankfort.)

In 1852, John M. Elliott entered into a law partnership with John M. Burns. The date of the intricate partnership is a. n. 12, 1852. Burns was younger than Elliott and was glad of the opportunity as he afterwards said, to associate himself with the rising legal luminary. The partnership started off well, with Elliott appearing in the jurymen and Burns assuming the office routine, as they had agreed.

In early 1852, just after the formation of the partnership with Burns, the two lawyers settled themselves down to practice in Pike, Johnson and Floyd. John M. Burns began to interest himself in building a home and finally completed the residence on North First Avenue, now occupied by Claude P. Stephens, United States District Attorney.

Elliott was soon a candidate for the Congress of the United States and won easily. Burns, eager partner, assisted in the campaign. In 1855, he was re-elected and again in 1857. This last term expired in 1859, and Elliott's sympathies being with the South, he decided not to run for the Congress of the United States again, but instead to seek election from Floyd and Johnson counties to the Kentucky legislature where he could more effectively wield his influence. He won the seat in 1859 and again in 1861, but being prominently identified with the leaders of the secessionists in Kentucky, the Federal government had him indicted for "aid and comfort to the enemy" and he was expelled. The indictment had been in the United States District Court, Judge David Ballard presiding. His fortunes now resting solely with the South, he cast his lot there and enlisted as a Confederate soldier under Gen. John S. Williams.

However, as the cause of the South demanded the services of statesmanship as well as military prowess, he resigned from the army and represented the Ninth District of Kentucky in the Confederate Congress which met at Richmond,

Feb. 18, 1852. He represented this district in the Southern Congress for two terms. His wife still continued to live at Prestonsburg and Burns assisted her a few times with money. The law partnership had of necessity ceased, for there were no law or courts in Eastern Kentucky. General Garfield had commandeered the Burns home here as his headquarters. At this time Burns was at the front and he set about the task of staying out of the clutches of the Federal soldiers. Interesting incidents come down to us of the seizure of the old home, of the family's evacuation and their hardships. At the end of the civil strife, neither Elliott or Burns returned to Prestonsburg to re-establish their law practice. The original agreement had specified a co-partnership for one year, or longer by mutual consent. A formal dissolving of the association did not take place for war time and civil strife are not conducive of formalities. However, the partnership was tacitly continued, probably because of mutual advantages that accrued to each of them.

At the conclusion of the war, Elliott had set up practice in Bath county at Owensville and entered politics. He was elected in 1868 circuit judge of the district and bade fair to resume a career so tragically interrupted by the war. His association with Burns ended and they finally became estranged. Followed a long and bitter court action between the two.

In 1876, two years previous to the end of the suit, which was dismissed, Elliott was elected to the Court of Appeals, to succeed the retiring Judge Bevard J. Peters. (Elliott's associates were Judges William Lindsay, M. H. Coffey, William S. Pryor and . . . Hines.) Upon the expiration of his term of judgeship, Judge Elliott declined to seek re-election and moved to Cattleburg where he formed a law partnership with the Hon. K. F. Pritchard.

While in Frankfort, Judge and Mrs. Elliott lived in the old Capital Hotel. Mrs. Elliott occupied herself with the multi-void of social activities incumbent upon a wife of a distinguished judge, while her husband brought "fidelity and credit to himself and the State" on the bench of Kentucky's highest court.

Col. Thomas Buford, the assassin of Henry county, Kentucky. He was a son of the Bluegrass aristocracy, rooted with a great passion to the ancestral land. Wealthy, socially and politically prominent, the Bufords moved in the highest circles of the Bluegrass society around Lexington, Frankfort and Louisville. They were breeders of fine stock and the farms of their farm extended over the rolling Bluegrass where fine farms are the rule and not the exception. While amply blessed with the world's goods and possessing the breeding and social and political values, yet there seemed to have been laid upon the members of the Buford family a curse of violent and intermittent insanity. I worked my own way through college and law school and in 1941, instead of setting up my shingle and establishing my law office, I joined the midwife of the Kentucky and in 1946 came out of World War II a service-connected disabled Veteran.

Six years ago I set up my law office with one book and a Thousand Dollar bank note and began to represent the humble and friendless, the orphans and widows, the one-zillion farmers and the down-trodden coal miners who recently have set up such a howl about the political corruption of our local Government from wholesale election bribery to wide open pay-offs in the liquor traffic that I, in default opposition to the political chieftains supporting my opponents, filed for the nomination and now seek the office of Prosecuting Attorney of this county. 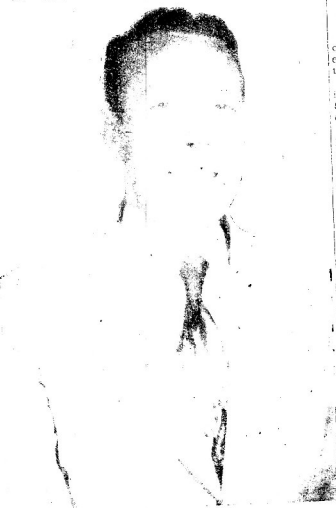

HAZARD FIELD PLANS TOLD

By Sturgill in Protest Against Discontinuance Of Ky. River Locks, Dams

Plans for transporting coal on the upper Kentucky River were told in Cincinnati July 6, by William B. Sturgill, executive secretary of the Hazard Coal Operators Association and formerly of Frestonsburg.

It came early in a hearing at which many persons appeared to protest to the army corps of engineers against a government proposal to close the locks and dams of the river.

Sturgill said that studies so far completed indicate that about a million tons of coal from the Hazard region can be transported from the Hazard fields to various cities located on the upper portions of the Kentucky River.

It was stated that a mill terminal would be located at Bellport and there the transfer would be made for river barges. It was announced that once this plan is in operation an additional 2 1/2 million tons of coal could be transported down river for consumers at Louisville.

The coal operators told Col. C. P. Hardy, district engineer at Pittsburgh and acting chief of the Ohio River division, that the decision to close the locks and dams came without any warning.

Col. Clarence Bledsoe, district engineer at Louisville, said it was estimated that the closing of the locks and dams on the upper Kentucky would save about \$5,000 a year. He said the engineers requested \$50,000 to keep open the locks and dams on the lower Kentucky and for many to dig out channels, but that it was cut by the House Appropriations Committee to \$25,000.

Colonel Hardy told the coal operators the appropriations bill still is in the senate committee where it would be possible for them to register their protest.





JURIST, VICTIM OF ASSASSIN'S BLAST

(Continued from Page 1, Sec. 2)

Thomas Buford's mind began that slow departure for the region of the lost and damned. He muttered to himself when the services of the estate and at times appeared to be conversing with his dead sister. At night, under the full moon, he would be up and down the porch, revering upon those who he charged had brought this tragedy. "His rights were denied," he would mutter in a mental anguish and disturbance. He walked the floor muttering to himself, cursing and denouncing the real or imaginary forces, and in weird communication with the spirits of the departed in the land of shades, listening to voices from an unseen world."

It is at night he tattered upon the precipice of unreason, yet by day he remained the composed and poised man of the world. He knew Judge Pryor of the Court of Appeals was a neighbor from Henry county. Whether Buford ever committed the indiscretion of talking to Pryor about the case, it is not said. Buford thought that Pryor had acquired a sufficient outside knowledge of the case from their conversation to be instrumental in causing a reversal of the lower court.

Buford almost certainly talked or attempted to talk to Judge Elliott. It would have been comparatively easy to do, for they had met, especially around Frankfort, on the occasion of the trial. If the matter had been mentioned, it would have been difficult for Elliott to find out a discussion as Buford, possessed with his mania, would have taken any unfair opportunity to do so in the drawing rooms of the State capital. The year 1938 and the court of appeals affirmed the decision of the Fayette court. Judge Elliott writing the opinion. Buford, as administrator of his dead sister, through his lawyers asked for a rehearing and the whole court, in judgment, but Judge Elliott's opinion was not disturbed.

Having exhausted every legal recourse, Thomas Buford fled to Frankfort. "He was dispossessed of his Henry county home. He was ejected from the soil on which he had hoped to live and to which he had hoped to lay his bones. His sister is dead. He is alone in the world. Like an irresistible attraction and fascination this suit, pending in Parkfort, drew him there, because outside of that place he had no interest."

He made up his mind, at first, to kill both Judge Pryor and Elliott; but while his reason was lying at the accelerated rate, his moral sense remained sufficient for him to decide to spare Pryor because of the jurist's children.

He loaded a double-barreled shotgun, each barrel with twelve buckshot, and to make sure of his death by purpose, he concealed a pistol upon his person. Having prepared the weapons for a deed, the billiard man, the English world had not known since Sir George Lockhart, president of the Court of Sessions in Edinburgh was assassinated in the morning in 1830. Buford wrote the following: "Capital Hotel, March 26, 1939. Whatever may happen to me, I desire that my niece, Annie O. Wallace, shall have everything both in equity and law that belongs to me. I only ask that my body shall be laid by my sister, Mary F. Buford, whom I loved so well, whose robbery and assassination I wish to try Thomas Buford."

Knowing that the time was fast approaching when Judge Elliott would arrive at the Capital Hotel, he put this informal will in an envelope, and wrote upon it: "Whoever may get this note I ask earnestly to deliver it to the person to whom it is directed." Having done so, he pocketed the letter and taking up his weapon, he walked out into the street in front of the ladies' entrance. It was about one o'clock, p.m.

Judge Hines and Elliott came up Ann Street, and Buford spoke casually to Elliott.

"Judge, I believe I will go snipe-hunting. Won't you go along?"

Receiving a simple negative reply, Buford asked again: "Well, then won't you go and take a drive?"

Judge Hines now turned to resume his way up the street and had advanced about six feet when the shot was fired. Looking back, he saw Elliott on the sidewalk and his assassin, bending over him crying: "I put his own hat under the dead judge's head. I'm sorry."

Hines attempted to raise his associate but he had died without uttering a single word. As a deputy sheriff and a policeman were coming up, Buford was passing the gun. He said as he handed it to the sheriff: "Be careful with that gun. I put twelve buckshot in it for Pryor."

News of the reprehensible deed took wings in Frankfort and soon the city was in a turmoil. Great crowds gathered in the streets, business ceased, and mob talk became so general that the sheriff summoned a number of citizens as guards at the jail. A local military company was alerted for trouble.

Upon request by a mass meeting resolution, Gov. James B. McCreary issued a proclamation, closing all public offices from 12 o'clock noon for remainder of the day. March 27, 1939. Mayor S. I. M. McVey, of Frankfort, issued a similar proclamation.

The defense and prosecution each had an imposing array of counsel. The prosecution had the services of the late attorneys, chief of whom was W. C. P. Breckenridge and Gen. John Rodman. The defense employed the services of the late attorneys, chief of whom was Judge George M. Curtis of New York, who was ably assisted by the congressman Edwin E. Settle of Owenon, W. R. Kinney, of Louisville, and Phil Thompson, of Harrodsburg.

On January 11, 1939, before a jury of farmers, Buford pleaded insanity. Judge McManama stated the case for the prosecution and E. E. Settle for the defense. Nearly one hundred witnesses were sworn.

All the witnesses having testified, ten hours were allowed for argument on each side. Before a packed courtroom for it was said every person in Owenon who could do so attended. McManama, Breckenridge and Rodman spoke for the state and Judge Curtis and three others argued for the defense. The only question for the jury was whether or not Buford was insane. Experts had testified for the state that he was sane; experts for the defense said he was insane. It was left for this jury of farmers to agree upon what the specialists in medicine and psychology could not judge. Curtis, an ex-Kentuckian, made a reasoned, logical exposition of Buford's mental state and of the close, he said:

"Col. Breckenridge in his beautiful and eloquent oration brought before you the State of Kentucky, holding in her hand the record of her list of crimes and with her brought the body of the dead judge upon this spectacle he demanded judgment for the people. I bring you the dead judge, the mad assassin and assign all before Kentucky and demand, as her sacred name, her traditions and her laws, that you be true to the solemn oath you have taken to true deliverance make between the people and the prisoner—that this mad captive go free and unscathed from this temple of justice and in the sentiment of the sublime prayer of the common law: May God grant him quick deliverance."

This argument of Curtis, well-founded as it was on the law of insanity and presented with such eloquence, greatly influenced the jury in his verdict. They said he was insane.

Thomas Buford was confined to the insane asylum at Anchorage, but shortly escaped to Indiana, "where," as Johnson says, "our requisition laws were not sufficient to have him returned to Kentucky."

Susan Smith Elliott, wife of the murdered judge, moved back to Caledonia after the death of her husband and survived until 1932. Before her death she presented a life-size statue of her husband to the people and it is erected on the courthouse lawn.

When she died, James B. McCreary, who had been the chief executive of the state when John M. Elliott was murdered back in 1879, was Governor again, and he issued an executive order that she be buried on the side of her distinguished husband in the State Cemetery at Frankfort.

It has been said of Judge John Milton Elliott that "the act will his part in the great drama of life."

On the memorial erected to him by the Legislatures of Kentucky over his grave at Frankfort, are these words: "As a man he was ardent, social, genial; by nature, a philanthropist. He was the love of his fellowmen by his generosity and worth. Devoted as a husband and friend, faithful and just. A dutiful citizen and upright official. His engaging virtues were candor, integrity and love of truth."

He left as a legacy a great name; but, far more than this he left the remembrance, cherished by Eastern Kentuckians, of the infinite goodness of a great soul.

SOIL CONSERVATION

By I. R. JOHNSON
Soil Conservation Service

The board of supervisors of the Floyd County Soil Conservation district met Tuesday, July 8, at 7:00 p.m. at their new location in the PMA office.

The supervisors reported that several requests for conservation assistance are being received.

Land capability maps will soon be available for those farmers who desire immediate assistance through the district. A land capability map represents an inventory of the soil, showing what each acre is capable of producing and what protection is needed. These maps are necessary because all the characteristics of the soil are evaluated on each individual form. These maps also keep the farmer and the farm planner abreast of soil land use, which is using each acre according to its capability with practices that will maintain the productivity of the soil. Such use is based on the following factors: type of soil, slope, kind and extent of erosion. Good land use puts all land to work, instead of permitting some of it to remain idle. It means the safe use of land for useful and suitable crops.

A soil scientist has been assigned by the Soil Conservation Service to assist the local district in making the necessary conservation surveys. Herman Gillem has been assigned this duty. He attended the University of Kentucky and received a B. S. degree in Agriculture in 1948. Since that time he has been working for the Soil Conservation Service in Laurel and Breathitt counties.

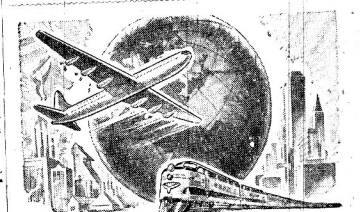

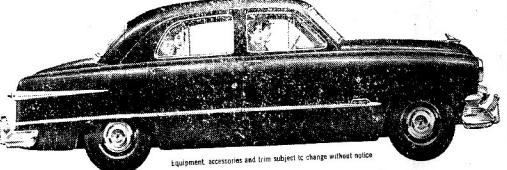
