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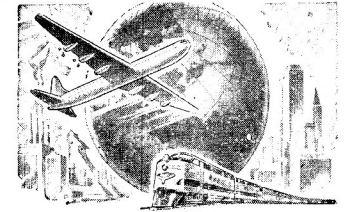

of that section of the county.

To Finance School Buildings
The board authorized the Superintendent to contact the State Department of Education to finance the construction of the county high school building and a new elementary school at Ligon, Plans for the Prestonsburg building, minus auditorium and gymnasium, were completed this week by architect, and it is believed a financing plan can be evolved from the structure and also the building at Ligon, where the school system has been a site for three or four years. A delegation of Ligon citizens appeared before the board to complain of the miserable condition of the present school and advocate a new structure.

The general budget adopted at the meeting envisions receipts and expenditures for the next fiscal year of \$1,183,749. Although a specific budget will be developed later and may result in some changes, the board's spending plans, generally, are these:
\$282,400 for instruction (\$120,000 more than that of last year); \$30,000 for general control; \$55,000 for operation of the school plant; maintenance, \$22,000; auxiliary services, \$59,000; transfer tuition (most of which is for county pupils attending Prestonsburg high school), \$30,000; capital outlay, \$79,000; debt service, \$20,000.

Agree on Tuition
The tuition arrangement with the Prestonsburg Board of Education providing for county pupils to attend high school here is the same as last year, except on the increase of per capita. The per capita for this year will be \$88.81 up to \$35.00, and if the enrollment picture continues to show a decrease, the board's agreement provided that the Prestonsburg Board employ a high school principal other than the present one, and maintain an adequate teaching staff.

The social security plan offered by the state was adopted by the board for all employees except those who are eligible for benefits under the retirement system. This includes from social security benefits the Superintendent, supervisory workers, teachers and others. Superintendent Hall said cooperation in the program is possible without additional costs to taxpayers.
