Heard by county officials conferring with state health authorities last week on the hospital question was the question of Floyd county's ability to support the hospital financially if it is not self-supporting. From this source it was learned that a Martin site would be acceptable to the Hospital Advisory Council.

The report has been current here for some time to the effect that the federal government may not appropriate \$2 for each \$1 voted in the county's bond issue. If this cut in funds materializes, the total amount available for hospital construction and equipment would be \$800,000 instead of the promised \$1,200,000.

ORDINANCE
