Since the State Board must approve all salary schedules, Boone Hall and Moore asked them to decide whether "such" schedules should be approved.
Superintendent Hall said the salaries of the high-school principals were increased to \$37 a month by the Board, and he felt that the supervisor and his assistant should be paid a comparable salary.

The Superintendent said that he himself, has been turned down on salary raises by his Board. He is still drawing the same \$400 a month he was making three years ago, he said.

The Superintendent said the Board had entered an order last month, employing a new Superintendent—V. O. Turner, now principal of the Maytown consolidated school. "It is my further belief that the Board's failure to increase the salaries of these people was based wholly on personal and political reasons, and to that extent the salary schedule as they approved it is not uniform," Superintendent Hall wrote in his report on the matter to Hodgkin.

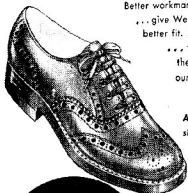

Paintsville, Ky., Sept. 17—(Sp.)—Daniels, 40, West Van Lear, Ky., pleaded innocent today to a charge of murder before Circuit Judge James W. Turner.  
 Turner then ordered that a jury be selected. He set tomorrow morning for hearing testimony in the case.  
 Daniels is charged in the fatal shooting last June 8 at West Van Lear of Millard Webb, 35, a deaf-mute.  
 At the time of the slaying, Johnson county Sheriff D. B. Trimble said the two evidently argued over Daniels' wife, who was formerly married to Webb.  
 Since the slaying, Daniels has been in Johnson county jail in lieu of \$15,000 bond.

**TIPSY DRIVER LICENSE LOSS MANDATORY ON CONVICTION**

Frankfort, Ky., Aug. 27 (Sp.)—Revocation of drivers' licenses of persons convicted for drunken driving is mandatory in Kentucky and there is no recourse under the law for them to be returned before the period of revocation is up.  
 "That is a reminder issued today by Robert A. Thompson, director of Local Relations for the Department of Revenue.  
 Thompson said that many drivers are uninformed about the law and that some judges fail to make the revocation angle clear to them when they appear in court. As a result, his Division has numerous requests to restore recalled licenses, he said.  
 Revocation for first offenders are for six months and the second and third convictions bring on two to five years.  
 In many cases accused drivers are told that all they have to do is pay a fine and charges against them will be cleared up, Thompson said. Some courts, although charged by

law with picking up licenses of convicted persons, fail to tell them about that part of the penalty. State police then have to recall licenses later when records of convictions reach Frankfort.  
 Thompson advised persons who do not consider themselves guilty of drunken charges to ask for a trial rather than to plead guilty to avoid making bail or spending a night in jail. If convicted, the only way they can have their license revocation lifted is to have the conviction set aside in a higher court, he said.  
 Other offenses for which revocation of licenses is mandatory are hit and run driving, using an automobile for committing a crime, manslaughter from use of a vehicle, false statement about ownership or operation of a vehicle, assault and battery resulting from a motor accident and reckless driving three times within a year.  
 Operator's licenses will be rescinded both for convictions in Kentucky and out of state, Thompson said.

 Plans for Lonesome Pine Council, Boy Scouts of America, to participate in the great national program "Forward on Liberty's Team" will be developed in each district of the Lonesome Pine Council. Virgil Pickens, Council president, announced this week.  
 During this month a fall Round-Up will be held. Each Scout unit will pledge itself to rope and brand mavericks and strays—all boys of Scout age who are not enrolled in Scout units. New Scout units will be organized.  
 Training courses for Scoutmasters and Junior leaders in the troops are scheduled to be held during October and November. Fall camps in which all Scout troops will be invited to participate are scheduled to be held at the new Scout camp on Dewey Lake and at the Breaks of the Cumberland and other locations designated by local leaders. Each Scout troop will be asked to hold an open-house meeting some time during the fall to be attended by all parents and friends in the community. 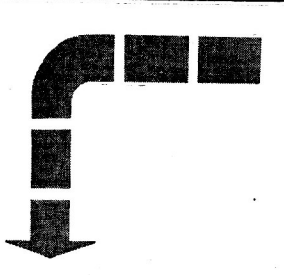

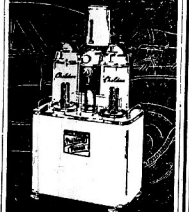
