44 Pct. of 12-Year-Olds In County Enrolled; Red Kids \$40,000, Necessary

Heavy increase in Boy Scout membership has been a result of the great national program, "Forward on Liberty's Team," which was launched by Lousiana Pine Council at a planning conference and executive board meeting held at Jackson last Monday evening.

The meeting was attended by 30 members of the county's executive board members from seven districts of the Council. An effort to recruit a key leader from each sponsoring institution, church, club, and other organizations was made.

It was shown that the Council is a whole, including 15 counties of Kentucky and Virginia, is reaching only 39 per cent of the annual boy age, as compared with 80 per cent in this area, including eight counties of West Virginia. The Floyd district is leading the Council with 21 out of a possible 48 points, and the George school with the one-point margin in the 12-year-old population. Pike district has shown a five per cent increase in membership this year. Wise county, Virginia, had the largest Scout membership with 444 boys in Scouting.

B. P. Reed, of Drift, chairman of the Council Finance committee, said that a \$40,000 budget for 1932 would be necessary if all districts of the Council are to have the advantages of field research service. He urged the belief these funds can be easily raised, since \$39,000 will be raised by the end of 1931.

At the evening meeting of the executive board, presided over by Wiley Picklesimer, Council president, the Council camping committee was authorized to constitute a main lodge and dining hall at the department station on Highland, and to be permitted to meet at the truck. From these antecedents any of you who know these families can trace my relationship not only to the Webbs, Allens, Osbornes and Gearhearts but also to the Merrins, Sizemores, Puttens, Harrises, Mays, Begleys, Hayses, Stumbos, Sallsburgs, Stephenses, Fraziers, Branham, Goodmans, Howards, Howards, Hibboses and many others of our old native families.

I have always been loyal to my people, as mounted

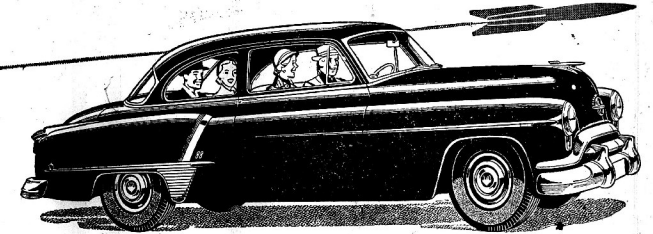
tain folks traditionally are loyal. If there is any reason my kin should now deny me their help, I honestly cannot think what it is.

As for those who are not related by blood to me, I ask their support as a matter of justice. I think I am not being unreasonable in asking election for ONE TERM ONLY to the office of Circuit Court Clerk. I know I am not being selfish or unkind to my opponent, Mr. Conley, for he already has been in this office 12 years and is asking for a term which would carry him through 18 years—a period which is longer than many of our young folks live.

I am convinced that it is better for our form of government that no man be installed permanently in office. To do so would be to destroy all ambition with others, all hope of advancement.

OPS NOTES

A reverse twist in the current probe of the slaughter industry in Kentucky, with a nationally-known packer as the victim instead of the villain, was reported this week to Carl P. King, chief special agent of the District Office of Price Stabilization.

The circumstance came to light during an investigation in Central Kentucky by Paul R. Jacoby, Price Economist, who has been helping the Enforcement Division in checking the grades, prices and weight of packers' deliveries to retailers.

Acting on reports from the national OPS office that packing houses may be paying above ceiling prices for livestock and then passing these illegal overcharges on to retail stores through falsification of records, 20 investigators in the Louisville OPS have been conducting a minute inspection of the operations of various slaughterers throughout the state.

Several violations have been detected and court action is contemplated in at least three of them King said. Thus far over the month of October, more than 1,800 violations have been reported.

"In view of this great number of investigations naturally are expeditious when any seeming irregularity is noted," said King. "But we just turned up two cases where the packer appears to have been singled against rather than aided."

In the one case a meat buyer was delivered a quartered carcass of "choice" beef when he was invoiced for a cheaper grade. In the other case, the buyer of a side of beef received a 220-pound delivery but was charged for only 120 pounds. The packer was out approximately \$60 on this delivery route Jacoby checked. King said the information will be passed on to the packer for whatever investigation or action he may wish to take.

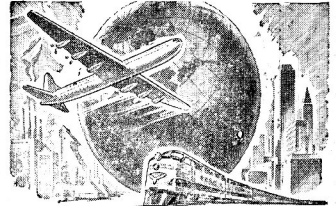
