Hazard, Ky., Dec. 8—A United Mine Workers official disclosed today he again is seeking to have Governor Wetherby provide a permanent detail of state police at Hyden, Leslie county, claiming a series of violent acts have occurred in that coal-producing area.
Tom Raney, international-board representative of the U.M.W., said he had sent a letter to Wetherby asking for the police detail. Some weeks ago, Raney telegraphed for state police aid after he reported a car, which he and a union organizer just had left, was machine-gunned. No one was injured in the incident.
Raney cited in his letter several acts of violence he declared had taken place in recent weeks, including firing on persons considered friendly to the U.M.W.

Since early summer, the U.M.W. has been conducting a campaign to organize nonunion miners in Leslie and Clay counties. Most mines in other coal-producing East Kentucky counties employ union miners.
Contacted by a reporter following Raney's release of his letter, Leslie County Judge Elmer Begley said he did not know of the acts listed in the letter.

IT'S A GOOD WORLD
 BY WILMAY

(Opinions expressed herein do not necessarily reflect those of The Times.)

It is good at times to find our views are identical to those of persons who really know. We quote here excerpts from a fall editorial in *Collier's*, one of America's foremost magazines, sent by a friend who is deeply interested in young people.

"We are happy to learn that Discipline, which has long been a horrid word among psychologists, is now back in the good graces of some members of the profession. This looks to us like a healthy switch in the psychoanalytical line of child rearing, and one which the psychologists will be able to sell to the public without any trouble.

"We are not unserved admirers of the old 'woodshed technique.' (Neither are we. It should be a last resort.) But we are inclined to think it hasn't caused any more havoc than the doctrine of total permissiveness, which is tough on both the parents and children. The poor kids, when they eventually break out of the cocoon of an undisciplined childhood, are completely unprepared for the terrors of parenthood at adult life.

"If the experiences in the earliest years of life are as important as the psychologists tell us, then it seems reasonable that those experiences should include some discipline and frustration. For it's inevitable that it has to be so. The child is going to come up against both. We Americans live in the home of individual liberty, but even here freedom and liberty are not unlimited.

"The choice of 'Be good or Papa spank' is pretty basic in the structure of any society, even the freest. It has to be so. We wouldn't be any civilization. For the adult citizen, the law is Papa. But logical penalties don't apply to little children. It is up to the parents to be the lawmakers.

"We have often felt a twinge of pity for youngsters who have never heard the word 'don't' addressed to them, even while we were also feeling an impulse to whack the far out of them. For it's a pretty rough world when they finally leave their world of uninhibited free-wheeling for a world in which thousands of impulsive actions, from dropping a candy wrapper in a public park to doing away with one's fellow man, are subject to strict rules and assorted penalties.

"Such violent transitions, we would think, have had something to do with the fact that juvenile delinquency is not just a slum-born phenomenon. They may also account in part for the oversupply of ripe cases in need of psychiatric administration. So we hope that the vogue for unbridled indulgence to the young is permanently passed, and that a sensible, well-balanced formula of permission and prohibition will find a lasting place in the child expert's guidebooks for perplexed parents."

Folk, then, our sentimentalists! The editor is superior to our feeble efforts that only direct quotation would suffice. Teachers and parents alike will find his comments contain the nucleus of the problem today, plus the solution, namely, a middle-of-the-road policy. All who want to the extremes on the recommendations of some psychologist need to bear in mind this is the newest science. Countless Freudian theories have long since been discarded and many modern ones will experience a more rapid demise. We should keep in mind the fact that anybody can be wrong, even the leaders of a field. Time was when the greatest minds of the universe were confident the world was square. There is such a variance between psychological schools of thought that even the doctors are slow to accept or reject the findings, one medical magazine reported recently.

Consolidation Is the Answer

THEIR fight for a straight 1 per cent commission for collection of school taxes lost through a Court of Appeals decision, Kentucky's Sheriffs are expected to turn to the State Legislature next month to gain their end. Legislation fixing a flat rate for school tax collection will be asked, it has been predicted.

The sheriffs do not claim school tax collection is an arduous task. They will admit that this is a quick matter of simple addition. But they insist that the extra commission is needed to make the office a paying proposition.

The argument is extremely fallacious as pertaining to the office in most counties of the state. Collection of state and county taxes alone makes of the Sheriff's office in the wealthier counties the best-paid of all county posts. Yet it is admitted that Sheriffs of some smaller counties are underpaid.

But so are other officials of those counties. Then it would seem that an oppressive school tax collection fee is not the solution to the overall problem. That would relieve only one official in each of these counties.

If the state cannot supplement salaries of officials in these counties where official business is slow, the Legislature should look into the matter of consolidating them with other counties, thus eliminating the necessity of a separate school revenues, effecting economical operation of county government and making the offices of all the officials worthwhile.

Education Is the Winner

FRIDAY of this week will see the inauguration by Morehead State College of its sixth and youngest president—Dr. Charles R. Spain.

Dr. Spain was named president at Morehead after the death of Dr. William Jesse Baird. He is widely recognized as an educator and as a scholar in the true meaning of the word.

What interests The Times most in Morehead's new president is the fact that his selection established with firm finality the separation of the school from politics. Friends of Morehead and the cause of education in Kentucky worried without a case while Morehead's Board of Regents studied the list of possible successors to Dr. Baird; for these gentlemen, including Floyd county's E. KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

An item that appeared recently in the Pineville Star about the local public library's bookmobile service to public schools is good proof that the minds of Bell county children are as hungry as their stomachs.

Mrs. Charles King, in charge of the bookmobile service, started out with 900 books and didn't get beyond the third school with them. She had to go back for another truckload. Last year the bookmobile circulation was 3283 books. Mrs. King thinks that number will be doubled this year.

Proof not only that mountain kids are hungry for good reading matter, but also refutation of any charge that movie heroes Roy Rogers and Hopalong Cassidy have pushed books like Marx' "Twain" ("Uncle Casey Finn") and Stevenson's "Treasure Island" out of the minds of boys and girls in eastern Kentucky. The same is true of youngsters in the Bluegrass, the Penny-rile and the Purchase, but I'd lay odds that there are more ambitious booklovers among teen-agers in the mountain counties than in either of the three other parts of the state. This may be attributable to ease, smugger life, to fewer hungry kids back this way. If I'm wrong about that, why does Bell county have bookmobile service and Fayette, Daviess and McCracken don't?

Patrons can build good stationary libraries in rural schools nearly everywhere in the state by donating good books they have read. In the very few counties that have bookmobile service, books can be given to the public library. And the books need not be limited to juveniles. Nowaday's the best books by standard authors may be read by youngsters under fifteen. Every school room in Kentucky needs a large dictionary. An encyclopedia, preferably in eight- or ten-volume, wherever there is a patron with one to donate.

The bookmobile is not a new idea. In my photo file, which supplies illustrations for thousands of year-books, there are pictures of 31-buries on wheels taken 15 years ago. There are two few of them now, particularly in Kentucky.

The foregoing paragraphs recall an old contention of mine, that two of the most important factors in the "ditching" of "Manhattan" are just what the cheapest I know of Soap and good reading matter.
