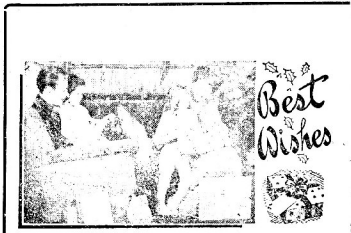

A majority of the teachers interviewed in the Floyd county school system say that six years is the age at which they would prefer the average child would begin the first grade of school.

This and other facts were learned in a survey conducted by Cora Moore, assistant rural school supervisor, among 110 elementary teachers in an effort to determine the attitude of opinion of 500 teachers and principals who work with first grade children.

Six years was voted by 71 teachers as the age for children to begin the first grade; 40 said six; 10 voted for seven; and three thought six years was old enough for the start.

Sixty-one teachers answered "No" to the question, "Do you have enough time and material for the individual and group instruction in reading readiness for those children who enter school before they are sufficiently mature?" There were 39 who replied, "Yes."

Ninety-three said they had planned their reading programs so as to give attention to appropriate material in reading, ability to speak sentences, adequate attention span and adequate auditory and visual perception before beginning the more formal reading activities. Eight said they had not.

Sixty-four said the average child is six years of age before he begins to read with any degree of success. While 21 placed the age at 5, and 10 teachers placed the age at 10 or older than that.

To the question, "Do you find that the teaching of formalized skills before a child has reached proper maturity generally contributes to the child's interest in the skills?" 95 teachers gave affirmative answers while four said "No."

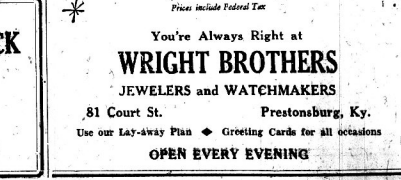

TB SUFFERER THANKS NURSE, DOCTOR URGING HOSPITAL TREATMENT; SALE OF SEALS IN FLOYD COUNTY IS AT \$1,771

A TB patient in the Ashland tuberculosis sanatorium was, at one time, like others—she had decided she would choose a few months of life at home rather than take treatment elsewhere, among strangers. But she has changed her mind, and is now so grateful she did that a recent letter to Mrs. J. D. Mayo, Floyd county TB nurse, is almost a song of thanksgiving.

The patient, Mrs. Margaret Ousley, of Hippo, this county, wrote Mrs. Mayo in part:

"How many times I have thought of you and how many people I have told about you; of how sweet and reasonably you talk to TB patients for their own good.

"Mrs. Mayo, I'm so glad I listened to your advice and the advice I got from Dr. C. B. Isom, of Garrett, Ky. I really had made up my mind to try and live at home rather than live in a little while and then die than come down here and stay away from my family, although I knew it was best for me and those I love so dearly.

"Then one day my husband... Asked me please to listen to him and come down here and get well, that we had the whole future to live for. Then I thought of your comforting words, and there was the Mayo. I'm so thankful to say I listened before it was too late, for this is one of the finest places there could be for TB patients. We have two wonderful doctors and so many wonderful nurses. The service in each could be better.

"So you see, Mrs. Mayo, I'm looking forward to a well and happy future to spend with my husband and two beautiful children. I'm happy to say that I feel better and am gaining weight.

"If it could be possible, I'd like for this letter to be printed in The Floyd County Times. I feel it may help some TB patient to listen and understand before it's too late.

The work of Mrs. Mayo as special TB nurse in this county, as well as the county's cooperation in the general fight on the disease is made possible solely through the purchase of Christmas Seals by the people of the county.

As of Wednesday morning, this week, Floyd residents have purchased a total of \$1,771 in Seals.

"A greater response is urgently needed," said county Judge Henry Stumbo, Seal sale chairman.

Gov. Wetherby Pleads For Sober Driving

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 17 — A plea to Kentucky motorists to observe a sober holiday season on the state's highways was made today by Governor Lawrence W. Wetherby, who pointed out that drinking drivers figured in several Kentucky highway deaths during the last Christmas and New Year period.

The Governor's plea followed one issued last week by Guthrie P. Crowe, commissioner of State Police and chairman of the Governor's Committee for Highway Safety.

Wetherby urged persons planning to attend Christmas and New Year's parties to make plans for safe transportation before leaving home. Winter weather and crowded highways, will make driving while drinking bad at any time—doubly dangerous over the holidays, the Governor observed.

He called attention to figures Crowe issued in his statement last week showing that more than 5,000 persons were killed in the United States last year in accidents that involved either drivers or pedestrians who had been drinking.

Nineteen persons died in highway accidents in Kentucky during a four-day period at Christmas last year and 11 died during a similar period at New Year's.

Who Would Answer Virginia Now?

FIFTY-FOUR years ago, a writer for the New York Sun wrote a piece of prose which is a newspaper classic.

The editorial he wrote was a sincere, fervent answer to eight-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon's question, "Is there a Santa Claus?" It was at once an affirmation of the true faith and a call to the faithful.

Virginia O'Hanlon is now a woman of sixty-two, and in these days before Christmas her name is being mentioned in the newspapers, the story behind the editorial is being told, and in scores of newspapers over the land the words in which young Virginia found blessed assurance are being printed again.

The doubts and fears which assailed her as a child no longer trouble Virginia, but in their stead are others. One can imagine her propounding another, and a greater, question in her declining years. But who could answer it as effectively as that editorial writer of years ago? Who could, with finality, write the answer to this question?

"Tell me, at this season when we read and think on the words, 'Peace on earth' . . . tell me, will peace ever become as real as my Santa Claus of the long ago?"

Who would tell Virginia, Yes; tell her in such words that she could forget the madness about her and accept the answer as final, setting her aging heart at peace as was the child's heart after that answer was printed in *The Sun*?

We could tell her that peace clings, tenuously, to this troubled world; clings precariously, but never abandons us to a world without peace, however dark or forbidding the gathering storm.

Yes, peace is as real as that the Santa of her childhood and the Peace she yearns for today are deeply linked, for without the Christ there could be no Christmas, consequently no Santa, and without Him no personification of the spirit of peace.

Yes, peace is as real as any part of the Christmas season. Nations may wage war, and men die, and diplomats bicker, and prejudice and hate may overshadow the brighter, happier thoughts of mankind. But peace remains. In the heart of mankind it will never die.

We could go further. We could say, as we believe, that peace dwells in the happy spirit, and when the men of all nations overcome sordid ambition, bitter hate and dark fear, then we shall know peace in terms of world quiet and complete understanding. That does not mean that men will cease to think and disagree in their thinking, any more than that all men shall be white or black or red or yellow. But they will learn the meaning of true tolerance and to smooth over all differences with the spirit of forgiveness.

They tell us such a time will be, and that it will last a thousand years. Whether it continue a thousand years or lives, as Virginia was told of her Santa, "ten thousand times ten thousand years," or ten thousand acres—it will come only through the spirit of Him whose coming to earth gave us Christmas.

Kentucky Needs This

MARION Vance, of Glasgow, Representative from the 27th Legislative district, has announced that he will introduce at the coming session of the General Assembly a bill designed to establish a crime investigating committee for Kentucky.

Representative Vance explains that the legislation he proposes would require appropriations, permanency in nature, power of summons, the right to hold public or private reported hearings and power to cite for contempt, with the whole activity thus made possible purely non-partisan in nature, with both political parties equally represented on the investigating committee.

The legislator has an idea that Kentucky needs its Ke-fu-er, and we agree. He cites Kentucky's gambling, whiskey mess, and The Times contends the point is well-taken.

This fellow Vance may be charging the windmill, but we have an idea that never was lance shivered against fairer target.

Kentucky has many honest, conscientious public officials, and we would be the first to defend them. But the Commonwealth is not free of crime and graft and fraud any more than the national government is. Now, when a federal housecleaning appears inevitable, is the time for Kentucky to set its house in order.

We would like for Kentucky to rid itself of those legislators and officials who are too closely linked with private enterprises which operate sub-rosa in the state capital. Lobbyists we will have, but they should not be in high places, important cogs in the governmental machinery.

There are some who have taken an oath to defend the Constitution and to serve the public who are more diligently serving certain interests, and the people have the right to know the sordid details.

For our part, we are willing for a part of our tax dollar to be spent in this cause of honest government.

IT'S A GOOD WORLD

He led her into a bedroom, decorated in pink and blue, with Mr. Stork in person on the center of the table, holding envelopes that contained checks and bills for her. Dumping his pack on the bed he turned to greet Master Gary Adams, small son of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Adams, of Martin. Gary had frozen when Santa first entered, but soon said, "I'm scared to death."

In no time he shook hands with the jovial gentleman, hugged his father and told him he would like a train for Christmas.

Someone requested that this recipe be published, and with it we offer another, even better one. Hot Tea Granite, a holiday favorite drink: 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg, 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon allspice, 3 tablespoons tea, 2 1/2 cups boiling water, 1 can cranberry sauce, 1 1/2 cups water, and 2 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1/4 cup lemon juice.

The spoon is used to let and steep for five minutes in the boiling water. Beat the cranberry sauce and heat it with the remaining water. Remove spices, combine mixture, add juices and sugar, stir well and strain before serving as hot as desired.

The next one, Spiced Cookies, should be treasured by club women of our district as Mrs. Paul Wickliffe, of Granville, Kentucky, former president of Kentucky Federation Women's Clubs, supplied it, and no one has tasted these without insisting they are the best cookies that can be made. Remember if you do not succeed the first time, to try again. There is a trick or two to making these.

Cream one half pound of butter and one cup sugar. Add 1 unbeaten egg yolk and stir well. Sift two cups flour with four teaspoons cinnamon and a dash of nutmeg and add. The mixture will be thick, but spread very thinly (press and pat if necessary) in greased pans or on cookie sheets, to much less than a four-inch thickness. Drop the unbeaten egg white on the surface of the mixture and roll it all over this to glaze the top. Remove excess egg and cover the cookie mixture with finely chopped pecans, the more the better. Bake in the slowest oven possible, watching closely. When lightly brown, remove it from oven and slice while still warm, into squares. But let them cool before removing from the pan. They will become quite crisp when cool, and are invariably voted delicious. P.S. Double the measure if your family includes menfolk!

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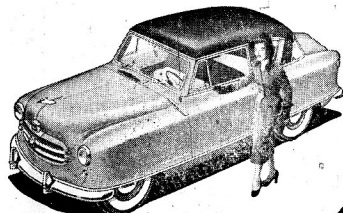

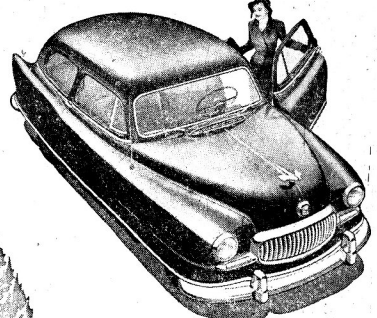

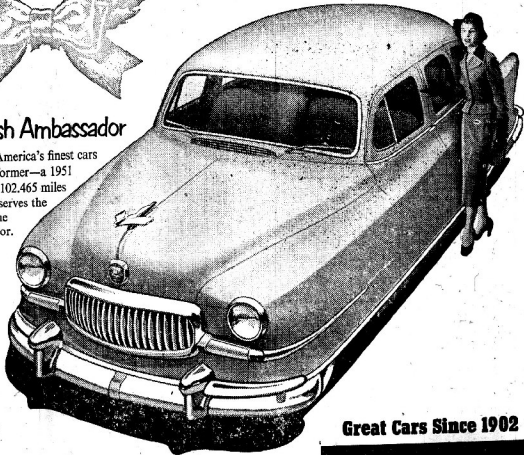
