## Jury Files 4 Indictments Against John Smith Hall

**TWO MURDER  
BILLS VOTED  
DURING WEEK**

**One Indictment Names  
Hall Habitual Criminal;  
His Wife Also Indicted**

John Smith Hall, Brenham's Gasmer, faces trial in circuit court here April 24 on four counts in connection with alleged mistreatment of Allfar Shoffer who was found by three officers last January 24, hidden away in Hall's barn.

Among the four indictments against Hall is one charging him as an habitual criminal. This bill cites two previous convictions—one in this county for a state-year pen term on a forger's county, the other in the Floyd circuit court for a two-year term on a charge of shooting and wounding. His conviction under this indictment would automatically mean for him a life sentence.

Hall also was indicted on charges of assault and battery, rape and an habitual criminal. He was indicted with his wife, Mae, and Alvin Hain on a count of unlawful imprisonment.

Miss Shoffer appeared before the grand jury, Monday, Witness list on the indictment were the girl, Sheriff A. B. Meador, County Judge Henry Stumbo and Dr. R. M. Sirkle. Although only 17 indictments were reported to Circuit Judge Edward W. Hill before court was adjourned Tuesday afternoon so that attorneys could attend the State Bar Association meeting in Louisville, two of these were for willful murder, two others were in connection with a shooting and robbery, and the others were for assault and battery.

The grand jury was on vacation Wednesday, but returned today (Thursday) to resume work.

Indicted on murder counts were John Wesley Hibbins for the slaying of Puller Thompson at Betsy Layne, and Ed Simpson for the fatal shooting at Bensville of 15-year-old Helen Johnson.

J. R. Camieca, secretary of the Grand Jury, said that the grand jury was quickly empaneled, despite the fact that several of the jurors named for duty were business men who pleaded pressing business. Empaneled the petit jury was a more difficult matter, as the grand names were drawn from the jury wheel.

The League Can Do Good

THE TIMES can see no objection to a Floyd County Taxpayers' League. Workers have their unions, officials have their associations—the people who pay the bill are entitled to their own organization.

Whatever weaknesses may develop in the League are not inherent in the concept of organization of the people. These will grow out of the weaknesses of individuals. The Taxpayers' League can make the wishes of the people known to officials, and so work with those elected to serve them.

It can as of now serve no one if no official will be permitted to receive a salary in excess of the Constitutional limit. It can, quietly and without fanfare, and without creating a general air of hostility, let officials know what is expected of them, with the assurance that no less will be acceptable.

Its work should be done without prejudice or bitterness. There should be no loose talk to cast suspicion on any official. To do so will cripple the League's effectiveness, for the ordinary voter will suspect that politics linger in the background and that somebody is seeking to discredit a possible opponent in a future election without going to the trouble of getting down to cases.

Possibly the most valuable contribution the League can make is to hold future official salaries within the Constitutional limit. This will make these jobs less attractive, certainly not so attractive that a candidate can afford to gamble twenty thousand dollars on an office which legally would pay less than \$30,000 for four years' work. And that would eliminate wholesale vote-buying and political chicanery.

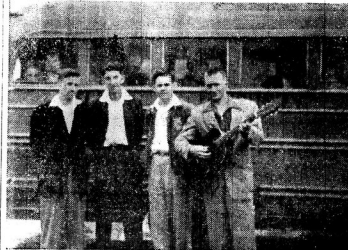
**Reed Tells Seal God To Aid Crippled Tots; Drive To End, Sunday**

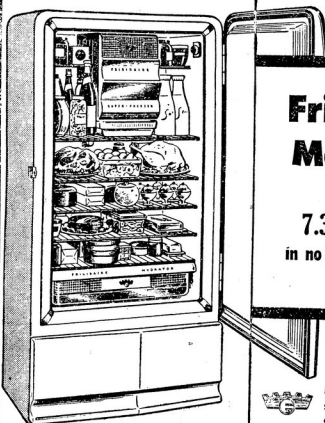

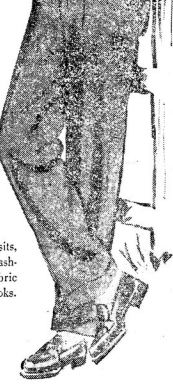

### UNION IS SUED FOR \$305,500

Two Companies, Five Individuals Allege Damages in Leslie

Hyden, Ky., April 5—Suits totaling \$305,500 were filed late today against the United Mine Workers by five individuals and two coal companies who charged they suffered damages during a three-day demonstration at two non-union mines.

The individuals said they suffered personal injuries, humiliation, and abuse. The companies charged loss of business resulting from a lingering damage to their reputation.

Approximately 200 miners from unions in surrounding counties were used when the U.M.W. set up pickets late in February in an attempt to crack the resistance to organization in Clay and Leslie counties.

They are the only two counties in Southeastern Kentucky's coal fields holding out against unionization.

The U.M.W. called off the demonstration after three days, charging the Kentucky state police were used as a strike-breaking force.

Top of Leslie county's largest mines, the Citation Coal Company and the New Hyden Coal Company, were chosen by the U.M.W. for its demonstration. Organizers had been touring the two-county area for several weeks before the pickets were called in. Violence and threats of violence had marked that action, too. Organizers said they were arrested on trumped-up charges and were made targets of gunmen shooting from ambush.

Defendants in the suit filed today in Leslie circuit court were, in addition to the U.M.W., 15 men listed as officials, organizers or pickets. They include International Representative Tom Raney.

The biggest individual suit was filed by Estill Deaton, superintendent of the New Hyden Coal Company. His suit charged he was assaulted viciously "with such force and violence that the bones of the plaintiff's face and head were broken, his teeth loosened and knocked out, and his body and limbs bruised." He asked damages of \$105,500.

Gus Sizemore, a 72-year-old resident of Hyden who said he "was assaulted viciously" with such force and violence that his shoulder and arm were severely twisted and injured.

Clay M. Bishop, a Manchester attorney and partner of the New Hyden company, said his automobile was stopped and he was prevented from going to his place of business by mob action. He charged he was subjected to a prolonged trade in which he was "abused, shoved, assaulted, intimidated, and caused to suffer painful alarm." He sued for \$30,000.

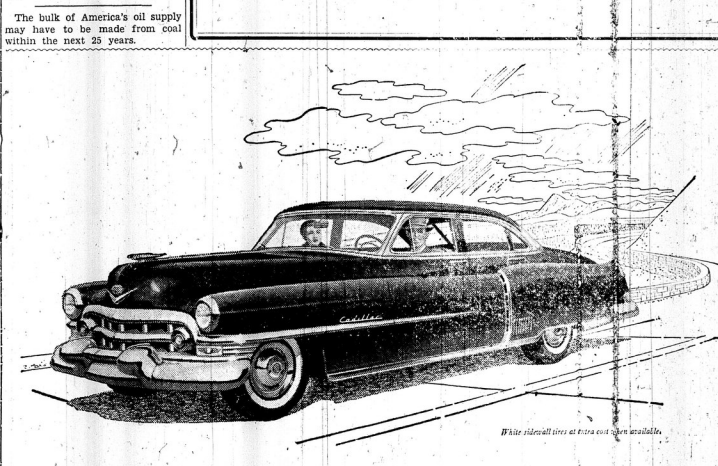
the creek where it became apparent he could not overtake the trio. "If I had caught them, I'd have torn them to pieces," Scalf grimly remarked.

Here the mid-west farmer stacks it out door and its huge size makes the clearing of snow into a chore. **Game, Fish Division Was Million-Dollar Operation Last Year**

Frankfort, Ky., April 7 (Sp.)—Kentucky's Game and Fish Division is more than a \$1,000,000 annual operation with total receipts for last fiscal year of \$1,113,188 and an outlay of \$1,147,934 for its expanded program. It was reported today by State Auditor T. Herbert Tinsley to Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby.

Tinsley reported further that the Division was left with a fund balance of more than \$203,000—or a decrease of approximately \$3,400 under the previous year's balance.

The Auditor reported that enforcement activities were on a stepped-up basis, with 103,329 licenses being checked for the year. There were 2,396 arrests made for violation of game and fish laws and 1,918 convictions obtained.

"This is a good record, indicating loyalty to service," observed Tinsley. "The percentage of convictions is only per cent in 1951 and eighty-one per cent in 1950—is commendable. The number of cases still does not necessarily reflect in the same degree upon the amount of arresting officers. In some situations, the leniency of the court is an important factor."

In addition, Tinsley reported distribution of 65,325 quail had been made during the year, compared with 59,914 in 1950.

**Construction Begins At Dewey Lake Scout Camp**

Many clubs throughout the 15 counties of the Council, including Rotary, Kiwanis, and Lions, have agreed to build and equip troop camps which will consist of tent platforms, tents, cots, toilet facilities, and water, to accommodate an average of 10 campers and leaders for each troop. 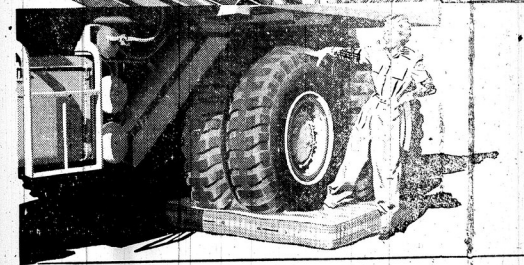
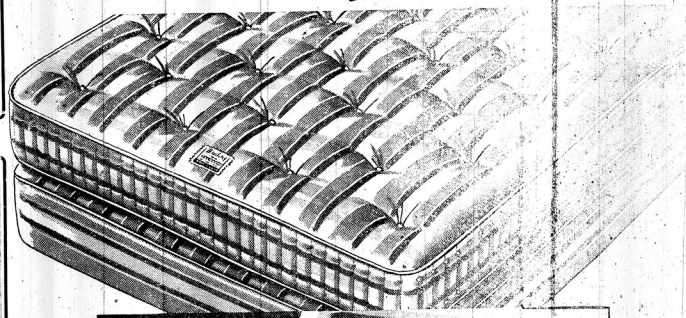
