Floyd County Historical Notes

By HENRY P. SCLAF

James Harris, Revolutionary soldier, who settled in early Floyd county, was born, according to his pension application, in Buchanan county, Va. He married, May 10, 1775, in Buckingham, the daughter of William and Elizabeth Harris. He was a member of the 24th Infantry Regiment, being the 14th, William Harris. We know his wife's name was Elizabeth, but her maiden name and the marriage record is unknown. The oldest son was born in 1782. He died in Floyd county, Oct. 2, 1832. His wife was born in 1752. There were 11 children born to this union. The mother of about two dozen, as a son of a son of a son. If children we know the names of four and but for the pension application of his wife we would not know we have no record. Some notes in 1774, 1775, 1776 and 1778 and Sunday in 1784 of the other seven children in this column state that one son emigrated to Ohio in 1784. The same notes state that another son, settled in Tazewell county, Va., and had a son James who moved into the Hartman family. They lived on the 1832 evidence or before, on except the similarity of names, names that the Revolutionary James Harris family and the family of Harris, appears to be the mother, James P. and David K. Harris, were the same sept.

A grandson of James Harris, the soldier, married into the Hartman family too. Kelley or Kelly married Lou Hartman, daughter of Daniel of The Top, Va. R. He, this column understands was a brother of Hartman Harris, the old attorney of Prestonsburg.

Let us go back to Samuel Harris, who was the youngest son of the Revolutionary soldier and who was born in 1794. He married before 1822 to Patsy Clay. He died in 1888. Patsy Clay was a second cousin of Henry Clay, the Kentucky statesman. It is said they were married in Georgia.

When we discuss the Clay family we set on more sparse historical and archeological ground for the record of the line across Clay's will established and numerous books set out in detail the Clay record. But in regard to the Eastern Kentucky Clays, the record is sparse and unrecorded. That the two families are the same there seems to be no question. Mothers Clay who lived on the Buffalo Creek in Floyd, was a son of Jordan and Mary Corry Clay. Matthew Clay married Elizabeth Sullivan in 1819. Another son of Peter Sullivan, another Revolutionary soldier who settled in Floyd but died in Wayne county, Va.

The record of these early Clays of Floyd is confused. There was a Patsy Clay who married 1844 to Clay in 1828. James Clay married Elizabeth Morrison in 1837 and Robert Clay married Sarah Smith in 1845. We can assume for purposes of setting up a working hypothesis, that these Clays were all brothers. But what of Patsy Clay who married Peter? They probably were cousins and the Patsy Clay that married Samuel Harris (1794-1889) was another cousin. Family names sometimes will lead to the solution of a genealogical problem if pursued wisely.

Martha Anne Harris (1829-1877) a daughter of Samuel and Patsy, married William Goble (1827-1882). One son of this union married Elizabeth, a daughter of Matthew. The notes supplied this column on the Harris family states that James Harris, the Revolutionary soldier, had a son Frank Harris and that there were four sons of this Francis, the other three being another Francis, Walter and William. James P. Harris, who was born about 1788 or possibly 1790, according to census records and who was possibly, and this column hesitates to say possibly, a grandson of James the soldier, married Nancy Young, daughter of William Young. James P. died before 1837. To this union were born Kelley Nelson, John B. James P., Joseph S. and Elizabeth.

This observation on the Harris and Clay families is more as an attempt to answer several questions that have been asked and to certain statements it can be seen that there is considerable doubt that has often been asked is: "Who was the father of Henry C. Harris?" This column does not know. No genealogical reference or family data places him as

LAWYERS EYE FEES ASKANCE

Test Suit May Decide When Sheriff Mitiga Allowance Effective

The new law which, beginning June 19, will enable sheriffs to collect the wages of prisoners for serving papers in court actions is so-called because it is a test suit.

County Clerk W. W. Coffey told this week he will not attempt collection of the sheriff's costs in serving papers.

Mr. Coffey recently wrote the Attorney General asking for a ruling to define the way the new law may be collected and was advised by Assistant Attorney General A. B. Hays that a test suit should be filed so that an opinion from the Court of Appeals may be procured in settlement of the question.

While the settlement has some doubt as to whether either of these bills will be passed, the Attorney General is confident that the Court of Appeals will hold that the law is applicable under the amended constitution of this state.
