**Income Estimates Given in Booklet**

A booklet presenting county income estimates for Kentucky and six other southeastern states has been published by the Conference on the Measurement of County Income. James W. Martin, director of the University of Kentucky's Bureau of Business Research and chairman of the measurement conference, announces.

The per capita estimate rate for Floyd county in 1950, as published by the conference, was \$751.

Highest per capita income rate in Kentucky for 1950 was recorded in Harlan county where the figure was placed at \$1,700. Jefferson and Kenton counties followed with per capita income marks of \$1,649 and \$1,636 respectively.

Campbell county's per capita income figure was fourth in the state at \$1,622, and Fayette county was next with a rate of \$1,360.

The publication was prepared by the conference to help meet the need for income data by counties for plant location, sales promotion and sales management, government finance, resource development and research purposes, Prof. Martin said.

Cincinnati, June 11 — Lock and dam No. 1 on the Big Sandy river at Calletsburg, Ky., one of a number of navigation facilities closed this year by the government as an economy measure, may continue in operation.

The Ashland Oil & Refining Co. of Ashland, Ky., made an offer today to the secretary of the Army to operate the lock and dam.

Col. Paul H. Stone, Ohio River Division Engineer, said the company had offered to contribute \$20,000 a year beginning July 1, for operation and maintenance of the lock. The oil firm, one of the largest independent operators in the United States, is to use of the facilities itself to refund any unexpected balance to the firm or to apply such refund as credit toward the next year's operations and maintenance.

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

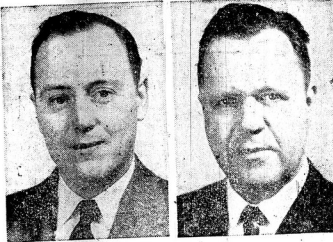

### ABC Board Discloses 4-Year Activity Gain

Frankfort, Ky., June 1 (Sp.)—Chairman Guy C. Shearer of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board today reported that there have been convictions of 144 licensees on charges of permitting gambling on licensed whiskey and beer premises during the last four-year period with two such convictions for the preceding four-year term.

Shearer disclosed a heavy increase in the volume of business before the ABC Board—which regulates the liquor and beer traffic in Kentucky—with 880 cases being tried during the period, compared with 549 for the preceding term.

In addition, he pointed out that 605 convictions have resulted in the last four years, compared with 293 in the comparable period—while still seizures also increased tremendously during that period. There were 346 stills seized and destroyed from April 1948 to April 1952, compared with 97 during the preceding term.

The ABC Board also cited figures to show that of the 682 cases disposed of during the last four years, 150 were for having disorderly premises; 109 for selling to minors and 86 for Sunday sales, 61 for selling without proper licenses, 29 for keeping improper records, and 11 for permitting minors to load in tanks.

Shearer recently asked agents to keep an eye on places in dry territory which have federal gambling licenses. Wherever there is gambling, there may be some liquor, he pointed out.

One Floyd county business, that operated by J. E. and Gracie Conley, Prestonsburg, was listed as possessing a federal gambling permit.

### 239 SERVICE FIRMS IN COURT

More than 239 injunctive actions have been filed for the Office of Price Stabilization by the Department of Justice in the nationwide survey of service trades establishments. Similar actions are contemplated against 623 other concerns.

Failure to keep and file records and reports as required by the service trades regulation is alleged in the complaints. Compliance of service establishments is important to have been put in effect by a vote of the senate. He did not have a majority of electoral votes, causing the election to be thrown into the supreme court.

### KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY

Farmers all the way from Corbin to Paducah have responded to my piece about the Johnson grass menace—have written for directions for getting chlorine of soda and how to use it. Three times as many responses as to last year's article.

But this should be a mere by-product. Every farmer with Johnson grass on his land should know the chemical ahead of time and be ready to use it when the grass gets tall enough to be seen—about June 1. Address Ewing Galloway, R.F.D. Henderson. A card telling how to get the chemical and how to use it will be mailed promptly.

I'll be glad to supply the same information to farm bureau officials and county agricultural agents. So far as I know, most county agents have done little to tell land owners that Johnson grass will ruin their rich bottom and second bottom land for corn. They have been preaching conservation as directed by the experiment station at Lexington, which also takes any casual interest in arousing farmers to eradicate Johnson grass.

I have been writing about Johnson grass in this space only three years. For twenty years I have been trying to arouse Henderson county farmers and to interest the experiment station and extension service at Lexington. It took a long time to wake up a few neighbors in Henderson county. I suspect that a Johnson grass crusade looks like a lot of work to the boys at Lexington.

Quite the contrary in the Deep South. States like Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas, from which Johnson grass spread north, east and west, are not only aware of the menace but are doing something about it in a big way.

Kansas has a state weed commission whose main job is getting rid of Johnson grass. Weeds come second. This state organization works with the extension service and the farm groups in Kansas chemicals for killing Johnson grass and noxious weeds are bought by the carload. Ditto in the Deep South.

Land owners in the Mississippi River delta region, which includes the lowlands of Louisiana, Arkansas, Mississippi, Missouri and South-west Illinois, are aroused—after seeing Johnson grass cover some of their rich black soil!

All my efforts to interest Dean Thompson Cooper in doing something about the Johnson grass menace when he was head of the extension service got only naive, non-committal acknowledgements. Maybe I'll have better luck with the new extension chief.

But Kentucky farmers can eradicate their own Johnson grass. If they wait for support and technical instructions from Lexington or Farm Bureau offices their land may be all but ruined.

### Fire Marshal Awards Safety Certificates

Frankfort, Ky., June 3—State Fire Marshal J. T. Underwood, Jr., commended efforts of 128 Kentucky hotels where substantial progress has been made in removing possible fire hazards, and presented each of them certificates of co-operation.

"We feel every possible encouragement should be given the hotels where the owners go more than halfway in eliminating hazards pointed out to them," observed Underwood.

Simultaneously, he announced his field force was conducting rigorous inspection of all hotels, motels and other places where fire hazards often exist in an endeavor to assure that maximum safety requirements are met.

Commissioner of Motor Transportation John M. Kinnaird announced that his department is making a study of intrastate truck rates so as to make them uniform. The state has never had a set of uniform rates for the trucking industry, and changes need to be made so as to create an equitable system for shipper and carrier alike, Kinnaird said.

**BIDS ASKED**  
The Department of Highways called for bids June 19 on the longest road letting of the year—involving 293 miles in forty-four counties.  
The letting calls for 30 miles of grade, drain and resurfacing projects in six counties; more than 150 miles of bituminous treatment in 23 counties; approximately 54 miles of two-cut rural road jobs in eleven counties and ditching and draining of 57 miles in three counties.

**ELECTION CALLED**  
Gov. Lawrence W. Wetherby called a special election for August 2 in the fifteen counties of the old Second Congressional district—to be held at the same time as the regular primary election—to fill a vacancy in the district created by the death in December of Rep. John A. Whitaker, Russellville. State Representative Garrett L. Withers appears to be the Democratic nominee for the Whitaker seat. Republicans have not indicated a choice.

**COMMISSION LEVIES ASSESSMENT**  
The Kentucky Public Service Commission levied an assessment of \$100.00 against gas, electric and telephone utilities for its support during the coming fiscal year. Included in the list of those assessed were seven privately-owned electric utilities; two pipelines, 27 rural electric co-operatives; 36 gas utilities; 83 telephone companies; 18 water lines and Western Union Telegraph Company.

**FIRE SCHOOL SCHEDULED**  
The annual Kentucky Fire School at the University of Kentucky was announced for June 3, 4 and 5. Some 500 firemen from throughout Kentucky are expected to attend. The school is sponsored by the University, the State Fire Marshal's office, Kentucky Municipal League, Kentucky Firemen's Association, Lexington Fire Department, State Division of Vocational Education, Industrial Fire Protection Council and the Kentucky Inspection Bureau.

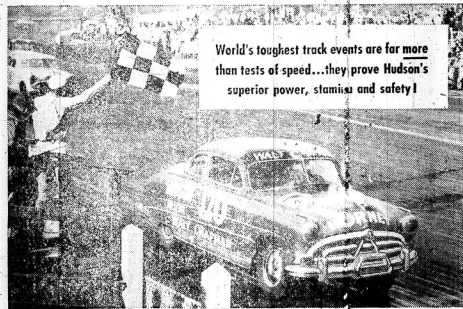

## QUICK FILING URGED

Applicants for 1952-53 whiskey and beer licenses have been asked by Alcoholic Beverage Control Commissioner Guy C. Shearer to file as soon as possible. Between 7,000 and 8,000 applications must be processed by his department during June in order to meet the July 1 deadline for new licenses. Shearer reported.

## COAL TRANSPORTATION UP

An increase in retail coal selling prices, to compensate the industry for the freight rate increase effective May 2, 1952, was announced by the Office of Price Stabilization. The increase, effective May 24, is limited to the exact amount of the rate boost, which was authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission. It amounts to six per cent, or a maximum of 20 cents per net ton.

The higher ceilings are allowed, OPS said, because retail coal industry earnings are too small to permit absorption of any rate increase. An OPS survey now is under way to determine whether retail coal dealers can qualify for further increases in ceilings under the OPS Industry Earnings Standard. This standard provides that price relief will be granted when an industry can show that its current ceilings are less than 85 per cent of the earnings it had in the best three years of 1946 through 1949.

## BETTER TESTS NEEDED

State police, attending a refreshment conference, were told more rigid eye tests are needed for drivers. A Lexington eye specialist said that more than 100 of the 722 lives lost in traffic accidents last year could have been avoided had adequate eye test examinations been given prospective drivers.

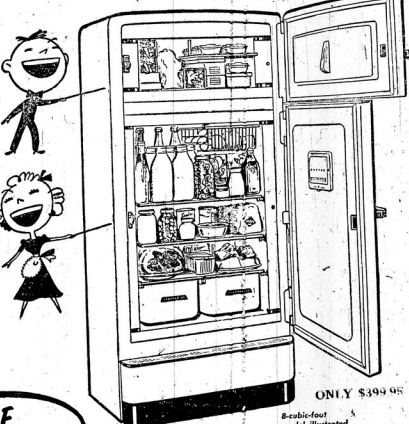

### TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

#### "KEEPING UP WITH LIZZIE"

Some writers on earlier times would have us think that all people have alike, others suggest that no two resembled each other. Both types of writers have something on their side but not the whole truth. If we are to judge by the things that some of us can remember, people have always been both conservative and radical. Some have been old hands in every profession, some have been young favorites who attracted the unfavorable comment of all the oldsters of their time.

We talk about the Pilgrim Fathers as if they were plain suits or even hyperbolic stagers. If one of them were to come visiting in our homes, I fear that we would have to revise our notions of Pilgrims in general. In some ways they were grim and grim and stark. What they believed they believed, and they were ready with sin or sword if needed. To do what they must do, they would have been brave or dare-devil, at least. But if a mere man were to come into our homes dressed as stately as they were in real life, we would burst out laughing. Not even at a dress-up ball would you find such dandy and such ostentation as these grave old fellows wore. If such people so clumsily dressed had come into our little old schoolhouse at Dixfield there would have been a temptation to throw some mild, sure-enough mud at the stiff, starched-and-ironed people, particularly if they were teenagers. Not to have been dressed thus, as you know, would have brought down the wrath of the Pilgrim fathers themselves. They, like everybody else, had to keep up with Lizzie.

When I was a boy as a child, there was a desperate effort made to compel all people to approximate a certain standard. Those who wanted to be regarded as somebody dressed and acted accordingly to a

very rigid code and spent whatever money they had to keep up with styles. On the fringe of our little community, and sometimes inside it, there were others who seemed to fly in the face of convention. They became for the others a horrible example of what not to be and do. And yet, after years of study of language and folk customs, I know now that they in their quietness were following quite as rigidly standards of an earlier time. Evidently it is in their own way they did—ones who were perfectly honest about it—as it was to be in the future. It is in their own way later and more up-to-date folkways. The Lizzie that they kept up with was just a slightly different sort of Lizzie from the one we know. It always comes as a surprise to my students in the history of the English language to find that expressions that their parents wanted them against had been perfectly appropriate in the days of their grand, parents and earlier.

Democracy as it has developed has given much water-rain to folkways than aristocracy did. The person with the poorest background may be dressed so much in style now that no one would suspect that he had not been brought up in the very best home. Clothes still may make the man, but it would take a super-judge to decide whether one's style for such clothes had been handed down. Language, too, has often been democratized so much that nobody could pretend to know the user's ancestral backgrounds. There must be an exception, a person who had been brought up in the tradition that certain words add dignity and worth to speech, when they are used in a certain plain, effective language is the best evidence in the world of a thoughtful culture, whether it is of old or brand-new. Keeping up with Lizzie in language implies now a making of accurate language sound effortless and natural. Don't forget that when effort is still obvious, east of manner has not yet developed; and the user may be trying, ineffectively to cover up folk ways that he feels are not classy enough.

### DECEPTIVE TAXATION

(From The Reader's Digest)

Not one taxpayer in a hundred suspects how much hidden taxes add to his cost of things he buys. When a customer walks into a showroom and lays out \$2,000 for a new auto, for example, some 862¢ of the price has already stuck to the fingers of federal, state and local tax collectors, an article in the June Reader's Digest reports. And when a car owner buys a gallon of gas for 26 cents, he pays 12 cents for the gas and 14 cents for the tax. On numerous other items—including milk, beef, bread and similar necessities—the tax comes to at least half the real value of the product.

Today the average American is turning over 32 cents of every dollar he earns to one tax collector or another. On a \$3,500 annual income, this means that a family pays \$790 in hidden taxes—in addition of course to income taxes which amount to another \$290. It is widely agreed that a tax load of 25 cents on the average citizen's dollar is about as high as the government can safely go, the Digest article says. Above that point taxes push up prices and sap incentive. They make a man think twice before risking his cash to make a profit. They dry up and scorch the flow of equity capital into new plants, equipment and products—the foundation of our industries and their future growth.

We are already seven cents past the danger line.

### Tax on Diesel Fuel

Effective July 1st

Diesel fuel, bottled gas and all other special motor fuels used to operate motor vehicles on public highways in Kentucky are covered under a new tax law which becomes effective July 1. The tax is 7¢ per gallon. David K. Walker, director of social taxes, Department of Revenue, announced.

Gasoline is covered under a separate tax law. The motor fuel tax is levied to build and maintain highways, Walker explained. The tax is placed on motor fuel because that is the most economical and simplest way to pay for the use of roads. The tax is approximately the same on all fuels, so that no special advantage exists for using a particular type of fuel, Walker pointed out.

The law sets up three classes of taxpayers: dealers, local users, and interstate users, all of whom must report and pay tax. All three classes are required to apply for license and furnish bond by July 1, 1952. Present license held by dealers of special fuel will expire automatically on July 1.

Walker also said the gasoline tax law, as it affects gasoline terminal storage operators, has been amended and operators will be notified of the changes.

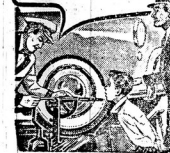

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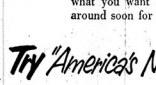
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
