It is said that the elephant has a long memory, but it is the elder Democrats who went through the Hoover Depression that remember longest and deep-est from a bitter well of memory. No accurate count was ever made of these un-employed, but the figure was near 13 million. It is not buefsta sanow, but back then the only thing you could do was beg or sell apples—or steal! Soup linos were everywhere. Veteraus who had defended their country marched on Washington to seek rolicf, and met army bayonets under Hoover's orfler. Men who in desperation were appealing to their government were gassed and bayoneted out of Washington. Thousands of books and articles have hear

Thousands of books and articles have been written on the human suffering occasioned by the cynical and negligent Republican Administration's attitude toward the depression. Any attempt by us to add to that story would be fuile, but we try. We want to tell the story, for the Elephant will not.

want to ten the story, for the Elephant w The roads were lined by refugees from starvation. They came from every-where and were going nowhere. Only wearily drifting around looking for something to eat and hunting for a place-to lay their heads. Compassionate peo-ple along U.S. 23 rolled old, dilapidated automobiles near the highway, so that these transient victims of the Hoover Depression could crawl into them and sleep.

Step. Cola miners lived only in the night, for they never saw the day except on the Sabath. They went to work anywhere from 2 o'look in the morning and stay-ed until they "ideamed up." If they did not "clean up" they were fired. No union representative gave any protection — there wasn't any. Sometimes that "clean up" took until 10 o'clock at night. Long near midnight tupples were running to prepare coal and the workers stayed on the job. Maybe they made a dollar and a half. But if they did, they took it in trade at the store.

Coal loading by hand was in lots of mines not by shovel but with a fork. Yes, a big fork that let the fine coal drop through, for only the lumps went into the cars. The small egg and dust was thrown away with the slate and bone for nothing. If your scrapping was six inches thick you took it with a pick. The company would not give you a single stick of explosive to save you hours of work.

If a miner worked one or two days he and his family ate only those days, for the company allowed him to take out scrip for what he worked. What they ate, the rest of the week, God only knows. We do know that plenty of families did not eat at all except by charity. by charity

At one mine in Floyd county the miners, in des-peration, met secretly in the woods at night and dis-cussed their plight. Next day they went, hundrods strong, to the commissary and with an appointed clerk handed out groceries. These groceries were charged on the books by themselves. Outside, the front office was plastered with Hoover signs—put up by a cynical crowd that asked a desperate people to vote a continuation of starvation and misery.

No Elephant's memory will be longer than a miner's when it comes to remembering that.





Not only the miner suffered. The farmer didu't sell hogs or cattle. He kept them. One Eloyd county farmer shipped his cattle to Cleveland and received 12 cents a pound. Back in Floyd county, if he could possibly have sold them, he would have gotten about three cents. Hogs were so plentful thar motorists had to get out of their cars and shoo them out of the road. Some farmers seeing their hogs starve slipped them into a neighbor's but in order that they would get fed. They weren't worth anything, anyway.

There was plenty of food, yet people starved. Corn was piled up in the Bluegrass fields and was offered at 17 cents a bushel. No takers, While people refiel for bread this source of food rotted because the Republicans couldn't find a way to get it to where, it was needed.

While we were in the depths of this human mis-ery the Republican Vice-President and his friends at Washington threw a big party. They came in their furs, their expensive clothes and chauffered automo-biles. They spent enough on the "Big Blow" to feed all of Floyd county for a month. Yet this same old, cynical crowd now asks you, hoping you do not re-member, to vote for them.

The Republicans talk about high prices. They ought to talk a little about low prices, for back un-der them prices slumped until they reached the point where, since there were no buyers, it would be use-less to quote still lower prices. Cotton fell to a point that men looked back to Queen Elizabeth's day in England, before America was founded, to find a price as low.

A man put a nickel in a clot ma-chine in Floyd county and "hit the jack-pot." Out came S7. In the out is to be four, hag of meal, six pounds of coffee and two cans of lard for that .money. Things were chenp, just as cheap as the Republican negligence could make them. Labor was cheap, too. It would have takor 15 days on the farm, or five days in the mines, to have worked out that money.

Back in 1931 if you were out of a job you starved or lived on charity and only through the grace of a compassion-ate God. Now you char wu unemploy-ment benefits. If you became old and could not work you either lived on your children or your savings. Now you can draw old-age assistance. If a bank failed and you lost your savings, you were just out of luck. Now the government pays your money back. Three banks failed in Floyd county under Hoover.

We are prosperous in America today and it is not a false prosperity, either. Working men who were laboring under Hoover sometimes as long as 60 or 70 or even 80 hours a week to feed their fam-ilies can now work 40 hours and afferd an automo-bile. We eat and there is no cry for bread.

bile. We eat and there is no cry for bread. We have two candidates for President. One is a General whose place in history as a military chief-tain is assured. The Democratic candidate is a man of that class of statesmanship to which Woodrow Wilson belonged. The same old cynical crowd that supported Tat because he was the Big Business Darling now support Eisenhower. This group of Ec-onomic Royalists started out with Tatt. They saw de-feat and switched to Eisenhower. A general takes orders from his superiors and the Tatt crowd that has now moved in on Eisenhower will give the or-ders.
