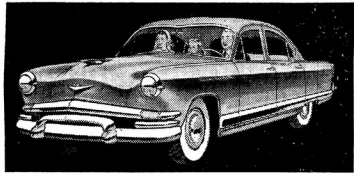

of rugged frontier riflemen, by sheer gallantry and peerless marksmanship, actually silenced a British garrison! The campaign ended, Clark and his men returned to the eastern settlements, scattered over the frontier where they had been gathered. Clark, prominent and a national hero, moved upon the scene, his every action illuminated by public interest. Most of the men sank into oblivion, recording into history after their glorious hour on the stage. Solomon Stratton, the Montgomery county, Virginia, frontiersman who had enlisted and fought for his country against his own state's desires, disappeared for five years.

We find him next on the New River in 1783, when he takes up 245 acres of land. Then he disappears for a decade and a half. He was obscure like the many Revolutionary War veterans who cared for neither their country and their records of service. Solomon never applied for a pension and these personal records of the Revolutionary soldier, which are so scarce, such a veteran, do not exist in Solomon's case. Indeed if it were not for the historians, pensioners and survivors we would not know that he was with Clark.

We do not know whom he married, except that her name was Jane and he was married probably in Virginia. This name Jane as well as the name Solomon survive with his descendants today. His son, Harry, who died in 1849 or 1850, was about 70 years old. This would place his birthdate at either 1778 or 1779. This indicates that Solomon himself was born in the 1750-1760 decade.

It was in 1797 that Solomon Stratton comes back to history and the background of his re-appearance to us is shown by an excerpt from an article on Eastern Kentucky land titles by the present writer. "In the year 1797, when it seemed the Big Sandy Valley was already sufficiently covered with overlapping and confusing land grants there was cast upon the Eastern Kentucky scene the shadow of Col. John Preston, distinguished scion of an old Revolutionary family of Virginia. He had sometimes, in the early 80's, experimented with this business of acquiring land in an arrangement with John Smith, deputy surveyor of Montgomery county, Virginia, who had acquired land on the Guyanette and some in the present Logan county, West Virginia. "This year of 1797 marked the

opening of the Northwest Territory and relieved the pressure on lands nearer the Virginia Motherland. Officers might go to the far Northwest, but Preston, casting his eyes just over the Cumberland, saw a golden opportunity in the Big Sandy between Preston and John Smith entered into a contract Feb. 7, 1797, with Daniel Harman and David Oberg for 100 acres for Mathias Harman and Henry Skaggs of Tuswell county, the principals. Mathias Harman and Henry Skaggs agreed to find, discover and show land of good quality to the amount of 100,000 acres in the Big Sandy Valley. The land was entered March 9, 1797. Ten years later an agreement was worked out between Major Andrew Hood, Mathias Harman and Solomon Stratton for surveying the grant. John Graham, now turning into his twenty-second year and who was fast developing the initiative and astuteness which was to make him one of the important figures of early Floyd, was chosen as surveyor. The organization was called "Adventurers on Sandy" and we must imagine that these men, veteran of the frontier and of the Revolution were an efficient, co-ordinated team. Harman knew the valley like a book and while we have no evidence that Hood or Stratton had been here previous to 1797 we do know that Stratton was a veteran of Gen. George Rogers Clark's Illinois Expedition and had there acquired to the full frontier hardihood and resourcefulness.

"Under the direction of these three Graham began his surveys. The site of Prestonsburg or Preston's Station was surveyed in 1797 as were thousands of acres from the mouth of Johns Creek to the headwaters of the river. As the work progressed, Graham became more and more enthused with the land and its possibilities. Soon he was the dominant figure in this business of surveying and the adventures on "Sandy" began to dissolve. It probably disbanded because Harman, frontiersman that he was and like an article on Eastern Kentucky land titles, could not contain himself anywhere for long, and Stratton was beginning to think of acquiring some of the Big Sandy bottoms for himself.

Just why Solomon Stratton did not acquire the vast estate for himself we do not know. He certainly had the opportunity and knew the legal steps to do so. He did acquire though some fine land, broad river bottoms, between the present Betsy Layne and Ivy Creek. Most of it was evidently passed on quickly to his sons. He and these sons, Tandy, Richard and Harry, owned all of the bottom from near Betsy Layne to Ivy Creek on the north side of the river. Fringing these river bottoms were large hill land areas.

Solomon Stratton lived about a quarter mile south of the mouth of Mare creek. For years the home of Thomas Leslie stood almost exactly on the spot of the old homestead. Solomon's son Tandy lived near where the residence of R. P. Stratton, deceased, now stands. Solomon died in 1819 and is buried in the old Stratton cemetery where so many of the early pioneers are buried—at the mouth of Mare Creek near the residence of Bill Hall.

George Rogers Clark, the commanding general of Solomon Stratton, died Feb. 13, 1818, only a few months before his humble soldier died. It is recorded that Clark in despair cried out before he died, "I have given the United States half of the territory they possess and they suffer me to remain in poverty." His remains rest in Cave Hill cemetery at Louisville.

"Speed Trap" Both were torn down. The town of Lackey has a census limit of 25 miles, he said, but his court has been lenient with all drivers who have not been driving faster than 45 miles an hour. "We have a particularly bad situation at the junction of the main highway with the road to Wayland, with a bridge nearby, over which children must walk to and from school and take their chances with fast, reckless drivers. I have refused to hold same drivers who were able to show they were not driving at excessive speeds."

Deputy coronator Lane later reported having made arrests of drivers in the vicinity, but Collins said he had no definite knowledge of their activities.

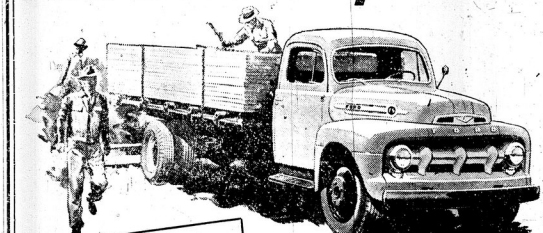

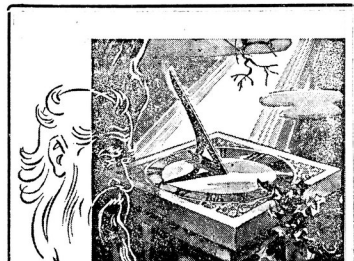

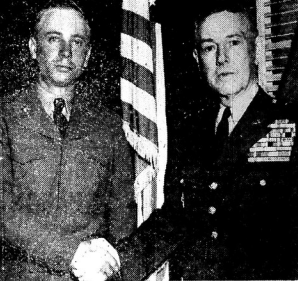

### JUDICIAL REVIEW DISALLOWED

Decisions of the Kentucky Railroad Commission are supreme in their sphere of regulating interstate freight rates and train service, the Court of Appeals held in a precedent-making decision.

The court held that an order allowing discontinuance of train service from Louisville to Middletown is not subject to judicial review, inasmuch as neither the Constitution nor the statutes allow such support to be taken. A number of other actions are pending before the Commission involving discontinuance of rail service.

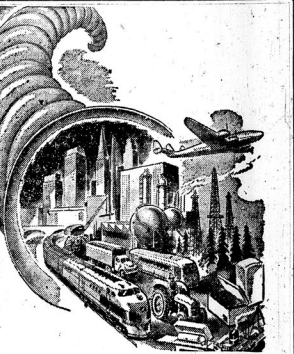

### IT'S A GOOD WORLD

Such a good one, indeed, when a man like Mr. Belford Reitz spends most an entire day building the "Pageant Hill" free of charge, to make it more wonderful, he acted as if it were a privilege to do the job, and took so much pains. He remarked that he never charges churches or religious organizations. His wife laughingly remarked that they might be rich, if they had all he had given away, but added that they felt it come back to them.

Side by side with Mr. Reitz some other good men from Martin were on the hill Saturday. Among them were C. R. Marshall, Haskell Frye, Sr., Wade Mahood, Chris Strub, Haskell Frye, Jr., Clarence King and Sam Ed King. With the aid of the bulldozer, two more walls were freed.

So many volunteered services, material or cash, it is impossible to remember all of them. Only Saturday, Dave Marr insisted on paying for the nails needed that day. That is the spirit which has made the pageant possible. Rev. and Mrs. Swindell, who have just moved to Martin, are going to be great assets to the pageant as well as to the community.

Former friends of Rev. J. E. Felty, Jr., were pleased to see him Saturday. He is best remembered as the man who led the fight six years ago to put this county dry. He is now engaged in a revival in Pike county. Rev. Felty is pastor of the Fairview Baptist Church in Ashland, and also president of the Grace Seminary there.

The following are a few quotes from LOOK in regards to our lawmakers in the capital of our nation. These facts, together with statements from some CIOs as to what carried home at the end of the war and what others might have, in the way of government property, led to believe in what the author says that taxes can be reduced and the foreign program not suffer drastically are correct.

Last spring, Congressmen decided members are away from home when in Washington, and that living expenses while there should be deducted from income tax returns. Congressmen get free doctoring, cut rates at Army and Navy hospitals, unlimited sick leave with pay. If one quits or is fired, a retirement fund comes to his rescue. If he dies in office, his widow gets a full year of pay.

Taxpayers maintain a private gym for Senators and Representatives, who work in air-conditioned offices. Senators have refrigerators in their offices, private parking garage, priority on elevators. A man in Congress never has to ask for a raise. Congress sees to all that by itself, without any prodding from the taxpayers. There have been various ways to arrange for expense accounts, according to the record. Senators have free haircuts but Congressmen must pay 25-cents for theirs. And so on, et cetera!

To tell it down, the author, Jack Wilson, suggested that we think twice before dooming youngsters to some career other than politics.

Magazines and newspapers contain much today as to why the average high school pupil reads, writes and expresses himself poorly, more so than a majority several years ago. The causes are not hidden. The problem is nationwide. Correction in a single school or even one state is impossible until the national trend shifts further back to former position.

Any teacher and most parents can point out the reasons, but so far America as a whole is doing very little about it. Despite better qualified teachers, tremendous improvement in equipment, etc., the finished product is falling much below par, on an average. A few of the obvious causes may be listed as the moral breakdown in homes, the countless distractions that prevent or interfere with study, the tempo of the times in which we live, Johnnie and Suzie are keyed up too often. An outstanding teacher predicted a year ago that it will not be many years till most children will not know how to read. She says an increased proportion of audio-visual aids to education will remove the need for such knowledge.

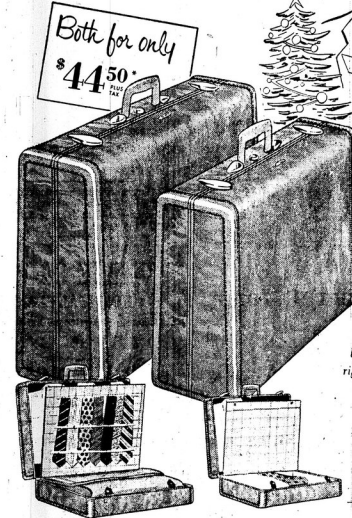

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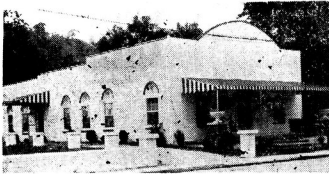
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**Power Company Names Doyle Vice-President**
