I hope that the people will realize the statement put in the paper by Mr. Holbrook is either a more likely idea for his part, or perhaps he is in the administration of my office, by publishing such misleading and inaccurate statements.

Mr. Holbrook's statement bears great similarity to that personal made and in suit towards me which is indicated in a letter to the Editor, now appearing in last week's paper, which is "A Taxpayer." This person, while attempting to create the actions of the Fiscal Court—worth which I am not competent—could not resist the temptation to take a back-handed slap at me, and in that letter has mentioned that I would or might have the County full of "strong" with manly men, "people hidden under their coats." The letter further indicated that I did not forewarn a limit on the number of "Protest-Ing" Deputy Sheriffs, etc., etc.

These statements are made about me when it's a matter of public record in the County Court files, since I have never Duponts served the people than any other Sheriff. ### CATS LOSING STREAK GROWS

But Followers See Hope in New Scoring Strength from Dixon

The holiday season, except for a win over the alumni, was rather cheerless from the point of view of the Prestonsburg Black Cats, and they are yet looking for their first win of the new year, but new scoring strength and the closeness of some of the scores even in defeat have given rise to the hope the team will be a strong factor in settling the race for Floyd county honors before the season is over.

The Cats lost their last pre-Christmas encounter to the strong Wheelwright five, 18 to 13, then edged the alumni, 41 to 39. Their first 1953 game was at Ashland where they lost to the Tom Cats, 49 to 27. Their next game, played Jan. 15, 1953, was at Ashland where they were defeated by the services of high-scoring Delmar Thum.

That brings the record up to recent times. Every time I look at the grass showed up I guesst it. If I had let it alone my 245 acres of second bottom would now be completely covered.

A next-door neighbor grew what he called a 20-acre field that had been infested with Johnson grass in another year or two, and now there is not a sprig of it to be seen in the field. Farmers with fields that look hopeless might try two crops of wheat in a row. It is better to run down the fertility by overwintering than to spend perhaps \$50 per acre for chloride of soda.

More than half the farms in Kentucky are infested with Johnson grass, and it will not be eradicated easily in all but perhaps in per cent of the state. A little money and a little work.

I would printed postal cards gratis to farmers wanting advice about how to get rid of Johnson grass.

ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY, AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A DEED TO AND THE ACQUISITION OF A CONTRACT, LEASE AND OPTION WITH THE PRESTONSBURG PUBLIC MUNICIPAL BUILDING CORPORATION AND AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF AN ESCRROW AGREEMENT AND ANY OTHER INSTRUMENTS NECESSARY TO CARRY OUT A PLAN OF FINANCING THE ACQUISITION OF A MUNICIPAL BUILDING TO BE USED FOR MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENTAL FUNCTIONS OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG AND APPROVING THE PUBLIC SALE OF BONDS TO BE EXECUTED BY THE PRESTONSBURG MUNICIPAL BUILDING CORPORATION.

WHEREAS, it is desired that the City acquire certain property now owned by the First National Bank, Prestonsburg, Kentucky; to be used by the City as a public municipal building, which property was advertised to sell to the City for a price of \$40,000.

WHEREAS, the City does not have sufficient funds to purchase said building outright; and

WHEREAS, the City has agreed to cooperate with said Bank and with the Prestonsburg Public Municipal Building Corporation in effecting a plan of financing the ultimate acquisition of said property by the City by the method approved by the Circuit Court of the County of Kentucky in the case of Stone vs. City of Clay County, 206 Ky. 712, 10 S. W. 2d 841;

WHEREAS, it is necessary to accomplish such purpose that the City join with the First National Bank in the execution of a Deed in which Deed it is covenanted, warranted to the City and secondly by the City to the aforesaid Corporation; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the City enter into a Contract, Lease and Option with the Corporation in which the City leases said property from the Corporation for a period of one year with an option to purchase the same; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the City enter into an Escrow Agreement with reference to such facts and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that a public sale of said bonds be had by the Corporation;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

1. The Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized and instructed to join with the First National Bank of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, in the execution of a deed covering a building to be used for municipal governmental purposes of the City of Prestonsburg, Ky. which deed is hereby authorized and instructed to execute an Escrow Agreement with reference to said Deed being held in escrow by the State Trust Company, Mayville, Kentucky, Trustee; and to execute a Contract, Lease and Option with the Corporation, said Deed, Escrow Agreement and Contract, Lease and Option were read and approved by the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg at the meeting at which this Ordinance was enacted; and copies of said instruments are appended to the minutes of the meeting at which this Ordinance was enacted and made a part thereof of the public records of the City.

2. That the Mayor and the City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute any and all other further instruments reasonably necessary and proper in carrying out the said plan of financing represented by said Deed, Escrow Agreement and Contract, Lease and Option.

3. The public sale of \$40,000 of Prestonsburg Public Municipal Building Corporation First Mortgage Bonds dated February 1, 1953, hereby authorized and approved in accordance with a resolution of the members and Board of Directors of said Corporation, to be passed on Jan. 16, 1953, and a copy of which resolution is also appended to the minutes of the meeting at which this Ordinance was enacted and made a part thereof of the public records of the City, and which resolution was read and approved in the same manner as the Deed, Escrow Agreement and Contract, Lease and Option referred to above.

Research Backed by Polio Fund

Recent successes in the search for an effective, safe and permanent preventive of paralytic polio have increased the need of March of Dimes funds to explore and exploit the findings, according to mail O'Connor said.

"Certainly the discoveries concerning gamma globulin did not mean the end to polio problems," Mr. O'Connor said. "While they solved some problems, they also created many new ones."

The two main findings, Mr. O'Connor said, were that (1) gamma globulin provided marked protection of a temporary nature against paralytic polio and (2) it prevented the severity of polio during the late stages of the incubation period of the disease, even though it may not prevent the disease completely if given after the infection has taken hold.

Limitations Cited. Mr. O'Connor cited three important limitations to the use of gamma globulin. 1.—It gives only temporary protection. Thus the search for a permanent vaccine must continue. 2.—GG is in very short supply. 3.—Gamma globulin research is incomplete. It must still be determined, for example, if GG will permit the mild, inapparent form of polio infection that leads to an active long-lasting immunity.

Large sums of March of Dimes money must be invested before solutions to the above problems are found, Mr. O'Connor pointed out.

May "Smother" Epidemic. "Our scientists must lead all we can reasonably hope for at this point," he said, "is that gamma globulin may be used in attempting to 'smother' polio epidemics in hard-hit areas. The final answer will still have to be a safe and effective vaccine that will provide relatively long-lasting immunity. Efforts to produce such a vaccine for widespread human use are being hopefully pursued."

Scientific research programs sponsored by the national foundation are financed entirely by the March of Dimes. This financial support is the above problems are continued until Jan. 31.

"It was shortly after the Inchon landing. The medics brought in a man who had a wound. The wound was on his plane and somewhat to the rear. We rubbed the soldier back but by the time we got there he was dead. Other men were lucky. They received blood in time. That the wounded man did not get blood in time was the fault of no one, but it there had been no blood on the plane some of the others would have died too."

Sgt. Clyde, after much prompting, tells of action at the front: "I saw the long line of wounded men and jeeps and stretchers. Always he refers to passing these lines and seeing men holding the bottles up as if that bottle was the symbol of life, which it was for these struggling artillerymen."

"We were trapped at the Chosen Reservoir and had to fight our way back to the beach. There were long lines of wounded men. I never had to have any blood myself. All along the lines of wounded men you could see other men holding up the bottles and giving blood."

Herbert Hancock, husband and father of three blood donors, is a brakeman on the Norfolk & Southern Railway out of Norfolk, Va. He does not get home much but, like his brothers, he says the family is a donor when possible. Mrs. Hancock says:

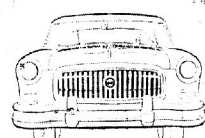

One of the most unique strains of dogs in America—one that is little known to the public but is of considerable importance to the fur economy where it is found, is the Catahoula hog dog.

Bearing the name of the Louisiana parish in which it was discovered, this dog has a peculiar ability inherited through years of hunting and generations of careful breeding, handling stock and particularly the marked and unmarked hogs that range wild through the swamps and woods of Louisiana.

One of these dogs he has his hogs range at will gathering them in an annual roundup for selection for market and ear-cropping of the young. It would be extremely difficult for the owners to round up these hogs on horseback or on foot, since they frequent the densest part of the swamps and many are extremely wild. But the Catahoula hog dog performs this job with ease.

The strain is a leader and teacher rather than a driver. He is also expert at handling other types of farm stock and is sometimes used in hunting around game, according to Henry P. Davis, well-known writer of articles on dogs.

The strain is a "risky dog" built on the lines of pit bulldog, with heavy shoulders and strong quarters. Most have the peculiar characteristic of "locking" their jaws. Their colors vary, ranging from white and brindle to a grayish body color mottled with brindle, brown or black spots.

The dog's origin is unknown and the strain is dwindling in numbers because of the steady decrease in open range acreage. It may be comparatively few years until the Catahoula hog dog is just a memory.

J. E. Wyatt, of Chatham, Louisiana, has long been an enthusiast of this dog. He says: "My own experience with this stock of dogs extends from my boyhood and I am 80 years old. These dogs make any kind of hunting dog anyone would want except a bird dog. I have owned some of these dogs that were so intelligent they seemed almost human."

An interesting side note is that some claim Jonathan Pilot is one of the strains that is now famous as the bloodhound.

**WETHERBY CUTS EXPENSES TO MEET LOWER INCOME**

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 12 (SP)—A program to keep expenditures within income for the 1952-53 fiscal year was adopted at a meeting of Governor Wetherby and his cabinet last Thursday. The program calls for a reduction in expenditures of \$2,000,000 for the year.

The agreement to cut expenditures was made necessary by the reduction in income from the 1952-53 fiscal year, \$20,000,000 over the year which the original budget has been based. Collections for the first six months of the year ran \$1,523,254 below the estimate.

In announcing the new program of expenditure, Wetherby stated that the level of services being provided by the state is at the highest point in history.

"We are, in effect, saying that the budget for this year will be \$200,000,000 rather than \$200,000,000. The total general fund expenditures for 1952-53 climbed to \$270,000,000 because we added \$25,000,000 to the budget as a special session in the Spring of 1952.

"When I recall that the original budget of \$200,000,000 for the year, it remains \$40,000,000 higher than the amount spent last year, and that higher rate is reflected in increased services to the people."

"When I recommended and the General Assembly approved a budget of \$200,000,000 for the year, it was anticipated that tax collections would produce that amount," the Governor said. "Because of developments which the Department of Revenue could not foresee, revenue collections have fallen below that estimate."

"It was my belief that the people of Kentucky desired that the budget be balanced by curtailing expenses rather than by a special session of the General Assembly to levy taxes. Accordingly, on November 1 I asked members of the cabinet to work with the Department of Finance to reduce departmental budgets to conform with the reduction in revenue. This effort has been accomplished without crippling damage to any agency program."

Chief among tax items that have failed to produce this year are the tax on distilled spirits production and corporation income taxes. A report by the Department of Revenue said the distilled spirits tax is \$122,000,000 behind estimates, and corporation income taxes \$63,000,000 behind.

The largest budget reduction will be in 10 agencies, with the Department of Aeronautics leading the list with a slash of \$550,000.

"I have contributed \$200,000 of the \$500,000 in the Governor's Emergency Fund," Wetherby stated. "The sum of \$125,000 is available in the Department of Mental Health because it has not been possible to make improvements as rapidly as we had hoped, particularly in the

**BLADES OF BLUEGRASS**

By C. A. LEWIS

Lexington, Ky.—Prof. George Roberts, retired head of the Agronomy Department, has some interesting history about early bulletins reporting tests at the Experiment Station of the University of Kentucky:

The first bulletin was published in 1905. Its title was "Do Fertilizers Affect the Quality of Tobacco?" The author, Prof. A. E. Menke, said calcium sulfate and nitrate of soda made the best tobacco.

On Jan. 4, 1906, the Experiment Station's second bulletin came out under the title, "Corn Fodder: As a Food for Stock." Experiment Station Director M. A. Scovell was the author.

In the same year of 1906 a bulletin dealt with the seeding of red clover at different dates, covered and uncovered, beginning on Feb. 2 and seeding at 10-day intervals into the first half of April. Prof. Menke was the author.

Also in 1905 a bulletin reported tests of varieties of wheat, the effect of cultivation and the spring application of fertilizers. Another bulletin reported on similar tests of potatoes, preparation of seed and effect of fertilizers.

A bulletin in 1907 told about experiments with different varieties of potatoes, preparation of seed and effect of fertilizers.

The first annual report of the Experiment Station, made in 1907, contained results of an experiment on applying nitrogen to bluegrass on six different stages of growth. The protein content ranged from 16 per cent for fertilized grass cut on May 13 down to 9 per cent for unfertilized grass cut June 9.

In the 66 years since the Experiment Station was organized in 1880, some 20,000,000 bulletins, circulars and leaflets have been published on subjects ranging from how to control grasshoppers to how to control your weight. That's a lot of paper and ink—and that's a lot of information for the people of Kentucky.

**Accidents Kill 754 in Kentucky in 1952**

Traffic accidents in Kentucky caused 764 deaths in 1952, according to the Kentucky State Police. During 1951, 740 persons lost their lives on state highways.

During the first week of 1953, 18 persons were killed in auto accidents in the state.

The police reports revealed that 47 motorists were fatally injured over the Christmas week-end and 10 persons lost their lives on the highways over the New Year's week-end.

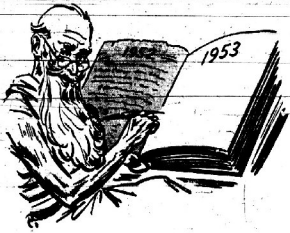

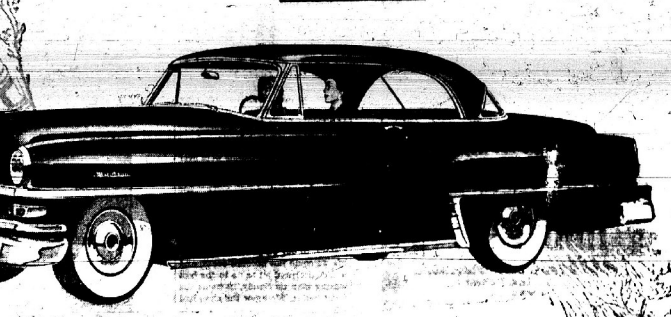
