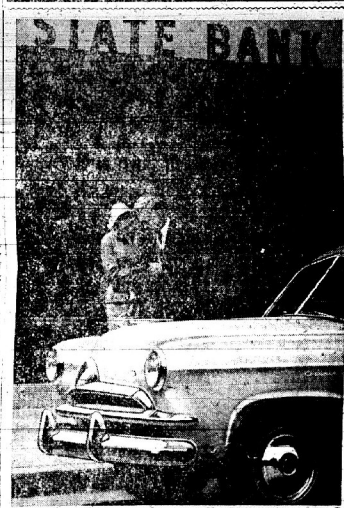

MURDERED FATHER AND SON BURIED IN A SINGLE GRAVE



Granite Marker erected at the grave of Col. David Morgan and William C. Morgan, his son, in the Davidson Cemetery at Ivel.

A single headstone marks the burial place of Col. David Morgan, "father they looked upon as the King of the Mountains," and his son, William C. Morgan, who are buried in the old Davidson cemetery at Ivel. They were buried together in a common grave, Oct. 12, 1815, the day after they had been murdered, while the fugitive killer watched from the security of a far-off hill.

The story of the tragic deaths of the Morgans and the flight of their killer is one that has fired the imaginations of the descendants of both sides in the double murder. Today, after a lapse of 137 years, the descendants remain the old tale. Nothing tangible remains as evidence to corroborate the many oral versions that will not die. Of such things the following is a composite of what the people say.

Edward L. Osborn, Virginia — present community of Ivel, probably north of Ivy Creek, and on the east side of the river. He had married a daughter of the late Alexander Osborn, a settler, Dewey Burnett, Lucinda, a daughter, was in her early teens and her brothers and sisters were in various stages of childhood and adolescence.

Osborn was comparatively speaking, well-to-do. He owned ample land and slaves to work his estate, but a debt to David Morgan, Sr., secured by a mortgage on the land and slaves, brought security to his heart.

The autumn days had turned the leaves brown and red and sold. It was October 12, 1815, Edward Osborn worked in his home on the family shore. While he worked he brooded over his debt to Morgan and the approaching end of a man's life.

When he did not brood on the debt there was the worry over what he believed to be the infidelity of his wife. She was too friendly with young Bill Morgan, son of his creditor, he thought. His worried on humped over his leather and axes. On a bench before him lay his hand knife and a long hunting knife and salt the brother with easy strokes. The knife was sharp, for he had "edged" it on the grindstone the day before. He did not recall, in his black mood, that Lucinda had turned the stone. His daughter would. She recalled the turning of the grindstone and the whetting of the great knife to the end of life.

The sun had started his descent into the west when David and Bill Morgan came trilling up to the George house. It was no hospitable visit, the master of the household knew, so he did not rise from his work bench. They were here for his slaves and land. Edward Osborn went to the door to greet them. Young Bill Morgan, he saw, was dressed in the best of the world. They talked of the debt and the land. David Morgan walked a gravel transfer of property. Bill Morgan heard the low voices of his wife and Bill Morgan in the kitchen. Angry words between debt and creditor, while the crowd from one of judicial confidence and force demands from the other. Suddenly the killer Morgan seized a set of bullet molds from the work bench and struck Osborn over the eye. Racing, blood and sweat, one eye closed with the wound. Osborn seized the hunting knife and struck Morgan. He struck again and again.

Floyd County Historical Notes

The following notes on Civil War veterans are from Hardesty's Presidents, Soldiers, Statesmen, Vol. II, published 1892:

William Frazer
 "The subject of this sketch is a native of Kentucky, born in Floyd county, Aug. 4, 1843; his parents were Robert and Frances (Hall) Frazer, the first parent now deceased. He enlisted at the age of 17 years in Co. B 30th Ky. Mid. Inf. which was assigned to service in the 3rd Brig. 23 A. C.; he participated in all the hardships and engagements in which his command took part from the capture of Mt. Sterling, Ky. to the fall of Saltillo, Va.; his battle list includes Beaver Creek, Cracker's Neck, Marrowbone, Fairview, Funcheon, Mt. Sterling, Cynthiana, Frankfort, Pond Gap (Pond Gap) Saltillo, and Gladesville, was several times detailed on perilous scout duty; in series of '94 was detached on perilous raid from Louisa, Ky. to Wise county, Va. from which he suffered very much from hunger and exposure; he received an honorable discharge at Louisville, Ky., Sept. 15, 1863.

"In 1863 he married Elizabeth Bentley, also of Kentucky, and they have 13 children, born in the order named: Amy, Evan, Nancy, Martha F., Robert, Ross B., Arnelia, George, John H., Walter, Antony, Samuel, and Henry Harrison. Mrs. Frazer's parents, Samuel and Mahala Hall Bentley are yet living; her brother, Cyrus Frazer, was a member of Co. B 30th Ky. Mid. Inf. during the late war, and was mustered out Sept. 15, 1865, at Louisville, Ky."

Craig Hamilton
 "Is a son of the late Jesse and Phemie (Hall) Hamilton, and was born at Mud Creek, Floyd Co., Oct. 15, 1837; his wife, Sallie, a daughter of William and Elizabeth (Pralston) Hamilton, was born on Robinson Creek, Pike county, Ky., June 23, 1840, her father deceased; they were married on Mud Creek, Feb. 15, 1857, and have had 11 children, viz: John, died aged 7 months; Equie, Nelson, Charles Taylor, Elizabeth, Malinda, Verena, Mary, died aged two years, Phemie, Bill, and Cordelia.

Henderson Hall
 "Is a son of the late Jesse and Nancy (Hall) Hall, and was born on the estate of Big Mud Creek, Floyd county, Ky., in March, 1827. His wife, who was Mary J. Watson before marriage was born on Prater Creek, Floyd county, in 1828. They were married on Mud Creek in October, 1848, and have had 11 issue: Fred H., died aged 3 years; William, died aged 8 years; Green B., Elizabeth, Halsey, Andrew, Minnie, Jonathan, Lee and Lawrence, all born in order as here named. By a previous marriage were born: Sarah J. and Polly. The maiden name of the first wife was Anna Justice, who died in October, 1850. The parents of both Mr. and Mrs. Hall are now dead. The subject of this record volunteered Sept. 6, 1862, from head of Beetham's Creek, and was enrolled as private in Co. B 30th Ky. Mid. Inf., 3rd Brig., Div. 2nd A. C. He was captured on Big Mud Creek Feb. 23, 1862, by Col. May's

command, and after an hour of captivity returned to his command at Louisville, was in battle at Bull Gap, Ky., in 1862; Mt. Sterling, June 9, 1864; Cynthiana, June 12, 1864; and Saltillo, Va., Oct. 2, 1864; in 1862 and 1863, was detailed as regimental blacksmith at Louisa, and received an honorable discharge from Louisville, Sept. 15, 1865. His present business is farming and dealing in lumber; he does not receive a pension. Address, Laynesville, Floyd county, Ky. Mrs. Henderson Hall had two brothers, James L. and Dow Watson, both of whom served in the Confederate Army in the war between the States.

The Merger Is Needed

THE TIMES congratulates the Prestonsburg Board of Education on its recent step toward consolidation of the Prestonsburg independent school district with the county school system.

The realistic view taken by the Board indicates that its members are thinking with a great deal of practicality of the future and are submerging personal preferences and ambitions for the bigger considerations.

School consolidation is always a touchy problem. It involves local personalities, community pride and prejudices. But none of these is so important as the greater aim of education for the children.

What concerns the Prestonsburg Board of Education as it prepares proposals to submit to the County Board in the move toward consolidation, we do not know. Whatever the job facing the two Boards of Education in this endeavor in behalf of the children, let us hope both approach the task with the firm intent of reaching an early and just understanding.

A Little-Used Bootlegging Car

A FRANKFORT news story says the State Motor Transportation Department has called on a Pikeville taxicab operator to show cause why his license should not be cancelled on charges he was convicted in U. S. district court for violation of the internal revenue laws dealing with intoxicating beverages.

This news causes one to wonder why the Department does not continue work along the same line with violators convicted in state courts. State law provides for taxicab license cancellation upon conviction for bootlegging.

Every violation of the sort by taxicab operators should be promptly reported by the courts to the Motor Transportation Department, and these charged with law enforcement and all interested in that cause should insist on the Department then taking the action the law prescribes.

Floyd Residents Draw Public Aid Totalling \$527,908 Last Year

Residents of Floyd county drew \$527,908 in public assistance payments during the past calendar year out of a total of \$5,187,075 provided by the state and federal governments, according to a report by the Department of Economic Security.

The report showed that \$22,194,421 for aid to the needy blind and old age assistance, \$12,015,796 for dependent children grants and \$976,830 for aid to the needy blind. Payments in Floyd county were: Old-age assistance, \$259,835; dependent children, \$148,551; and aid to the needy blind, \$128,512.

Old-age payments increased an average of \$5.39 during the year to monthly average last month of \$55.69. The rolls declined during the year from 85,858 in December, 1951, to 56,197 last month.

Aid to the needy blind showed a similar trend with average payments last month of \$37.12 to 2,452 blind persons, compared to \$31.52 in December, 1951, to 2,525 persons while aid to dependent children payments averaged \$64.00 to 20,015 families in December, 1952, compared with an average of \$41.86 to 21,245 families in December, 1951.

Since the Department of Economic Security took over administration of public assistance five years ago, payments have aggregated \$138,533,924 for all purposes. In 1948 the total outlay was \$1,971,270. The figure rose to \$21,879,944 in 1949; \$28,375,710 in 1950 and \$31,797,483 in 1951.

Floyd County TB Nurse Women's Club Speaker

Wayland, Ky., Jan. 30 (Sp.)—The Women's Club of the Floyd County Tuberculosis Association, as the sponsor Thursday evening, January 22, before the Lackey-Garrett Woman's Club at the home of Mrs. H. J. Sherman, Olo.

"Of the half million cases of active tuberculosis in the United States over 20,000 are in hospitals or isolated, which leaves 300,000 to spread the disease," stated Mrs. Mayo, emphasizing that the control of the disease is 80 years behind the control of other communicable diseases, due mainly to the lack of beds in the hospitals where tuberculous patients are treated.

"Due to the purchase of T. B. Seal annually and contributions by the Floyd County Tuberculosis Association, efforts by TBMS and labor to control this disease, the annual death rate in Floyd county has been reduced from 25 persons in 1940 to 15 last year," related Mrs. Mayo.

Mrs. Mayo displayed a map of Floyd county and with the use of colored tacks located the death active cases, and arranged cases of tuberculosis in the county.

Under the subject, "State and National Legislation with Special Emphasis on Health," Mrs. Mayo, prior to her introduction of the speaker, outlined the current legislation, mentioning mainly that Kentucky hopes to have the application for fifty more beds in its T. B. hospitals.

As a business session after the program it was presided by the president, Mrs. Geo. E. Brack, that the Executive Board had met and appointed Mrs. N. D. Howard vice-president to serve for the remainder of the club year.

A letter was read by the president concerning the General Federation health contest.

Two Overtimes Needed To Decide Tilt Played As Big Crowd Watches

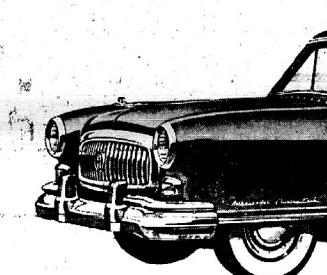
