OHIO MIXED MARRIAGE NOT RECOGNIZED HERE

AS UNION HELD CONTRARY TO PUBLIC POLICY; GRAND JURY INDICTS TRAM NEGRO, WHITE WIFE

When and where is a couple legally married? That was the question presented the grand jury here last week and the jury gave answer by indicting a married couple on a charge of fornication.

The indictment resulted from the fact that the couple had a white woman and a Negro.

The two, George Honaker, about 70, colored, and Catherine Jurell, both of whom were married in Ohio where mixed marriages are legal. Then they returned to Martin where they had been previously accused of living together while unmarried. There they showed colored residents proof of their marriage.

Intercourse is contrary to the public policy of Kentucky, decided the prosecution, and the grand jury voted the indictment against Mr. and Mrs. Honaker.

The Honakers claim they returned to Kentucky only to do some later-duty and that they want to return to Ohio. If they do as is indicated, Kentucky will be satisfied.

Do We Love Our Children Less?

DEAR Parent: May I please come into your home, by way of the press, to discuss with you the most important issue that you will feel that it is not fair that many of our children "starve" for an education while others have more money than they can properly spend, or have a tax burden that may be only half as much as ours.

Now for a few facts—or shall we say reasons? For amending Section 186:

DO YOU KNOW THAT—

- 1. Less than one-fourth of the school children in Floyd county have sanitary drinking water and toilet facilities.
2. More than one-fourth of the children of Floyd county are being taught by "emergency" or sub-standard teachers.
3. Many children are now entering our high schools who have never had a single day with or under a certified teacher.
4. Many of our better teachers are leaving Kentucky for jobs in industry and for better paying teaching positions in other states.
5. States with highest educational level have highest per capita income.
6. Kentucky's teachers are being paid less than in any other state.
7. Many of our teachers' salaries are some \$1,400.00 below the national average.
8. Kentucky ranks 45, 46, 47, 48 in practically all categories of educational progress.
9. Almost every third school child in this state is illiterate.
10. Only 14 of all 100 entering first grade receive high school diplomas.
11. For every 100 children, 47 are illiterate.
12. Every fourth or fifth school-age child in Kentucky is not enrolled in a school.
13. With the above facts, and many more that will be coming your way, does it not seem that we need to awaken and show that we really love them MORE—not LESS—by voting a resounding YES to amend Section 186?

HOW MINIMUM FOUNDATION WOULD BENEFIT FLOYD CO.

Moody Outlines Program To Rebuild Coal Industry

Lexington, Ky., Sept. 11 (Sp.)—Joseph E. Moody, president of the Southern Coal Producers' Association, outlined a six-point program of action for the coal industry tonight, and called on all concerned with its future to join in a comprehensive program to strengthen its weakened economy.

Speaking before the Kentucky, Tennessee, Ohio Valley Personnel Conference at the University of Kentucky, Mr. Moody cited the economic factors which have taken away about a third of the market and thrown thousands of miners out of work in the past few years, and called on all concerned to join in a fight to combat this situation.

The destructive economic factors, particularly in the South, he declared, are high costs per ton of production, heavy operating and fringe labor payments, and excessive freight costs to the major markets of the North and Mid-West.

Mr. Moody said it is clear that he did not believe the problem of coal was insurmountable, but he emphasized that they could be overcome only by concerted effort and "sober determination" of all concerned.

He proposed the following six-point program of action: 1. Stop cut rate dumping of foreign coal in our markets.

2. Restrict the use of natural gas to the fields for which it is best suited and stop the shipment of gas to other areas.

3. Reduce the exorbitant freight rates of coal, particularly to the distant non-market Southern mines.

4. Restrict the use of natural gas to the fields for which it is best suited and stop the shipment of gas to other areas.

Another major factor in driving Southern coal out of markets has been transportation costs. Moody declared:

Railroad freight rates for hauling bituminous coal have been increased a maximum of 11.15 per cent since July 1, 1946, and today they are 100 per cent above the rates of the halcyon coal boom of 1914.

Mr. Moody concluded: "The entire industry—miners, operators, transporters and all—need to cooperate in a common effort to keep the industry in a stable and prosperous condition. It is our duty to do this."

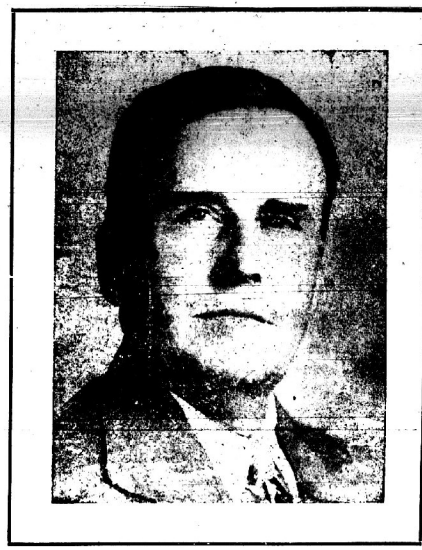



When the Court of Appeals held that two or more prison terms could not be served concurrently in Kentucky, but must be served consecutively, it had the effect of extending prison terms for the 87 inmates who were in the LaGrange reformatory and Eddyville penitentiary. The Governor said the commutations were "in the interest of prison morale" and that it would have been unfair to hold the men longer than they had been told originally. The terms in each case were reduced to the length of the longest single sentence imposed upon a prisoner.

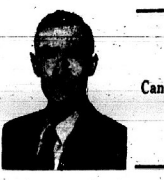

LACKEY SALISBURY Candidate for COUNTY JUDGE DISCUSSES ROADS

While traveling over the county, I have personally inspected many of our roads and bridges in Floyd county. I have found that a great many communities have been entirely neglected as far as roads are concerned.

Take the Mare Creek road, for an example, where there are no bridges. The first ford is a water hole about 30 feet long and 2 feet deep at this time. Mine water keeps the creek filled. Without bad weather it will be impossible for cars to cross this creek.

It would seem to me that most of the road money has been spent, or wasted, on roads that do not serve a majority of our people. Roads have been constructed, at great cost, over high mountains that do not serve many of our people.

Most of the present county bridges need flooring and painting. If they are not given attention, they will rust and fall down. Rust and scaled-up paint must be removed before paint is applied.

Get honest workmen to operate the county road machinery, not politicians. Insist on honest work for honest pay.

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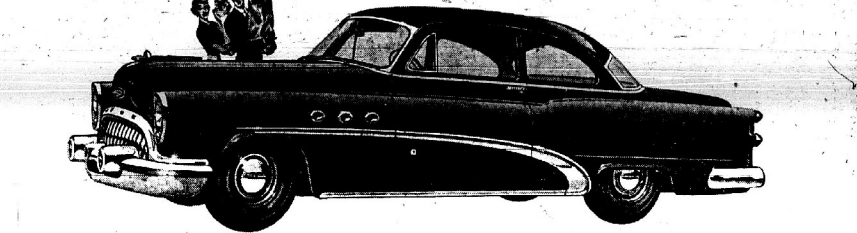

Six State Hospitals Admit 1,260 Patients

Franklin, Ky., Sept. 14.—Kentucky's six state tuberculosis hospitals admitted 1,260 patients and discharged 1,228, with a medical diagnosis indicating the condition of 843 had improved during the fiscal year ending in June, it was reported today by Joe D. Miller, executive director of the State Tuberculosis Sanatoria Commission.

Some 200 patients remained on the list awaiting admission.

The figures compare with 1,231 admissions and 1,052 discharges during the previous fiscal year.

Out-patient clinics reported 10,400 visits were made for X-ray examination and treatment as compared with 8,414 during the preceding year.

State tuberculosis hospitals are located at Madrasville, Louisville, Paris, Ashland, London and Glasgow.

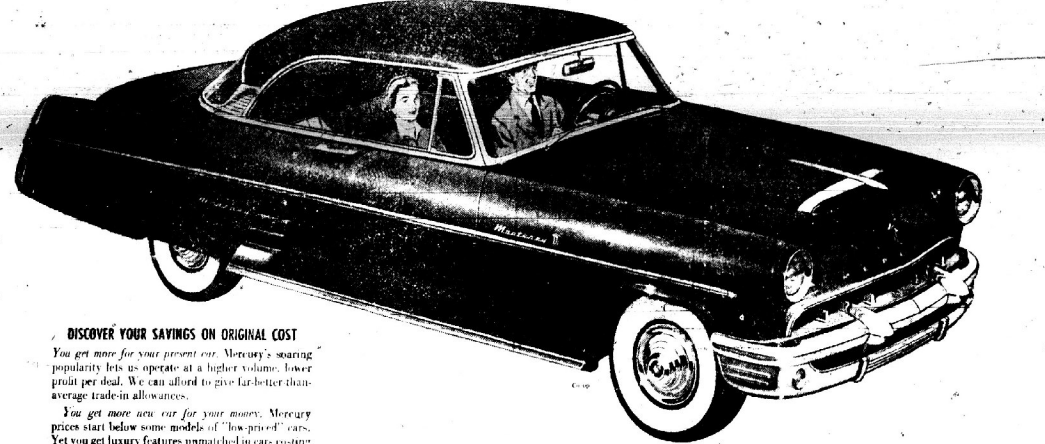

U. S. Grants Cut; 97 Will Lose Jobs

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 14 — A reduction in federal administrative grants to the State Department of Economic Security will require dismissal of 97 employees of the state's unemployment insurance and employment service programs by October 4, it was announced by Commissioner of Economic Security V. E. Barnes.

There now are 528 employees administering these programs. The cut in administrative funds for the present fiscal year was from \$2,347,702 to \$2,077,225—with \$215,932 of the reduction being for personal services. In addition, the Department of Labor has directed discontinuance of Elizabethtown and Morehead offices of the Employment Service, reducing from 24 to 22 the number of these offices in the state.

A general order was issued both by O. D. Hannah, director of the Division of Unemployment Insurance, and L. P. Jones, Employment Service Director, to release all employees 70 years old or more. This, it is expected, will account for about 10 of the number to be released, with the remaining coming from other age groups.

Over 62,500 seamen are currently employed on ocean-going ships of the American merchant marine.

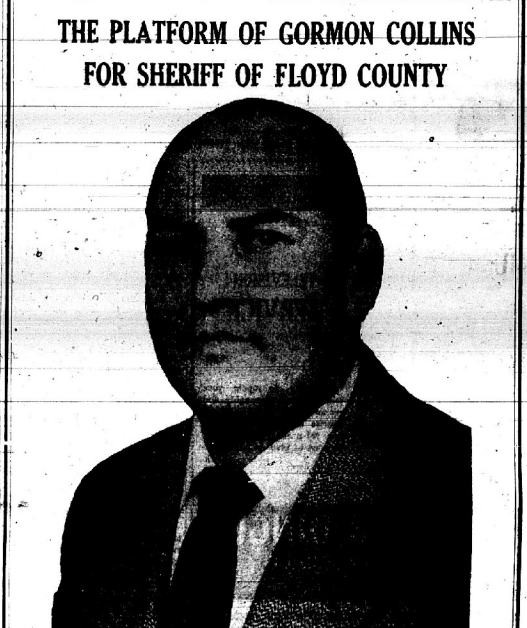
