IS HUGHES ANOTHER PARILLI?

Johnny Rauch, one of football's top-flight passers during his All-American days at Georgia, thinks Kentucky may be coming up with another Babe Parilli.

After he had scouted the Wildcats in their 23-6 loss to Ole Miss Saturday, he came up with the observation that "Kentucky has had better-than-average passers - and that one kid can be great."

Doing the flipping for Kentucky were Dick Shatto and the "Kid" Delmar Hughes.

"They're both capable of hurting you when they throw the ball," said Rauch, now an assistant coach at Florida.

"The game will play Kentucky at Lexington Saturday night."

"The last boy Kentucky used seemed exceptional to me for a freshman. If he shows the normal improvements that can be expected in a player, he'll be great."

He was talking about Hughes, a 165-pounder from Prestonsburg. His appearance Saturday, as Coach Paul Brynari searched desperately for a backfield combination with punch was his first in a game for the Cats.

Hughes started out in Parilli fashion by completing the first five passes he threw. And then he impressed Rauch about both Shatto and Hughes wasn't that they were doing a good job of hitting the receivers - it was the way they spotted the receivers and were getting the ball away.

This reduction in cash income and winter feed supply, there is a complete failure of fall pastures. Fall hay crops are so damaged that they are generally being used as emergency pasture. Many farmers are now using a substantial portion of the winter hay supply to supplement the inadequate pasture.

The result will be a disastrous shortage of feed by mid-winter. In a normal year no hay would be used before late November and in good years early December. The hay crop this year is so small that it will be used for a normal feeding period, and would have been inadequate for the long feeding period had the field been average. The complete failure of late hay crops leaves the supply approximately 50% below the requirements of the abnormal feeding period. There is no carry-over as the 1952 drought, which not so severe as 1953, created a shortage which was only used with available supplies, but also devoured all cash and credit resources of most farmers.

The net result has been a drastic deterioration of the economic picture in this area in a period of strain caused by rapidly declining cattle prices and a general drop in all other farm prices.

"This area includes more than fifteen thousand farmers, with the majority principally dependent on income from cattle. The long cash crop, tobacco, being severely damaged, leaves these farmers with no choice but to deplete their herds almost to the vanishing point by selling their cattle at depression prices to obtain cash to purchase feed from distant and more fortunate areas for the remainder of their livestock."

He said Secretary Benson to take every action possible to provide economic aid and credit, as provided by the government, to enable drought-stricken farmers to retain the cattle and other livestock required for their normal farm operations.

In 1923, two out of every five children in Kentucky attend a school with outdoor toilet facilities.

In 1933 there are 2,000 teachers that hold only emergency teaching certificates. This means that 100,000 school children are being taught by inadequately trained instructors.

How do these conditions affect Kentucky in the national picture? The rate of rejection of white-collar jobs in Kentucky for military service in World War I was 10 percent.

Why can't Kentucky, a progressive state in nearly every other respect, get its education program into high gear to remedy these glaring deficiencies?

The stumbling block to any improvement in the educational program of the state is the outdated and outmoded Constitution of 1792.

Inequalities are created because this money goes to the state district on the basis of school children—1 cent for each child.

With the amendment of Section 186 the state can establish a foundation program (similar to that already existing in other states) which will enable all Kentucky schools to reach an acceptable standard of education and education for their children.

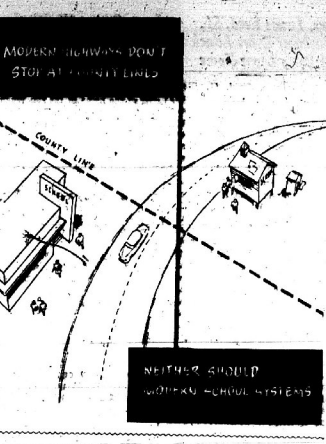

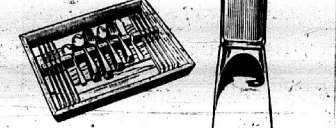

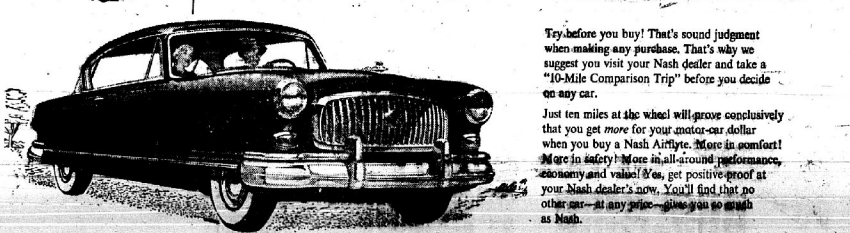

### BENTLEY FINE MAY BE VOID

Attorney General Says Judge Pro-Tem at Trial Ineligible for Service

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 14—A member of the State Workmen's Compensation Board may not serve as County Judge, even temporarily, without vacating the former office, Assistant Attorney General M. B. Hollifield held that a state officer could not serve at the same time as a county officer in unexpired a Floyd county dispute.

The opinion was given after an inquiry was made if Paul E. Hayes, Prestonsburg, a member of the Workmen's Compensation Board, could serve as County Judge pro-tem. Mr. Hayes acted in this capacity after County Judge Henry S. Smith had submitted to an August 14th graduation class through observation and student teaching in the Louisville City and Jefferson county school systems. Miss Martin was graduated from Berea College in June.

That no person shall be a state officer, a deputy state officer or a member of the General Assembly and at the same time an officer of any county, city or municipality or an employee of any of these.  
The Attorney General's opinion stemmed from the conviction of Arthur Bentley, of Lockett, at a quarterly court session presided over by Mr. Hayes as judge pro-tem. Bentley was fined \$1,000, and appealed his case to circuit court. Commonwealth's Attorney Burnia Martin said this week that, in view of the Attorney General's decision, Bentley's conviction was void without proper jurisdiction. Since Hayes was ineligible to serve as judge pro-tem, he will ask that the case be dismissed on appeal.

**FURN TO DEATH**  
GRUNDY, Va., Sept. 22—Two Kentucky youths were trapped and burned to death in a burning automobile today after a collision with a lumber truck. Two others were injured. Killed were Tommy Daniels, 19, and James Buchanan, 20, both of South Williamson, Ky. Injured were Ernest Thompson, 40, of Westport, Buchanan county, driver of the truck and Raymond Baker, 18, of South Williamson, an occupant of the car.

### GOVERNOR URGES CARE TO PREVENT FIRE LOSSES

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 28 (Sp.)—of great danger to timber, soil and Governor Wetherby has called on Kentuckians to use extra caution in the prevention of forest fires because of extreme drought conditions in a statement issued here for National Fire Prevention Week, Oct. 4-10.

"Today our forests face even greater danger from fire than in 1952 when 2200 square miles of timberland were burned. This is the third year of a prolonged drought, and, even though some rains may occur, fires can start soon after and they will be dangerous until heavy mow makes the woods safe," the Governor said.

Wetherby was presented a Smokey Bear toy, symbol of the nationwide Cooperative Forest Fire Prevention Campaign, by Henry Ward, Commissioner of Conservation. A similar toy had been presented the President and they are going to other governors to help publicize the campaign.

Ward said the movement, which has been conducted since 1942 by state foresters, the U. S. Forest Service, the forest industry and civic and educational groups, has reduced materially the number of man-caused fires. Smokey Bear, dressed in blue jeans and a forest ranger's hat, has been used to interest children in fire prevention and Congress has passed legislation making him official for the campaign.

Wetherby urged "every boy and girl to become a Junior Forest Ranger and join Smokey Bear in the great work of helping to prevent destructive forest fires."

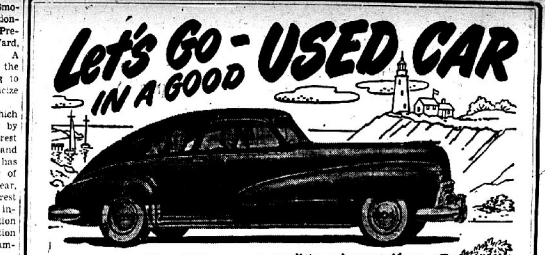

**PERKINS HITS DELAY IN AID**

**Says Tax Amortization Under Group IV Rating Essential for Section**

Congressman Carl D. Perkins has urged legislation of the accelerated tax amortization plan for new plants in such areas as has been ready for release for some weeks, but is being delayed pending action revising the cover-all manpower policy for such areas.

Congressman Perkins argued that the tax amortization plan is more essential for a permanent improvement in the basic employment pattern in Eastern Kentucky than any other single proposal. He wrote Dr. Fleming, in part:

"While certain individual Senators expressed opposition to this entire program, the final action provided for a continuation of the policy of giving preference to labor surplus areas and, in my opinion, is a directive for you continue this policy without interruption."

"This is vitally important to labor surplus areas such as the counties of Breathitt, Floyd, Johnson, Knott, Letcher, Magoffin, Martin, Perry and Pike in Eastern Kentucky. This area produces such essential items as coal and lumber, yet reflects an unemployment rate of almost ten percent or more than three times the National average. The Kentucky Department of Economic Security has assured me that there are not less than 40,000 workers available for immediate employment in this area, with an additional 20,000 miners on a part time schedule of two days per week or less. Conditions are rapidly approaching depression levels in the area while the nation boasts of a record high in the number employed. A few defense orders for coal and lumber channeled into the area would go far toward alleviating the human suffering of these under-employed and unemployed workers without additional cost to the government or substantial damage to other production centers."

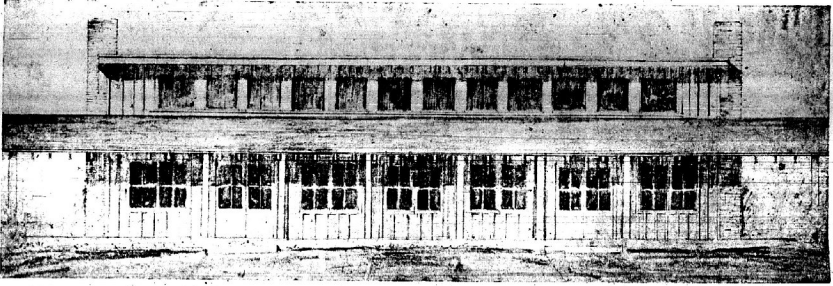

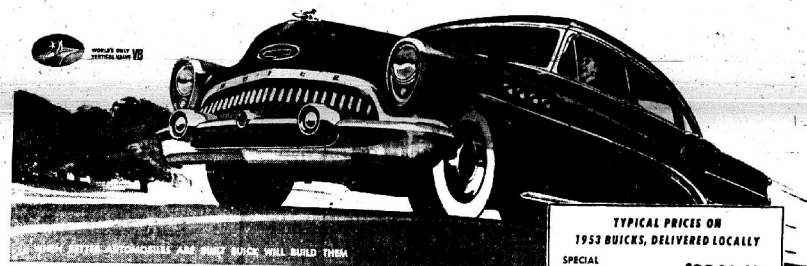

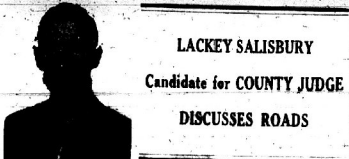

 DISCUSSES ROADS

Continuing my campaigning over the county, I have personally inspected many of our roads and bridges in Floyd county. I have found that a great many communities have been entirely neglected as far as roads are concerned. Some of the roads that I have traveled over are in a bad shape at this time and will be impassable when the bad weather sets in. The people that live along the paved roads do not realize the seriousness of this situation.

The road going into Auxier along the river is in a bad shape and will be practically impassable when bad weather sets in. Bridges across the river are dangerous, planks out of the floor and the floor broken in many places; too dangerous for public use. Road leading out of Auxier is now in a bad shape and will get worse. The school bus driver will not haul children over the bridge; they unbind and walk across, then get back on the bus.

It would seem to me that most of the road money has been spent, or wasted, on roads that do not serve many of our people. Roads have been constructed, at great cost, over high mountains that do not serve many of our people. One of these roads is so steep and narrow as to be almost useless for normal traffic. If the money that has been spent on these mountain roads had been spent on roads along the valleys, we would now have many miles of good roads where they are urgently needed.

My road program is simple. Where people are bottled up and can't get out, do something for them. Low water bridges can be built at small cost. If we can't do any better, at least do that much. I believe in spending the road money where it will do the most good for the most people. I don't believe in spending it all in one place. Each gravel road ought to have some black top put down each year. New roads ought to be laid out and a part of the money spent on new construction each year.

Most of the present county bridges need flooring and painting. If they are not given attention, they will rust and fall down. Rust and scaled-up paint must be removed before paint is applied.

Get honest workmen to operate the county road machinery, not politicians. Insist on honest work for honest pay.

If we had the \$6250.00 that was paid the auditors to tell the present County Judge, and others, what they owed Floyd county, there would at least have that much money to spend on emergency work on our county roads. This money could have been put to a better use. Every man ought to know what he owes. Any of our mine-bookkeepers, bankers, school teachers, or business men could have easily figured out how much our County Judge, and others, owed Floyd county without sending to Louisville and getting high-priced auditors to do the work. If they had been capable administrators they could easily have figured this out for themselves and saved the taxpayers the \$6250.00. I am elected your County Judge, it will not be necessary to send to Louisville for auditors. I will cause me to pay over to the County Treasury money due Floyd county, because proper reports will be made by all officials.

**PAROLE STUDY MADE**

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 28—Means of strengthening Kentucky's parole procedures were recommended to Governor Wetherby following a study made by the National Probation and Parole Association.

The report, made by Hugh P. Reed, Chicago, director of the study, was given the Governor and a special committee on parole (meeting several months ago) to look into the subject. Among recommendations were:

1. That judges, rather than juries, fix the sentence of criminals.
2. That all persons placed on parole or probation be kept under supervision—in contrast to the present system whereby only those on parole are constantly supervised.
3. That circuit judges be forbidden to prohibit terms unless supported by a written report of an investigating officer.

Other recommendations called for an increase in authority of the Parole Board in determining when and where parole might be granted and provisions for higher pay and educational standards for parole and probation officers.

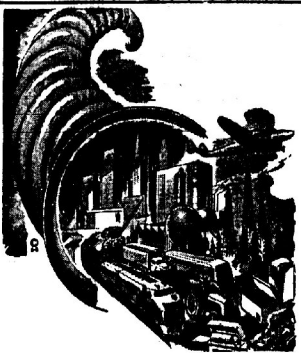

The award is presented in recognition of high quality of regular banking service to farmers as well as for special activities conducted by the Association's member banks in the agricultural field.

Points toward the award are given by the A.B.A. for such activities as promotion of soil conservation and land management, cooperation with the extension service of the state agricultural college, support of farm youth groups such as Future Farmers of America and 4-H Clubs, and other programs which strengthen banker-farmer relationships. Quality of regular bank service is of course given major emphasis in choosing the award-winning states, along with the work done in agriculture by the state bankers association. In addition, prime importance is placed upon the appointment of bankers in each county to represent the banks in agricultural matters and coordinate the bank program in the farm field.

Mr. Donny said that club has sent a judging team to the State Fair every year since 1929 and that it has ranked in the top 10 in the state on every occasion, at one time achieving third place.

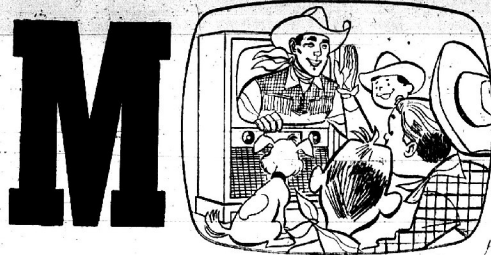

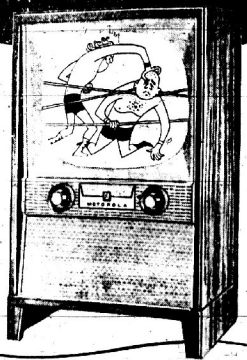
