FLAMES TRAP YEAR-OLD TOT

As Little Paint Home Is Destroyed Friday; Three Others Escape

While three older children of the family and a woman neighbor stood helplessly by, Helen Marie, year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Otto Spencer, burned to death in the fire which consumed the Spencer home on the right fork of Little Paint Creek last Friday afternoon.

The tot's body was not recovered until the flames had subsided at the home and a nearby chicken house had been reduced to ashes.

The fire was said to have started when Mrs. Spencer was away from home and her husband was working in the mines. The report received here said the blaze started when one of three children left with the baby playing with fire.

Mrs. Eva Collins, a neighbor, attracted attention on the scene when she saw the child's car but could do nothing to save it.

Surviving, besides the parents, are three brothers and three sisters, Wanda Lee, Willa Sue, Wilma Jean, James Otto, Billy Clyde and Larry, all of Little Paint. Funeral rites were conducted Sunday at the graveyard in the Whitaker Hill cemetery.

SUIT ATTACKS FISCAL COURT BOND ORDERS

Tax League World Void Gas, Water Bond Issues; Suit Filed Here Today

That an old custom of delayed filing of fiscal court orders may cast a group of bondholders a quarter of a million dollars was viewed as a possibility today (Thursday) when the Floyd County Good Government Taxpayers League filed suit in Floyd Circuit Court to set aside the bond orders rendered in the county auditor's various Beaver Creek area and water districts.

The Taxpayers League attacks the validity of the fiscal court orders on the grounds that they were not read and signed as provided for in the Kentucky Revised Statutes. The suit was presented by Robert B. Wellman as attorney for the League.

Substance of the suit was chiefly that the suit was presented by the plaintiffs' petition. It reads: "That said written entry, made May 9, 1953, and not signed by the presiding judge or with the approval of the members of the fiscal court as set forth in said order, and after said meeting had adjourned, that said order was not then nor at any time publicly read or signed by the presiding judge in the presence of or with the approval of the members of the fiscal court as set forth in said order, and by reason thereof said purported order was void and null and of no effect."

Copy of the May 9 order was filed as Exhibit A and copy of an order of June 17, at which time the court met again and adjourned, was filed as Exhibit B. Plaintiffs alleged that the orders were not signed by Judge Stumbo until after Nov. 9.

Plaintiffs say they are permitted to prosecute the case for themselves and all other taxpayers of Floyd county, that the orders be adjudged void, and that defendants be enjoined from proceeding further under the "purported orders."

Speculations were rife as to the position of the bondholders in the event the orders by which the water and gas districts and providing for the issuance of bonds are declared invalid.

Section 61.00 of the statutes under which the League sues, reads: "Before each adjournment the minutes of the proceedings of the fiscal court shall be publicly read by the clerk of the court and corrected if necessary, and shall be signed at the presiding judge with the approval of the justices of the peace who were present when the court was held."

"No minute or order of the fiscal court shall be valid until read and signed as provided in this section above and nor unless the record shows by whom the court was held."

Parents and other school patrons are being invited to attend the conference.

BOARD HERE ASKS COUNTY FOR GYM AID

Offers Merger Proposal; Turner Points Out Debt Limit Has Been Reached

A nine-point proposal for merger and a plan for help in the construction of a gymnasium in connection with the new high school here were submitted Tuesday by the Prestonsburg Board of Education at its meeting with the Floyd Board of Education.

No definite action was taken on either matter, and a second joint meeting of the two boards were scheduled for January.

Plans for a gymnasium, as proposed by City Superintendent Charles H. Prater and board members H. D. Fitzpatrick, Jr., Dr. George P. Archer and Tom O. Minnie, call for the expenditure of \$20,000. At that amount, it was pointed out, an attempt will be made by the City Board prior to merger to raise half through bond issue, secured by taxing. The county board was asked to raise the remainder.

Although there was no immediate response from county board members, County Superintendent Virgil O. Turner pointed out that the county board had a real financial problem with tremendous building program and has reached the limit of its ability to pay on bonded indebtedness.

Mr. Turner said, "We need at least \$50,000 for building in this county. I think the people of the county don't realize what the situation is." He added that the bond issue which would be needed to meet the new high school building was limited only with the great difficulty.

City Board Member Fitzpatrick agreed that the county board was operating to the limit of its ability to pay on bonded indebtedness. "At least let us open the door and see what can be done," he argued.

Dr. Archer, Fitzpatrick and Dings pointed out that the city's offer to bear half the expense of the building would effect a long-range saving for the county, since merger is certain and if nothing is done toward a gym before that time the city burden would be on the county board.

Plans the city board has for the proposed gymnasium include a complete physical education plant, with space under the bleacher sections for classes in shop.

The city board members—Archer, Fitzpatrick, Dings, W. V. Bunting and W. A. Spredlin—pointed out their plan had no intention of interfering with the county board's plan for the Martin school.

Flord, Other Counties of Area Show Heavy Population Losses

The tide of emigration flows away from Floyd county, and generally speaking, away from Kentucky.

The state in the last three years had a net loss of 50,000 people, or 1.1 per cent, while Floyd county had a net loss of 770 persons, or a same percentage population loss of 1.8.

These and other figures were reported recently as population estimates made by the Department of Rural Sociology, Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station, University of Kentucky.

While every county in this area (Economic Area No. 9, the Cumberland Plateau) except Leslie lost population over the period from April 1, 1950, to April 1, 1953, the Water Gap was under direction of the Carter & Callahan Funeral Home.

Population gains were noted in all three metropolitan areas: Louisville, Newport-Owingston and Ashland, but elsewhere only three areas had increases. These were Area No. 1 (the Purchase No. 2, Owensboro-Henderson) and No. 7 (the Inner Bluegrass, including Fayette, Clark and neighboring counties).

The loss of population through migration is of course, not a new development, rather it is a continuation of a long time trend and is to be explained for the most part, by familiar factors. There is a continuing movement from farms to cities, and from agriculture, such as the shift to grassland farming, development of the area.

—Moving toward merger with the county school system—which, tentatively, has been scheduled for the next fiscal year—the city school board has submitted proposals as conditions of merger:  
1. The Prestonsburg Board of Education shall transfer and convey to the county school board all real and personal property and assets, real or personal, of every kind and nature.  
2. The Floyd County Board of Education shall assume all indebtedness and obligations of the Prestonsburg board.  
3. Officers of the Prestonsburg board shall serve as members of the county board until expiration of their terms of office.  
4. The high school building now being constructed in the city limits of Prestonsburg shall be named Prestonsburg High School.  
5. The county board shall continue the membership of Prestonsburg high school in the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and shall meet the requirements for accreditation by such association.  
6. The present sports program of the Prestonsburg high school shall be continued until such time as a change of conditions shall make a change desirable.  
7. The county board shall not later than April 1, 1954, redivide the county into five divisions as nearly equal in population as possible.  
8. All teachers and other employees of the Prestonsburg board shall, upon such merger, become employees of the county board and their contracts and tenure with the Prestonsburg board shall be considered the same as if such were had with the Floyd county board except that their salaries shall be based on county board salary schedule. All acts of the Prestonsburg board with respect to employees and former employees shall be binding on the county board.  
9. All employees, students and other persons of the Prestonsburg independent district shall be entitled to and receive equal consideration and treatment in the conduct of the schools so that no discrimination shall exist against such persons. Otherwise, the county board in its regular meeting Tuesday transacted these items of business:  
Appointed Estill Gobbe trustee of the land of Con Creek school to succeed Willie Gobbe who has moved to Michigan; Edward Carl Finley temporarily as his driver at Wayland and Caille Satter on a permanent basis for the Middle Creek school; hired Gaynelle Bevel as teacher at Beay Layne; look builder's risk insurance on the Prestonsburg buildings; accepted the \$13,324.35 bid of the Prestonsburg Building Company on school building contracts.

Early TB Diagnosis May Result in Cure; \$4,000 Die Each Year

Threatened by one of our nation's biggest health problems. About 34,000 people in the United States die of it each year. Tuberculosis is the first cause of death in only one among persons between 15 and 35 years of age.

But the heavy death toll from TB is not the whole story. It is estimated that about 400,000 people in this country have active tuberculosis. Only about 850,000 of this group are known to the health authorities.

A major problem in TB control is the fact that so many persons with active tuberculosis, unaware that there is a germ in their lungs, do not know they are well. Group X-rays show that one of two persons of every 1,000 adults X-rayed have active tuberculosis, and some of these people never suspected that TB had struck.

TB is a communicable, chronic disease caused by a germ, the tubercle bacillus, which is so small that it can be seen only through a high-powered microscope. And yet tubercle bacilli can damage vital body tissue, ruining a person's health and threatening his life, particularly when the disease is allowed to go on unchecked.

Tuberculosis is insidious and people are often surprised when they learn they have TB because they feel fine. For TB does not make itself known, when it first attacks, with obvious symptoms.

It is tragic that a person may be losing his own health because of undetected tuberculosis and it is also tragic that the person with unknown or hidden TB can unknowingly pass it on by coughing, sneezing, or by spitting his disease to others.

The necessity of finding and treating those with unknown or undetected tuberculosis for their own sake and also for those around them, is obvious. The earlier tuberculosis is found the easier it is to cure.

How can these cases of TB be found? The easiest way of detecting TB early is by X-ray, as it is done by a person's chest X-ray will either give him the satisfaction of knowing that his lungs are sound, or it will give him the opportunity of finding TB early, so that it strike and gettine treatment for it when it is easiest to cure.

Our Coyness Is Asinine

If this section of Eastern Kentucky has any desire whatsoever for the gas power plant proposed by the Atomic Commission, its citizens—business men, officials, civic leaders, newspapermen, all—are doing a monumental job of playing coy. They haven't indicated by even one syllable that the section needs and wants such a plant.

That the Big Sandy valley needs such an industrial operation becomes more and more apparent. Something must be done to stop the outward flow of residents of the area to other more favored sections. Something must be done to make possible an economic existence for this region. Coal, industrial grain here, is toppling. Agriculture, lumbering, other vocations and industries either are non-existent or are barely existing.

Thus we sketch the need. Barely sketch it. But what community wants the plant? An industrial operation of this magnitude would require level land and water-power, transportation facilities and fuel. More important, along with its accessibility by road and rail, an inaccessibility to enemy attack.

Floyd county does not have such a site. It fails to qualify in the matter of level terrain of sufficient proportions. But Lawrence county can fill the bill. In the vicinity of Louisiana such a site could be found. Two railroads, D. S. 23 and highway 10 of neighboring West Virginia would supply transportation. Replacement of needles in existing dams of the Big Sandy would provide an ample supply of water and river transportation; or, if the high-lift dam at Green-up is built, use of the old locks and dams would not be necessary.

Coal, natural gas, oil and a vast pool of native labor are all among the resources such a location has to offer.

But do Louisiana and the Big Sandy want the industry? If the matter was that of good, old Joe Doakes wanting a job with the state, we all would be on our toes, beating the drum for him, beseeching Frankfort and never letting up till we had thrown our influence as far as it would go. But in this case where thousands of Joe Doakes need jobs, we play coy, hard-boiled, and sit by in a sort of asinine docility while opportunity, spurred, knocks elsewhere.

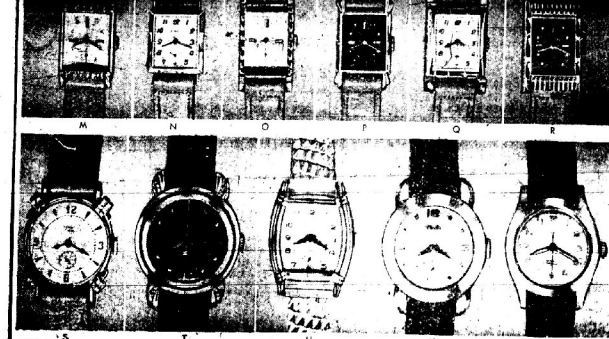

Less Sweets, More Care, Fluorides Only Methods Of Tooth Decay Control

"Consumption of less sweets, use of fluorides and proper dental care remain the only methods of tooth decay control," Dr. P. Owen, D.D.S., director, Division of Dental Health, Kentucky State Department of Health, said this week. A recent American Dental Association statement disclosed that scientists are sharply critical of incomplete or preliminary research reports which are being used for sensational claims of dental products. The statement added: "Misleading and deceptive advertising claims for dentifrices containing chlorophyllin derivatives, anti-enzyme, chemicals and ammonia-containing compounds were based on inconclusive data." The A.D.A. summarized that there is "no satisfactory evidence that any dentifrice now on the market will actually prevent tooth decay." Dr. Owen commented that the visit to the dentist twice a year is the best manner of preventing serious dental difficulties. A good diet along with less candy, chewing gum, soft drinks and other sweets will go far in promoting good dental health. Brushing teeth after every meal, and rinsing out the mouth after eating sweets are essentials. Numerous Kentucky communities have fluorinated their public water supply, since the State Board of Health approved fluoridation in 1953. Where fluorides cannot be added to the water, Dr. Owen said, family dentists may make four applications of sodium fluoride solution to the teeth of children at the ages of 2, 7, 10 and 13 years.

#### Help Your Doctor Help You

It was an ancient Oriental custom to pay the doctor regularly during good health and stop payment when illness developed. The modern system is different, but it is still true that the doctor would rather help you keep well than cure an unnecessary illness.

However, he cannot do so without your cooperation. You have nothing to be proud of when you boast, "I haven't been near a doctor in years." That does not necessarily mean that you are healthy. It does mean that you are gambling with your own health and that of your entire family.

Tuberculosis is an insidious disease which can creep upon you unnoticed. Only your doctor, using X-ray and other tests, can tell whether or not you have TB. The disease has no obvious symptoms in its early stages. You can feel and look perfectly healthy an until he has TB.

On the other hand, there's no need to hurry yourself into a nervous collapse about TB. The disease is contagious, but you usually have to be in family contact with a case to get enough germs into your system to cause TB to develop. If you are in good health generally, your body can usually fight to get to a starburst.

Your best protection against TB, and for your health in general, is to see your doctor once a year for a complete physical check-up and a chest X-ray. If he feels you are in any special danger, he will advise you to see him more often. If TB should develop, he will be able to discover it before it gets a head start.

TB is always recoverable and there is no easy road to recovery but modern science is improving the methods of treatment. You can be sure of one thing: TB found early can be cured more easily than TB which has had time to carry out its stealthy work by destroying body tissue.

### Urges Strengthening Of State Jury Laws

FRANKFORT, Ky., Nov. 30 — Strengthening of laws dealing with grand and petit jury service in circuit courts was recommended to the 1933 General Assembly by the Kentucky Judicial Conference, composed of the seven appellate and 64 circuit judges of the state.

The proposals, made by the conference after a study lasting more than a year, call for abolition of distinctions between grand and petit jury service, so that a person called for service on one panel might be used on the other.

It also proposed to abolish the use of bystanders and to revise the law so that voter registration is required. The present law calls for "property owner" or "housekeeper." The latter, the property owner lives outside the county or state.

The plan also calls for longer grand jury terms, rather than a three-day session each term, that might be extended, in case of emergency to nine days. Rewriting of the exemption provision also was approved to bring it into line with federal demands.

## Floyd County Historical Notes

By HENRY P. SCALE

From "Wise County, Virginia," by Charles A. Johnson, we reprint the following on the Graham family of Virginia.

The first immigrants of the Grahams who came to this country, of which there has been left an account, arrived about the year 1720 to 1730, the exact date of which is not known. It is, however, a matter of history that one Michael Graham settled in Paxton Township, Lancaster county, Pennsylvania, about the date referred to and that he was a direct descendant of the Earl of Montrose, who was beheaded. The descendants of Michael Graham afterwards settled in the valley of Virginia and became noted for their scholarly attainments as well as their religious zeal.

William Graham, son of Michael, was in his day a very prominent and noted man. He was the founder of Washington and Lee University, then known as Liberty Hall Academy, in Augusta county, Virginia, and was its rector or president for 20 years. He was educated at Princeton College, New Jersey, and had for his class mates such distinguished men as Aaron Burr, James Madison, vice-president of the United States, who became president, Henry Lee, father of General Robert E. Lee and others of almost equal distinction. He was a personal friend of George Washington and through his influence Washington was induced to endorse the college that afterwards took his name. He was a Presbyterian preacher, as well as college president, and he accomplished during his short life what is estimated to be second to no man in Virginia. The history of his character is given in detail in the annals of Washington and Lee University.

It is known that with the coming of Michael Graham to this country, that other members of the same family, Irish and kin, also settled in this country. Among them was John Graham, who settled for a time in Pennsylvania, and later moved to the great Old Pasture section, Augusta county, Virginia, between the years 1760 and 1765, and later purchased a tract of land, in 1766, from John Lewis, the father of General Andrew Lewis, who commanded the Battle of Point Pleasant in 1774, and who was the first settler of Augusta county, or rather the territory which afterwards became Augusta, having erected his home in the remote wilderness, in the year of 1732, at Belle Fontaine Springs near Staunton.

John Graham, whom we will call the senior, reared a family of four sons and five daughters. He was born in the year 1690 and died in the year 1771. His oldest son's name was Lantry Lancelotti. The names of the other three were John, James and Robert. His daughters' names were Jane, Elizabeth, Anna, Rebecca and Florence. Anna married John Kincaid and moved to Anthony Creek in Orange county, West Virginia, date unknown; but in the early settlement of this country.

Immigrating to America from Denmark county, Ireland, with John Graham, was a brother, William Graham, Sr. He had married Jane ..... in Ireland and she was the daughter of Robert and James Graham, who came with them to Virginia. David Graham, a third son, was born in Augusta county, Virginia, 1742. David married Jane Armstrong, daughter of James Armstrong, a Revolutionary soldier. David and Jane Armstrong Graham were the parents of John Graham of Floyd county, Kentucky.

### FEWER KENTUCKIANS IN HIGHWAY DEATHS

FRANKFORT, KY., Dec. 1.—The percentage of persons killed on state highways during the first nine months of 1953 was down slightly from that for the same period in 1952, and 13 fewer home-state motorists were killed during the period.

Charles R. Jones, executive secretary of the Governor's Committee for Highway Safety, said that there were eight more out-of-state persons killed in Kentucky during the period than through September last year, and that the total killed was down five. September is the last month for which an all breakdown of figures is available.

For the first nine months of 1953 there were 576 highway deaths of which 406 were Kentuckians. For the same period this year deaths totaled 572, including 453 Kentuckians. The percentage of Kentuckians listed dropped from 80.4 to 77.

Jones said that for the first time in several years Kentucky has a good chance of ending the year with fewer home-state motorists killed than during a preceding year. Indications now are that the total dead will go over the 1952 figure of 785.

"Although the drop in Kentucky deaths—in figures that are complete—is slight, it is encouraging and may mean that our efforts to publicize safety are paying off," Jones said. "It looked for a time as if we might drop under the 1952 total of all deaths but it doesn't look that way now. If fewer Kentuckians are killed that will at least be one bright spot on the record."

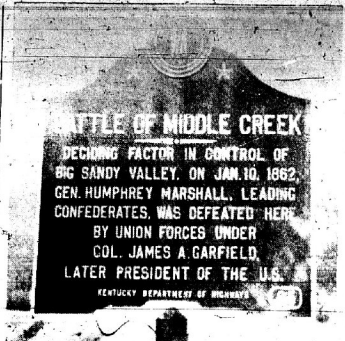
Jones said that deaths lagged behind 1952 figures for most of the year but that two weeks ago the trend was reversed. He blamed exceptionally good fall driving weather and increased traffic for an upsurge in deaths within the last month.

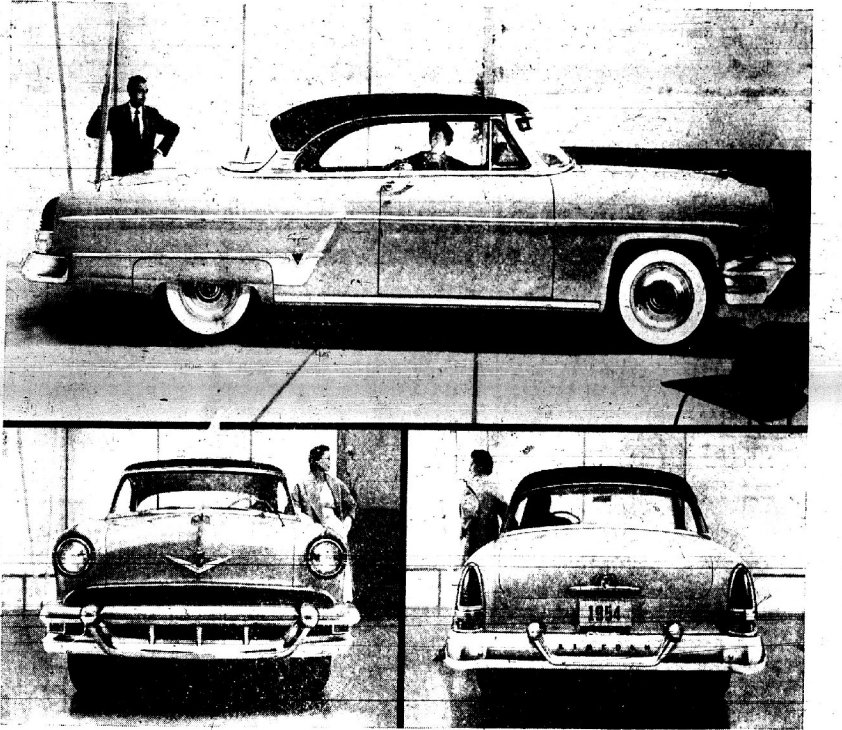
