COURT HOLDS BARNES SAYS VOIDING SUITS FIRING FINAL WAS CORRECT

Appellate Court Action Upholds Judge Gramman In Three Floyd Cases

Special Judge Lawrence Gramman was correct in his dismissal of three suits filed in the Floyd circuit court, the 1952 term, he learned already due the county by Floyd officials and former officials, the court of Appeals ruled last Friday.

The newest and most modern Kroger store in Eastern Kentucky opened here Wednesday morning in a new brick building specially designed for its purposes. The opening was attended through the day by a throng of customers such as is seldom seen in this section.

The supermarket is completely self-service, with the exception of the poultry foods department, and the store equipment alone cost an estimated \$120,000. The equipment includes air conditioning, conveyor system and numerous other items, three refrigeration compressors each, frozen foods, fresh meats and poultry, since each type of these foods requires a different temperature.

Reeves quoted Lt. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield as telling the group: "We have got to control these county meetings. We have got to protect ourselves."

County Judge Henry Stumbo, a Clements supporter in the May primary, is chairman of the Floyd County Democratic committee.

Reported Reeves on the Frankfort "secret" meeting:

Over and over, the group was told how vital it is to the Chandler administration that his supporters win control of county, district and state party organizations this year.

Waterfield cautioned the group to keep details of the meeting under their political hats.

"This should be a closed meeting. Those newspaper fellows are out there in the hall right now," he said.

Chandler himself paid a visit to the meeting later in the afternoon.

Others attending the meeting were Robert Humphreys, chairman of the Democratic State Central Executive Committee; Rural Highway Commissioner J. B. Wells and Deputy Highway Commissioner Ben Klair.

"The chairman of the Democratic Party in Kentucky is with us and it is mighty nice to have a fellow like Bob Humphreys on our side," Waterfield said.

He added that the Chandler Democrats must win control of the party machinery "so we can keep him (Humphreys) on as chairman."

Humphreys told the group upcoming county conventions are more important than many persons realize.

Control of the county organizations will determine control of the district and state central executive committees in Kentucky for the next four years.

Capture of the county machinery "mean that Harry Lee Waterfield will be the next governor," Humphreys said.

The veteran party chairman said it is important that Chandler Democrats not allow themselves to be misled by rumors of intraparty deals.

"This thing is all important," he said.

Humphreys noted that large numbers of present Democratic county chairmen are "not our friends" and that it is "extremely important" that they be replaced by party officials favorable to the Chandler faction.

Wells said the job to be done by the Chandler forces at the June 30 county conventions "will separate the men from the boys."

Several members of the group emerged from the meeting stating its purpose was to raise funds to support a bid for the Democratic presidential nomination by Governor Chandler.

After the general meeting, the group broke up into district huddles to discuss several local nominations.

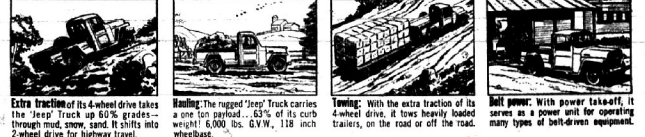

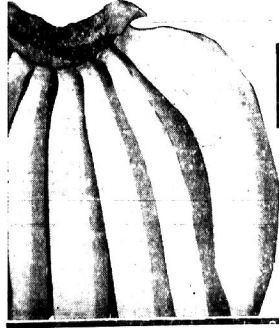

COAL MARKET RATED BETTER

Demand for More Services Creates Fuller Market For Bituminous Coal Industry

The bituminous coal industry can expect to share fully in the rapidly expanding energy market created by ever-increasing demands for goods and services, Tom Pickett, executive vice-president of the National Coal Association said in Washington Wednesday.

"Coal may well be entering its golden years," said S. C. Campbell, NCA president.

Mr. Pickett spoke at the opening session of the 29th anniversary convention of NCA, following the keynote address by Mr. Campbell, NCA president and vice-president of Eastern Gas & Fuel Associates, Pittsburgh.

"Coals vast reserves, far exceeding those of competitive fuels in this nation, are expected to supply an increasing share of the energy requirements to power the nation's progress," Mr. Pickett declared. "This is testified to by government industry as they analyze future demands."

The future of coal is brightened, the convention session was told, by the growing need for energy for electric generation, for steel production, for general industry, and the need for coal as a raw material for chemicals and synthetics, able for conversion into liquid and gas.

But no one should expect an undeviating, unbroken expansion of coal production in the future, the speaker warned. There will be peaks and valleys, he said, "but it will be unreasonable to anticipate new lows in the foreseeable future."

"As we participate in the nation's progress, we must seize the opportunities offered, and work cooperatively to secure impartial treatment from government and consumers," Mr. Pickett asserted. The industry must strive for greater efficiency and economy of production to keep costs competitive, but at the same time "establish and maintain a reasonable return and fair profit for its product."

Marking the rise in coal production from 392 million tons in 1934 to 470 million in 1955 and prediction of a \$60 million ton total for 1956, Mr. Campbell called increasing demands for coal a "challenge to the industry" but gave a warning against any "tendency to over-optimism."

"There is need for caution," he said, "only to the extent that everyone understands that in a vast extractive industry like the coal business, replacement of plant, of obsolete equipment, and expansion of capacity, must be met with adequate financial return."

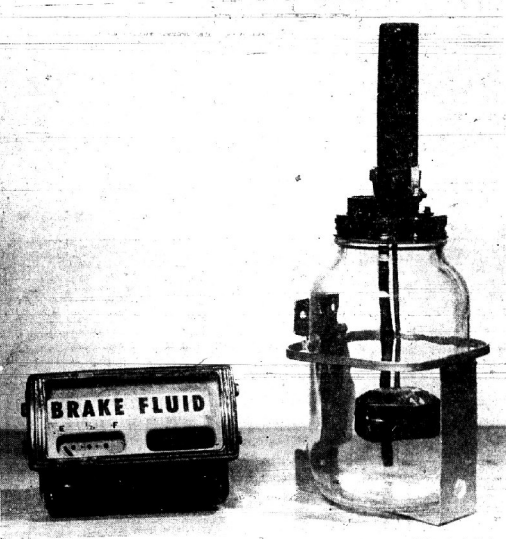

TAX LIABILITY RETROACTIVE ON STATE RETURNS TO JAN.

July 1, is the date set for 150,000 Kentuckians to start paying their part of the State income tax for the first time. It is on that date that withholding of the high income taxes enacted by the 1956 Legislature will start. But for these new taxpayers—as well as for the 450,000 persons who already have their taxes withheld—the new, higher tax rates are retroactive to last January 1. This means that when you file your State income tax return next year (before April 15) you will have to figure your tax liability on all of the money you earned during 1956. The higher tax rates actually will apply only to that portion of your income earned between April 1 and December 31. The old, lower tax rates will apply to income earned between January 1 and March 31. Hereafter, you were required to file a tax declaration if you expected to receive during the year \$1,000 or more from which no State tax was withheld. Now, any Kentuckians who expect to receive \$100 or more in 1956 from which no State tax will be withheld must file a tax declaration on or before next July 1. These declarations are the taxpayers estimate of how much income he will receive during 1956, how much State income tax at the higher rates will be required to have paid in to the State at least two thirds of this estimated tax bill—either in

Courts Holds A Wife Adopted by Husband Can Inherit As Child

Lexington, Ky., June 10—In an opinion in a will case, Circuit Judge Chester D. Adams said yesterday that a wife adopted by her husband as his daughter may inherit over blood relatives an estate held in trust.

The opinion said she would be considered "his natural, legitimate child."

The ruling came in a suit involving the estate of Mrs. Lucella Graybill, who died in 1922. The petition and he will specified that her \$44,000 estate be placed in trust for her son, Robert, with the balance left after his death to go to his heirs at law. He died last October 28.

His wife, Mrs. Louise Graybill, who was married to him in 1922 and adopted as his child in 1941, was among defendants. The suit asked if the wife was an heir at law of her husband and eligible to share in the trust.

The judge said arguments that the adoption was void as against public policy were "ingenious." He called "intiguing" the arguments that Graybill's dowry "cannot occupy and take under the dual and inconsistent roles of wife and child."

He ruled Mrs. Graybill, as heir at law of Robert Graybill, was entitled to inherit the balance in the trust fund.

Judge Adams mentioned Graybill's attempt to "divert the course" of succession from the blood relatives to the wife.

The judge wrote, "He only did what any other man might do under the circumstances, when the ties of blood are stronger than those of blood, which is frequently the case."

Work Deaths Highest In Farming Industry

An estimated 14,000 farm residents lose their lives in accidents each year and an additional 1,000,000 are injured seriously, says the National Safety Council and the University of Kentucky Agricultural Extension Service.

The two agencies point out that more work deaths occur in farming than in any other major industry, with an economic loss of about \$1,560,000 annually.

These facts point up the need for safety programs and habits.

Only one out of four farmers aged zero to four years of age accounted for nearly 8 per cent of the total while the 15-to-19 age group totaled 9.49 per cent. But, the 20-to-24 year-old group had the lowest rate, 4.72 per cent.

Did you ever try striking a bunch of crows as they foraged in a field? If you can do it, you are a master; indeed you may put a rise between between you and the crows and approach with the greatest caution—but you won't surprise them. Theirs lookout will spot you every time. If you don't have a gun he allows you just so much distance before he signals a warning to the brethren. If you have a gun, the watchful invariance saves it and disables its caution.

Getting close enough under these conditions to shoot them with a shotgun is next to impossible. A 22 rimfire sometimes works if you know your trajectory and have a lot of elevation in your sights. You're lucky to get within 150 yards of the birds and that's a long shot with a rifle. Red Brown, arms and ammunition expert of Sports AfIELD magazine, thinks one of the high-powered centerfires is the best medium. If a flock of crows hasn't witnessed the effects of high-powered rifles too often, a shooter can sometimes get field shots at 200 yards and frequently between 200 and 300 yards. This type of shooting calls for telescope sights.

Hunting crows with a shotgun is a completely different type of

hunting from start to finish. In the first place, it is wing shooting. When shotgunning the crow it is largely a question of maneuvering the crow himself and this requires some knowledge of crow psychology and crow language. You must make the crow a victim of his own devices. Where shooting crows with a rifle demands skill, mainly in rifle-marksmanship, shotgunning them requires even greater skill in crow lore. Until one has mastered this ability with the shotgun a little of little consequence. Once crows are in range, however, they provide a fratas in order to lure him away from the feeding. A good call and knowledge of how to use it together with an owl decoy, sets the perfect stage.

Mountain Valley, Ky., June 11

(Sp.) — The building of one and one-half miles of highway here this summer will complete a gap in State Highway 278 and make some of the most remote sections of the state available to the traveling public. The Rev. Gordon Duncan, president of Magoffin Baptist Institute, has announced.

To illustrate his point, Mr. Duncan said that the actual highway distance from his school to Salyersville will be 18 miles when the road project is completed as compared with 50 miles now.

Completion of the road will make it possible for the institute, which includes grades one through twelve, to serve many additional pupils who are now not attending school anywhere, Mr. Duncan said.

Anticipating an increase well beyond the 40 students who were enrolled at Magoffin during the school year just closed, the board of trustees has appropriated funds to complete construction of a new classroom and administration building, which has stood unimproved for past two years.

The new building will include eight classrooms, the school library quarters, a gymnasium-auditorium and administrative offices. It is valued at \$100,000.

Eighteen families in the vicinity of the school have petitioned the Bell Telephone Company of Jackson for telephone service and have been assured that in good prospect telephone service can be extended to the community in the next few months, Mr. Duncan said.

NEW RESPONSIBILITY FOR FAMILY DOCTORS

In the past the family doctor was seldom thought of in connection with treating tuberculosis. This highly complex disease was left to specialists specifically trained to fight the "great white plague."

Although it was always important for the family doctor to be able to recognize tuberculosis in his patients, today he is being brought more and more into the treatment as well as the diagnosis of the disease.

What has happened to bring about this change? The discovery of drugs to treat tuberculosis and the medical advances of recent years mean that, under certain circumstances, victims of tuberculosis may no longer continue their treatment after an initial period in a hospital. Because these patients must take good care of themselves and often must follow prescribed treatment for a long time after leaving the hospital, the family doctor becomes very important as the guardian of their health.

Since he has greater responsibility for caring for tuberculosis patients, the family doctor must know more about the disease than ever before. This situation may require some important changes in the teaching of tuberculosis in the medical schools, with greater emphasis on diseases of the chest than ever before.

Tuberculosis associations are encouraging the teaching of tuberculosis in medical schools in a broad way so that the young men now training to become doctors will be able to care for the tuberculous victims of their own time and their patients in the years to come.

 The report estimated the total pumpage of water in the 29 counties covered by the survey at approximately 115 gallons a day, about 14 million gallons is used for public supply and the remainder for industrial needs.

5-State Areas Undergo Studies in Truck Farming
 Frankfort, June 14 — The University of Kentucky Agriculture Experiment station will undertake pilot studies in five sections of the Commonwealth to determine their suitability for truck crop production.
 Dr. C. D. Phillips, agricultural economics professor, and Frank Lebus, chief of the agricultural development division of the State Agricultural and Industrial Development Board, said a meeting of various state and federal agencies was held recently to discuss the program.
 Lebus said food processors have been showing increasing interest in obtaining fruits and vegetables from within the Commonwealth in commercial quantities.
 "As a result of federal government cutbacks in tobacco acreage, there is a definite need for alternative farm enterprises to supplement income to Kentucky farmers," Lebus stated.
 Dr. Phillips said soils, irrigation facilities and other conditions would be taken into consideration in exploring the possibility of profitable truck crop production. The test areas are: Clinton, Fulton, Hickman, Hartford, Frankfort, Morehead and Somerset.

School Board Must Pay For Services
 Frankfort, June 14 — School funds may not be used to maintain a county health department, R. E. Devis, superintendent of Carlisle Public Schools was thus informed recently by R. F. Matthews, Jr., assistant Attorney General.
 The school board had desired to contribute towards the salary of a county sanitary inspector and other expenses connected with the maintenance of the Nicholas County Health Department. Matthews said the Commonwealth's Constitution prohibited such allocations of school funds.

The chief said a bird carried a smoldering cigar butt to a nest it was building there.

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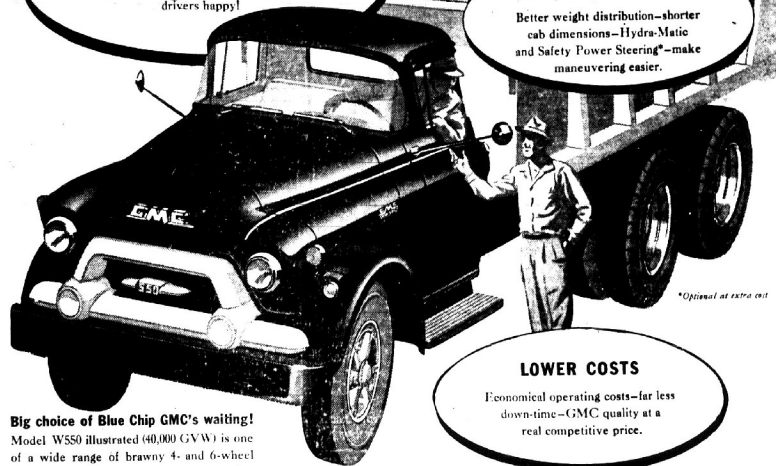
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
