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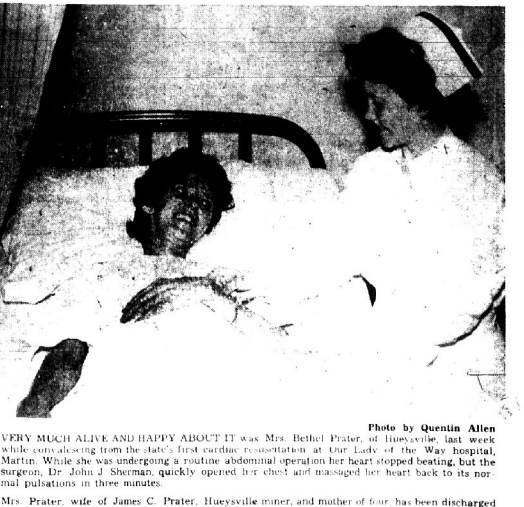

the place of religion in our national life. "The idea that freedom of religion means freedom from religion is wrong," he asserted. "The Founding Fathers never intended to have a separation of religion and state in the sense that the principle of religion should not guide the state."

"If we can correct these flaws," the speaker concluded, "we can complete our task—leaving our children a greater land to love, live in and leave to their children."

There is no reason why the penalties of the Indiana murder statute should not apply to women as well as men, just as all other statutes are made to apply to all citizens alike."

The prosecutor described Mrs. Collins as a "heartless woman, in whose behalf her former neighbors in Ky. did not speak."

The Collins family formerly resided in the Burning Park section of Magnolia county, near the Floyd-Martin line and was known by many Floyd county residents. The four who were slain by Mrs. Collins were buried at Magnolia about two miles from Ironton.

Holovichka said Mrs. Collins' trial would be the first scheduled before a criminal court jury after the Labor Day holiday.

The slim, petite widow has been indicted for the murder of her husband, Ben, a 28-year-old war veteran confined to a wheel chair for four years. Mrs. Collins, Sr., 48, and his two sisters, Martha Ann, 33, and Mary Sue, 31.

The slaying took place May 20 in the hope they all shared at 3714 1/2th st. in the Beaville section of Hammond. Mrs. Collins was reported to have said she shot the four because the house "was not big enough for all of us."

Ben Collins, Sr. the slain husband's father, was working but his youngest child, Bobby, 8, was in the house when the slaying took place and escaped the rain of 12 bullets which killed the others.

The day before the slaying took place Holovichka said that he would prepare to try the accused widow first to conviction and was made of Hammond. Mrs. Collins was reported to have said she shot the four because the house "was not big enough for all of us."

SPORTS AFIELD

A houseboat is built for one purpose—to be lived in. It can be a home, it can be your fishing lodge or your hunting cabin. You can move around any time without setting your feet against roll or sway under you. You have everything of the shore cabin except the cranking log fire. But it compensates for this—right outside you have fishing. Anyone thinking about a houseboat should consider most carefully certain aspects of the waterway it will be used on. Slip up and you have to trade it for a smaller one, or haul it to another river or lake. That can be more expensive than you think.

Make sure that the whole length of the waterway is navigable for your houseboat, and remember, river channels have ways of changing. Non-navigable waters might have a bridge that's too low. Don't think that this isn't important since you plan to just live aboard and not move. When you find how economically and smoothly your houseboat moves and what comfort it brings along, you'll want to take water tips, insata Willard Craudall, boating editor of Sports Afield.

Be a good mooring place are available. These should be sheltered, have free access to a nearby landing, and be not too far from a couple of places where the houseboat could be hauled out. If the water is navigable you may have to get permits to moor.

For all except the largest houseboats, an outboard is ideal power. It can be mounted on the craft, or the houseboat can be moved by simply putting the motor on any small boat and towing. Most houseboat owners want to keep a small outboard boat tied to anyway. It's a good idea to have two outboard motors, one for the houseboat and one for the small boat.

Some of the larger river houseboats take an inboard better. There's more room for it, the weight of it becomes less significant and it adds little to the draft.

Animal Rabies Creates State Wildlife Problem

Frankfort, July 2 (Sp.) — During the first four months of 1956 there were 143 laboratory-confirmed cases of rabies in Kentucky's animals, with 103 cases for the entire year of 1955, according to Dr. E. Ronald Hesterman, director of the Division of Veterinary Public Health.

The most significant increases in cases by species have been found in foxes, cats, skunks, horses and small white-tailed deer.

"Since the number of cases in dogs and cattle remained about the same and the increases in cases among other animals, this indicates there is still a definite wildlife problem," Dr. Hesterman said.

Camp Programs For Children To Begin in July

Frankfort, July 2 (Sp.) — A unique program of honor camps for Kentucky's dependent children will be activated early in July.

Charles Alphin, commissioner of Welfare said plans call for several of these camps to be opened. The first will be at Kentucky Dam State Park. All camps will be located on state-owned property, Alphin said.

Persons in charge of the Kentucky Village camps are the Reed, Children's administrator; Dewey Greer, Campton, assistant supervisor in charge of the educational program; and Vernon Hatton, Lexington, member of the University of Kentucky basketball team, assistant supervisor in charge of recreational activities, Alphin said.

Participating in the camp project are three State Agencies, the Department of Welfare, Conservation and Economic Security, M. J. Clarke, director of the Welfare Department's Division of Children's Institutions, will be in charge of the camp program.

Each camp will be kept to a maximum of 60 youths and 10 employees. Boys admitted will be between 14 and 18 year old. Food, clothing, housing, medical care will be furnished by the State. In addition, athletic, recreational and religious programs will be offered to the campers.

As a result of these camps, Kentucky's dependent children, will have an opportunity to learn lessons in such fields as reforestation, fish hatchery, wildlife preservation, park maintenance, tree nursery, forest research, fire fighting, boat and boating and swimming and life guard techniques, Alphin said.

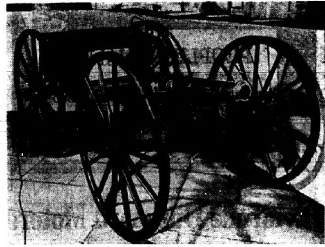

NEW SHERIFF FOR MAGOFFIN

Elected Official Fails To Execute Bond; Ruled Named Until November

Magoffin county has a new sheriff this week after the elected Sheriff, Hade Montgomery, had reported to the fiscal court that he had been unable to fill the required county revenue bond due June 1.

County Judge Silas Carty last week declared the office vacant, and appointed Noah Rudd, former Magoffin county Jailor and an unsuccessful candidate opposing Montgomery for the Republican nomination for Sheriff in 1955, Coroner Ishaiah Saulted as Sheriff till Rudd executed \$25,000 county revenue bond and his official bond.

An audit of Sheriff Montgomery's books was made two weeks ago by an Ashland accountant employed by the Magoffin Board of Education, and the audit was said to have shown Montgomery to be owing \$22,000 to the Board. He claimed some credit against that amount but did not ask for it being.

Filing of the vacancy raised the question, How long can Montgomery's successor legally hold the office? Magoffin Jailor Ben Puckett asked the Attorney General's office if a November election will be required to fill the unexpired term. First Assistant Attorney General Walter Herdman wrote that under present law, if the vacancy occurs three or four months before the election the office must be filled by popular vote at the November election.

Since the 1956 General Assembly moved this year's primary back from August to May 25, Herdman said, the time of the vacancies involved in the official's question creates a problem as to whether anyone can be nominated to fill them.

Herdman pointed out that under the present law, where the vacancy is created less than 70 days before the primary, the political parties nominate candidates for the general election. If the governing authority or party may fill a vacancy that occurs in a nomination after a primary, Herdman wrote. But neither of these provisions, Herdman wrote, "takes care of the situation we are confronted with and the Legislature apparently failed to consider such a possibility when the primary date was changed."

The old August primaries were "about three months later" than the November election, Herdman said, "and there was little chance of the question which we are now faced presenting itself."

He added, "in any event, the office to be filled must be placed on the November ballot and if nominations cannot be made, then the candidates must run as 'write-in' candidates." Herdman sent a copy of the opinion he prepared for Puckett to Magoffin County Clerk Green Rudd, who also had asked about the Sheriff's office in his county.

ORDINANCE PROHIBITING NON-USE OF STANDARD MUFFLERS AND PROHIBITING SUDEN ACCELERATION OF GASOLINE DRIVEN VEHICLES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY AS FOLLOWS:

1. All gasoline-driven vehicles in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky shall be equipped with standard mufflers on the exhaust. No vehicle shall have any kind of equipment whatsoever affixed thereto or used thereon which would cause any unnecessary noise in the operation of such vehicle.
2. No gasoline-driven vehicles in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, shall be accelerated in such a manner as to cause the wheels of such vehicle to spin, resulting in the screaming of the tires which is commonly referred to as "screeching off."
3. Any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall result in penalty of a fine not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$20.00, for each offense.
4. All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.
5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after date of publication, according to law.
