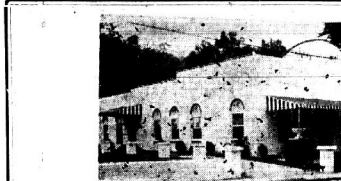

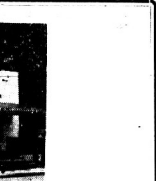

### COUNTIES GET POLIO VACCINE

#### Rate of Distribution Increases, Says Teague; 33 Stricken During Year

More polio vaccine was distributed in Kentucky during June than in any other month previously, according to Russell E. Teague, M. D., Commissioner of Health, Kentucky Department of Health. During June enough vaccine for 21,447 injections was sent into various Kentucky counties, Teague reported.

"The rate of distribution seems to be improving," Mr. Teague said. "This is encouraging in that many more persons under 20 years of age and pregnant women have yet to receive their first injection. Up to June 1 only about 28 per cent of the Kentuckians under 20 had received vaccine according to our records. A polio epidemic is still possible with such a low percentage of community protection."

Polio cases in Kentucky since January number 33. Counties have 1956:

- Anderson, 1; Davies, 6; Estill, 1; Fleming, 1; Fulton, 1; Garrard, 1; Harlan, 1; Harrison, 1; Jackson, 1; Jefferson, 4; Jessamine, 1; Kenton, 2; Lewis, 1; Lyon, 1; McCreary, 1; Madison, 1; Mercer, 2; Owsley, 1; Perry, 1; Whitley, 1. Fort Knox has also reported two cases.

Parents are being urged to check with their family physician and follow the plan adopted by the medical profession in their localities for the administration of the vaccine.

Frankfort, July 2 (Sp.)—A two-year study of food habits of Kentucky children released by the State Department of Health showed seven out of 10 children interviewed were eating enough protein foods, about 4 out of 10 were eating enough vitamin C foods and only about a third were drinking enough milk.

The survey, among 3,102 children in 15 counties and 37 schools, also showed less than one-third were eating enough green and yellow vegetables and slightly more than half were eating enough other fruits and vegetables.

In addition, the surveys revealed one in every five children interviewed ate no green or yellow vegetables and approximately one in six ate no vitamin C foods. In three schools, 352 pupils missed 136 meals during a three-day survey period.

The counties covered in the survey were: Barren, Breathitt, Christian, Clark, Graves, Henry, Letcher, Johnson, McCracken, Mercer, Metcalfe, Morgan, Pike, Rowan and Todd.

### MEDICAL FOUNDATION JOB JUST BEGUN, WATKINS SAYS

Were on first base, but we've got to get around to home plate," so said J. Stephen Watkins, president of the Kentucky Medical Foundation, at a meeting in Lexington recently of the Foundation's Board of directors.

Establishment of a University of Kentucky medical center will soon become a reality, Watkins said, but there still is opposition to it. "Now we want to sell those of the medical profession who are skeptical about the new center," he said.

"The Foundation is not going to let the UK anti 'hurt the University of Louisville," Watkins declared. "The Foundation will support the recent increase in funds to the Louisville medical school and will continue to urge appropriations for the school. The organization also will continue, he said, to inform Kentuckians of medical education needs so funds will be provided for the University of Kentucky and for the enlargement of the University of Louisville."

As to the future assistance to the University of Kentucky medical center, Watkins said, the Foundation might:

1. Seek grants from private Foundations.
2. Recruit outstanding students for enrollment.

**State Finances To Receive Boost, Board Discloses**

Frankfort, July 2 (Sp.)—Two recent transactions of the State Department of Economic Development total three-quarters of a million dollars to the state's bank account. This was disclosed by W. F. Foster, Mayfield, in making his final report as chairman of the A&I D Board. Foster was later commissioned by Gov. A. B. Chandler to be chairman of the new department's Industrial Development Board and chairman pro-tem of the Agricultural Development Board. Foster said the Department of Economic Development has returned \$175,000 to the general fund and expects to relinquish \$65,000 more by September 30. The money is the remainder of \$3,000,000 appropriated since 1949 to make topographic maps of the state. Completed this year, the mapping program, which costs nearly 6 million dollars including matching federal funds, will require a small amount of money annually to keep it up to date. Foster said Kentucky is now the only state in the nation which can furnish modern, large-scale maps of its entire area. Topographic maps are used widely in plan, location surveys, agricultural planning and other reconstructions.

Foster said the A & I D Board was responsible for the sale of 228 acres of the Eastern State Hospital Farm at Lexington to International Business Machines Corp. Announced recently, this transaction, when completed, will provide the Department of Mental Health with \$37,000 additional funds for capital improvements, he said. "These two transactions total about \$400,000, or more than four times the \$158,000 appropriation the Department of Economic Development will have to work with during the next fiscal year," Foster said.

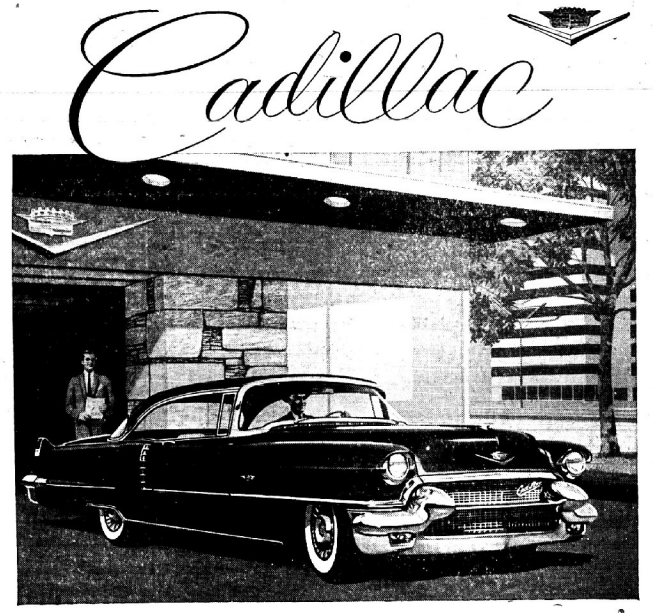

### Three Counties of Area Opened to Deer-Hunters

One area of this part of the state will be opened to deer-hunting this fall, it was announced last week by the Department of Fish & Wildlife Resources, Frankfort.

The Robinson forest reserve in Knott, Breathitt and Perry counties will be open to deer-hunters three days, Nov. 8-10, it was said. Deer there are plentiful. Other counties where deer may be hunted these three days are Rowan north of U. S. 60, Plank, McCrory, Lewis, Crittenton, Fleming, Carter, Metcalfe, Cumberland, Barren, Hart, Edmonson, Nelson, Harlan, Rockcastle, Mingo, Bullitt, Hopkins, Hancock, Trigg, Lyon, Livingston, Caldwell and Christian.

Only buck deer with as many as 12 points on one antler may be taken. Stags using steel which will hold only one slug; long bow and arrows and rifles which use center-fire cartridges of not less than 243 caliber may be used. In addition to the regular hunting license a 48 deer hunting permit will be required and the deer may be hunted from 7 a. m. to 6 p. m. Central Standard Time, on the days designated. Residents of Indiana are barred from the hunt due to the provisions of the reciprocal law.

**ROAD PICTURE IS EXPLAINED**

**State Seeks Acceleration Of Federal Aid Highway Construction, Kiser Says**

Frankfort, Ky., July 2 — Kentucky wants to "accelerate" construction of federal aid highway funds authorized under the bill signed Friday by President Eisenhower so it can build \$230,000,000 worth of roads in the next three years.

This was announced today after a closed meeting of State and United States highway officials.

Afterwards Highway Commissioner Bert Kiser and Joseph T. Leary, Frankfort attorney and political adviser to Governor Chandler, gave newsmen this picture:

1. The new act of Congress allots to Kentucky \$137,000,000 in federal-aid highway funds for three fiscal years, starting yesterday.

2. To receive this money, Kentucky must put up \$56,500,000 of its own funds during the three years.

3. If Kentucky had the \$56,500,000 this fiscal year it could "accelerate" the three-year program by starting most of it this year.

4. The only way Kentucky can have this much matching money this year is for its citizens at the November 6 general election, to authorize a \$100,000,000 highway bond issue provided for by the 1956 legislation.

Leary sat in on the meeting between the state and the federal officials. He acted as chief spokesman at the news conference.

For a moment, reporters thought they were going to get some detailed road-building plans. Mack Galbreath, former federal district highway engineer here who now works for the state, started to discuss details of projects to be built.

Leary interrupted to say "We don't want to identify the projects by name at this time."

Galbreath, consultant to Commissioner Kiser who will supervise a major portion of the new federal-aid program, said Kentucky hopes to award some construction contracts this fall and others next spring. He said two or three years of engineering work has already been done on some projects.

"In Kentucky a position technically to undertake this vast program in view of its loss of 100 highway engineers in the past six months?"

"We will have to an extensively to consultants. We might as well admit it," Galbreath said. He added that it was hard to say whether use of outside engineering firms and consultants to design and locate roads would be more costly than using State employed engineers.

"The laws that limit the salaries we can pay won't let us compete for engineers with private consultants," Galbreath said.

**State Tax Collections Breaking All Records**

Frankfort, July 2 (Sp.) — General Fund collections are exceeding all expectations and breaking all records, according to officials of the State Departments of Finance and Revenue.

At the end of May, General Fund receipts amounted to \$80,330,571. Corporate and individual income taxes and the production tax on distilled spirits are chiefly responsible for the upsurge in revenue. Corporate income taxes have risen to a new level of approximately 12 million dollars returned in refunds.

Road Fund taxes for the same period reached \$61,822,423, an increase of more than 3 million dollars over the same period last year. Spoken for the departments attributed this increase to heavier consumption of motor fuels with receipts from this source reaching \$45,897,551 as compared with \$41,684,889 for the eleven-month period last year.

**URGE CAREERS IN MEDICINE**

**State Youth Challenged To Enter Medical Field, Watkins Tells Principals**

A program designed to challenge Kentucky youths to seek careers in the field of medicine has been inaugurated by the Kentucky Medical Foundation.

According to J. Stephen Watkins, president of the Foundation, the program was initiated with discussion with high school principals and class advisers at a recent meeting at the University of Kentucky. Watkins said the program has as its objective the advising of the youth of the state of the "new opportunities for medical education which will be available upon the opening of the new medical, dental and nursing schools at the University."

"We feel that many Kentucky students, when informed of the opportunities available, will want to concentrate their efforts on finding a rewarding career in this field of medicine," Watkins added.

The Foundation president added that "any student graduating from high school this year who is interested in becoming a physician, dentist, pharmacist, nurse or medical technician will find that training is available at the University of Kentucky."

Interested parents and students were invited to contact the Kentucky Medical Foundation, 223 Radio Building, or the University of Kentucky registrar.

In stressing the need for encouraging medical careers, Watkins pointed out that the state's engineers have "for several years conducted an active program to encourage high school students with good grades to enter the College of Engineering and seek a career in this field."

Much depends on the guidance and counseling of parents, he concluded, adding that students should be guided by their parents to accept the challenge of good scholarship to they will be prepared to enter fields that require "highly technical training."

**PERKINS QUOTES DR. MARTIN TELLING NEEDS OF SCHOOLS**

"The crisis has been on us a long time," Congressman Carl D. Perkins, Hindman said in a speech to the House of Representatives last week on Federal aid to education proposals.

"We have seen it mount each year, he contended. He knew that there are not enough schools being built each year. We know each year more and more youngsters are ready for school. Facing a situation of this kind we must recognize that the classroom shortage has become so great that it is a federal responsibility to aid states and localities."

Perkins said he wanted to tell the Congress about Kentucky's great need for additional classrooms. Quoting Dr. Robert Martin, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Frankfort, he explained that many local boards of education are looking forward with hope and anticipation to passage of the proposed federal legislation.

According to Dr. Martin, a comprehensive study of Kentucky's need for school facilities has been completed recently. He reports that in the past 15 years, 400 new school centers have been built or are under construction. He reports that there will be an estimated need of 10,000 new instruction rooms as additions to present buildings or as a part of more than 400 new school centers. In addition to these instructional spaces, the new buildings in each center will need heat, indoor toilets, sewage disposal, lunchroom and fixed handwashing facilities.

The survey shows that in the old buildings of the state more than 200,000 children now attend school in buildings with no central heat and with no indoor toilets. More than 175,000 children attend school in buildings with no handwashing facilities available.

"Superintendent Martin points out further that the cost of needed school building facilities by 1960 will be approximately \$50 million dollars. The total amount that could be raised in this state for this purpose from local districts' funds, under the laws in force at the time the study was completed, was approximately 162 million dollars. That left a deficit of approximately 88 million dollars to be supplied from some other source."
