SCHOOL FUNDS ARE SUBJECT OF BANK SUIT

First National Asks Court for Permission To Offer Interest Bid

Suits was filed Monday in Circuit Court here by the First National Bank asking it be allowed to bid as a depository for the school funds in the county Board of Education. The action, prepared by Combs and Combs, named the Board, its members and the Bank as parties defendant.

The First National Bank rectifies eleven alleged faults and Kentucky statutes in support of its petition. Item One identifies the two banks. The other ten points are:

2. July 1, 1955 to July 1, 1956 the First National Bank was the depository of the school funds of the Floyd County Board of Education for which it paid \$420,000.

3. On July 1, 1956 the Board withdrew the funds from the First National Bank and placed them in the depository of the school funds of the Floyd County Board of Education for which it paid \$420,000.

4. Prior to July 1, 1956 the First National Bank requested the Board and the County Superintendent to accept competitive bidding for the deposit of the funds. The plaintiff bank states that it would have paid \$200,000 in interest but that it had no opportunity to submit a bid.

5. The petition points out KRS 160.570 that provides a depository of school funds may be designated for a period not to exceed two years.

MINE MISHAP KILLS WICKER

At Midas Last Week; Shuttle Car Operator Contacts Electric Wire

Basil Lee Wicker, 35, of Mousie, was electrocuted in a mine accident here last week while working on a shuttle buggy for the Hall and Hagans Coal Company at Midas. He died instantly, it was said.

It is said that Wicker, operator of a shuttle buggy, a mine conveyance as part of general duties, was making the second trip of the day outside the mine when he struck an electric cable burning in two in the car. He came in contact with a high voltage line, approximately time was seven o'clock, witnesses said.

Shorn Wool Market Price Averages Are Announced; Payments Expected Aug. 1

Mr. Roy C. Gray, Chairman of the State ASC Committee, announced recently that the national average price received by producers for shorn wool marketed during the 1956 marketing year was 42.8 cents per pound. He stated that this means that producers who filed applications for shorn wool incentive payments will receive an incentive payment of \$44.20 for each \$100.00 that they received from the sale of shorn wool and that producers who filed applications for lambs and yearlings incentive payments will receive 77 cents per cwt. of live animals which were sold for slaughter.

Mr. Gray went on to say that the ASC office will begin making payments to producers who have filed applications about August 15, 1956, and that it will not be necessary for producers to go to their county ASC office to receive their incentive payment as it will be mailed directly to the producer.

years "and before entering upon its duties shall agree with the Board as to the rate of interest."

The petition also cites KRS 160.210 which provides that an employee of a school system may not, at his own pecuniary interest, in "supplying goods or services" for which funds are expended, enter into such a contract, and if he wishes his office is vacant.

7. The plaintiff affirms that no one connected with the Board of Education can legally profit from a contract with the Board.

8. It is alleged that County Superintendent V. O. Flurry is a stockholder in The Bank Josephine.

9. It alleges that Joe Holson, attorney for the Floyd County Board of Education, is a stockholder and director of The Bank Josephine.

10. W. A. Spradlin, a member of the Floyd County Board of Education since the merger of the city and county systems, is an assistant cashier of The Bank Josephine.

11. The plaintiff bank says in its petition that the action of the Board, without requiring interest from The Bank Josephine was "arbitrary and capricious and in violation of the Board's discretion."

The First National Bank asks that it be permitted to bid and if it is the low bidder that it be designated the depository of the school funds. It also asks the court to enjoin the Board from designating The Bank Josephine from serving as depository in the absence of a contract to pay interest.

Both the Prestonsburg banks are members of F. D. I. C. and Joe Holson, attorney for the Board of Education says that "it is a violation of the Federal statute for a member of the F. D. I. C. to pay interest on demand deposits."

Interest may be paid only on time deposits, saving accounts and certificates of deposit which are maintained and against which no withdrawals are made for a period of six months. If The Bank Josephine violated this law it would be subject to a fine of \$100. Holson says in a prepared statement to The Times.

Mine Jeep Sparks Kill
Pike Co. Man; Another Injures in Explosion

Sparks possibly from a mine jeep ignited a gas pocket in the Co-borne Coal Corporation mine at nearby Goody, Pike county, killing one man and slightly injuring another last Thursday.

The dead man is John Gilman; 31, Turkey Creek, Ky. Third-shift foreman, his body was recovered near the jeep by members of a rescue crew and federal and state mine inspectors about 5 hours after the blast.

Members of the rescue crew, from the Eastern Coal Corporation mine at Stone, Ky., said a flash fire apparently followed the blast, and that damage to the area was heavy.

Van Hoes and Gilman both were equipped with respirators, but Gilman appeared to have been killed outright. The two men were on a fire-tunnel run at the time.

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Orphanage Wards, Others Hurt in Collision Enroute To Salyersville Church

Sixteen children from a Magoffin county orphanage, their governess and two other adults were injured, three of the children seriously, July 7 in the collision of the orphanage station wagon with a car on a curve near West Liberty.

All 16 children were taken to two ambulances to the West Liberty hospital. Their governess was admitted to the Paintsville General hospital and Miss Margaret Wood, Floyd county missionary, was taken to the Prestonsburg General hospital.

State Police Trooper Jack Roberts said he filed charges of reckless driving and failure to have an operator's license against the driver of the car, identified as Bobby Morrison, 20 of Peru, Ind. Morrison was treated at Paintsville hospital for face cuts and bruises and was released.

His companion, Elmer McIntosh, 32, also of Peru, reportedly suffered a broken leg and was taken to the Prestonsburg hospital.

The children, representing half of the total orphan population of the Dora Lee Children's Home at Wayne, Magoffin county, were being taken to a Salyersville church where they were to participate in a program at the Sunday school hour the next day.

Their station wagon was driven by Miss Margaret Wood, one of the co-operators of the orphanage. Miss Wood suffered small cuts on one knee and either a bruised or fractured collarbone.

At West Liberty facilities of the 23-bed hospital were sorely taxed as the 16 near-hysterical patients, ranging in age from 3 to 13 years, were brought in. None suffered fatal injuries.

The town's two physicians and three nurses were augmented by numerous women volunteers who help quiet the children, many of whom kept calling for "Mommie" the name they use for Miss Wood.

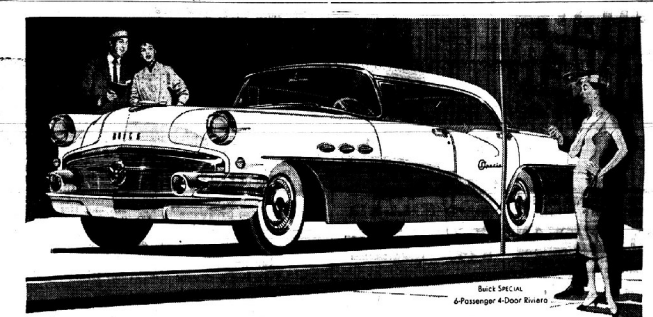

rence Grauman, Louisville, who was appointed by former Chief Justice Porter Lewis to hear the cases.

Lewis charged Judge Grauman's appointment was illegal and null, especially inspired. This charge resulted in Lewis' six-month suspension from law practice last year.

Today Lewis again charged Judge Grauman was appointed illegally. He contended in his brief that the appointment was illegal because Judge Grauman was a judge of a court of continuous session at that time.

Lewis noted that Judge Grauman heard the testimony for three days before he dismissed the suit, adding:

"We categorically and confidently say to the court that there is a line of substantive and competent testimony in the record to support the finding made by Judge Grauman."

"The opinion by the high court, Lewis contended, did not touch the basic and fundamental issues of the cases 'top, side or bottom.'"

"The court should withdraw its opinion and reverse the judgments of the illegally appointed that judge for the further reason that under the law it is necessary for the court to determine whether or not Judge Grauman was disqualified to act as a special judge," he said.

Lewis also charged in his brief that the court is antagonistic toward him, adding:

"In view of the antagonism which some members of this court have toward the attorney... it is respectfully requested that this be considered as a formal written motion for the members of this court, who may have become biased or prejudiced against the appellants or their cause, to disqualify themselves to sit in these appeals."

Prospects for Watershed Development In Area Improve With Funds Allocation

An impetus was given conservation activities in the state this week when it was announced by Governor Chandler's office that \$80,000 had been allocated for the emergency watershed planning of watershed projects. The amount set aside is to be used for planning over the next three years.

One watershed in this county has been under consideration for development the last two years. The Cow Creek Watershed Association was organized to promote the improvement of the valley and the papers are all in the mill," according to L. R. Johnson, conservationist of the Floyd County Soil Conservation District. The members of the Association are holding quarterly meetings.

Johnson provided figures on seven watersheds in this county needing conservation work. They are the designated areas: Mud Creek, 21,450 acres, Middle Creek, 18,880, Abbott Creek, 12,800, Cow Creek, 6,480, Bull Creek, 8,240, South Beaver Creek, 22,000, and Left Beaver with 21,350 acres.

Of course the watershed first improved in this section will have the greatest priority of need," Johnson pointed out. The money provided from the Governor's emergency fund will be placed in a trust fund, earmarked for use by the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture to finance a watershed planning effort. One crew is already allocated to Kentucky under provisions of Public Law 556, which governs federal participation in watershed projects.

Governor Chandler's action will bring the field men, identical groups of technicians hired and trained by the SCS. Each crew can man four watershed improvement plans a year.

In order to serve the numerous local fields of Southwest Virginia, Eastern Kentucky, and Eastern Tennessee, J. Manufacturing Company will carry a large inventory of renewal parts at all times. The building and additional five acres will cover more than 16,000 square feet and will be constructed by the Armstrong Construction Company of Kingsport, Tenn.

POLIO SHOTS TOTAL 18.2%

Of County's Population Under 20; Epidemic Feared by Authorities

Only 18.2 per cent of Floyd County's 27,528 persons under the age of 20 have received any polio vaccine, according to figures reported to the Kentucky State Department of Health. With so small a percentage of highly susceptible persons protected, there is always the danger of an epidemic.

Thirty-three cases of polio have been reported in Kentucky this year. This figure is lower than the number of cases at this time last year, when 35 had been reported. Last week, 180 new cases throughout the United States were reported, as compared with 277 for the corresponding week of last year. The reduction in the numbers of cases perhaps can be largely attributed to the effectiveness of the polio vaccine. Parents are being urged to have their children vaccinated as once before the polio season gets further under way.

Most susceptible to polio are those under 20 years of age and pregnant women. Over 100,000,000 persons in this most susceptible group have received vaccine with a perfect safety record.

Vaccine is available through family physicians. Parents are being advised to check with their physicians and follow the plan which has been suggested in their localities for the administration of the vaccine.

The State Health Department is shipping orders of vaccine to counties on a first-come, first-served basis. Floyd county parents have been asked to call for the vaccine so that this area will receive its proper allotment.

Three Loans Awarded By Scholarship Fund

Frankfort, July 19—The Rural Kentucky Medical Scholarship Fund has granted loans to three additional medical students, according to Dr. C. C. Howard, Glasgow, chairman of the fund's board.

Approved were James O. Self, Ekron; James E. Van Hoose, Nipps, Johnson county; and John T. Tegan, Davenport, Iowa. Self and Van Hoose are students at the University of Louisville. Tegan attends the University of Iowa College of Medicine.

Loans were recently granted to 13 students through the Scholarship Fund which seeks to provide rural communities with adequate medical facilities.

Under the plan, medical students may borrow \$200 a year if they agree to practice in Kentucky communities acceptable to the fund.

EXPERTS TEST TOBACCO HERE

Specialists of 2 States Examining Aromatic Crops Growing As Experiments

Specialists from two state universities were in the county last week to examine the three pilot fields of aromatic tobacco being grown here on an experimental basis. The men were from the University of Kentucky and the University of North Carolina. Heading the inspection team was Roy Crase, aromatic tobacco specialist of the latter institution.

The specialists found two of Floyd county's three fields growing excellent aromatic tobacco, but it was pointed out by Dr. W. Wallace Blair, pathologist of the University of Kentucky, that it is too early to evaluate properly the quality of the crop. Dr. Crase, tobacco specialist at the University, said the soils in this area seemed to be good for the production of this tobacco.

Aromatic or Turkish tobaccos are used to "leave" the typical American cigarette, and its expanding use has depleted world markets. Most of this tobacco used by the American industry has heretofore been imported from Turkey or other Near-East countries. It is now grown in Virginia, North and South Carolina. It is not under the government quota system.

Curing and marketing of the aromatic tobaccos are handled differently than the American burley product, it was pointed out by County Agent O. E. Boggs. The initial stage of harvesting here will be under the direct supervision of Crase who will return at the proper time. The leaves are strung out on an eight-foot rack and hung in curing sheds where they will cure for nearly a week, depending on a number of factors. They are transferred to this curing to a barn that has a special heating unit. After final preparation for market, it is packed in 20-pound bundles and will be shipped to the Southern Aromatic Tobacco Company, Anderson, South Carolina.

Veterinary Training Available to Students

Frankfort, July 19 — Applications for veterinary medicine training under the program of the Kentucky State Board program at Auburn University and Tuskegee Institute, must be filed by August 15. Dr. Floyd E. Hull of the University of Kentucky announced this week.

Under the program approximately 40 Kentucky students attend the two Alabama schools without paying out-of-state tuition. Nine Kentucky students recently graduated under the program, 7 from Auburn and 2 from Tuskegee.

Dr. Hull explained that the program is made possible by a system of contracts among the State of Kentucky, the Southern Regional Education Board and the two schools. In return for the quota of students who are admitted on the same basis as Alabama residents, Kentucky pays \$1,000 per student to the school to help meet operating costs.

The Kentucky quota for the September class is 10 new students at Auburn and 3 at Tuskegee. Applicants must be Kentucky residents and must have a minimum of two years pre-veterinary training. Dr. Hull asked that students interested in further information about the program write to the Kentucky Council on Public Health, Education, State Office Building, Frankfort.

SPORTS AFIELD

There are many experiences that may rise in the field, other than those caused by injuries. These "medical emergencies" are just as serious and dangerous as even the severest accident. They can be classified under four general groups: unconsciousness, heart disease, acute abdominal disease and stroke.

Unconsciousness is always terrifying and frustrating emergency to cope with. There are dozens of causes, but don't rack your brain for them. Your main concern as a first-aid volunteer is to do nothing that will injure the patient. Lay him rest flat on his back; with a minimum of handling, inspect for hemorrhage. Under no circumstances should you force any fluid down his throat. If he is cold and clammy, apply heat if he is hot, apply cold compresses to the head.

Acute heart disease includes coronary, angina, heart failure and others. The stricken patient usually collapses, face an ashen gray color, gasps for air. Place on his back in a half-sitting position. Do not let him move; he must not be moved until seen by a doctor. If you cannot help him so he doesn't ease himself.

Acute abdominal disease includes appendicitis, perforated ulcer, gall bladder attack and such. Place the patient in a semi-reclining position with the knees bent and legs supported. The face is flushed, eyes pop out and pupils are unequal in size. Breathing may be snoring or irregular. Do not eat or drink. If you are not sure, call a doctor.

A stroke is an interruption of the blood supply to the brain. Symptoms depend on which area of the brain is affected. About half the cases of stroke lapse into unconsciousness. The face is flushed, eyes pop out and pupils are unequal in size. Breathing may be snoring or irregular. Do not eat or drink. If you are not sure, call a doctor.

POLICY RATES GO UP AUG. 1

Workmen's Compensation To Cost Kentucky Firms More, Thurman States

Higher policy rates for workmen's compensation insurance will go into effect August 1, Insurance Commissioner Cad P. Thurman announced last week.

The higher rates, Thurman said, are due to increased payments for workmen's compensation claims. The increase is the first in seven years for industrial risks, except coal-mine operations. It is based on higher medical expenses and increased workmen's compensation benefits authorized by the 1956 Legislature.

Coal-mine rates will be increased 12 1/2 per cent until January 1. Then, continuing rates will be reviewed and rates adjusted, Thurman said. Policies, other than coal mines, that do not expire until after September 1 will reflect an 8.6 per cent increase after August 1.

After September 1, policies renewed for risks other than coal mining will be written at rates that reflect experience of previous years and anticipated increased benefits. Thurman said each class will be reviewed individually, and various percentages will apply to changes in renewal rates.

Kentucky employers paid \$10,293,579 for workmen's compensation insurance in 1955, Thurman said that amount will increase about 10 per cent in 1956 under the new rates.

Kentucky Attracts 47 New Industries

Frankfort, July 19 — Forty-seven manufacturing plants began operation or announced plans to locate in Kentucky the first six months of the year an official report states.

Issued by the Department of Economic Development and the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce, the report said the new plants will create more than 6,000 new jobs and have annual payrolls estimated to reach 23 million dollars.

New factory employees for the entire year of 1955 totaled approximately 8,000, according to the report.

The new factories located in 22 counties, will have a plant investment of nearly 50 million dollars compared with plant expenditures of 20 million dollars during the entire year of 1955.

The report said Kentucky reported a monthly average of 164,000 manufacturing jobs in 1955, about 9 per cent more than the previous year which was the highest rate increase in 11 southeastern states.

Smaller Burley Crop Predicted for Year

Frankfort, July 19 — Kentucky's burley tobacco crop this year will yield 200,150,000 pounds or slightly less than 1955, according to a report issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Cross seeds of the 1955 crop totaled 217,942,333 pounds, the Federal-State Market News Service reported. From this figure is deducted seedlings totaling about 5 percent of the crop which cuts the total to near the estimate for this year's crop.
