CREDIT NEEDS OF FARMERS BETTER SERVED BY NEW LAW

The credit needs of a larger number of farm families can be better served by the Farmers Home Administration under recently enacted legislation.
 The new law provides broader authority to assist family-type farmers with loans to improve and operate their farms. It also authorizes, as a part of the rural development program, loans for operating and developing farms where the farmer has part-time employment of the farm. Included in the broadened authority are loans for refinancing existing debts, and an increase in the maximum amount that can be advanced for operating loans.
 All of the present loan services of the Farmers Home Administration which include loans for the operation, development and purchase of family-type farms, farm housing, soil and water conservation, and loans to meet emergency credit needs will continue to be available.
 When debts are refinanced by the FHA the payments will be scheduled according to the ability of the borrower to repay. In the past, the agency has only refinanced existing debts when the refinancing was incidental in the making of a new estate loan for purchase or improvement of family-type farms.
 Insured loans are made by the FHA from funds provided by private lenders. The loans will bear 3% percent interest plus a 1 percent insurance charge.
 Total operating loans under the new law may be made in amounts up to \$10,000 to the borrower with a limit of \$50,000 on the amount any one borrower can owe for this type of credit. The operating loans are for the purchase of equipment, livestock, fertilizer, seed and other farm and home-use expenses needed to carry out efficient farming operations on family-type farms. The interest rate remains at 3 percent. For the fiscal year 1957 \$155,000,000 plus a certain state fund of \$15,000,000 to meet if necessary has been appropriated for operating loans.
 The increase in the maximum limit of these loans will enable the agency to serve farmers and ranches in areas where heavy investments are required. Available operating expenses are now \$5,000.
 Loans will also be available for operation and development less than family-type farms if the applicants are established bona fide farmers.

The luncheon for newspapermen and their wives will be held at the Executive Mansion. The news conference will be held in the House of Representatives chamber.

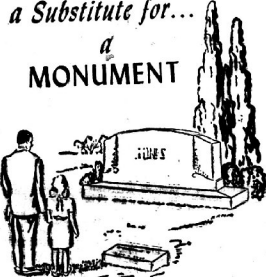
Letters of invitation were addressed, "Fellow Editors and Publishers," Chandler owns the Woodford Sun, a Versailles weekly.

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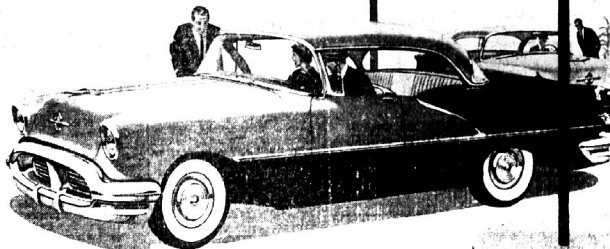

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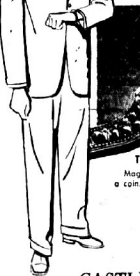

Federal Excise Tax Refunds Are Due

Claims must be filed not later than Oct. 1, 1956 by farmers seeking refunds of the federal excise tax on gasoline. The U. S. Extension Service notes:

Two cents a gallon refund may be claimed on any gasoline purchased and used on the farm for farming purposes during the period Jan. 1, 1955 through June 30, 1956. Farmers also may obtain refunds of the tax on gasoline used on his farm in agricultural work by a custom operator or neighbor Form 2340 for the refunds is available at Internal Revenue offices, county agents' offices and many banks and post-offices.

School Lunch Funds Increased One-Fifth

Kentucky and eight other southeastern states and Puerto Rico will receive an increase of almost 4 million dollars or 24 percent, over what they had last year for operation of the National School Lunch Program for the coming year. Kentucky's share of the federal funds will be \$2,250,372.

In the Southeast last year, nearly 450,000,000 meals were served under the lunch program to 2,740,946 children in 12,266 participating public schools and 183 private schools.

Under the National School Lunch Program, federal funds are used to reimburse schools in part for their food purchases. The funds are apportioned among the states on the basis of the number of children of school age and of the relation of the state's per-capita income to the national per-capita income.

Federal law requires that each dollar of federal funds disbursed by state agencies must be matched by \$1 from sources within the state. If the per-capita income in the state equals or exceeds the national average, the matching requirement is lowered.

The school lunch program is administered in the states by the state departments of education in accordance with operating agreements with the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service. The program has grown steadily in its 30 years of operation approximately 1.8 billion meals being served last year to 4,600,000 children in 56,000 participating schools in the nation.

Chandler Tells Road Bond Meet To Explain Issue

Frankfort, Sept. 24 (Sp.)—State officials urged Kentucky's county judges attending a road bond conference here to return home and work for the passage of the 100-million dollar road bond issue in their own communities.

Kentucky voters, Nov. 6, will decide whether the state shall borrow up to 100 million dollars by issuing 30-year bonds and pledging State revenues to guarantee the debt will be paid. Money derived from the sale of the bonds would be used to match the increased federal-aid money appropriated for highways by the last Congress.

Passage of the bond issue "will give us more money for work on our primary and secondary roads. If we can accelerate this program, I believe the Federal interstate roads will prove very popular," Commissioner of Highways Bert Kiser told the 47 county judges and 60 visiting county officials.

Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield told the conference the sale of road bonds would release about 37 million dollars of State funds Kentucky would otherwise have to put up for federal-aid matching in the next 3 years.

"No logical argument could be interposed against the bond issue," Frankfort attorney Joseph J. Leary said. "This is a good deal, and the only possible way to meet an immediate, urgent need in the next 3 years and meet it promptly."

Other persons meeting with the group were Chief Highway Engineer Dwight H. Bray, Rural Roads Commissioner J. B. Wells, former Governor Keen Johnson, president of the Better Roads Council, supporting the bond issue, and former Highway Commissioner J. Stephens Watkins.

The meeting was called by Gov. A. B. Chandler to enable county officials to have a better understanding of the bond issue.

Forty Groups Endorse Proposed Road Bonds; \$100,000,000 Asked

Approximately 40 organizations have endorsed the proposed \$100,000,000 state road bond issue, the Kentucky Better Roads Council announces.

The council, a nonpartisan organization seeking Kentucky voter approval of the bond issue at the Nov. 6 election, said the endorsers include representatives of agriculture, business, labor and civic groups.

Among the latest to endorse the bond issue were the Kentucky Farmers' Assn., meeting in Frankfort, and the Whitesburg Junior Chamber of Commerce. Thirty-two other organizations recently sent endorsements to the council headquarters here. They are: Hazard Coal Operators Association, Local Union 89, General Drivers, Warehousemen and Helpers, Louisville, London, Laurel County Development Assn., Eastern Kentucky Automobile Club, Ashland, Lewis County Farm Bureau, Vanceburg, Highway 411 Assn., Russellville Chamber of Commerce, Livermore Campbell County, Bardonia, Lebanon, and Bullitt county, Morehead Junior Chamber of Commerce, and Corydon Lions Club.

The Kentucky Farm Bureau Federation and the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce were among 24 organizations endorsing the proposal earlier. The executive council of the Kentucky Federation of Labor also recently endorsed the bond issue. If the bonds are voted, the state would have the \$100,000,000 to match federal aid and also would receive some state funds now earmarked for matching purposes. These state funds then could be used on state roads for which federal assistance isn't available.

The 1956 Legislature passed several tax measures now in effect designed to raise the estimated \$4,500,000 needed each year to retire the proposed bonds. The 1956 act did not increase state taxes on the average motorist to pay off the bonds. Most of the increased tax revenue comes from the sale of trucks. The principal tax boost was the two-cent-a-gallon surtax placed on gasoline and diesel fuel used on these heavy commercial trucks.

FOUR SPECIALISTS NAMED TO U. K. MEDICAL COLLEGE

The University of Kentucky Board of Trustees has appointed four medical specialists from the State University of New York College of Medicine to the staff of the newly established UK College of Medicine.

The new staff members are an assistant dean, a medical economist, a medical statistician and a medical statistician.

The dean of the University of New York College of Medicine at Syracuse, Dr. William R. Willard, resigned his post there in July to become vice-president of the UK Medical Center and dean of the College of Medicine.

The appointees follow:

Dr. Richardson Kilbourne Noback, assistant dean and associate professor of medicine; Dr. Howard Lee Bost, professor of medical and nursing economics; Dr. Robert Straus, professor of medical sociology; and Dr. Alan Ross, assistant professor of medical statistics.

UK President Frank O. Diekey, who recommended the appointment of the medical educators to the board, said that all will assume duties immediately. Dean Willard and the new staff members will have temporary offices in the Fine Arts Building.

Dr. Noback, the assistant dean, was director of the Syracuse Dispensary and assistant professor in the Department of Medicine there. Prior to joining the Syracuse staff, he was assistant director for the Medicine, Comprehensive Care and Teaching Program at Cornell University.

Dr. Straus, the recipient of B. A., M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from Yale University. After being awarded the latter degree from that institution he served for a time on the medical faculty there and from 1951 to 1953 was a research associate.

The other member of the medical team coming from Syracuse, Dr. Ross, served as assistant professor in the Department of Public Health and Preventive Medicine there. Before joining the Syracuse staff he was a research associate in the Department of Biostatistics at the University of Pittsburgh Graduate School of Public Health.

Dr. Bost holds a B.B.A. degree from the University of Texas and both M. A. and Ph. D. degrees from the University of Michigan. In 1943 the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration awarded him a certificate upon completion of a specialized course.

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Fire Toll Up: Chief Urges Local Action

The 1955 fire record, higher than 1954's in almost every way, emphasizes the need for full scale observance of Fire Prevention Week (October 7-13). Chief Vernon Blackburn of the Prestonsburg Fire Department said this week.

Referring to figures compiled by the National Board of Fire Underwriters, Blackburn pointed out that in 1955 fire took an estimated 11,000 lives and destroyed property worth \$685,218,000—16 per cent over the 1954 property loss.

An analysis of urban fires shows an increase of almost every type of fire. Residential fires, for example, totalled 291,324 — almost 2,000 over 1954. Increases were noted in all other types of building fires, mercantile, manufacturing, non-residential assembly, storage and miscellaneous. The grand total—400,044 building fires is greater by nearly 10,000 than the previous year's figure.

The only decrease, and it was a sizeable one, was in the number of grass and brush fires, 246,000 — more than 35,000 fewer than in 1954.

Home fires continue to be the most common type of building fire. In 1955 they represented 25 per cent of all fires, a slightly greater percentage than the year before. Chief Blackburn urges every household in the community, therefore, to increase his efforts to locate and eliminate fire hazards in his home.
