O. J. West, district engineer, Department of Highways, writes this newspaper and others to point to the increasing piles of litter that are making more and more unsightly roadsides of a beautiful part of Ventucker. Kentucky

Mr. West notes that accumulations of trash, garbage and other kinds of debris along the highways of this eleven-county area have become noticeably greater since the disastrous January flood. He adds:

"I am sure there is not a single person who would think of placing this material on their own property, or on their neighbor's property; but, in fact, this is just what is being done, as the highways are yours just as much as your lawn, orchard or other proper-ty."

The district engineer expresses the belief that "with the proper cooperation of each and every person we will be able to remedy this condition and in a short time practically eliminate the entire condition, and improve the appearance of our roads to conform to the reputation of our state as to tourist attraction..." attraction

With Mr. West's aims we are in complete agreement. Certainly this roadside dumping of debris is doing Kentucky, and particularly Eastern Kentucky, much damage. Folks who come visiting here for the first time must surely think we are the world's poor-est housekeepers. They must be convinced we have little sense of our own responsibility to help keep beautiful a beautiful region. To them we must seem either unthinking or deliberately determined to descrate the natural scenery with which we are blessed.

The highway official states an obvious truth when he says that "with the proper cooperation" of all the situation could be remedied. But if Mr. West thinks that we are going to get such cooperation on a pure-ly voluntary basis, as it should be given, he is-dead wrong. Some will voluntarily cooperate, but a great number will have to be forced into compliance with

There is a law on the statute books which covers this situation. If highway officials, law enforcement officers and the courts will get tired enough of dirt and filth and flagrant violation of the law to crack down on these litterbugs, and crack down hard and often—then, and only then, will the garbage dumps along Eastern Kentucky highways vanish.



BATTLE OF IVY MOUNTAIN

First large scale engagement in Eastern Kentucky between the Union and Confederacy was the Battle of lyy Mountain, Nov. 8, 1861, often referred to locally as the Sattle of Ivy Narrows. Union Commander was Gen. W. O. "Bull" Nelson and Confederate leader was Col. Andrew Jackson May, of Prestonsburg.

Most fighting occurred at the place shown in the picture where the roads intersect and at a wooden bridge then over nearby ivy Creek. The Confederates retreated when Union troops deployed around the mountain side and emerged on the rebel right. Col. May took his raw milltiamen to Virginia but when the Unionists evacuated the valley in a few weeks the Confederates returned to occupy it until the pattle of Middle Creek two months later.



I have a brother who is a candidate for County Attorney. At this time I should like to ask you to sincerely consider him in his race. He is JARVIS ALLEN, a lawyer, a former teacher, former County Court Clerk of Floyd County, and a man who is worthy of your support.

Jarvis was raised as hard as any other man in this race. He has plowed as many fields, heed as much corn, not only worked in a corn mill but ran it when he was a mere boy. One year he attended Prestonaburg Iligh School and walked the eleven-mile trip home svery week-end. When he had finished high school he walked the long trip from Pyramid on the head of Middle Creek to Pippa Passes, Ky., where Mrs. Lloyd accepted him as a student.

During Jarvis' last semester at Caney our father died and Jarvis came home to teach school and to help our mother support his six younger brothers and sisters. At every vacation term thereafter Jarvis went to college, earning more and more credits until at the time of Pearl Harbor he lacked only nine hours of receiving the Bachelor of Arts Degree in Education. Although well qualified to enlist as an air cadet or to apply for a commission Jarvis Allen enlisted in the ranks as a private in the Air Force. After being trained as a machine gunner and an aerial engineer he flew to England and Joined the Eighth Air Force where he fought in combat and contributed his share to the final defeat of Germany.

final defeat of Germany.

Jarvis' life in the service was no picnic, no life of a desk-bound job with brass on his shoulders. He rode three Flying Fortresses to their deaths. The first made it back to an English Beach, the second "ditched" in the English Channel and Jarvis with his crew was rescued from the cold, icy waters three hours later. The third plane on which was fighting was blasted from the air after it ran out of ammunition during the historic raid in Schweinfurt, Germany, in August, 1943. Jarvis Allen, wounded by shrapnel, was the last living man to leave the plane after all others save the pilot had abandoned ship. The pilot rode the plane to the ground after ordering Jarvis to take to his parachute. Jarvis landed in the midst of enemy-held Belgium and although painfully wounded, suffering a sprained back and a broken foot, he was able to evade the enemy with the help of heroic underground and after four months, during which we at tome all but gave up hope for his safety and his life, made his way back to England. He walked, crawled and struggled across the Pyrenees Mountains on foot, a trip which took two weeks. Jarvis returned to us broken in health from months of starvation but served his country for more than another year as a combat instructor for the Air Force. His experiences no doubt saved the lives of other combat-bound crews.

While Jarvis was missing overseas the Air Force decorated him in absentia at Marshall College, Huntington, W. Va., with the Air Medal with five Oak Leaf Clusters and the citation accompanying the award stated that my brother had distinguished himself in combat by shooting down five enemy planes.

Jarvis was later decorated with the Order of the Purple Heart r wounds received in action. He is still rated partially disabled as a sult of his military service.

I am not asking you to elect Jarvis County Attorney because of his distinguished military record. You have been kind to my brother. I merely cite his war record to remind you that he, too, has given his full measure of devotion to his country's cause as have most of the men of his age group here in this county. Since the issue has been brought into the campaign by others I feel it my duty to complete the record.

After Jarvis returned from service you good people elected him County Court Clerk of this county and while at least one of his opporants says that he has never run for county-wide office he failed to tell you that he has been on the state payroll for at least six years at a salary almost as high as this office pays. I am proud of my brother's record while he was Clerk. No one has ever attacked it.

While Jarvis was your Clerk and since that time he has worked unceasingly for the good of Floyd county. He has twice gone to Washington, D. C., at his own expense to appear before Congressional Committees in the interest of the canalization of the Big Sandy. Jarvis does not claim that he alone secured these improvements but that through his efforts and the efforts of those he supported these projects were made possible.




