But Not Always Right Governor Chandler has announced that he will give high priority to tax-cutting legislation when the Gen-eral Assembly convenes next year. Which, of course, will not be protested by the general taxpaying public. But The Times is not convinced that this is the thing to do, although tax relief generally would be welcom-ed by everybody. Kenucky needs the \$2,000,000 this tax reduction would eliminate. It needs it for teachers. The state is still far behind other and more prosperous states as the competition for qualified teachers mounts. Ken-tacky education can never move ahead without proper instruction, and it is obvious that Kenuckiane have not made the financial sacrifices necessary to get and hold good teachers and enough of them.

For this reason, we suggest that the \$20,000,000 surplus now in the state treasurp be earmarked solely for teachers' salaries and that the present taxes stand to continue to support education as well as other es-sentials of government. If the Governor has an idea that a tax cut in 1958 is the thing to do for ways mailting taxes.

Ohio Cities Get Help

Floyd county towns and practically all other Ken-tucky municipalities stand in need of street improve-ments which few are able to finance. To begin with, initial street-paving or surfacing is usually done at the expense of property-owners, but once that work is done maintenance expenses are ex-pected to be met, and should be met, by other sour-

ces. In Ohio, we read, municipalities are hard pressed, just as they are in Kentucky. But there is a differ-ence. Those city governments get regular financial "shots in the arm" from state funds.

"shots in the arm" 'from state funds. Soon a news dispatch says, grasoline tax monay amounting to \$2,852,185 will be distributed to Ohio cities for street purposes, and this year the state will apportion more than \$42,000,000 in all for streets and highways over the state. We mention these facts to point up Kentucky's needs in the same field. It has become more and more ap-parent that city streets are used by the general public, that a sizeable part of the grasoline tax fund is derived from mileage put on city streets, that streets no long-That a sizeable part of the gasoline tax find is derived from mileage put on city streets, that streets no long-er serve only those who live on them or only those who reside in the corporate limits of the town or city. Consequently, street improvement and maintenance are becoming more and more a concern of the state. That fact Ohio has accepted. Kentocky might well do more thinking along the same lines.
