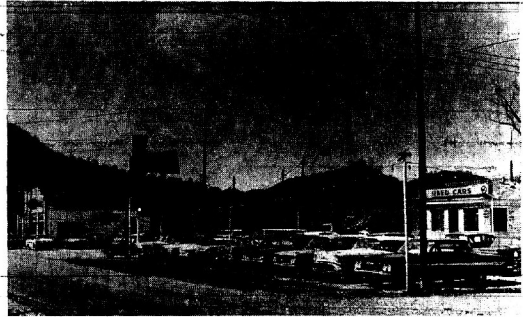

In compliance with the Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1962 concerning relocation assistance to families displaced by acquisition or clearance of right-of-way for federal-aid highways, Clyde B. Allen, of the Right of Way Division, District 12, Pikeville, has been designated local assistance man by Lawrence W. Johnson, chief right-of-way agent. Mr. Allen has already assumed full responsibility for all matters pertaining to such work in Highway District 12, which is composed of Knott, Lawrence, Johnson, Martin, Letcher, Floyd, and Pike counties.

"He will maintain in his office a supply of information packets that will be distributed to all property owners, where applicable, at the earliest possible stage of the project. Mr. Allen will be available in the district office to offer assistance, advice and information to all affected property owners."

Floyd County Stands To Lose—And It Can't Stand It

THE TIMES has maintained a silence about the proposed closing of the McDowell Memorial hospital that could easily be construed as a lack of interest on our part. But such is not the case; our silence has simply expressed our barrenness of constructive ideas relative to the situation.

It is obvious that Floyd county cannot operate the hospital. The very size and elegance are forbidding. Its location, the expense of maintenance and staffing for full operation—all these virtually close its doors to all except the United Mine Workers themselves or to the state of Kentucky or some agency of federal government.

Shall this splendid facility, then, be closed, to stand, until it falls, as a reminder of what might have been and as a symbol of failure? Must this county, which already needs more doctors and all the services only they can perform, have fewer doctors? Must Floyd county, already beset by economic difficulties and rightly marked as a chronically distressed area, be further plagued by the loss to its economy of the huge payroll now being paid staff members and other employees at the hospital, as well as by the loss of the business it has afforded suppliers?

These and other questions arise. Is the answer to each, inevitably, "Yes"? Here stands a facility which the state might use. Kentucky's program for the rehabilitation of alcoholics is being expanded. Could not this hospital be used for that purpose? Or, as other existing state services require more space and added facilities, would not the hospital serve the state's purpose well without incurring the great cost of constructing new buildings or additions?

If there are those whose dislike of state or federal help in whatever situation is so sharp that they would oppose any such solution to this problem, we invite them to have a try at working themselves and the rest of us upward by the well-known bootstraps.

Prestonsburg - 1963

The New Year is here, and we wonder what is ahead. We see our city now, showing progress and gains after a long period of sleep. We wonder what is before us. Will the road through town be built? Will the new sewage on its way toward town? Will the city have parking space so that we can use our streets for traffic? Will we have a sewer system so that our city will be safe from health hazards?

These questions are in our minds, along with many more, but they are many that are far more important. Are we satisfied to be merely "the county seat of Floyd county" and a shopping and banking center for a small area around our city?

Take a look at a road map of our section of the state. Where else in Eastern Kentucky can we find a community that will be as well blessed by good roads as ours will be by the end of 1963? (There will be need for improvement of roads, but the roads will be there.) But will we be ready to make use of these roads?

Every business man, every professional man, every teacher, every landowner, and even every housewife should have been "on the ball" for the last year or two, planning for the future.

We have one organization dedicated to this, but of what is it composed? Look at its regular Wednesday noon meetings and whom do we see?—three or four business men (but seldom is even one of these a merchant), the same number of housewives, a lawyer and a doctor or two, two or three from our banks, a representative or two of the city council, a couple of preachers and a representative of one of our radio stations.

It is true that these are among the leaders of our community, but where are the rest? Why should our people find it necessary to go to Huntington, Lexington or Ashland to trade? We have, or will have shortly, better connections than any other place in Eastern Kentucky for a big trade center. Buyers from the east must pass through or near our city, to reach other cities. The same is true of those travelling to the north and south.

Let's wake up in 1963, before we are passed by. Let's wake up or invite "furriners" in to do the job for us. Frankly, it is too late for 1963, but 1964 and '65 are just around the corner, and so far none of the other communities has shown any more activity than we have.

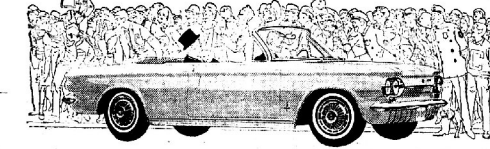

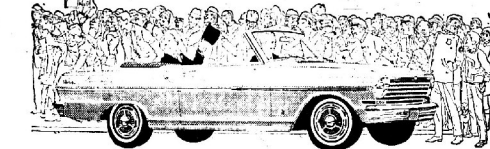

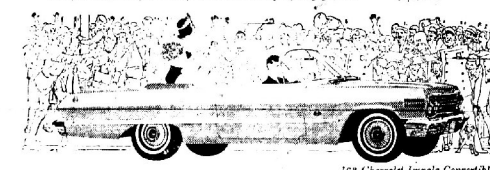
