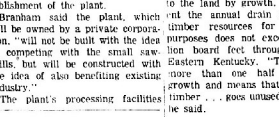
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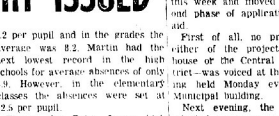
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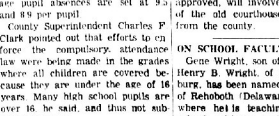
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Our Yesterdays

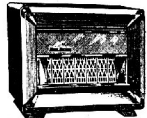

After 1964—What Then?

The greatest construction program in the history of Prestonsburg is now under way but will, except for one or two projects, end next year.

The list is impressive: the extension of the Prestonsburg-Pikeville arm of the Mountain Parkway, the low-rent public housing project, sewer and water treatment plant construction, the Floyd county courthouse, the Prestonsburg Community College and the amphitheatre at Jenny Wiley State Park.

One more project, the county library, is certainly in the final stages of planning and construction. Both badly needed, are possibilities.

But, with all these going, the end of 1964 would in all probability see them finished.

After 1964—what then?

It should be remembered that, without state and federal government participation, the present construction boom would not exist. The community would be unassistedly quiet.

Prestonsburg and Floyd county cannot forever depend upon projects financed at least in part by public funds to provide major sources of employment and business activity. They need permanent industry, we add at the risk of repeating perhaps the most oft-quoted statement ever made in this area.

Flood control along the Big Sandy is already partially realized, and within five years should be completely so. A splendid new highway from the Mountains to the Blue Grass, here to connect with other major highways leading to other parts of Kentucky and the nation, will be open. Education on the whole is moving upward, and a Community College here as an adjunct of the University of Kentucky adds immeasurably to that upward picture. The entire area, with Jenny Wiley State Park and Dewey Lake as the center, is becoming nationally known as one of America's most picturesque vacation spots, and recreation is almost at the door of every person residing in this part of Kentucky.

For a long time now we have been told that any community hoping to land an industrial project must have a site above flood danger, adequate transportation, good schools and churches, sanitation, recreation and a good business climate.

Looking back at what has been done during the last three or four years and ahead to what can be expected to be achieved, not at some distant date but soon, one wonders what the industry could ask—unless it is an improved business climate.

Some industrialists have denied that labor-capital relations existing in the area are not discouraging. And if these relations aren't such as to deter investment in the area, why not begin to take a long and careful look at the situation, with a view to removing the obstacles?

Process of Selecting Future Engineers Set By Highway Officials

High schools and district highway engineers throughout the state are receiving information on the process of selecting 40 young men who next spring will be awarded freshman scholarships to the University of Kentucky College of Engineering.

The scholarships will be awarded by the State Department of Highways. A scholarship applicant must be an approximate 1964 graduate of an approved Kentucky high school. The applicant must be a native-born 1963 graduate who has a satisfactory employment record with the Highway Department. He must rank in the upper two-fifths of his high school class and be recommended by his principal or mathematics teacher.

Applicants also will be required to take the American College Test, which will be offered at 30 points throughout the state on designated dates. The first examination will be held on October 8, but October 12 is the deadline for registration for this registration.

Registration forms, which are available at high schools and district engineers' offices, should be completed and mailed with a \$1 registration fee to Dr. Charles P. Epton, state co-ordinator, ACT, Office of the Dean of Admissions and Registrar, University of Kentucky, Lexington.

All Kentucky high schools have lists of the locations at which the tests will be given.

The scholarships are intended for youths who wish to study highway engineering. Recipients who make satisfactory progress as freshmen may continue to receive scholarship assistance during their sophomore year.

Lovern Asks Assembly Legislation Providing For Annual Inspection

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 25 (Sp.)—State Public Safety Commissioner Glenn Lovren has urged the 1963 General Assembly to enact an annual motor vehicle inspection law in Kentucky.

"Speaking to an estimated 600 at the first 1963 Department of Public Safety seminar in Louisville, September 19, he compared death rate figures in all states.

"We know that the death rate per 10 million vehicle miles is 4.54 in this state which do not have inspection programs," he said.

"The average death rate per 100 million miles in Kentucky for the past 12 years has been 7.8. Kentucky does not have a motor vehicle inspection program."

Asking, "Who wants inspection?" Lovren noted that "a public opinion poll sponsored by the National Council on Traffic Safety, showed that 97 per cent of the people interviewed favored periodic inspection of all motor vehicles."

He said that an interesting side-light of the poll is the fact that this percentage was constant in states that have inspection laws, as well as in those states which do not have inspection.

"The Kentucky Department of Public Safety is hopeful that the General Assembly will look with favor on the passage of an annual inspection program in its 1964 session," Lovren added.

Demonstrations at the seminars were conducted by the divisions of Accident Control, Driver Licensing, Fire Prevention, State Police, and Boating.

Among the demonstrations were karate self defense, using hands the new radar system, polygraph (the detector), and other scientific analytical apparatus, including blood alcohol tests, a driving simulator, and demonstrations of several fire hazards.

Two other safety seminars are planned by the department, one at Kentucky Dam Village, October 1, and one at Jenny Wiley State Park, October 18.

NEWSPAPER REPORTER SAYS U. S. BUREAU HEADS, UMW, OPERATORS TO BE NAMED

A newspaper reporter testified Thursday last week that some Bureau of Mines officials are about to be named codefendants, along with big coal operators and the United Mine Workers, in suit suits.

Nat Caldwell, a reporter for The Nashville Tennessean, said "some fairly high level people" at the Bureau of Mines would be named coconspirators. These suits, he said, are being prepared. Caldwell has investigated coal-mining operations in Eastern Tennessee and Western Kentucky for his newspaper. He told of the suits during testimony on a bill that would extend the federal mine-safety laws to mines employing fewer than 15 men.

He said the legislation is being pushed by the United Mine Workers of America and the big coal operators to force small mines out of business.

When Caldwell said he is convinced the Bureau of Mines would help shut down the small operators and added that the bureau's policy was "interwoven" with that of the U. M. W.'s Representative James Roosevelt (D, Cal.), who was presiding, asked if he could document the charge. Caldwell then told of the suits, saying they would "bring into the open the partnership of the Bureau of Mines and its representatives." The federal officials, he said, used their inspection powers to try to force coal operators to join the union.

Caldwell also delivered what Representative Charles E. Croft (R, N. Y.), called a "scathing indictment" of the U. M. W. Caldwell said the union used its members' money to buy its way into control of the coal industry and is now going away with its members' jobs by financing automa-

tion of the mines.

"The union," he said, "is the management of the coal industry. It supplies the management ideas and the finance ideas."

Caldwell's charge that the U. M. W. and the big operators had joined to push the proposed bill that would bring the small mines under the federal safety act was supported by Robert Holcomb, president of the National Independent Coal Operators Association.

Holcomb said the Bureau of Mines was under the domination of the U. M. W. and would enforce any such law only to drive small units out of business.

He said the U. M. W. wants the small mines shut down because most of them are non-union.

"I think that is exactly what I think that is about," Holcomb said. "If a union mine acquires the business of a non-union mine the union is richer by 40 cents for each ton of coal mined."

Graduation from the Signal School represents a major step forward in a soldier's military career, qualifying him for high-level technical positions after leaving the Army. Admission to the school is limited to men of outstanding promise.

UK Enrollment Hits Record High, 12,112

The University of Kentucky's fall semester enrollment stands at an all-time record high—12,112. This tops by almost 600 the previous enrollment peak of 11,521 established a year ago. A total of 6,190 students are attending 200 classes on the Lexington campus; 1,801 are enrolled in the five community colleges; 650 in the evening class program, and 471 in extension classes for credit. The five UK community colleges report the following registration figures: Ashland, 282; Covington, 625; Cumberland, 191; Fort Knox, 331; and Henderson, 265.

The seven latest recipients, their locations and total state aid are: Taylor county, Campbellsville, \$814.34; Alexandria, \$700.44; Union county, Morganfield, \$675; Powell county, Stanton, \$642.90; Hatcher county, Elizabethtown, \$593; Lee county, Beattyville, \$582.76; and Pike county, Pharesville, \$265. These seven, as will those receiving checks earlier, will get the second half of their state aid after December 1. Floyd county's fair did not qualify for state aid. A total of 73 local rates qualified for aid under the 1952 Legislative program that appropriated \$500,000 for use in the 1953-1961 fiscal year to supplement local premiums in approved classes. Maximum amount is \$1,500. Checks are mailed in the order in which the records are received and approved. Commissioner Beauchamp added.

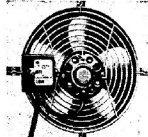

"The maternal grandparents of Alanzo Holbrook were Jesse and Frances Holbrook Lyon natives of North Carolina. Jesse Lyon was born in Wilkes county, North Carolina, April 1, 1792; Frances Holbrook Lyon, his wife, born in the same county, April 5, 1796. They married in their native county August 5, 1811, came to Kentucky in 1821, and settled in Floyd, now Lawrence county, Jesse Lyon, who was a farmer and blacksmith, died April 5, 1879, at the age of ninety years. His widow died June 30, 1882. Alanzo Holbrook was reared on a farm and educated in the common and select schools of Johnson county, Kentucky. He remained with his father until he was about twenty years of age, and was a teacher in the common schools several years; in the year 1870 he engaged in the merchandising business at Flat Gap, Johnson county, which business he has successfully continued. He was appointed postmaster at Flat Gap, October 6, 1879, of which office he is the present incumbent. "April 8, 1882, he was married to Sip Rule, a daughter of A. W. and Angelina Spradlin Rule, A. W. Rule, father of Sip Rule Holbrook, was born August 14, 1814; Angelina Spradlin Rule, his wife and Sip Holbrook's mother was born June 21, 1825. A. W. Rule and Angelina Spradlin Rule were married March 25, 1846. Their children were Martha Jane Rule (later Savits) born March 2, 1847; Sarah Ellen Rule (later Davis), born March 14, 1849; Benjamin P. Rule, born April 5, 1851, died August 6, 1875; Bosco L. Rule, born January 4, 1853, died May 5, 1880; Andrew J. Rule, born November 3, 1854, died February 11, 1885; Proctor M. Rule, born August 1, 1857, died October 12, 1897; Sip Rule Holbrook, wife of Alanzo Holbrook, born February 11, 1862. Alanzo Holbrook's brothers were as follows: Loranza D. Holbrook, born May 18, 1864; Jesse Holbrook, born June 18, 1868; David Holbrook, born 27, 1862; Pleasant P. Holbrook, born March 20, 1862; October 3, 1867. Alanzo Holbrook was appointed notary public for Johnson county, Kentucky, in 1885. He is a member of the Masonic Lodge No. 381 at Paintsville, Kentucky, and in politics is a Democrat. He owns property and land and resides at Flat Gap, Johnson county, Kentucky."

Insurance Costs Reduced By Recent State Action; Rates Effective Sept. 16

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 17 (S.I.)—Kentucky residents can expect to save over \$1 million annually in property damage insurance premiums after September 16, State Insurance Commissioner J. Elliott Flanery has announced.

The largest savings—ranging from 27 to 77 per cent—will go to farm owners in reduced rates for wood shingle roofs under the Farmowners Package Program. Also, a 20 per cent reduction will apply to farm barns and outbuildings, tobacco barns, brooder houses and connected structures, and silos. Changes in the rating plan for better type farm dwellings will bring additional savings, Flanery said.

A seven per cent reduction in overall basic policy premiums for all forms of homeowners insurance will also go into effect September 16. This change will include removal of charges for swimming and wading pools, and outboard motors of less than 25 horsepower. Also, the charges for outboard motors larger than 25 horsepower will be reduced.

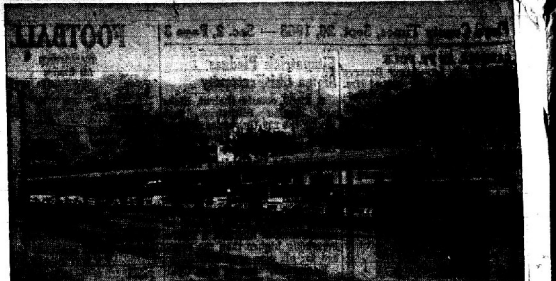

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Ward Warns Practice Of Garbage Disposal Costs State Large Sum

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 17 (Sp.) — "Garbage sneaks" is the tag applied by state highway officials to those people who fill highway litter barrels with household garbage.

"This practice is costing the taxpayers of Kentucky thousands of dollars, because men and women are being pulled away from other important highway duties," Highway Commissioner Henry Ward said.

Highway personnel and equipment are dispatched daily to many areas of Kentucky to empty litter barrels filled with household garbage. Before the barrels were emptied once a week.

"The purpose of litter barrels," said Maintenance Director T. J. Hoogood, "is for refuse that motorists need to deposit in order to keep highways and rights-of-way clean."

At present, it is costing Kentuckians over \$100,000 a year for highway crews to pick up litter along the highways. And this unnecessary expense is increased by "garbage sneaks" who fill litter barrels with household trash, Ward added.

In order to keep Kentucky's roads clean, crews throughout the 12 highway districts are constantly picking up paper bottles and cans, placing more "No Dumping" signs, removing junked and abandoned vehicles from rights-of-way, and adding more litter barrels.

Other steps taken by the Department to improve the appearance of Kentucky's roads are the planting of trees; reseeded bare and eroded areas; reconditioning picnic tables and other equipment in roadside parks; and spraying and cutting brush.

"If the 'litter-bus' and 'garbage sneaks' could be stamped out, Kentucky could build more miles of much needed roads," Ward said.

DENSE MATERIALS SHIELD AGAINST NUCLEAR THREAT

Dense materials that shield you from radiation after a nuclear attack are of course highly desirable. But many misconceptions are circulating regarding such materials, says Kenneth Evans, U. S. Air Expedition Service civil defense specialist.

For instance: Lead is a very good shield against radiation. Evans says, who can build a house of lead sheets which are from two inches thick to three inches thick? So lead actually is impractical as a complete shelter, he noted. Even expensive in sheets and very heavy.

How about steel? A very good shielder. Evans admits — but it takes about eight inches of solid steel to set absolute protection. Again, a steel house (or steel roof eight inches thick is virtually impossible.

However, 2 1/2 inches of concrete will give protection. This is more in line with practical protection. Some persons could afford a house of concrete walls that not only would be reduced to about four-tenths of one Roentgen by the time it had gone through eight inches of steel, 2 1/2 inches of concrete, 31 inches of earth or eight feet of wood. Evans emphasizes that in an area where most citizens are quite a distance from the prime target in the state, the maximum shielding protection as listed above is not really needed.
