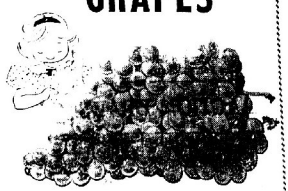

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CHURCH GROUP HEARS ROGERS ON HOSPITALS

Len B. Rogers, Pikeville district leader and member of the executive board of Appalachian Regional Hospitals, Inc., told the Presbyterian Men's Fellowship group here Tuesday evening of the challenge offered by the National Board of Missions of the Presbyterian Church, by the opportunity to save the United Mine Workers' five area hospitals for Eastern Kentucky.

Rogers detailed factually the intricate and involved negotiations, the necessary foundation planning and the capital outlay the acquisition of the hospitals at Harlan, Middleboro, McDowell, Pikeville and Hazard demanded. It was a delicate operation that had to be handled against too much newspaper publicity for fear the draught process would be strangled.

The Pikeville board member played a prominent part in the acquisition of the hospitals and the setting up of the non-sectarian and non-profit corporation that received the institutions from the hands of the church board, state and federal government.

"The Board of National Missions acted figuratively as a midwife in the operation," Rogers said, "for you must say, the board was made with a plan."

Beginnings of the struggle to save the hospitals threatened by closure at the United Mine Workers was made when a Harlan minister wrote a letter inquiring if the church could do something. Robert Barrie, chairman of the Health and Welfare Division of the board, was dispatched to Kentucky to survey the situation. In February, Dr. M. Rosenfield and Associates were employed to make a report and a preliminary one was made in April in a conference of churchmen of various faiths, hospital administrators, state and federal representatives and many others. The report, revised and expanded, was presented to the annual meeting of the church board in late April.

The report noted the widespread need for the continued operation of the hospitals.

"To permit them to close," the report said, "would precipitate a catastrophe in the reduction of available modern medical care in a 15-county area with a population of 278,000 persons."

The Area Redevelopment Administration indicated it would give immediate attention to an application for aid on the purchase of a state-owned hospital in New York and told the Board of Missions that if the hospitals could be transferred to a non-sectarian and non-profit corporation he would ask the Legislature to underwrite funds of \$700,000.

The board debated for two days but finally adopted, at the suggestion of the union owners, a statement of intent. The union gave the church board only four days to agree to the purchase or the order to close would go out. The statement of intent covered a number of things the board would undertake to do at once. One of these was to provide an annual grant of \$75,000 which the board didn't have.

"The plan called for many things to be done simultaneously or concurrently, by many agencies of both federal and state governments and the church board," Rogers said. "It was rapidly implemented."

The purchase deadline was extended to July 1, the ARA and the hospital fund trustees negotiated a price of \$3.3 million. The Appalachian Regional Hospitals, Inc., was formed. Gov. Combs asked the Kentucky Legislature to vote \$700,000 for a new phase of medical facilities and provision was made for a board of trustees. Of the 31 appointed to date, five are Presbyterians, two are Disciples of Christ, one a Baptist, one Episcopalian, one Methodist and one Southern Presbyterian. Nine additional trustees are to be named soon.

The Board of Trustees, meeting in Harlan, September 28, employed Dr. Karl S. Klichs, Chicago, as executive director. He has a distinguished record in hospital planning and administration. He will not give the job full time until December 1 but has already had several meetings with regional doctors, civic leaders and representatives of the public. Lexington was made headquarters of the clinical trustees and at 11-7-32.

The Daniel Boone Medical Clinic, which operates at each of the hospitals, was recognized by the National Medical Association approved the operation of the clinic. Under this plan is a part of partnership for group practice on a regional basis with fees for service. There is a free clinic of physicians and the suggestion of KMSA doctors employed by the union will move their offices out of the hospitals.

The five hospitals were officially transferred to ARH on September 29 at Washington and the purchase price paid. It is envisioned that the remaining five hospitals of the system will be transferred next year.

"Today, the five Appalachian Regional Hospitals are open and doing business," Rogers said. "For how long it is entirely up to the people of the region they serve."

"We, the trustees of ARH, earnestly solicit your help and cooperation in this great undertaking of faith, to the end that the people of Eastern Kentucky will be served by the finest medical institutions with the finest medical care available anywhere."

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

HUNTERS ARE ASSURED FULL HUNTING SEASON

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 7 (SPL)—Hunting seasons interrupted by a week of fire hazards in Kentucky have been announced so that hunters will be permitted to enjoy the full number of days originally designated. Mayor Clark, commissioner of the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, reported today following a meeting with the Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission.

The archery deer hunting season which was due to close on November 15 but in which the hunters lost 15 days, has been extended from November 15 through November 23 with a later season opening on December 1 and extending through December 15. Hunters will be permitted in the 45 open counties which have been previously restricted.

The first phase of the 1963-64 season was to close on October 31 but hunters lost 13 days. These days have been added to the end of the second phase of the season which opens in the eastern and southwestern counties on November 21. The new early date for the western area is December 15 while for the eastern area the season will end on December 31.

Twelve days were lost to the archery deer and turkey hunters on Kentucky watersheds but this was compensated for by the addition of eight days to the season on December 2 and continue through December 7, ending on December 9 and ending through December 11.

New dates for the archery deer hunt on Fayette, Old mine and Buchanan are as follows: November 15-21; November 22-28; November 29-December 5. The first phase of the deer season has been extended for November 23 and 24 with other sex deer harvestable while the archery season on this area will coincide with the statewide season. Shooting preserves, which were due to close on March 31, will not be extended until April 1.

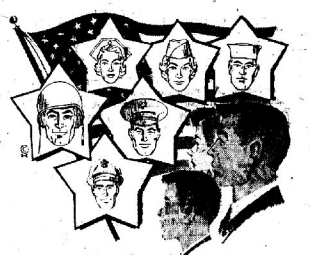
A primitive weapons season on a designated area in Bath and Mendick counties, has been changed with the archery season extending from November 2 through November 23. The deer season for deer is unchanged. November 23, 24, 25 and December 1. The squirrel season has been set for November 21 through December 31, while the grouse season is unchanged. One through January 23, is unchanged. Only muzzle loading rifle and muzzle loading shotguns and bow bows and crossbows may be used in this designated area. Two days lost in the deer season will be added to the second phase of the season if approved and stated by Stewart Adair, Secretary of the Interior.

What's Going On in FISH & WILDLIFE
By MINOR CLARK, Commissioner
Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources

The severe drought that has ravaged Kentucky this year has finished what speculation as to the effect such arid conditions may have on the population of its hunting season.

Many persons believe that the severely dried up water has caused severe damage to the quail and rabbit crop. This is based on the fact that in the water and the quail and the rabbit are the same. This is not valid in the opinion of hunters and game conservationists. They believe that, while the drought was one of the most severe ever encountered at this time of the year, it had little or no effect on wildlife from the standpoint of mortality.

The reason that quail are able to obtain enough water on which to survive is from the birds that, although some streams and ponds dried up, these quail still were able to obtain sufficient water for the early morning drink from the ditches and wetlands. In like manner they reason that the great majority of the rabbit were of sufficient size when the drought was at its peak.

SBA Manager Announces Business Start Program; Conferences Scheduled

Prospective business owners will have an opportunity to learn the advantages and disadvantages in starting their own business through a new program announced by R. S. Blankenship, manager of the Louisville branch office of the Small Business Administration.

"These conferences are open to individuals from all walks of life," Mr. Blankenship said. "They will cover subjects concerning the launching of a business, including organization, location of a firm, financing, business regulations, insurance, taxes, personal factors, management and administrative problems, and the many other advantages and disadvantages from other sources, such as government agencies, attorneys, accountants and bankers."

Mr. Blankenship said that in 1962 there were about 430,000 new businesses started. During the same year, about 210,000 businesses were discontinued. "A large percentage of the business failures can be attributed to lack of management experience and know-how," he explained. "The need for management knowledge is essential."

The SBA's aim is to inform potential business owners of the advantages and disadvantages of some into business for themselves.



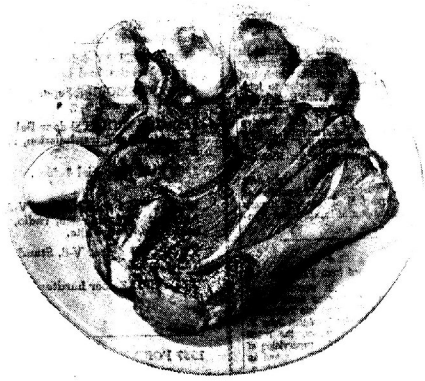

VOTE COUNT IS RESTRICTED

To 115 State Counties; Other 5 Counties Used Paper Ballot Method

Larry Layne, state campaign chairman for the nine G.O.P. candidates for state office who asked for the recount, said Monday that it would be confined to the 115 counties, having voting machines. In those counties election commissioners check machine totals against the reported figures.
 Kentucky's five other counties use paper ballots, and a recount of them would require court action.
 Breathitt won last Tuesday by about 13,000 votes. The recounting was sought because G.O.P. campaign workers reported wide-spread voting irregularities.

Democratic headquarters at Frankfort, the only place where a running tally of the recount is being kept, said the recounting had brought these changes:

Ballard, a gain of 12 for Numm and loss of nine for Breathitt; a loss of nine for Breathitt; Campbell, a pickup of eight for Numm; Floyd, an extra seven for Numm; Glasgow, a gain of one for Numm; Greenup, loss of 30 for Breathitt; Metcalfe, an additional nine for Breathitt; Ohio, a drop of five for Breathitt; Scott, a pickup of 36 for Numm, and Warren, a loss of three for Breathitt.
 The official Jefferson county tabulation, which shows a gain of 6 for Numm, has been completed in seven city wards. The count is incomplete in the five other wards and the three districts in the county.

FORD GROUP EXTENDS AID

Quarter-Million Dollars Given To Assist Section; Floyd-Co. Sees Benefits

Berea, Ky., November 9—Bell does the giving of a large sum of money reach as far into the life of the people as will the grant of the Ford Foundation to the Counties of the Southern Mountains, announced on November 7. By the express terms of the grant, Floyd county can co-operate in the enterprise and reap great gain over the next few years.
 "The Ford Foundation is furnishing a quarter of a million dollars in the expectation that this sum, used under the direction of the Council of the Southern Mountains, will provide the people of each county with a better understanding of their hope as well as their difficulties; that it will result in new approaches to education to prepare for work and citizenship in a shifting world; that pilot projects in education and community planning will become the standard for related accomplishment all through the Appalachian South.
 This program is not merely a plan to "help the helpless" but a straightforward attempt to develop people's abilities to act on their own behalf. It is based on the fact that most people in the mountains are unemployed chiefly because they are unskilled for the work that is needed today, increasing their poverty and further limiting their usefulness.
 The plan made possible by the Ford grant suggests no quick or easy remedy but offers a strong hope for people who tend to think their plight is hopeless. State by state, county by county, every resident of the uplands will have the chance to gain by this daring and thorough departure from previous methods.
 The Council leaders believe that no area can be really developed unless the abilities of the people are developed to the maximum. Pilot projects to do just this and to show how it can be done on a mass basis will be the first step undertaken by the Council under this grant.
 The education project will hold conferences for educators and encourage pilot programs designed to improve and enrich public education in the Appalachian South. Stay-in-school campaigns, cultural enrichment and adult education programs will be started.
 The Council will offer matching grants to schools interested in starting such programs. These will also be available for hiring emeritus status and "Peace Corps" type workers, in special areas.
 Outstanding consultants will be brought to the Appalachian South to staff conferences and seminars involving administrators, teachers and school board members.
 The research project will set up a clearinghouse service on Appalachian research. It will collect and systematize all known research, seek to correlate research plans and techniques in order to have total coverage, and will do research or encourage it in areas where knowledge is needed.
 The publication project will publish research data and other significant literature. These materials will be made available to mountain leaders and other students of the region.
 The executive committee of the board of directors will meet in Berea, November 26. The Committee on Education will meet in Atlanta on December 5, and Floyd county will be invited to take part in its next step toward its own development by its own initiative and under its own leadership.

Kentucky Now Leading in Using Federal Funds For Highway Building

Frankfort, Ky. — Kentucky has vaulted to the front in its regular federal aid highway building program.

Statistics just released by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads in Washington, D. C. show Kentucky as the only state in the nation now obligating this fiscal year federal funds for its so-called ABC or regular federal aid program. This is the program under which the state matches on a dollar for dollar basis the money apportioned by the federal government.

"This unique position of leadership means that Kentucky will get modern highways under this program at least a year sooner than it ordinarily would," according to Highway Commissioner Henry Ward. "It further means," Ward said, "that taxpayers of this state are getting immediate results from their tax dollars in the form of new, modern highways. Regardless of whether the funds are federal or state, it is the taxpayers who are paying into the various funds and they deserve to have these dollars spent as rapidly as possible for the purposes they were intended."

By obligating now federal funds which become available next year, the Highway Department can move ahead with preliminary engineering and other planning necessary for highway projects to the construction state. Immediately then, as funds become available, projects can be advertised and let to contract. Forty states are still obligating 1961 federal funds and others are still trying to match 1963 and 1962 federal funds, according to the statistics released in Washington.

Solomon W. McGuire and Thomas J. Ritchie

Two distinguished citizens of Johns Creek section a few decades ago were Solomon McGuire, landowner and banker, and Thomas J. Ritchie, Union veteran and farmer. They were brothers-in-law. McGuire was a native of Floyd county but Ritchie was born in Russell county, Va.

McGuire, born in 1850, married first Sarah Burchett and after her death, Callie Wells. He died in 1934, was buried on the family farm, but after Dewey Lake was impounded his remains were reinterred in a new family cemetery in Lawrence county. He was the father of 11 sons and daughters.

Ritchie, born in 1842, served 17 months in the Union army in the 45th Kentucky Mounted Infantry and was mustered out on account of a wound. He married Elizabeth Esther McGuire in 1869. They were the parents of four children; one daughter, Mrs. Florence McCarrell, survives.

Growth Of Town Of Allen Told In Increasing Number Of Its Telephone Patrons

The growth of Allen, Kentucky over the past 40 years can be significantly shown by comparing the number of telephones in service in 1920 (75), to those presently in operation today (527). A Guy Hisle, local manager of Southern Bell Telephone Company, told the Allen Lions Club at its regular Monday evening dinner meeting.

"Floyd county as a whole has also been part of this same spiraling growth trend, jumping from 224 telephones in 1920 to 1,874 in 1950, and finally rising to the present total of 4,486 telephones in operation in the Southern Bell system alone as of this month," Hisle added.

In constructing the new telephone plant facilities that made possible this year's portion of this growth and improvement, Mr. Hisle informed the club that more than \$215,000 had been spent in 1963 in the Prestonsburg-Painville area alone, and that over \$220,000 is in the new construction budget for 1964.

Hisle said that in the future the people can look forward to greatly improved "electronic" central offices, TV picture phones, Masers (light beam transmission of messages) and a commercial communication satellite system. All of these items, he informed the club, are presently being developed in the trial-use stages or under initial development at the Bell Telephone Laboratories in New Jersey.

Club vice-president **Harry Snodgrass** presided at the meeting, and the speaker was introduced by **Randall Allen**, President of the club.

OLDEST STATE LODGE TO OBSERVE BIRTHDAY

Lexington Lodge No. 1, F. & A. M., the oldest lodge in the state, has produced its 175th anniversary on November 23, with a banquet at the Lexington Hotel at 7 p.m. in Lexington.

In 1788—four years before Kentucky became a state—the lodge was chartered as Lexington Lodge No. 23, by the Grand Lodge of Virginia, the charter was dated November 27, 1788, and issued to "Richard C. Anderson, John Fowler, Clay Green and others to hold a regular lodge of Free Masons at the town of Lexington, in the District of Kentucky. The charter was signed by Edmund Randolph, Grand Master of Virginia and Governor of the Commonwealth in 1785-87, Colonel Richard C. Anderson, a Revolutionary War veteran and first Master of Lexington Lodge No. 23.

When the Grand Lodge of Kentucky was formed in Lexington, October 16, 1820, Lexington Lodge No. 1, F. & A. M.

The first "Masons' Hall" was a small log building at the corner of Walnut and Short streets; this was replaced by a substantial brick building in 1796; it was destroyed by fire in 1919. Henry Clay, noted statesman and Master of Ashland, in 1820, and was Grand Master in the same year. Other famous Masons of this lodge include John Bradford, founder of the Kentucky Gazette, Colonel Joseph Hamilton Davies, Robert S. Todd (father of Mrs. Abraham Lincoln), Governor John J. Crittenden, General Leslie Combs, John Perlethwait, General Clay, father of Cassius M. Green, Judge George M. Bibb, William T. Barry, Felix Grundy, John Pope, John Rowan, builder of "My Old Kentucky Home," Jesse Bledsoe, Edward West, Harry James, Dr. Frederick Rindley, and John Jordan.

When Gen. Marquis de Lafayette, a member of the Order, visited Lexington in May, 1793, he was royally entertained with a supper and dance in the Grand Masonic Hall, and a Masonic breakfast the next morning.

Through the Civil War Lexington Lodge No. 1, was strongly pro-confederate in sympathy and only one or two meetings were held during the entire war period; its lodge hall having been taken over by the federal soldiers as a prison and hospital.

There have been two Grand Masonic Halls in Lexington, occupied by Lexington Lodge No. 1; the first built in 1826, burned in 1833; the second erected in 1841 was razed in 189. The present Masonic Temple at 144 1/2 North Broadway was erected

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Absentee-Voter Ruling Is Explained by Court; Commissioner Comments

Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 14 — The legislature may limit absentee voting to citizens without violating the state and U. S. constitutions, the Court of Appeals said Friday.

Explaining a previous order invalidating the 1962 absentee-voting law, the high court said the State Constitution sets forth no limitation of legislative power on absentee voting.

"... We conclude that the legislature may select the recipients of this privilege (consisting with other requirements of the Constitution)," Associate Commissioner Beverly Woodfill said.

The 1962 law, designed to correct abuses in voting by absentee ballot, limits absentee votes to three classes of voters.

The previous law permitted anyone to vote by absentee ballot if he was required by business to be absent from his county on election day.

"Arbitrarily," Woodfill said, "those (the 1962 statutes) do not include many otherwise qualified voters who would normally be absent from the county of their residence on the day of an election."

He said, however, the classes selected by the legislature "appear to be the only large identifiable classes that accomplish the object of the legislation."

The 1962 law limits absentee voting to federal employees, full-time students, members of the armed services and merchant marine, and religious or welfare employees connected with the armed services, along with their wives and dependents.

Section 147 of the State Constitution, which says that any person absent from his home county on election day may be permitted to vote in a manner provided by law, does not necessarily mean it applies to all voters, Woodfill said.

The 1962 law was held invalid by Jefferson Circuit Judge Lawrence Crumman last month on grounds that it conferred a special privilege on a special class of voters.
