#### "Talking" Books Fill Vital Need

Blind and Physically Handicapped (LBPH).

Other favorites were Memories of Old Jack by Wendell Berry and Walter de la Mare's Stories from the Bible.

The LBPH provided 101, 858 free books and magazines on a regular basis to more than 2,000 Kentuckians last year, according to LBPH director Dena Wilson.

LBPH readers include not only blind Kentuckians, but also people with other handicapping conditions (such as cerebral palsy and stroke) that prevent them from reading or holding conventionally initied material. Figures for the 1975 fiscal year show that the most frequently used LBPH and the most requently used LBPH and the most requently used LBPH persons certified by the Library of Congress. The LBPH circulated 73,780 talking books and in-587 magazines on record last year.

Participants in the LBPH program receive record players and cassette players on enhange. They receive and return books by mail, postage free, for loan periods of one month. Some readers use catens choose to receive books selected by LBPH staff members who are familiar with the categories of books each reader enloys. The LBPH served about 150 Kentuckians with Braille material last year-llowever, for many people blindness came with old age, making it difficult for them to master Braille. "These people rely on recorded material for information and eatertainment." Mrs. Wilson said There are about 60 nursing homes on the LBPH mailing list.

What a relief and blessing it would be to parent and children alike, if the past could be lifted from the present and the old-flashinned one-room schools brought back again to teach the Jessons of morality for which they were noted.

A flick of the mind, and the massive monuments to knowledge become silent. Their frightening corridors are emptied of turbulence and crime, and the arrogant wave of delinquency loses its stig.

The mob of youngsters has broken up to assemble in small neighborhood groups, rach sharing, in the common cause of learning. Beddam has been transformed into a murmur. Descipline has ceased to be a prublem; everybody knows everybody else, and this in itself is a politicing force. The one-room schools are back in business, teaching basic truths and instilling respect for the virtues so essential to individual immail development.

The thought is but a wish, the vision but a dream, and reality gives a denial to both. Time and circumstance build new paths over the old, and there is no way of separating the one-from the other to walk the road back to the halicyton days revered in memory. The past has been used for wave the persent, just as the sum total of all our experiments makes us what we are.

Yet, there is strength to be drawn from the other to day by making yesterday a part of the past of the past of the past of the past of the sum and in the order of the past of the substitution of the past of the pas

reality. It is reality, and we live the fuller lie foods by making yesterday a part of it. If we are dissendanted by the furmful in modern education, we can insulate ourselves through reverse. McGuffey, born in 1900, was himself a college professor at Cincinnati College
and later at flow Chiversity at Athens. He was a stern disciplinarian at the
college level, practicing what he preached throughout the moral context of his
books.

At Athens, he expelled so many students that in the class of 1841 only one senior
remained to receive a dipiona.

All thems, he expelled so many students that in the class of 1841 only one senior remained to reveive a diploma. Today's revival of the McGuffey tradition is understandably limited in scope. However, the Readers are in use as textbooks in private and parochial schools in certain states, notably. Ohio, Pennsylvania and California. As in their earlier days, the books are a wonderful source for teaching reading and spelling, to say nothing of their value for establishing moral habits. The emphasis is on phonetics as opposed to the modern "word recognition," and teachers bring of how first graders can spell works which surely would stump even many of the college graduates who are being assembly-line produced today. All this business of rebirth is good. Our link to the past still holds, and should modern public school educators finally admit their failures, the old one-room school awasts and the McGuffer, Readers are ready.



Natural Bridge has excited Americans since long before the days of Daniel Boone; the area is full of Indian relicis, shelters and burial grounds, it has been estimated that the formation of this physics natural arch took more than a million years.

Natural Bridge forms an arch with an opening 78 feet in length and 65 feet high. There are more than 15 million pounds of rock in suspension, supported by 760 immense abutments. The rock at the center of the arch is 40 feet thick and 30 feet wide at the top; and flat enough to actually serve as a bridge.

The ewe from the bridge is of the magnificent Daniel Boone National Forest. The surroundings are actually what makes this bridge so much more interesting than other similar natural arch structures, notably in Kentucky, Virginia and Utah.

The area was originally owned by the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, and was a very nopular excursion trip around the time of the century, It was turned over to the state about 1926, with the intention that State ownership and more intensive improvements would give the park the place it deserved in the ranks of national playgrounds.

It was among the first Kentucky State Parks and retains the honor of being one of the most popular State Resort Parks even today.



Frankfort, Ky.—How Kentucky students and their teachers react in case of tornado, flood, fire or other emergency may well depend on a program being carried out by the state Department of

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



## **School Bus Accidents Fewer**

Frankfort, Ky.—Despite the fact that there are more school buses on Kentucky roads each year, the number of school bus accidents continues to decrease, according to Paul Jones, director of pupil transportation for the state Department of Education.

Kentucky transports 450,000 pupils each school day—67 per cent of the total enrollment.

Appearing on the Department of Education radio program "Education Speaks," Jones credited Kentucky's good safety record to four factors: "better trained drivers, better school bus equipment, improved roadways and greater awareness of school buses by other motorists."

Each summer the Department of Education holds training sessions for school bus drivers around the state. These sessions train new drivers and help experienced drivers keep up with new laws, regulations and school bus safety features.

"Kentucky buys the best in school bus

"Kentucky was the first to use 12-ply

Jones said Kentucky helps to hold the

alike," Jones said.

Due to this standardization, Kentucky 
pays about \$2,250 less per school bus than 
a neighboring state does for buses with 
comparable specifications.



# 10% of Assaults Made on Police

Made on Police

Frankfort, Ky.—Ten per cent of all assaults reported in Kentucky in 1974 were against state and local police officers.

According to the recently released state police Uniform Crime Report (UCR) for 1974, 382 of the 3.824 reported assaults were against plone officers. That figure, however, was a drop of four from the 1973 count.

County police officers continue to be the most frequently assaulted group—29 assaults per 100 officers, an increase of 10 per cent over 1973. The next highest rates were for police in cities of 25,000 100,000 population 22 assaults per 100 officers, up from the 1973 rate of 14.

The UCR also shows that while 26 per cent of the 382 assaults resulted in physical injury, no police officers were killed in the line of duty last year. Dr. Ephraim McDowell Home

The early home of Dr. Ephraim McDowell, proneer Kentucky surgeon and "father of abdominal surgery," was built circa 1789 on a tract of fand owned by Isaac Shelby, Kentucky's first governor and father-in-law of Dr. McDowell.

Kentucky's first governor and father-in-law of Dr. McDowell. The two-story, white clapboard house, standing on Second Street in Darville, has nine rooms, 24-paned windows, a transomed doorway and seven fireplaces. Dr. McDowell, born in Augusta County, Virignia, on November 11, 1771, was the son of Samuel McDowell, one of the judges of the first Kentucky court in 1783 and president of the convention that framed the first Constitution of Kentucky. Epiharim McDowell studied medicine at the University of Edinburgh, 1792-93. He settled in Danville three years later and became the foremost surgeon west of the Allegheny Mountains.

Here on Christmas Day, 1809, Dr. McDowell successfully removed a 20-pound ovarian tumor from Mrs. Jane Todd Crawford of Green Country, The operation lasted about 25 minutes without the benefit of an

anesthetic. The doctor had improvised an operating room in his house. The patient was partially dressed and conscious of every movement. To restain any involuntary muscle movements, men held her arms and legs with force. During the operation she repeated the Psalms. Dr. McDowell's 45 year-old patient survived the operation by more than 32

45-year-old patient survived the operation by more than 32 - years.

In 1795, Dr. Ephraim McDowell and Dr. Adam Rankin opened an apothecary shop in the brick building adjoining the house, and it was used by their successors until 1856, when the property was purchased by the Methodist Church for use as a parsonage.

Dr. McDowell practiced medicine in Danville until his death in June 1830; he was buried with his wife at Traveller's Rest, the Isaac Shelby estate six miles south of twen.





The ferry operators, John and Len Dill, had Lincoln arrested for infringing on their rights. The case — Commonwealth of Kentucky vs. Abraham Lincoln — was tried in the east room of the log house before Squire Samuel Pate, the presiding justice. The testimony failed to show that Lincoln had ever set any person "over" or "across" any river or creek. He had, as Lincoln testfied himself, taken passengers to the middle of the river, and no farther.

#### Nature Trails By Rufus M. Reed

Soik is the most important thing on planet earth, and nature has countless helpers and infinite processes for building soil and renewing I. A group of students and I made a special study of the leaf mold of the forest tleaf mold is the "mother of soil"). We peeled off a large slab of leaf mold from the forest floor; we called it "the primeval mother of all life on earth." The underside of the leaf mold was turning white—the work of fungi, which help to change the fallen leaves back to soil. We discover many tay mushrooms growing change the latien leaves back to soil. We discover many tany mushrooms growing on the leaf mold; they are shaped like little parasols, and the students call them, "the parasols of the wood nymhs." We learn that these small mushrooms feed on dead leaves and help to reduce them to home.

We find coutless life organisms living in the leaf mold all of them nature's helpers in changing leaf litter to soil Among the tiny creatures living in the leaf mold, we find roundworms, ter-mites, earthworms, millipedes, cen tipedes, ants, snails and bugs. #### Miracle of Soil-Building

Miracle of Soil-Building there was also a great number of there was also a great number of microscopic things living in the leaf mold such as protozon bacteria, molds and others. These help to set up chemical changes for converting all animal and vegetable matter to soil.

We soon see that the rich, black soil of the forest is a highly complex thing, compesed of billions of decayed organisms, rotted leaves, twigs, countless dead bodies, wastes of animal matter—all this forming a trick layer of humus beneath the leaf mold. We now examine a section of the humus under the leaf mold, and find it to be the home of many small creature, such as snails, millipedes, larvae of beetles, centpedes, spiders, toads, ants, salamanders and angleworms. These are nature's helpers in building the soil. The anture's helpers in building the soil. The angleworms alone make many tons of new soil yearly on a single acre. The ants also work together to plough the soil, to drill it full of holes to let in oxygen and nitrouen.

Here we note an endiess cycle of nature. The green leaves do their work of photosynthesis and make the food to build the trees. Their work is for one brief summer, then in autumn they change color, fade and die, to fall to the forest floor. Their work then is just beginning, they return to the soil all their elements to help nourish future trees and plants. We note the leaf mold is always moist under the trees; it is truly a sponge that soaks up moisture and retains it. Thus it prevents the rapid run off of rainfall and keeps the soil from washing down. Next we look at some fallen logs and old stumps. We lear the rotten ones apart and find them filled with life forms, such as bessybugs, wireworms, mice, shrews, ant nests, termite colonies, which chew up and digest the cellulose inwood and pass it out as a residue to mix with the soil and help to enrich it. We also note that this forest, with its thick bed of leaf mold has been stable and self-sustaining for centuries: it changes a little every day but remains forever the same, We find a number of old moss-covered stumps, indicating that some of the large yell-woods have been cut her to the property of the property Ken Ducky /ez: Men have not yet vandalized this for-est by tearing it up with buildozers; so est by tearing it up with buildozers, so life goes on uninterrupted and fills the endless cycles of nature. 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

While most recreation sites within the 640,000-acre forest will reopen next spring, three sites will be permanently closed. They are the Auger Springs and Indian Trail plenic areas in Laurel county and Hemick Grove picnic area, in McCreary county.

About a dozen areas will temporarily closes, including eight camping sites on Lake Cumberland.


