## Man, wife die when car, truck collide

A Floyd County couple died Wednesday afternoon after their automobile collided with a coal truck on Route 114 at Middle Creek.

According to a report filed Wednesday by the Pikeville Post of the Kentucky State Police, Eula Mae Huppert, 73, of Prestonsburg, drove her vehicle out of the Compton's Grocery parking lot on Route 114 directly into the path of a fully loaded coal truck driven by Donald Sturgill, Sturgill, 42, of Pound, Virginia, was unable to stop in time and struck the Huppert vehicle. Both vehicles careened into the east-bound lane and struck a guard rail. Sturgill's truck went over the hill, knocking over a utility pole.

Huppert's passenger, her husband, John W. Huppert, 65, was pronounced dead at the scene by Floyd County Coroner Roger E. Nelson. Eula Huppert was removed from the vehicle by members of the Floyd County Emergency and Rescue Squad and was transported to the Highlands Regional Medical Center, where she later died of injuries suffered in the wreck.

Sturgill apparently suffered only minor injuries. Responding to the scene were members of the Pikeville Post of the Kentucky State Police; the Floyd County Sheriff's office; the Middle Creek Volunteer Fire Department; and the Rural Electric Company Cooperative.

The accident is still under investigation by the Kentucky State Police.

## Verdict returned in PCC rape case

A Floyd County Jury found a Johnson County man guilty Thursday of the attempted rape of a Prestonsburg Community College student last year on the school's campus.

Romie Adams, 60, of Nippa, who was an usher at the Upper Room Church in Paintsville, was convicted of first degree criminal attempt to commit rape after a two-day trial in Floyd County Circuit Court which included graphic and surprising testimony.

The jury recommended Adams be sentenced to a nine-year prison term. Adams' conviction apparently will be appealed by David Williams, with the Department of Public Advocacy, who mentioned to the court that there were "several appealable" issues in the case.

Both sides in the case gave completely different versions of the incident: the prosecution claimed that the victim was brutally raped; the defense claimed the two participants were acting out the victim's fantasy. The victim, a Johnson County

woman who was a student at the college, testified that Adams grabbed her from behind as she was leaving the campus on the evening of April 4, 1991.

The woman said Adams dragged her over an embankment, gagged her and tied her hands in front of her with a piece of rope. She testified Adams ripped her clothes off and attempted to have sex with her in various positions.

She said she recognized Adams because she knew him from church (See Trial, page three)

Caudill was informed this week by the Administrative Office of the Court (AOC) that he has been assigned to temporarily preside over the Letcher County Circuit Court.

Retired Floyd Circuit Judge Hollie Conley, who was assigned to Letcher County when that county's judge was indicted, asked to be relieved from his duties due to family health problems.

Letcher Circuit Judge Larry Collins was indicted last year for allegedly offering protection to drug dealers in exchange for money and drugs. Collins was suspended from his duties by AOC pending the disposition of the case.

Judge Caudill, who will be presiding

in Letcher County three days a week, said he foresees no problems in his assignment and that he is looking forward to the job.

School improvement standards established :

## Lines drawn for progress

The starting lines have been drawn, and a 20-year race for educational improvement is on in Kentucky schools, where the stakes are high for those unable to keep the pace.

Test scores released Wednesday by the state Department of Education will serve as the baseline for improving education in Kentucky and they suggest some schools will have to travel a wider circuit if they are to meet state goals.

The formula for measuring success is fairly simple. Schools are expected to attain test scores of 100 points over a period of 20 years. Scores from 1992 testing serve as the starting point, and the difference between that number and the goal of 100 points must be made up in ten percent increments every two years.

For example: - A school which received a base line score of 30 from 1992 testing needs to improve by 70 points over 20 years to reach the 100 point goal. Ten percent of 70 is seven, so test scores must improve by seven points every two years...to 37 in 1994, 44 by 1996, etc. Those improvement goals are called "thresholds."

Once thresholds are set, an accountability process takes over. Schools which exceed their scoring goals qualify for cash rewards which can be used however teachers and administrators decide.

Schools which fall short of the threshold goal must develop improvement plans approved by the state.

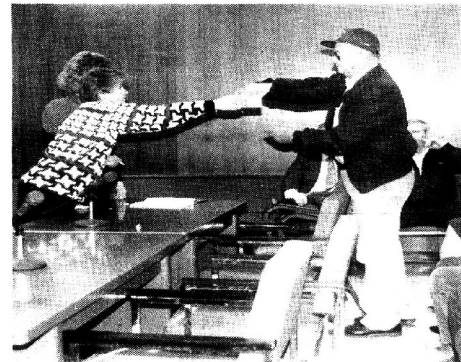
Schools which fall behind their original baseline will be assigned an assistance team of teachers and administrators from a pool known as Kentucky Distinguished Educators.

Schools which fall way behind, five percent or more below their baseline, will be considered schools in crisis. All teachers and administrators of that school will be placed on probation, students will be allowed to transfer to other schools and a Kentucky Distinguished Educator will be assigned to the school with the power to pursue the dismissal of any

teacher or administrator. State officials have stressed that test scores should not be used to compare one school against another, but to measure the progress of individual schools.

The accompanying chart shows baseline scores for Floyd County schools and the threshold scores they are expected to attain on 1994 tests.

## Floyd deputies kept at bay in Knott County barricade

A Knott County woman reportedly held Kentucky State Police and Floyd County Sheriff's deputies at bay with a shotgun for nearly five hours Saturday when they tried to serve her with an arrest warrant in a criminal suit caused by what one woman calls "a case of fatal attraction."

Floyd County Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson said Thursday that two Floyd County deputies and members of the Hazard Post of the Kentucky State Police attempted to arrest Henrietta Crigger on three counts of telephone communications harassment Saturday at her Chaffins' Branch home in Knott County.

Crigger then barricaded herself in

the house with a shotgun and refused to come out.

Eventually, Thompson said, the Kentucky State Police special response team was called in, and Crigger surrendered at her family's urging.

Also on the scene were Knott County sheriff's deputies and District Two Constable Bob Backworth.

Crigger was charged with one count of second-degree wanton endangerment and one count of resisting arrest, Thompson said. She was incarcerated at the Knott County Jail and released Monday on \$2,500 bond.

Crigger was scheduled to appear in Floyd Circuit Court Monday on the harassment charges, which were filed last month by Darrell Combs, of Martin.

Combs said Thursday that Crigger

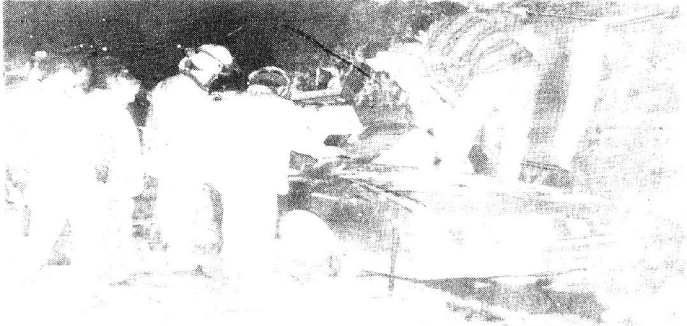
has on several occasions harassed and threatened her on the telephone. "I fear for my life and for my family," Combs said Thursday. "Restraining orders mean nothing with this woman..." She even called me from the jail after she was arrested

Scott, who divorced Crigger in 1982, said Thursday that two years ago Crigger had assaulted his previous girlfriend, striking her in the head and inflicting a wound that required several stitches.

"Every woman that I have any sort of dealings with," Scott said, "well, (Crigger) just stalks them."

"I fear for my life and for my family," Combs said Thursday. "Restraining orders mean nothing with this woman..." She even called me from the jail after she was arrested

## Lethal intersection almost claims two more unsuspecting victims

The intersection of the new Floyd County branch of U.S. 23 and Route 1428 nearly claimed two more victims Tuesday evening in the second accident at that site in less than a month.

According to a report filed by Deputy Sergeant Lloyd Powers of the Floyd County Sheriff's office, Matthew Mullins, 19, of Jenkins, was apparently driving south on U.S. 23

at an unsafe speed, failed to stop at the intersection, and crashed into a rock wall.

Both Mullins and a passenger, Sam Bentley, 24, of Virgie, were seriously injured. The men were taken to Highlands Regional Medical Center.

Bentley was air-lifted to Saint Mary's Hospital in Huntington, West Virginia, where he remains in critical condition. Mullins was transferred to Humana Hospital at Louisa for orthopedic care.

Responding to the scene were members of the Floyd County Emergency and Rescue Squad; the Floyd County Sheriff's office; the Pikeville Post of the Kentucky State Police; and the P&B and Respond ambu-

lance services.

The accident is still under investigation.

According to Powers' report, Mullins did not know that the roadway came to a dead stop despite the presence of stop signs and flashing caution lights, which were installed earlier this month after a North Carolina man died in a crash at the same site just before New Year's Eve.

James Howard Brewer, 34, of Seagrove, North Carolina, was killed Wednesday, December 30 when he failed to stop at the intersection and crashed into the rock wall.

That accident is still under investigation by officers of the Pikeville Post of the Kentucky State Police.

County Executive Director Sharon Conley of the local ASCS offices said Thursday. The reason for the confusion, Conley said, may be that the Floyd and Knott County ASCS offices were officially combined in

1986, so that when and if the Knott County branch closes, the Floyd County branch will as well.

Although there are about 400 farms listed as being in Floyd County, Conley said, the Floyd County office is considered a sub-office and is open on Wednesdays only.

She added that Madigan has yet to implement the ASCS office closures, recommended by a joint USDA/Office of Management and Budget review team.

"At this time," Conley said, "we just don't know what's going on.... We heard the earlier rumors about the proposed cuts, but nothing has been done.... All I can say is that we're open until further notice."

Thursday. "I was excited about becoming a judge and Letcher County is no different than Floyd County. I want to get the docket under control and get those cases disposed of and decided. I don't foresee any problems at all."

Caudill will go to Letcher County Tuesday to become familiar with the docket and to get his office organized. The judge added that he, like Conley, will not schedule any criminal trials until after a special grand jury meets next month.

A special judge from Fayette County will preside over the deliberations of the special grand jury which is expected to hear testimony relating to alleged criminal activity involving county government officials.

## Housing Authority lauded for keeping expenses low

In these trying times of ever-soaring federal debt and government overspending, the Prestonsburg Housing Authority offers a breath of fresh air... the department of Housing and Urban Development says it hasn't been spending enough.

Housing Authority Executive Director Julia May addressed members of the Housing Authority board Wednesday at a special budget meeting. May told board members that she and her staff had been advised by HUD agents to spend about \$30,000 worth of reserve funds so that the Housing Authority does not lose them.

Board members voted unanimously to approve May's proposed

operating budget for the 1993-94 fiscal year.

Among other items discussed at Wednesday's meeting:

- the board voted unanimously to write-off uncollectible accounts totaling \$2,084.08.
- May said that HUD officials had stressed a "family self-sufficiency" program for tenants. She added that she and her staff were investigating training courses in the program, as well as revenue sources to pay for them.

- The Housing Authority voted to issue a special proclamation to Prestonsburg Mayor Ann Latta thanking her for meritorious service.

- The position of Housing Authority deputy director will be changed to a full-time position.

Only Mayor Ann Latta was absent from Wednesday's meeting.

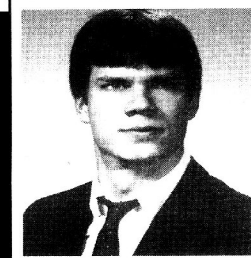
Saturday.

Combs said that Crigger blames the episodic behavior and threatens the phone calls on a near-diabetic condition that she claims causes her to behave irrationally if her blood sugar level gets too low. The Floyd County jailer's log indicates that Crigger was taken to Highlands Regional Medical Center for medical treatment during a previous incarceration for failure to appear in court

on the harassment charges.

Although Crigger has not made any more threatening calls since the weekend, Combs said, she fears the situation is not yet resolved.

"I have been inside my house now since before Thanksgiving being stalked by this woman. I've done everything legal and taken it through the courts step by step, and now this woman is out again walking the streets."

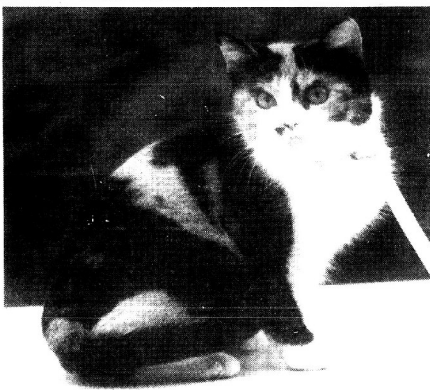

and that his ex-wife was her best friend.

After the incident, the woman crawled up the embankment, across the parking lot toward the Johnson Building on the college campus where police found her, she testified.

The woman said she had loaned Adams money to send to his ex-wife in Indiana and on another occasion, money to send to his stepdaughter in Florida. She said Adams repaid some of the money by letting her use his credit card to purchase gas and for car repairs.

Prestonsburg City police officer Ricky Conn testified that he found the woman, hysterical, bound and gagged, near the Johnson Building.

Kentucky State Police Detective Lynn Cross and Prestonsburg policemen Greg Hall, Roy Roberts and Jeff Stumbo arrested Adams the next day near his home at Hager Hill.

Cross testified that the officers took Adams to his home, at his request, to feed his dogs. Cross said Adams consented to a search of his home where officers found a shirt which had been cut and parts of the shirt used for the gag. Officers also recovered muddy, grass-stained clothing the man said he wore the night of the incident.

Adams, who testified on his own behalf, claimed the woman had asked him to meet her on the college campus to carry out a sexual fantasy.

"I loved her, I cared for her," Adams testified. "What she wanted to do, I'd do. I wanted her to be my companion. I wanted her to be with me."

Adams said the two "laid" in the grass near the college for about 20 minutes and that he attempted to have

sex with the woman, but that he was "too scared." He said the woman said, "Romie run" and he left her. He testified that he went back to the scene because he had lost his car keys and wallet.

He testified that the woman helped him search the area for his keys and wallet and when the items were found he left her at the scene.

During cross-examination by Commonwealth Attorney Jerry Patton, Adams said the two were supposed to meet at his house after the incident at the college.

"Weren't you worried when she didn't show up?" Patton asked.

"Sure," Adams said. "I got her some Diet Pepsi and a pizza because she was supposed to meet me at the house. I sat home and (ate) some pizza."

"You were worried about her, so you sat home and (ate) pizza?" Patton asked.

"Sure, I was hungry," Adams answered.

Adams also testified that the woman had asked him for money on various occasions prior to the incident and promised him "dates" after he had given her money. He said the two had engaged in graphic phone conversations about sex and that on one occasion she wanted money to purchase a "sex kit," which included a pornographic movie. Adams said he had previously purchased X-rated movies at Wal-Mart.

In closing arguments, Adams' attorney, Sid Trivette, argued that the two had a "weak mind, strong mind" relationship and that the two needed each other for different reasons. Trivette said that with Adams' interest in religion, he could have pur-

chased an R-rated or PG-rated movie at Wal-Mart and it could've been, in his opinion, pornographic.

"In no way am I suggesting that they are selling X-rated movies at Wal-Mart," Trivette said. "He's not the most educated or perceptive person I've seen. He can be led down a path to disaster. After that, anything could happen."

Patton argued that Adams' account of the relationship was "beyond comprehension."

"What he sold you today was a fantasy," Patton said. "Never, never in my greatest imagination had I ever given any thought to what he sold you today. Above all, this man testified that he belonged to the church and he engages in something like this. That's sick. It's beyond comprehension."

"To leave her bound and gagged on the creek bank and go home and eat pizza is so ridiculous I don't want to make this argument," Patton continued. "That is a very, very troubled man who has fantasized the whole thing."

The jury deliberated an hour and 35 minutes before returning the verdict.

Formal sentencing has been set for Friday, February 5.

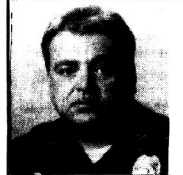

Taxpayers who visit the local office can receive answers to their tax questions and obtain guidance in the preparation of individual tax returns. Tax forms and IRS publication are also available.

William E. Palzkil, district director for IRS in Kentucky, said taxpayers

who come to the local offices for assistance with their returns should bring the tax package received in the mail, all W-2 forms, interest and dividend statements, and any other information supporting claims for tax credits or adjustments to income.

In addition, Palzkil said that taxpayers may want to use the free IRS telephone service to get answers to their federal tax questions. Taxpayers may call the IRS toll-free telephone number 1-800-829-1040 during regular business hours from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

While the state legislature waits for Governor Brereton Jones to submit his Plan B for health care reform (Plan A sleeps with the fishes) and some proponents of reform say the state should wait for Congress to act, Senator Benny Ray Bailey has been stitching together his own plan.

mediate rate-setting on services, and it addresses a growing need for medical service in rural Kentucky by requiring medical students to spend 30 weeks per year in the field.

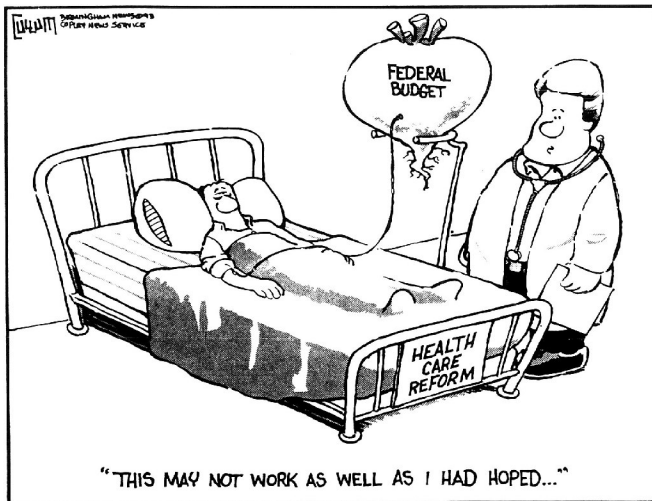
We've seen only a summary of Bailey's proposal, so we'll reserve final judgment on it's worth.

## Straightening the road issue

The mountain counties have made advances in roadbuilding over the last 20 years. But look what we've got. U.S. 23 is still not four-laned through Pike County, and we can't predict when it will be. We've still got a big gap of hazardous and steep roadway on U.S. 119 that effectively lops off part of

the county. In the vast midsection of Pike County, roads are barely wide enough for a compact car and a coal truck to pass each other.

From Campton east, how can they call Mountain Parkway a parkway? Ditto for the Daniel Boone Parkway. You won't find less than four lanes on the Bluegrass Parkway or the Western Parkway or any of the others.

The last thing in the world any of us in this region expect or want is a six-lane highway to the capital. What we need are a few good four-laned highways to help us develop economically, and we need a bunch of good two-laned roads just so we can get to work and back without feeling we're on the brink of disaster.

Get in touch with U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers, Lt. Gov. Paul Patton, and Gov. Brereton Jones. Inundate the phone lines at the Department of Transportation. Urge those decision-makers to reroute that money for six-laning I-64 back this way. Don't beat around the bush. Tell them we need that road money, we deserve it and we won't hush 'til we get it. —Condensed editorial from *Appalachian News-Express*

## Clinton should keep promises

Bill Clinton's campaign pledge to end welfare as we know it is one promise that he can keep.

And he should keep it. Trimming the welfare rolls is a worthy goal. The savings should not be measured in dollars and cents alone, but in the independence and self-respect of those now on the dole.

Reforms should begin with unwed, teen-age mothers.

Getting off welfare isn't easy. Giving birth interrupts, if not ends, many teens' quest for a high school education.

They lack the basic work habits their peers acquire in part-time, after-school employment. Also, it would keep idle hands busy and away from drug abuse and other self-defeating behavior.

SPECIAL ORDERS COULD BE CURTAILED

Majority Democrats in the House of Representatives are threatening to narrow a window where Americans can see the full-flowered looniness that passes for official congressional business.

Unless they're turned around before Congress convenes, Democratic leaders may trim the time allotted at the close of each day's session when members can speak on "special orders" into the wee hours of morning, until they run dry.

The tradition, which began a few years ago when C-SPAN, the cable network, started coverage of house proceedings, allows any member—ordinarily under tight time restrictions in routine House deliberations—to yammer on about anything, sometimes even making serious sense.

House members, especially minority Republicans, saw the political advantage of making speeches on the House floor to C-SPAN's national TV audience while appearing to command the rapt attention of the nation's largest legislative body.

Actually, the House is almost always an empty cavern during "special orders" and, because former Democratic House Speaker Tip O'Neill once got fed up with Republican sniping, the emptiness looms large on after-hours C-SPAN.

O'Neill, in an order that still stands, said the TV cameras should swing around the chamber every once in a while to show the huge hall and acres of empty seats as "special orders" speakers drone on.

The latest Democratic fit of pique, the pending decision to curtail "special orders," is blamed on the antics of Rep. Robert Dornan, R-Calif., Congress' reigning zerk-do, and collector of patriotic derring-do, items which usually feature Dornan himself.

Prior to the congressional adjournment in October, Dornan captivated the conservative—and, to its regret, the Bush White House—with a series of manic speeches directed at the presidential candidacy of Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton.

All the Dornan speeches were intended—or seemingly intended—to show that Clinton was not only a liar and a draft-dodger during the Vietnam war but, possibly, a young man who betrayed his own country to the Soviets.

Democrats, obviously unappreciative of the pure wackiness and psychic wonder of Dornan's performances, were upset and still are that the president-elect took such a verbal lashing in the guise of patriotism. The move against "special orders" was viewed as a muzzle, at least partly intended for Dornan.

Dornan's lectures on Clinton were certainly political attacks. But he had the giddy rush of a wild ride on a runaway freight train: bits of history speeding past in a blur of good and evil, alarms ringing, drums rolling, wars fought, good men betrayed, heroes dying—and Dornan hammering it all together, as if to demolish Clinton's candidacy in a fit of patriotic fervor.

Reciting his suspicions that Clinton, as a Rhodes scholar in England, might have become a Soviet operative while on a visit to Moscow, Dornan, in his nightly speeches, kept recalling a world trip of his own about the same time.

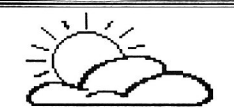

## Regional News Briefs

### 'Airport manager, board at odds over road

The road leading to the Big Sandy Regional airport has become unsafe due to the mud created by coal trucks hauling to and from Raven Mine, the airport manager James Mineer said. Mineer threatened to file a lawsuit if the problem is not corrected within a month. The mine superintendent said he couldn't afford to wash the road. Airport board members then passed a motion that Mineer not be allowed to act as a representative of the airport when contacting any governmental agency. —Paintsville Herald

### Teacher's lawsuit seeks \$350,000

A former Lawrence County middle school teacher has filed a \$350,000 federal civil rights suit against the school system, the superintendent and her principal. Jennifer Justice, 46, of Blaine claims she was not rehired after the close of the 1992 school year because she earlier had complained about grading procedures, the system's failure to comply with state regulations and misappropriation of federal funds. —The Paintsville Herald

### HIV-infected student urged to switch courses

A state school official told the parents of an HIV-infected student their son should drop cosmetology because of his illness and even offered to get him a home computer so he could switch fields, court documents show.

Donnie Jones, 19, of Perry County, claimed in a federal lawsuit filed in May that he was threatened with expulsion from the Hazard Vocational Technical School. He said the threat by Finley Begley, southeast regional director for the state Board for Adult and Technical Education, came because Jones was infected with the virus that causes AIDS.

Begley has denied he threatened to expel Jones. But in a deposition, filed January 19, in U.S. District Court, Begley acknowledged discussing a course change with Jones' parents during a visit to their home November 1, 1991.

Under questioning from Jones' attorney, E. Douglas Richards, Begley acknowledged he was not aware of any health guidelines suggesting HIV-infected persons not perform such work. Donnie Jones quit school November 4, 1991, but Begley denied claims that he gave the parents until that date to persuade their son to leave cosmetology. But Margaret Jones, in a deposition also filed January 19, said that was exactly what happened.

"It's put it like this," she said. "He told us that he could run an interlude for Donnie to give me and my husband one week to, you know, get Donnie to change to computers or some other class. But he also stated as of 4 o'clock Monday evening, November 4, that he would have to step in."

"It's hard for me to think I'd do that," Begley said in his deposition of the deadline. The discrimination case, which court officials have said could be the first in Kentucky involving HIV, is scheduled for a non-jury trial May 26. —Lexington Herald-Leader

### Boons Camp man charged with sex crimes in Ohio

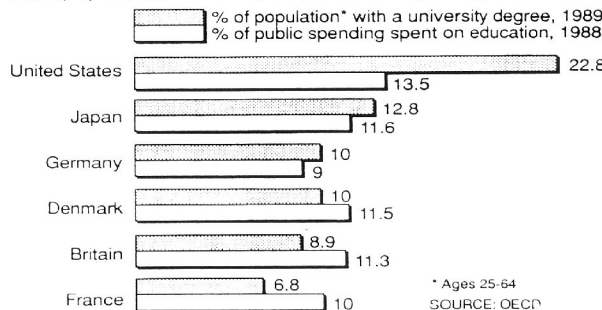

### Senate makes Ford's Motor-Voter Bill a top priority for action this year

The National Voter Registration Act of 1993, commonly referred to as the "Motor-Voter bill," was introduced in the Senate January 21 by Majority Whip Wendell Ford. As the second item introduced in the Senate for the 103rd Congress, the "motor-voter" bill immediately became a top priority for passage this session.

The bill is the same legislation which passed the House and Senate in the 102nd Congress, but fell short of overriding the Presidential veto. President Clinton has endorsed the measure and indicated his intention to sign it into law upon passage by Congress.

Among the highlights:  
•States will allow voting registration with the application for a driver's license; by mail and in person at appropriate state and federal agencies;

•Approximately 90 percent of eligible voters will be registered;

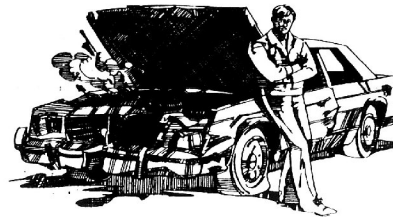
•Federal criminal penalties will apply for voter fraud;  
•Effective date is January 1, 1995, for all states.

University, February 13, and Georgetown College, February 20. The students are competing for a total of \$68,000 in scholarships that may be used at any Kentucky college, university, or post-secondary educational institution.

The Academic Showcase has competitions in: Art, 2-D and 3-D; Music, vocal and instrumental; Journalism, feature writing; English, essay and creative writing; Speech; Computer; Mathematics; and Chess. All competitions are individual except for math and computer, which are team events. Competitions are judged by university faculty and professionals.

First through fourth-place winners on the regional level receive plaques and an opportunity to go to the state finals to vie for college scholarships. Individual students who win first place on the state level will receive \$2,000 scholarships; second place, \$1,200; third, \$850; and fourth, \$600. Team members who are state winners each receive \$1,350 for first place; \$950 for second; \$650 for third; and \$400 for fourth.

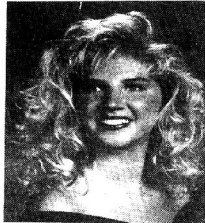
Trophies are also awarded to state winners. In addition, the high school of each state winner will receive \$1,000 to be used for the school's academic programs.

**BENEFITS AFFECTED BY JAIL TERMS:** A reader says he's facing a possible felony conviction, and wanted to be assured that he'll continue to receive his compensation benefits if he goes to prison.

Unfortunately, I can't provide such assurance. The fact is, as recently as September, 1992, the VA reaffirmed its position that compensation benefits may not be paid in excess of certain amounts for any person incarcerated in a federal, state, or local penal institution for conviction of a felony. Beginning on the 61st day of incarceration, vets rated 20 percent or more are limited to 10 percent; veterans rated less than 20 percent are limited to half of the 10 percent rate.

Dependents may have the right to an apportionment while the beneficiary is incarcerated. Any apportionments will be discontinued, and full benefits restored upon release, or upon participation in a work-release or halfway house program.

### SENIORS TARGETED AGAIN

People who make their living shaving a few corners off their ethics apparently find seniors the most "rewarding" targets of their often misleading and frequently fraudulent schemes. As I've said in this column many times, it's not that seniors are naturally gullible. Rather, seniors tend to be shrewd in business deals, that is, if they're dealing on a one-to-one, aboveboard basis. However, that's not always the case. Many seniors who tend to be a little more trusting than they could be, too often write checks before checking things out.

One of the "deals" that is aimed at the senior market involves so-called "inside tips" to government giveaways of surplus property. You may have seen the headlines on the advertisements for publications that promise to reveal secret information on how to get on these fabulous deals: "Drug raid seizures! Dirt cheap." Or,

"Government homes for \$1." Or, "... for \$4." However, as the Consumer Information Center points out, while these ad headlines may make you think the government is practically giving away surplus property, confiscated vehicles, or seized real estate, etc., that just isn't true. Also, you don't need to buy any publication promising "inside" tips on how to learn about "secret" government sales. For one thing, the sales aren't secret. For another, you can get information free of charge on when and where sales will be held, what is being offered, how to buy, where to get more details, and other useful tips in a booklet called "The U.S. General Services Administration Guide to Federal Government Sales." For your free copy, send your name and address to Federal Sales Guide, Pueblo, Colo. 81009. When you look through your free guide, you won't find any

"pay-next-to-nothing" deals promised in the ads, because they don't exist. The government must sell at fair market value.

A further note: Those guides or catalogs being offered for sale can cost \$20 to over \$100. Also note that if you reply by phone to their 900 number, make sure you state how much you'll be charged per minute. Also be wary of attempts to keep you on the line longer than necessary. And, be wary if they insist on sending the publication via UPS or other private carrier. This enables them to avoid investigation by the U.S. Postal Service for sending fraudulent materials through the mail.

When you send for the "...Guide to Federal Government Sales," you'll also get a free copy of the Consumer Information Catalog which is updated quarterly. It lists more than 200 free and low-cost publications available on a wide variety of subjects.

## VA questions and answers

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Following are representative questions answered daily by VA Counselors. Full information is available at any VA Office.

**Q—**Is the VA claim number the same as veteran's social security number?

**A—**A veteran who filed an initial benefit claim before 1974 will have a VA claim number. A veteran who filed after 1974 generally will be identified by his or her social security number.

**Q—**My VA pension is being deposited directly into my bank account. How do I get the direct deposit changed to my new bank?

**A—**Ask your new bank to complete a new SF-1199A, Direct Deposit Sign-up Form, and send it to your VA Regional Office. Be sure not to close your account at the old bank until the direct deposit starts at your new bank. It should take between 30 and 60 days for the change to take effect.

**Q—**I was recently separated from the military under the Special Separation Benefit (SSB) incentive plan. I also was determined to be 30 percent disabled by VA. Does the SSB payment affect the compensation I will be getting from VA?

**A—**The SSB will be because, in most instances, VA must recoup the SSB payment. The only instance where this does not happen is when a veteran previously received compensation for a disability incurred during a period of service prior to the period of service used to compute the SSB payment.

**Q—**I have been in the Army Reserve since 1989. Am I entitled to payments under the Montgomery GI Bill (Selected Reserve) for attendance at a vocational welding school?

**A—**You may be eligible for this type of training. However, you will need to provide evidence that, since October 1, 1991, you have not re-enlisted or extended your enlistment to have six years of obligated service remaining after the re-enlistment or extension is signed.

### Clara Barton: Healing the Wounds

In the Declaration of Independence Thomas Jefferson asserted as a "self-evident truth" that "all men are created equal." This "truth," however, did not encompass women. Nowhere, either in Europe or the new nation of the United States, were women treated equally with men. Their place was thought to be the home—in the kitchen or the nursery. This sphere of influence could occasionally extend to the church or schoolroom. Certainly women did not have equal opportunities in politics. Nor did they achieve even a hope for equality in that realm until 1920, when they won the right to vote.

The situation for women began to change in the 19th century, particularly in education and religion and, more gradually, in nursing. In Europe, almost all teachers were men, but in the United States women slowly replaced men as teachers, and—by the time Clara Barton was born, in 1821—it was taken for granted that the majority of teachers in the schools were women.

Young Clara Barton was one of these women. She was a school teacher at 16 and, in one way or another, continued to teach for the rest of her life. By her time, especially in New England, women had begun to take charge of education. Margaret Fuller gave lectures to women on their rights and Elizabeth Peabody introduced the kindergarten from Germany. Young Clara Barton was determined to carve out a career for herself as well.

Eventually Barton grew weary of teaching. For some years she had nursed an invalid brother, and now she wanted to become a nurse. The Civil War gave her a more than ample opportunity. She hurried to Washington, where she helped organize medical support for the army. But Barton was not content with administration. After considerable effort, she obtained permission to nurse wounded soldiers at the actual scene of the fighting. From that point on Barton did much of her nursing on the battlefields. When medicine and supplies ran out, she had recourse to New England towns, many of which responded lavishly to her appeals. In recognition of her services, she was appointed superintendent of nurses.

After Appomattox and the end of the war, Barton went abroad. In Europe, she nursed the wounded on both sides in the Franco-Prussian War, and was honored by kings and emperors for her contributions.

Barton's experience abroad introduced her to the newly-organized International Red Cross, with headquarters in Switzerland. This set the stage for her greatest achievement. Back in her own country she set out to persuade congressmen and senators to commit the United States to join the Red Cross. Inevitably, she was appointed president of the American branch of the organization, and created policy for Red Cross aid in war as well as in domestic disasters. In her old age, she helped establish the American Woman's Suffrage Association, and, not content with that, the Woman's International Peace Association.

In all these activities, Barton was a kind of combination of England's Florence Nightingale and America's Julia Ward Howe, the blending of nursing skill and compassion with the desire to uplift and to educate.

Mitchell stated she was very pleased with the efforts of her students. The students were very creative and conscientious. They spent much time completing a project that taught them as much about themselves and their community as the topic itself.

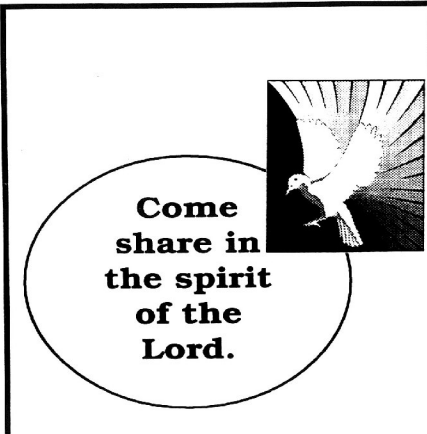

NEWS OF THE WEIRD

A state appeals court in Santa Ana, Calif., upheld a lower court in December by granting Sheryl Ulyate an increase in child support payments from her ex-husband for their 15-year-old daughter, from \$2,000 a month to \$6,000 a month.

FETISHES ON PARADE

Last winter, Fort Worth, Texas, police stopped a car that had been the subject of reports that a bound and gagged blond woman had been spotted in the passenger seat.

In May, Kenosha, Wis., police arrested a 40-year-old, heavy-set man inside a women's restroom at the University of Wisconsin-Parkside, charging him with disorderly conduct.

In July, a Jackson Center, Pa., woman reported that someone used a ladder to climb into the second story of her home and that apparently all

that was missing was \$10 worth of diapers, despite the presence of jewelry and antiques in the same room as the diapers.

In August, Baton Rouge, La., police charged Redmond McGee, 25, with breaking into a woman's house to burglarize it and brushing her hair against her will.

In Toms River, N.J., William Radice Jr., 20, pleaded guilty in November to forcing a woman to take off one of her black loafers and give it to him. He had accosted her in her driveway as she was unloading groceries.

PET PROJECTS

A civilian dog in Knoxville, Tenn., came home in December carrying in his mouth a bag of cocaine with a street value of \$16,000.

London's Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons in November announced guidelines to discourage vets from routinely shortening dogs' tails, especially poodles' and bulldogs'. About 20 percent of Britain's dogs have been so "docked," and more than 25 percent of registered breeds have their tails shortened by tradition.

LORENZO'S OIL

You'd never know it by the title, but this movie is about a miraculous medical discovery made in real life by a couple determined to defy the odds and save the life of their son.

Lest you think this sounds too much like the "Disease of the Week" flicks we are inflicted with on television, you will be pleasantly surprised—and inspired! Nick Nolte and Susan Sarandon portray Augusto and Michaela Odone, parents of a precocious little boy, Lorenzo (Zack O'Malley Greenburg). When Lorenzo becomes ill, the doctors diagnose his malady as adrenoleukodystrophy (ALD), a degenerative neuromuscular disease passed on only to boys through a defective gene in their mothers.

Augusto and Michaela are told there is no hope for their son, but they relentlessly refuse to accept this.

In a frantic race against time and the ravages of the disease, they set about researching it on their own,

determined to save their son. What makes their struggle particularly real to the audience is the fact that this couple is all too human. They rant and rave not only against the unfairness of their little boy's illness, but at each other as well, as they vent their frustrations. This is more true to life than we've all been spoon fed with movies of this sort.

While I won't give away the ending, I will say that the title has all to do with what this couple ultimately accomplished for their son. Their courage and determination can only be termed awe-inspiring.

As for the actors themselves, there couldn't be a stronger, more talented cast to take on this script. The only hindrance is Nolte having to effect an Italian accent. It doesn't come naturally to him, and it shows. However, with everything else good going for it, you can forgive this small flaw in the movie. I wholeheartedly recommend it.

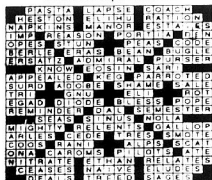

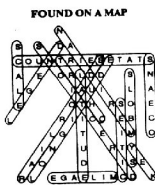

# Back Home IN KENTUCKY

## Kentucky playwrights entertain America

Kentucky can boast two Pulitzer Prize-winning playwrights, John Patrick and Marsha Norman.

In 1906 Patrick was born John Patrick Goggan in Louisville. He was abandoned by his parents at an early age, grew up in foster homes, and became a hobo while still a teenager. At nineteen he settled in San Francisco, found work as a radio announcer, and began writing scripts for NBC radio, training that may have helped in his future career. In 1943 Patrick won a name for himself when he wrote The Hasty Heart, now an established favorite of community theatre groups.

Patrick was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in drama for Teahouse of the August Moon, which has won numerous other awards and brought Patrick international fame. He has also written a series of five plays about Opal, a crotchety junk collector, and earned accolades for screenwriting adaptations such as Three Coins in a Fountain (1954), Love Is a Many-Splendored Thing (1955), High Society (1956), The Philadelphia Story (1956), and Some Came Running (1959).

Born in Louisville in 1947, Marsha Norman worked with disturbed children at the Kentucky Central State Hospital, taught gifted children, and wrote for the Louisville Times before devoting herself to writing plays. Her first play, Getting Out, debuted at the Actors Theatre in Louisville before heading to Broadway. Her other plays include Circus Valentine, The Holdup, and In Trouble at Fifteen, but she is most well known for the controversial 'night Mother.

'night Mother, a one-act play about a mother and her grown daughter, who plans to commit suicide, won the Pulitzer Prize in drama for 1983. Like 'night Mother, Norman's other plays focus on bleak subject matter, and have inspired antagonism among viewers and critics even as they have inspired some of the world's highest praise.

# Parido gets first win at D.W. Howard Fieldhouse

## Four score in double figures in 67-66 Blackcat win

It was a first. Mark the date on your calendar, an absolute first. Prestonsburg boys' head basketball coach Gordon Parido is 1-7. That's correct. He has won one and lost seven -- against Betsy Layne at Betsy Layne that is.

The Prestonsburg coach got his first win ever as a head coach over Betsy Layne on their own floor as the Blackcats stunned a good Bobcat team with a 67-66 come from behind victory.

"I'm one and seven now," said Parido after the game. "It's always good to come in here and win. This is the first time I've won here. It doesn't happen too often."

Parido said that he tried to keep it quiet but he feels that his squad knew of his tough luck at the D.W. Howard Fieldhouse.
