Witnesses testify under oath :

School job drew Hammond's eye

Although no evidence of vote fraud emerged from depositions of witnesses Thursday, three people testified that the Floyd County Attorney tried to get a member of the Floyd County Board of Elections a higher ranking job in the Floyd County School System.

Floyd County School Board Chairman Eddie Patton testified in a deposition Thursday, in the case of Dale

McKinney vs. John M. Stumbo et al, that County Attorney Jim Hammond visited his home on two separate occasions in June and July with David Layne to lobby on behalf of Layne to be hired as the school system's new director of facilities.

Patton said that Hammond asked him to talk to Floyd superintendent Steve Towler on behalf of Layne and that Hammond mentioned having "a ticket on the superintendent's wife."

C.K. Belhasen, representing McKinney in the lawsuit, asked Patton why Hammond would mention having a ticket against the superintendent's wife.

"I don't know," Patton answered. Patton said that the comment concerning "a ticket" on Towler's wife came during a late night visit by Layne and Hammond to his home in June or July.

Towler's wife, Dohna, was cited for an alcohol-related charge last February, but the matter was not assigned a case number until July. The case is pending in Floyd District Court.

Applications for the position of director of facilities were being taken in July and the slot was filled by Towler in August. Layne was not hired for the position.

Patton said after Hammond and Layne's visit, Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo called him to recommend Layne for the job of director of facilities. Patton also said that State Senator Benny Ray Bailey had also called him and recommended Layne for the job.

Patton said he told Towler about the visits by Hammond and Layne. Superintendent Towler confirmed under oath that the visits referred to by Patton had been made.

Towler also said that Stumbo had called him and told him that Layne "had good qualities for the job available."

Towler was not asked about the charge against his wife.

Layne, who is a teacher at Prestonsburg High School and a

Three invoke the 'Fifth'

Depositions were taken Thursday in the Floyd County Courthouse Annex from 20 witnesses expected to testify Monday in a vote fraud civil lawsuit filed against Floyd County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo.

Although none of the witnesses testified that they knew of any wrongdoing or illegal acts by Stumbo in the May primary, three of those scheduled to testify invoked their Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination.

Velma Banks and District Two Magistrate candidates Kenneth Roberts and Calvin Howell invoked the Fifth Amendment and gave no testimony at their depositions Thursday.

Banks said she did not intend to invoke her Fifth Amendment right at Monday's trial. Howell said he only invoked his right "at this time" and could testify at Monday's trial.

Roberts said he intended to invoke his right against self-incrimination at Monday's proceedings and

Blackburn files as write-in

A write-in candidate has filed to run against District Three school board member Brent Clark in the November election.

Betsy Layne resident Lance Blackburn filed his declaration of intent to run as a write-in candidate in the county court clerk's office

Thursday morning.

In a written statement Thursday, Blackburn said that he filed for the position because "I and many other concerned citizens feel that the Third District has been improperly represented" by current board member Clark.

Blackburn and other Betsy Layne residents have been complaining at school board meetings for the past several months because the board voted in July to abandon a 21-classroom addition at Betsy Layne Elementary.

If he is successful in his write-in

campaign, Blackburn said he will strive to see that the school system "runs like a well managed business." Blackburn also said he would push to proceed with the construction of the Betsy Layne addition.

"I want what's best for all the children of District Three and all the children of Floyd County," Blackburn's statement said. "I will not play the game of 'I'll support your project, if you'll support mine. I will listen and accept community involvement and input on the issues. I will not hide and refuse to answer questions or explain actions.'"

Blackburn added that he would seek input from citizens in the Mud Creek area concerning the site of a proposed middle school.

State to verify report :

School review begins

Kentucky Department of Education investigators are scheduled to be in Floyd County Monday to begin a week-long review of improvements in the school system noted in an extensive report submitted to the state earlier this month.

Bill Riddick, consultant for the department's assistance and intervention division, said Monday that investigators expected to remain in the district all week to verify improvements cited in the September 15 report.

State education officials conducted an extensive investigation into the school system in May 1992 and released a scathing report on the district in August 1992, which also included 89 recommendations for improvement in the school system.

School board members were required to develop short and long-term improvement plans which would incorporate the state's 89 recommendations.

The school system's September 15 report was requested by the state in order to measure how the district has progressed in implementing the short and long-term improvement plans.

Task force nets pot haul in Toler raid

A Wednesday evening raid in the left fork of Toler Creek by the Mountain Area Drug Task Force netted approximately \$3,500 worth of marijuana.

Junior Hall, 63, of Harold, was arrested by Floyd County Chief Deputy Ianzie Hunt and charged with trafficking in marijuana.

Hunt said that Hall was arrested while carrying a large bag of what appeared to be marijuana off a hillside at Toler Creek.

Hunt was working in conjunction with the task force and the arrest was the result of an undercover investigation by the Mountain Area Drug Task Force.

Hall was allegedly carrying a large bag containing 64 small bags of marijuana reportedly worth \$25 to \$50 apiece along with a bag of marijuana buds estimated at \$300 dollars.

At his arraignment in Floyd District Court Thursday morning, a not guilty plea was entered on Hall's behalf and his bond was set at \$2,000 or 10 percent cash.

A preliminary hearing was set for October 19 at 9:30 a.m.

New trial ordered, but suspect still in prison

Jim Mack Penix Jr. was denied parole Wednesday, September 22 by the Kentucky probation and parole board, but his fortune could be changing.

In August the Kentucky Court of Appeals ordered a new trial for Penix, 34, formerly of Van Lear, now lodged in a Bell County Detention center, in the shooting death of Barrett Heath Endicott, of Prestonsburg, in a trailer park behind Combs Airport on May 13, 1990.

In 1991 Penix was charged with second degree manslaughter and sentenced to 10 years in prison by Martin County Judge Stephen N. Frazier.

Through the efforts of Penix's attorney, Ned Pillefsdorf, a retrial was granted by the court of appeals during a August 1993 hearing.

The decision to order a retrial came after Pillefsdorf claimed the commonwealth attorney had made numerous errors in the case.

Pillefsdorf claimed that the testimony of the victim's mother was irrelevant and served no purpose other than to appeal to the jury's emotions. Pillefsdorf also claimed that a photograph of the victim unduly inflamed and prejudiced the jury.

Another item in the original trial

that came under attack by Pillefsdorf was the mention in the closing arguments of the rifle's safety.

Although Judge Frazier told the jury to disregard the statements concerning the rifle's safety device the appellate judges ruled admission would not cure the prejudicial effects on the jury.

Appellate Judge A.M. Wilhoit said, "Coming as it did in the prosecutor's closing argument, the incident was surely fresh in the minds of the jurors as they began deliberations, and certainly had a devastating effect on the defense of accident."

"If (Penix) only allowed the rifle to be pointed at the victim without

knowing whether or not it was loaded, a jury could find at worst to be a reckless act, but if he had also taken the step of releasing the safety, the jury might well conclude from this additional fact that Penix acted wantonly."

The appellate judges determined for these reasons a new trial is required and remanded the case to Judge Frazier.

Although a retrial was granted, Penix still sits in jail awaiting a motion to be filed for his bond.

Judge Frazier said Monday, "Council usually waits 30 days before

The "man who knew too much" to visit Vietnam after travel ban lifted

Once banned by the United States government from entering communist countries, Robert D. McAninch has been invited to visit Vietnam as a delegate of the Citizen Ambassador program.

On November 3, McAninch will join about 30 international affairs educators who will visit Vietnam in November to establish education and business contacts with the Asian country. The educators will tour universities in Hanoi and Ho Chi Minh City, formerly Saigon. The delegation will also discuss developing re-

lations in trade and foreign investment with Vietnam's Ministry of Finance and Foreign Affairs after President Clinton relaxed trade regulations with Vietnam.

McAninch wants to get a firsthand look at the effect of the Vietnam War on the economy, the shortages of goods, and the government. He hopes to sort out the propaganda from the facts.

McAninch, who was part of a Multi-Nuclear Force in the 60s that trained about 15 NATO countries in the use of nuclear weaponry, said he "felt strange" about visiting Vietnam. "They were the enemy," said McAninch. "I lost friends in Viet-

nam. Now to go waltzing over there on a goodwill visit is a complete 180 degree turnaround than the way I was oriented in the 60s."

An enlisted man assigned to Sascom, a classified unit, McAninch helped train countries in the use of nuclear weapons from 1962-65 while the Vietnam War raged around him. For at least five years after he left the military, McAninch was not allowed to go near a communist country because of the classified nature of his military job.

"But the world turns around," he said. "Times change. Germany and Japan were once our enemies. Now, they're allies. Russia was once an

enemy and now they're considered our friends."

The political science specialist visited the Soviet Union on a goodwill mission several years ago, but cut his visit short because he had a "pretty good idea" of what was going to happen.

"Chaos had to come," he said. "There were long lines for sugar. It was like a time machine. We had gone backwards in time. It was like 1952."

This group toured a factory in Russia that was supposed to employ around 300 people. The group was taken to the factory around lunchtime

said, "I don't change my mind, I'll take it through the whole thing."

Stumbo's attorney, Arnold Turner Jr., said that the witnesses could only take the Fifth Amendment to protect themselves, not his clients.

Thursday's depositions were taken in preparation for a trial scheduled to begin Monday in Floyd Circuit Court in the case of Dale McKinney vs. John M. Stumbo.

McKinney is alleging that Stumbo, or others working for the judge-executive bribed voters, sabotaged voting machines and performed work on

private property using county equipment. The lawsuit also alleges that relatives of Stumbo worked in voting precincts and intimidated voters. McKinney also claims in the lawsuit that Stumbo and other candidates were part of a county-wide slate in which candidates pooled their money to buy votes.

County employee Joey Bolling testified he had no knowledge of any wrongdoing by Stumbo during the May primary election, but he said he "hailed" his mother in a county-owned vehicle to vote on election day.

Floyd County Sheriff Paul Hunt Thompson, who also testified Thursday, called McKinney's lawsuit an attempt "to destroy the Democratic party in Floyd County."

Thompson testified that the so-

called slate in the May primary "was created by a drug dealer to defeat" him in the May primary. He added that candidates in an election "run for themselves, first and foremost."

District Two Magistrate Jackie Edford Owens was subpoenaed to testify, but he did not arrive at the courthouse annex before depositions were closed. Perry County Circuit Judge Doug Combs, special judge in the case, is expected to begin the trial Monday at 10 a.m. in Floyd Circuit Court.

Heater explodes; Jarvis home is gutted by fire

Lifeguards from the Cow Creek Volunteer Fire Department combated a fire that gutted the home of Pauline Jarvis late Thursday morning.

"According to Jim Caldwell, Cow Creek Fire Chief, Jarvis had just lit her kerosene heater and walked outside to get wood for her other heater when she turned around to see the kitchen engulfed in flames.

Jarvis then attempted to go in the front door to call the fire department but the intense heat stopped her.

Neighbors were not at home at the time and, luckily, a passerby seeing the house aflame stopped to assist.

Caldwell said the call came in at 11:10 a.m. and six firefighters were on the scene by 11:15 a.m.

"Apparently the kerosene heater exploded shortly after Jarvis lit it causing the flames to spread so quickly," said Caldwell.

No other houses were in danger.

filing a motion for bond in case the state appeals or petitions the court for reconsideration of the retrial decision.

On August 19, J. D. Johnson, Martin county Assistant Commonwealth Attorney, filed a motion to appeal the decision, giving Penny a new trial. This would mean Penny will not likely be allowed out on bond even if his attorney files a motion for a bond hearing.

Another twist in this case arose when Penny was denied parole after the court's appeal. Instead, a new trial was charged.

Judy indicated the victim's mother gathered a petition of 1,500 signatures and presented them to the parole board requesting they not parole Penny.

Judy Endicott also had friends of her son write the parole board requesting parole be denied for Penny.

"Under the first sentence, Penny will not come up for parole again for four years and Judy indicates she will fight until there is a sure thing in a court of law."

members of the county board of elections testified that he applied for the position of director of facilities because he felt he was the most qualified person for the job.

Layne explained that he and Hammond were life-long friends and that Hammond took him to the school board chairman's home because he didn't know where Eddie lived."

Layne denied that any statements were made by Hammond during the visit to the chairman's home that Patton owed him some type of political favor.

"I didn't get the job," Layne said at his deposition. "I think I'm still the best man for it."

Hammond was scheduled to give a deposition Thursday, but attorneys for all sides agreed it was not necessary to have Hammond testify.

A call to Hammond to comment on the testimony given Thursday was not returned.

The three witnesses involved have admitted under oath that Patton had been approached and state law prohibits board members, including the chairman, from attempting to influence school personnel decisions.

Bolshen did not explain the relevance of the issue concerning Layne, Patton and Hammond to the allegations of election fraud raised in the civil lawsuit against John M. Stumbo.

so they wouldn't think that only 89 people were on the premises, and that the parking lot was empty. The group discovered though that the factory hadn't been open for two years, and had only been opened for the delegation's visit. Factory employees were home "drawing pay."

McAninch said, "After he left, the government began crumbling. He hopes the same thing will happen with Vietnam."

"We had to go to the Soviet Union, it fell apart, and I got there," McAninch said with a chuckle.

The international affairs delegation will also visit historical sites in Vietnam, including the Cu Chi Tunnel. Critics say that the war's cultural activities also include a trip to Hanoi's oldest pagoda.

McAninch said he couldn't turn into the trip's Vietnam because the intention is to help the country improve his lectures to his students at the Prestonsburg Community College.

"I'll speckle 'em with personal anecdotes and individual slide shows," McAninch said.

He will continue to teach his classes during his absence, but students will see him only on the big screen via videotape.

Rafting on Pike County's Russell Fork focus on special airing October 10
Some of the longest, wildest white water rafting can be found at the Russell Fork River in Pike County. A program by the Pike County Chamber of Commerce features footage of both novice and expert rafters as well as scenes from Pike County in Thunder in the Gorge on the Russell Fork airing on KET at 12:30 p.m. Sunday, October 10.

The five-mile-long gorge ride at Russell Fork—for experienced rafters, only—is one of the biggest and most dangerous rafting rides in the eastern United States. This section averages 45 feet in width. Rafters face several major rapids including "Tower Falls," a two stage drop with hydraulics, boulders, and hidden rocks; "Triple Drop," with consecutive 3-, 8-, and 9-foot drops; and one of the river's worst rapids, "El Horrendo."

In addition to lots of rapid-riving footage, the program visits several sites in Pike County, including the Elkhorn City Railroad Museum, the Augusta Mills York Mansion, and Breaks Interstate Park.

Children, guns and school

It sounds so reasonable. Children should not have easy access to guns.

Yet, children in Kentucky have all too easy access to firearms, and some of them take those guns to class with them. And, if not illegal, the penalties aren't very stiff.

Attorney General Chris Gorman is on something of a crusade to get guns out of children's hands, whether at home or at school, and it's a crusade that ought to have universal support.

Gorman wants the 1994 General Assembly to pass a law that makes carrying a firearm into school a felony offense and another that holds adults responsible when children find their guns and shoot someone.

Again, how utterly reasonable.

Neither Gorman nor anyone else is proposing to make it illegal for a parent to teach a child how to hunt

wild game safely. But that parent has a responsibility to take every precaution that the child doesn't use the weapon recklessly and harm others. The possibility of a stiff penalty for irresponsibility will make adults think twice before leaving firearms where children can easily get and misuse them.

As for the guns in the classrooms, the gun-toting child should be held accountable no matter how the weapon was obtained. We've had one incident in which a teacher and a janitor was killed by a student in Orayson last year. That's one incident too many, and any legislation Gorman or anyone else proposes to lessen the likelihood of a repeat gun battle in a Kentucky school should pass the legislature unanimously. —*The Frankfort State Journal reprinted in The Lexington Herald-Leader*

Call for better death penalty laws

I agree with Laurel County Commonwealth's Attorney Tom Handy's call for better laws regarding the death penalty.

In reality, when people are sentenced to death in Kentucky, they will never sit in the electric chair. Because of a long, drawn-out appeals process, the convict will probably die of natural causes in his prison

cell.

Since the U.S. Supreme Court reinstated the death penalty in 1976, 31 people have received a death sentence in Kentucky. But none has been put to death since 1962.

If the death penalty is not a true sentence, it's time for Kentucky lawmakers to take it off the books. At this point, it seems, it's totally useless. —*The Paintsville Herald*

Run on your own time

Kentucky Secretary of State Bob Babbage said last month he has ceased charging the state for travel expenses related to his job since he began traveling the state to lay groundwork for his campaign as governor. Babbage also quit using a state vehicle in January for the same reason, he said.

Yet Babbage's generosity and forthrightness miss the point. Taxpayers shouldn't mind paying travel expenses for the elected official, or any other, so long as the expenses are job-related.

But the message Babbage seems to be sending is that he's so busy trying to get elected governor that he spends little time, at least on the road, doing the job he was elected to do. And he'd probably hate to have

someone accuse him later in the campaign of having spent state money while performing personal tasks.

Voters put Babbage in the secretary's office in 1991, four years after he served a term as state auditor. Like the first time, they cast their ballots for him, voters didn't intend to put the man in office and pay him a salary to move closer to the Governor's Mansion.

The same may be said of any public officeholder, including and not limited to Lt. Governor Paul Patton and state Auditor Ben Chandler, both of whom will probably run for governor. Let's not forget state Treasurer Frances Jones Mills, whose reputation for alternating political offices — and violating the public's trust — is well known to some but was overlooked last time by voters.

Go on, Bob, and all the other politicians, too. Take the money that's sowed you, no more and no less. Make sure you've earned it. Taxpayers shouldn't be made to feel they've given you an IOU with a 1995 due date. Meanwhile, keep your campaigns in perspective — after hours and on weekends. —*(Bowling Green Daily News reprinted in the Lexington Herald-Leader)*

Where will the money come from?

Editor: I think most people would like to see adequate school facilities in Floyd County. Unfortunately, a large number of our children attend schools in unsafe, poorly maintained, outdated buildings. The students at Betsy Layne Elementary are faced daily with a depressing, dangerous school environment. There are many people in the Betsy Layne community who would welcome the construction project that the Floyd County Board of Education canceled at the "whim" of newly-appointed board member, Brent Gifford Clark.

There are others who question the wisdom of building on the present Betsy Layne site. Some facts that need to be considered are as follows:

- The site is ready for immediate construction.
- The site has been raised to three feet above the 100-year flood level.
- Adams Middle School and Allen Elementary, two of our county's most recently constructed schools, are both built on filled sites that were previously below flood level.
- The site is currently owned by the BOE. A new site by state standards would have to include at least 12 acres of land. There are few alternate sites available.
- The purchase cost of new property would use desperately needed tax dollars that might be better spent on other projects.
- The cost to install utilities to a new school site can be astronomical. For example, to run water lines to Duff Elementary cost \$280,000. An additional \$200,000 was spent to run lines to and install holding tanks at Allen Center. The water installation at South Floyd High School cost \$500,000.

Can our BOE afford to purchase property, run utilities, build access roads, bridges, etc. and build a new building with the money currently available?

Should promote baseball program

Editor: Over the past several months I have been hearing and reading about the plans to construct a track facility on the grounds currently accommodating Allen Central football and baseball. I am not opposed to such plans and furthermore believe that such plans should be proposed at the inception of any plans to construct any new school. The construction of new educational facilities should be designed and planned for the long-term and not just piece-mealed as the institution grows. The location of all extra-curricular facilities should be "on-campus."

All of the extra-curricular facilities should be branched off in the immediate vicinity of the main educational facility. Such planning would be properly conceived ensuring for the long-term success of the learning institution. Being a parent of children who will prosper through any and all educational and extra-curricular advances at Allen Central High School I am totally supportive of such plans.

I have only one problem with the proposed track facility plans. Where is the plan providing for the proper relocation of the baseball field? The "Times" has provided the public with several "Track Up-Dates," but has totally failed to inform the public as to the plans to continue the baseball program without any inconveniences or interruptions.

Just in case the situation has not been considered, baseball facilities are not compatible with track and field facilities. The two facilities are totally different and as such cannot be shared on the same field. There must be two fields of play for the two sporting events. Unless you have failed to surmise, I am a strong advocate for the benefits derived from a quality baseball program. Baseball, the game, has unjustifiably been pigeon-holed as a "nonrevenue generating sport" in this county.

I personally challenge this archaic notion. Until such time that quality facilities are constructed for high school baseball programs the programs will continue to languish in mediocrity. It should not be headline news to discover that people will follow quality programs regardless as to whether the program is baseball, football, basketball, track and field, or academic debate. Successful programs generally have an entourage following their successes. People who support successful programs are generally willing to expend time and money for the programs' on-going success. Conversely, people are not willing to waste either time or money on programs that are managed haphazardly and that make no effort to challenge the participants to excel.

Baseball has every potential to be a "revenue-generating sport," but our educational leaders must provide quality facilities which include quality lighting for nighttime participation. Our educational leaders must also seek out and find quality coaches who emphasize education first. Coaching is not a part-time job as some would have us believe. Coaching is a full-time job that requires a thorough knowledge of the competitive event, discipline, respect, dedication, honesty, commitment, and compassion. The quality coach possesses all these qualities and is also able to teach all these qualities to his or her students. Finding the proper coach is critical for building a quality program. Programs of quality can never exist when the program is headed by a "coach" that is serving in

this capacity for only the money.

Of the major high school sports, baseball is without doubt the least discriminating. It does not require its participants to have excess height, excess weight, or lightning speed in order to excel. A sport such as baseball which offers opportunity to persons of average height, weight, and speed should not be treated like a sport from a "Third World Country." Rather it should be promoted and its participants should be encouraged and made to feel proud that they play a sport that has been invented and manufactured in the good old U.S. of A.

Baseball has always been good to me, and vice versa. Through hard work and dedication, baseball carried me on a fairly long journey over its fields of play. It afforded me a college education. It even allowed me to begin work on my "Masters" degree.

My only payment to the institutions of higher learning where I was privileged to play the game I so dearly loved was to do just that—play the game. I am forever indebted to the game of baseball and my payment to the game will never be fulfilled because it has done so much for me.

I do not want the opportunities that were afforded me in days-gone-by to be lost to future baseball participants at Allen Central High School. The thought is unthinkable. I only ask that the "Times" give us die-hard baseball fans a "Baseball Field Update" in the very near future.

For proponents of the Allen Central Track Facility, I stand with you whole-heartedly. It is something that we need. Likewise if the track is constructed around the football field we will also need a quality baseball field.

What we do not need is a power struggle between the two athletic events. Both programs need not be placed in a position where one is perceived to be more important than the other, because both programs when properly coached have much to be gained by their respective participants.

Supreme court ends regional jail fight

The Kentucky Supreme Court ended a seven-year power struggle over the Big Sandy Regional Detention Center at Paintsville last Wednesday.

The Supreme Court denied a request by Johnson County Jailer Thurman Tackett to review a Court of Appeals decision giving control of the jail to Johnson, Lawrence, Magoffin and Martin counties.

The denial effectively lets stand the March 26 appellate court ruling, which had reversed a Johnson Circuit Court judgment in Tackett's favor.

Tackett has gone to court more than once over the detention center since he became a jailer in 1986. In November of that year, Tackett filed suit in Johnson Circuit court, claiming he, not the four-county jail authority, had the power to operate the jail.

Judge James A. Knight, however, ruled in the jail authority's favor. In 1988, the Court of Appeals overturned Knight's decision, giving control of the facility to Tackett.

And so began a series of court decisions that kept control of the jail questionably in Johnson County's decision by the Supreme Court. *Paintsville Herald*

Girl is home 7 years after abuse case

10-year-old girl has gone home to her mother seven years after she was removed from her home by a sexual-abuse scandal involving 23 children.

The children, including the 10-year-old, were removed from their homes by state social workers in 1986. Nineteen adults, most of them related, were indicted on charges that included sodomy, incest, rape and sexual abuse.

The 10-year-old's parent were among those indicted. Her father, Herbert "Hub" Gipson, was acquitted in June 1990, and prosecutors dropped complexity charges against her mother, Gracie Gipson.

The two oldest children, a boy who is now 19 and a girl who is 16, were returned to Gracie Gipson in 1991. The fourth child, a 15-year-old boy, lives in a home in Somerset. *The Lexington Herald-Leader*

Blending art and biology

A number of budding young artists from the Children's Museum of Art in Prestonsburg filed into Prestonsburg Community College's art gallery recently, well armed with pencils and drawing pads.

Their mission: To sketch some of the animal specimens on display in the gallery's Natural Science Exhibit.

PCC associate professor of biology Dr. John Shiber and Ralph Clark, art teacher and founder of the Children's Museum, arranged the activity to promote an interdisciplinary concept of blending art with animal biology.

The idea was conceived by Shiber, who credits his own children with its

development. "They love to draw animals of all kinds—which child doesn't?" he said. "And they are always delighted when they have a real one to sketch. So, whenever the college acquired a new specimen, I let them sit quietly and draw it."

"This led me to think why not bring other artistic children to have the same opportunity?"

Clark called his students "the cream of the crop." As soon as they arrived, the art students went seriously about the business of choosing their first "models." They then sat cross-legged on the floor, sketching.

For Denise Candill and Ashley DeRossett, the small fox standing on

its hind leg was the first choice. Tiffany Ratliff chose the birds that were mounted on the wall. Nathan Hall was taken by two squirrels standing side by side, and Steven Prater found the young deer lying on the ground as his first model.

Even Shiber's children got involved, with Tony sketching one of the hawks in flight, and Linda drawing the mink.

If a child finished one drawing, he or she went on to another display specimen. DeRossett chose the wild turkey for her second drawing, while Ratliff and Prater went after an owl suspended in air with a squirrel gripped tightly in its claws.

The activity lasted almost two hours. "This was a rare and wonderful opportunity for my students," Clark said. "They don't often have a real animal to 'sit still' for them as they draw it."

Shiber and Clark hope to repeat the activity with more children.

The children's zoology art will eventually grace the walls of the Children's Museum of Art, located in the Mountain Heritage Arts and Crafts Center on Court Street. The museum is sponsored by the Floyd County Library-Emma Wells May Cultural Center. Full enrollment is under way for children between the ages of seven and 12.

KERA, how it changed my life

Kentucky Education Reform Act. These four words would have meant nothing to me two years ago. Yet, today I look at KERA almost as a rebirth for me.

Last year, as a junior at Wheelwright High School, I found myself in the middle of something I didn't understand. I had looked at my schedule and had seen that I had U.S. History and English III, but these classes were nowhere to be found on the schedule. They had been combined into a two-hour block class called American Studies. Somehow we were going to teach English and History at the same time, and on top of that we were going to have the same class for two hours! Well, my fellow students and I happened to be overlooking what we were really getting into.

I can remember walking into the class that first day dumbfounded and slightly worried. After all, we had already been informed that no class had ever done this before. This was the first year and we were the lab rats.

We were told that day about some of the things that we were going to be doing for the year. There was going to be a lot of writing, they said, ranging from short stories to pamphlets. It was during that first day of learning that I was introduced to Mr. Bud Reynolds. All I could think of was how much energy this guy had. I mean here I was nodding off one minute and all of a sudden there was this jolly man jumping up in front of the class talking about breaking out of the traditional classroom settings and posting notes to New York and starting writing circles with schools in Covington, Paducah, Louisville, and Lexington. When the two hours were over I found myself staggering out of the room in a daze of dizziness. My head was swimming and I felt I had been pulled three different ways at once. Many of the students felt the way I did and it was because so much had been poured on us at once. Such an onslaught of expectations had been issued that I was actually in the first stages of withdrawal.

The Battle at Wildcat Mountain, conclusion

The death of Joe Cameron near the beginning of the Civil War left Mollie Cameron to fend for herself and little Jim, their 3-year-old son. Mollie left during the third week of October to make a sack of beans to a distant neighbor. She couldn't pack little Jim on such a lengthy journey so she awoke him early and kept him busy in order to tire him out. He fell into a deep sleep and Mollie covered him with a saddle shawl before leaving.

She had no way of knowing that the battle of Wildcat Mountain would be fought that day, but as she neared her destination, she met soldiers, dressed in gray, who instructed her to return home. She obeyed them but as she neared her home, she encountered Union soldiers in deep blue. She left the beaten path and roamed about the area looking for another way to her cabin and little Jim.

Meanwhile, southern soldiers stopped to rest at her cabin and little Jim, hidden beneath the shawl, went undetected. They set fire to the cabin and left hurriedly when a scout reported Union forces were approaching.

Some of the Carter's Tennesseans, who made up part of the Union forces, passed near the burning cabin to rest and remarked about the new grave—decorated with bright-colored leaves.

"Flush up, what's that I hear?" "Why it sounds like a baby a' crying. It's inside the cabin."

The men were horrified. To fight, kill and maim in battle was one thing but to hear a youngster crying from a burning building, well, that was another matter.

"I'm going in," one of the men said, as he quickly moved toward the cabin. Another soldier followed on his heels.

Fire was billowing out of the front door which had been left open by the soldiers in their haste to leave. The men scurried to the back door which was locked. Together they crashed against the door, knocking it to the ground.

A whoosh cleared away the smoke but the room was soon engulfed in flame. In that brief moment they saw the motionless child on the bed in the corner. One of the men grabbed him up in an instant and soon the three of them were safely outside.

Little Jim soon began coughing violently, gasping for breath, once he was outside and away from the burn-

ing building. The soldiers were unharmed except for some minor burns and scorched hair.

Meanwhile Mollie continued on, with the sound of guns echoing in her ears. She turned this way and then that in her attempt to reach her home and little Jim. The battle came nearer forcing her to wander afar before returning later in the day.

As she neared her home, Mollie's way was blocked by soldiers in blue, burying through the woods, chasing Confederate soldiers toward London.

Thirty Confederate soldiers and five Yankees lay dead at the conclusion of the battle at Wildcat Mountain which was the first Civil War battle in Kentucky. Many were wounded.

The Tennessee soldiers, not knowing little Jim's given name, affectionately called him "Cub."

They correctly figured that his father was buried in the new grave nearby. Since his mother was nowhere to be seen, they surmised that she had been foully dealt with and murdered, her body probably in the blazing cabin.

They took the young lad along with them and, later in the day, sent him to a field hospital along with the wounded soldiers.

The Tennessee soldiers who saved

little Jim on Wildcat Mountain followed after the Rebel soldiers, led by Zollicoffer, to London and beyond toward Cumberland Ford and Cumberland Gap.

When the Wildcat Mountain and Livingston baggage wagons arrived at London, Cub was aboard. He was adored by the whole company of Tennesseans who made him an honorary member.

Though Cub cried for "Mummy," he soon became attached to the soldiers. A blue uniform and hat, complete with turkey feather, was fashioned for Cub while one soldier whittled out a wooden sword. Soon he could shout, "Forward, march."

Later, Cub was left in Tennessee, with the family of one of the soldiers.

But on the slopes of Wildcat Mountain, Mollie Cameron was nowhere near her former self.

Mollie slept on the lone grave of her husband each night and wandered aimlessly each day—asking everyone she saw if they had seen anything of Joe or her little Jim.

Turtle power

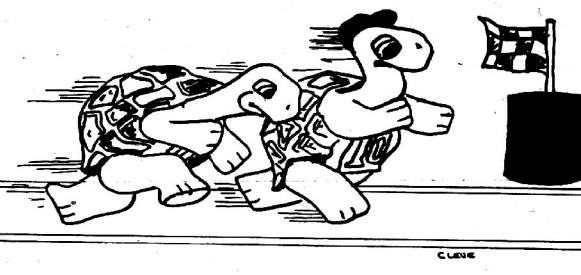
Terrapin owners and trainers from across the area are preparing their entries for the tenth annual Terrapin Trots sponsored by Our Lady of the Mountains School, Paintsville.

The races will be held during the Apple Festival in Paintsville the Jenny Wiley Festival in Prestonsburg. The races, which draw contestants from Johnson, Lawrence, Floyd and Magoffin counties, have been compared to the Kentucky Derby in the thrills and excitement category.

Each year about 75 to 100 turtles are saved (from probable death on the highways) by enthusiastic individuals who share in the frenzy that only turtle racing offers.

About 15 turtles at a time are placed behind the starting gate for each heat. When the gate is lifted, the turtles speed for the green fringe at the finish line, 20 feet away. It's every turtle for itself as the turtles crawl over and around each other to qualify for the main event.

Heat races are titled: The Terrapin Trot (businesses), The O'Hare Pace (civic organizations), The Turtle Bones (medical), The Muddy Banks (financial), The Shelly



Allowance (schools), and The Jurassic Jog (individuals). Heats are timed by official Terrapin Trots timers. Heat winners receive ribbons.

The winners of each heat are kept in a separate holding area until the Sweepstakes race. Then, as spectators go wild, the turtles dash/straggle toward the finish line and a place in terrapin history.

Prizes are \$100, \$75 and \$50 for the win, place and show, respectively, as well as impressive ribbons suitable for display.

Only terrapins are eligible, no snappers or musk. Turtles are furnished to businesses and individuals if so desired or entrants may bring their own. Use of steroids or other stimulants as well as decoration or painting of the shell is strictly prohibited. (For numbering purposes a

removable sticker is applied by racing officials.)

Turtles brought to Our Lady of the Mountains School prior to the day of the race are fed produce, bugs and worms and kept in a comfortable environment. No harsh chemicals are used for the pre-race bath. Turtles are returned to their natural habitat immediately after the races. The Trots are approved by the National Wildlife Association.

The Terrapin Trots are held behind Ken's Sport Shop at noon Saturday, October 8 in Prestonsburg, and in Paintsville, the Trots will take place at Our Lady of the Mountains School on Friday, October 1, at 1 p.m.

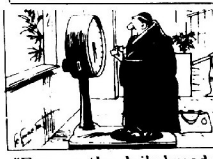

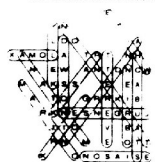

ground; a man who shot himself in the foot trying to hit a squirrel who was running nearby; and a man who was shot when he dropped his gun from a tree and had it discharge when it hit the ground, with the barrel pointed back up at him. Sull, said the state Department of Natural Resources, the number of accidents declined for the fourth straight year.

Ben Berkman and her husband filed a lawsuit in October against the Radisson Suite Hotel in Boca Raton, Fla., accusing the hotel of negligence in allowing the couple's personal towels, which they had brought to the hotel, to be stolen from their room.

A 60-year-old slaughterhouse worker was decapitated in Stockton, Calif., in June in an accident involving the machine that strips the hide off cows.

— According to a U.S. Department of Energy memo reported by the Denver Post in December, the number of workers it takes to change a light bulb, on a certain vital safety system at the Rocky Flats nuclear weapons plant, is 43, requiring 1,087.1 person-hours.

The New York Times reported in April that Kansas lawyers Michael Harris and Fletcher Bell were successful in filing worker compensation claims for back injuries suffered at work. Harris got almost \$35,000 for the strain of reaching into the backseat of his car for his briefcase, and Bell got \$95,000 for his injury lifting his briefcase from the trunk of his car.

The District of Columbia Bar Association suspended lawyer Willard C. McBride in April but rejected a more severe penalty. The bar found that McBride engaged in "fraud, deceit and misrepresentation" in an improper scheme to obtain a passport but said a more severe penalty was not warranted in that McBride's offense was not one of "moral turpitude."

In August, police in Berkeley, Calif., investigating a robbery, got a tip from a witness as to the license plate of the getaway car, which turned out to be a rental car. They staked out the rental car agency, and the next day, the robbers were arrested when they returned the car to get their deposit back.

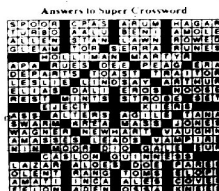

Newly-formed golf association to hold first tournament

If you have been thinking that all of the local golf tournaments are over, well, there is another one on the horizon.

The newly-formed Jenny Wiley Golf Association will hold its first tournament October 16 at the park golf course in an effort to raise revenue to upgrade the course.

"We're going to be working on the tee boxes, out-of-bound markers, installing, hopefully, sand traps and ponds on the two and three hole," said Teddy Hall, club member and chairman of course marshalls.

The tournament will be a four-

man scramble, but teams will not be announced until the day of the tournament. Four groups — A, B, C and D — will be formed with names being drawn for the pairings.

"This way no one can go out and fad up," said Hall. "We will be placing the teams together."

There will be a lot of great prizes given away during the event. The foursome that finishes first will receive a trophy plus \$100 each. Second finishers will receive a trophy plus \$75 each, and third place is good for a trophy to each player plus \$50.

"We want to have a real good tournament the first time out," said Hall. "We want get more members into our new association. We'll have

a chance to get all the golfers together and tell them the rules of the tournament and, at the same time, make a pitch for our association."

A \$90 putter will be awarded to the player coming closest to the hole. The golfer coming the closest to the line will receive a gift certificate.

Cash prizes will be given to the players who comes closest to the hole on specially marked greens. Also, the longest drive is worth a cash prize.

Hall said that players who have a bad shot can purchase a "mulligan" and get another shot.

"We'll be selling the mulligans," said Hall. "Players have to purchase them before they go out on the course.

If they have a bad shot, then they can turn in their mulligan and get an extra shot."

Hall explained that the mulligans could not be used on prize holes.

"It's just to help get a better team score," he said.

Refreshments will be served to all the golfers after the tournament.

"We will be starting work this weekend to remove trees that have caused shaded areas around the greens. By taking them out, the greens will get more sunlight.

"We've never had out-of-bound markers before," said Hall. "We also will mark the distance of the fairways."

Hall said that course marshalls will be used during the tournament, but they will not be a problem for the golfers.

"We will just be there to explain things to them. If someone is playing slow we will ask them not to hold others up and let them go ahead."

"We want to educate the people. We will have a sign hung with the course rules on it. We want to get more people taking part. Our goal is to clean up the course and make sure they keep the carts on the cart paths."

The association membership now numbers 30, but Hall and the others are hopeful that many more will come into the association and get involved.

"We'll not get everything done by spring," said Hall. "It will take time, but down the road, golfers will notice the difference in the course."

Hall said that the association has the complete support of Park Manager Jim Kennedy.

"He has been super about everything. He's all for the association. Anything we want to do, he seems to be one step ahead of us."

Registration for the tournament will be held on October 15 and the deadline is 5 p.m. on that date. Registration will be held at the course's pro shop. Registration fee is \$25.

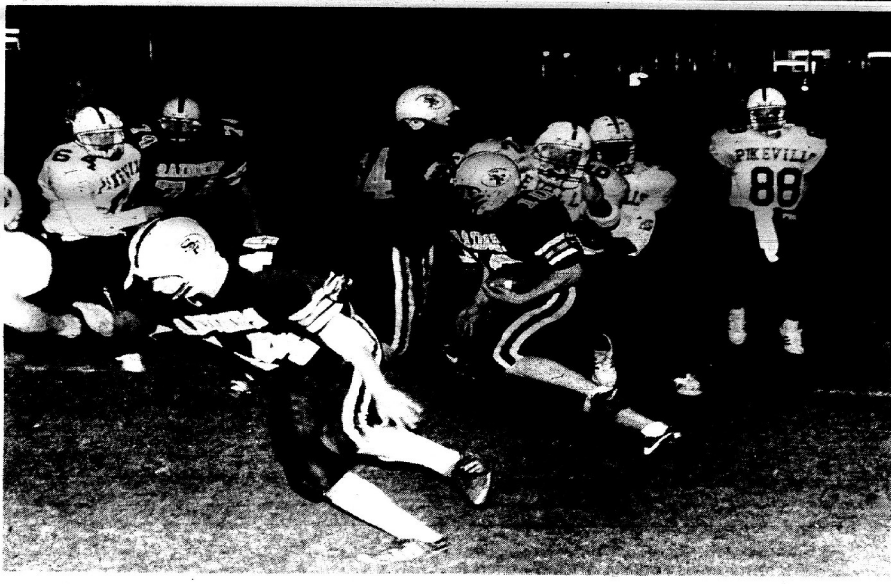
James had a bogey and the rest par for his 37. He birdied on the number 10 hole to miss by one stroke.

District leaders to meet as P-burg Blackcats travel to Shelby Valley

Coach Bill Letton and his Prestonsburg Blackcats will travel to Shelby Valley tonight in what is a bigger district contest than most fans will admit.

While the Blackcats have been on a roll all season, they carry the role of heavy favorites by as much as 21 points. But the Wildcats of Shelby Valley have been eluding some opponents also. They lead the district with an unblemished 3-0 record and are 4-1 overall.

Prestonsburg has played only two district games, winning both of them. They are currently 5-0 at the halfway mark of the season.

The defense has been the "Most Valuable Player" for Prestonsburg. But the Wildcats have also played good football on the defensive side of the line.

"We have had 29 take-aways this year in the first five games," said Wildcat coach Tom Searcy of his defense's play. "We've had 10 interceptions and recovered 19 fumbles. I'm very pleased with that."

Coach Searcy's scouting report...

"Prestonsburg will basically run the 'I' game," said the Shelby Valley coach. "They are expecting (Dwayne) Garza and (Seth) Hyden back. With both backs returning, they will have plenty of stuff."

(Thomas) Ratliff is a very good quarterback. He has a good arm and can throw deep. He is poised and comes to play.

"Both offensively and defensively, Prestonsburg is big and strong. They are a lot stronger than we are."

"They have given up only 11 points in the first five games. That means coming in, we have to put some points on the scoreboard early. It will be a rough game for us."

Coach Searcy said that tonight's game is definitely an important game — more so for his ballclub.

"It will be the game that will decide where we will be in the playoffs," said Searcy. "We feel that Prestonsburg is the team to beat in the district and the region. Coach Letton has a lot of good-looking kids."

(Jody) Cornette has just done an excellent job for them since the other two backs have been out. I like the (Matt) Porter kid. He played very well against Pike Central.

(Blake) Leslie did a good job running at the bone back spot. They will throw the football out of the slot set. "Prestonsburg has 19 formations they run and that makes it difficult to adjust to all those."

Searcy said that his team faced "a big task" against the Blackcats and they would have to "get down to playing."

Garza, Hyden to return?

According to Coach Letton, the possibility of Garza and Hyden returning this Friday night is very good and that's good news for Blackcat fans.

"They have been practicing with us," he said, "but with no contact practice. Both look good and feel good. We will keep them out of any contact one more day (Tuesday) and see how they feel. But it looks good."

Coach Letton's scouting report... Shelby Valley will showcase one of the area's top quarterbacks in Joe Don Cole. Cole is a three-year starter for the Wildcats and throws the football very well.

"Their wide out Jerry Reed Adkins and (Ryan) Demison are the two favorite receivers," said Coach Letton. "While they are not a big team, they do have good speed and quickness."

"They will show us a defense that we haven't seen before and it will be a challenge for us. They are real quick."

A look at the Wildcats... Cole passed for 128 yards against Elkhorn City last Friday night in his game's 40-20 win. He has totaled 350 yards passing in the first five games.

"I'm real pleased with Joe and his work ethic," said Coach Searcy.

Junior Jeremy Johnson (5-10, 165), who was injured in last year's game at Prestonsburg, has returned and is leading the ground game for the Wildcats. Johnson has rushed for over 100 yards in Shelby Valley's last three games. He has totaled 420 yards on the ground thus far.

"Jeremy runs the football hard," said the Wildcats' mentor. "He's a hard worker out there."

Shelby Valley will average between 150 to 160-pounds on their front line and while that is not very big, they make up for their lack of size with good speed.

"We are very aggressive on the front line defensively," said Searcy.

DEER PERMITS AVAILABLE

Licensing officials with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) have announced that deer hunting permits for the 1993-94 season will be delivered to all county clerk offices by September 22. Availability of deer permits from other license vendors such as sporting goods stores or bait and tackle shops may be much later depending on the time it takes for county clerk offices to distribute the permits to their agents.

Deer archery season opens October 1 and the first segment of the muzzle-loading season is set for Oct. 16-17. Deer permits that include two deer tags will cost \$21 this year. Persons eligible to purchase a junior hunting license (\$6.25) may purchase the two-tag permit or up to two, one-tag junior deer permits at \$12.50 each.

All hunters born after January 1, 1975 and who are required to purchase a hunting license must also complete a state certified hunter education course. The card is not required in order to purchase a hunting license or deer permit, but must be in the hunter's possession when hunting.

Hunter education course schedule information is available from the KDFWR Information & Education Division by calling (502) 564-4236 or 564-4762, M-F, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. EST. Allow at least three weeks for card delivery following successful completion of the free, 10-hour (three day) course.

The Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources does not receive general fund state tax dollars to administer its programs. The agency is funded through the sale of hunting and fishing licenses, and by apportionment of federal excise taxes on sporting equipment.

KDFWR TO PURSUE COMPUTERIZED LICENSE SALES

During the 1994 session of the Kentucky General Assembly, the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources (KDFWR) will pursue legislation necessary to implement a fully-automated system for selling hunting and fishing licenses for the 1995 license year.

One of the most compelling reasons to change the licensing system is improved availability of licenses without additional cost. At the present time each license must be filled out by hand when sold, and some licenses or permits are not always available from every vendor.

If the Kentucky legislature approves the new system, all license vendors would be direct agents of the

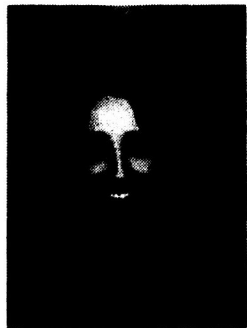

Five games remain on the Betsy Layne Bobcats football schedule and the five remaining opponents will be nothing like the last three the Bobcats have had to go up against.

Betsy Layne got off to a 2-0 start, the first in several years. Visions of a winning season began to dance in Bobcat fan's heads who thought that Christmas was going to come early.

However, the Cats have faltered the last three weeks causing Coach John Derossett's ballclub to fall to 2-3 in the first half of the season.

Betsy Layne has played some heavyweights in teams like Morgan County, East Carter and Madison Southern.

Tonight, the Bobcats start the first of their last five games when they visit Allen Central to face the Rebels who have also fallen to 2-3 on the season.

That is where Keith Hamilton comes in. The senior quarterback has been a standout all season for Betsy Layne. He had 210 yards passing against Morgan County

when the ground game just wasn't there. He had touchdown tosses of 82 and 45 yards in the game, proving he could go deep with the football.

Since the Morgan County game, Hamilton has been throwing the ball more.

He could air it out tonight at Allen Central and that would present a tough challenge for Glenn Floyd, Thomas Jenkins and Brad Blackburn in the Rebels' secondary.

Freshman tailback Craig Hamilton has been amazing this season. And with each game he just seems to get better and better. When you watch the 125-pound back run, you notice quickly that he loves to play the game.

What he lacks in size he makes up for in quickness and pure determination. Not only is he one of the Bobcats leading rushers but receivers as well. He has had five receptions this year for 89 yards. He is going to be a good one.

When you talk to opposing coaches about the Bobcats not one has failed to mention Brandon "Bubba" Combs. Combs has caught the eye of several area coaches and many say that he is definitely college material.

Combs anchors the Bobcats defensive line and you won't find too many backs running the football toward Combs, but rather to the opposite side.

This will be a good game despite each team's 2-3 records. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Rebels ready themselves for second half

For the Allen Central Rebels football team, it has been a rough first five games. Well, four of the five anyway.

The Rebels have faced three of their district's top teams and now look forward to the remaining schedule that will begin with the Betsy Layne Bobcats tonight at the Don Daniels Athletic Complex.

It also will be homecoming for the Rebels as four lovely young ladies vie for the honor of being named Homecoming Queen, 1993.

The game itself should be a good one. Both teams are coming off big losses from last Friday and need to gain some momentum for the remaining five games. Betsy Layne fell hard to Madison Southern 42-0, but played better in the second half holding the Eagles scoreless. Allen Central is coming off their worst defeat in school history after falling to Jenkins 81-0.

Allen Central carries the favorites role in tonight's county matchup by a narrow three points.

The Rebels will be looking to show that they are a better football team than last week's effort would indicate. But they also will be going against a good defensive line in Betsy Layne.

The Rebels and coach Glenn Reeves will be looking to another "Glenn," that being fullback Glenn Floyd, to carry the football and the Rebels to victory.

Floyd is the leading rusher for the Rebels averaging 77 yards per game and has totaled 386 yards through five games.

Joining Floyd in the backfield are James Osborne and Shawn Howard. Osborne is carrying the football around nine times per game and has accumulated 161 yards for 32 per game average. Howard has shown much improve-

ment since the season began. Howard rushed for 113 yards versus Berea two weeks ago. Look for Howard to carry the football more in the second half of the season.

If there is a disappointing part of the Rebels' offensive game, it would be in the passing department. Senior quarterback Brad Blackburn hasn't had the protection he needs to throw the football and has totaled 329 yards in the five games. But 202 of those came -- would you believe it -- against Pikeville.

Blackburn is not afraid to throw the ball. His leading receiver has been freshman Thomas Jenkins. Jenkins has seven receptions for 106 yards. He has caught two touchdown passes. He had three pass interceptions as a free safety in one game this season.

Other Rebel receivers include Adam Coleman, Rondel Stewart and Austin

The Rebels' defense is led by one of the hardest playing linemen around, Shawn Robinson. Robinson has 19 first hits this season along with 12 assists. He has recovered two fumbles this season.

Scott Bellemy is another lineman who digs in the trenches for the Rebels. Bellemy has 26 first hits and 13 assists.

Justin Salisbury, Steven Akers and Charlie Wade have been impressive on "D" for Coach Reeves.

Floyd has seen time on the defensive side of the line at free safety. Blackburn also plays the safety slot along with Jenkins.

Allen Central (2-3) has one district win and there could be a battle for that fourth spot in the playoffs. Coach Reeves' team has faced all the heavyweights and should be competitive against the remaining five teams.

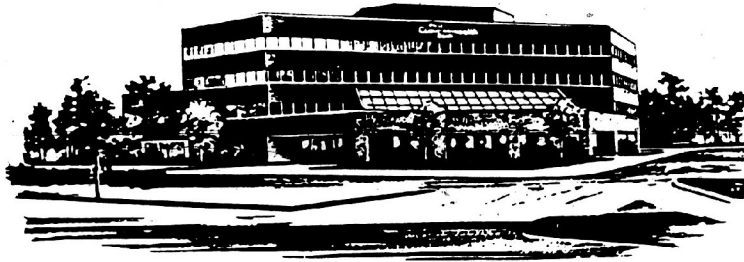

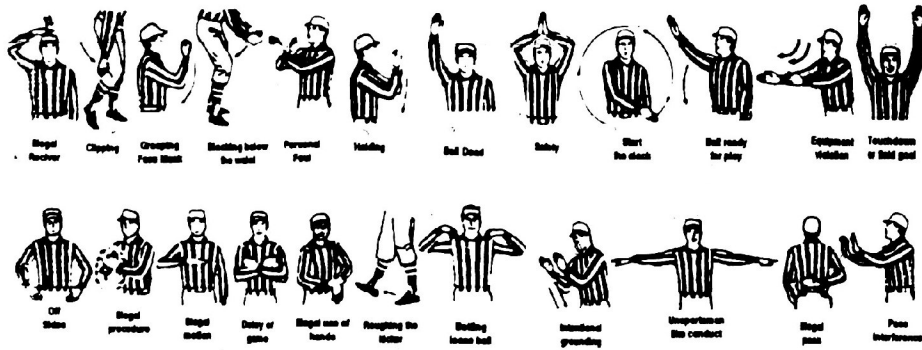

Tackett crowned South Floyd's first Homecoming Queen

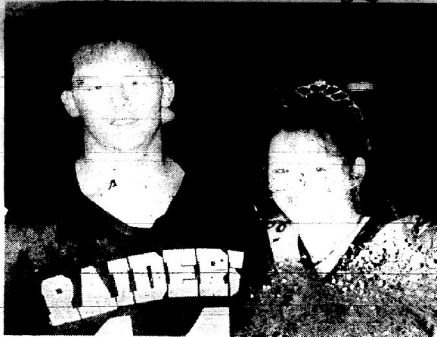

KDFWR and have access to a full range of licenses and permits. Since the automated system does not use preprinted forms, agents will not run out of loose licenses. The proposed system would reduce the administrative burden now experienced by the county clerks and their agents.

Clerks and their current agents will have the opportunity to remain as license vendors under the new system. Any businesses presently not participating who meet certain requirements could potentially be a vendor. Cost effective options will be offered to those who elect to participate.

Although all the operational details have yet to be designed, the agency is confident both license retailers and license buyers will benefit if a change is made.

"The two most positive aspects of the fully-automated system are the increased availability of licenses and lower cost of operating the system."

said Rebecca Games, director of the KDFWR fiscal control division.

"We believe the license buyers will be better served and that this new system is a wiser use of the sportsman's dollars," she added.

Prior to approaching the 1994 General Assembly for legislative approval, the KDFWR is soliciting public comment on the issue of changing to a computerized licensing system. Persons wishing to voice their opinion should contact Mac Quarles (phone 502-564-3400) or Barbara J.

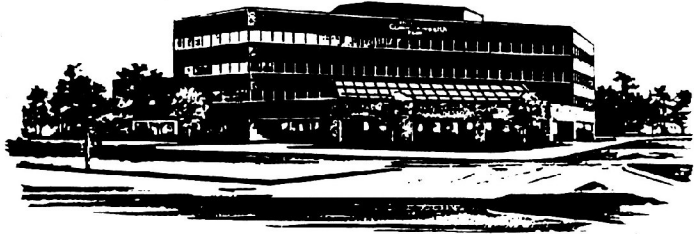
