

State looking for remedy to deadly intersection

PIKEVILLE - The fact that two CINEVILLE – The fact that two fatal accidents have occurred at the intersection of Town Branch Road and U.S. 23 in the last two months is not lost on officials at Kentucky's Highway District 12 office in Pikeville.

Highway District 12 office in Pikeville. Greg Couch, engineering support branch manager for District 12, said a study is already being discussed, a study that would start soon. "We've got that whole section on it o-do list." Couch said Tuesday. "In light of what's happened, it's got our attention. We'll start the study in the near future." Couch said a study would begin by accumulating an accident history by accumulating an accident history for the study as a peac-hour count of known as a peac-hour count of a matter of sending the numbers in

report form to Frankfort for approval. "The study would take about two months to complete," Couch said. "Then it's sept to Frankfort along with a recommendation from us, From there, the timeline would depend on whatever type of project would be undertake." Two of the options could be a traf-fic signal or a barrier wall. However, Couch said a barrier wall has been mentioned in the past without a great deal of support. Couch was not aware of any complete official study of the intersection, he said Monday. 



Even as he is hard-selling Congress and the American public on the need to act quickly on his unprecedented economic stimulus package, President-elect Barack Obama is warning that the massive government spending program means that we will face "trillion-dollar deficits for years to come."

In the next breath, Obama acknowledges the gripping high-wire act his administration will attempt Because such deficits would have a ruinous effect on the economy if allowed to persist, the president-elect promises to work diligently to eventually restrict spending and impose other discipline that would allow him to reduce the deficits in the long run.

We would be skeptical of such a promise in the best of times. It is even harder, in these tumultuous days, to

accept that such a tricky budgetary U-turn can be exe-cuted over the next four or eight years. Yet, something else Obama said gives us hope. He declared that overhauling Medicare and Social Security would be "a central part" of his budgetary efforts. Politicians of all stripes have long treated these two marcine antilement encoders are and include two massive entitlement programs as practically sacro-sanct even as experts estimate that they, along with Medicaid (the health care program for the poor), will consume nearly the entire federal budget by 2050 without drastic reform.

Obama did not offer specifics about how he will address the issue, although during the campaign he proposed adding a payroll tax on incomes above \$250,000 to bolster Social Security, which currently relies on a day capped at about \$106,000 annually the said he would offer more details with his first proposed budget next month.

If Obama capitalizes on his momentum and popularby following through on his pledge to lead real reform on entitlement programs, he will have made a huge first step in traversing that high wire.

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

LOUISVILLE — Kentucky has once again sored an F in all four cate association's State of Toburg Control 2008 reported released nationwide today. The state's flunking grades in tobacco control spending, cessation programs, smokefree air and tobacco tax stem directly from the legislature's failure to pass strong statewide laws proven to prevent the premature death and disease caused by tobacco use.

and disease caused by ublacto use. "Tobacco use is at the heart of a crisis plaguing our state's health and economy." said Kuntz. "This report should sound a thunderous wake-up call to our elected leaders to do the right thing for Kentuckians by increasing our tobacco excise tax."

by increasing our tonecce excise tax." Kentucky's F for tobacco tax is based on a state excise tax of 30 cents per pack. The current national average tax is \$1.19 per pack. Gov. Steve Beshear has proposed a 70 cent increase in Kentucky's tobacco tax, which is projected to produce over \$200 million a year in new revenue for the state. Kentucky last increased this tax in 2005 from 3 to 30 cents per pack.

tax in 2005 from 3 to 30 cents per pack. "Increasing the cost of cig-arettes will cut smoking rates, especially among youth and pregnant women," said Kuntz. "F or every 10 percent increase in the cost of a pack of cigarettes, three is a seven percent drop in youth smok-ing."

Kentucky alone, Secondhand smoke causes an additional 50,000 deaths each year. Kentucky 's economic cost due to smoking tops \$3.7 bil-lion a year. Tobacco-related illness costs our nation \$193 billion annually. The annual State of Tobacco Control report grades states and the federal govern-ment on smokefree air laws; cigarette taxes; tobacco pre-vention and control funding; and coverage of cessation treatments and services. Grades are calculated by com-paring policies against stan-dards based on current, recog-nized scientific criteria for effective tobacco control mea-sures.
