Floyd County has a lot to gain or lose, depending on how the state budget negotiations currently underway shake out

Should the more conservative Senate spending plan win out, state spending on local projects would total \$3 million, all funded by coal severance tax. If, on the other hand, the House plan wins out, Floyd County would see not only nearly all of those same projects, but also an additional \$21 million, mostly going toward construction and renovation of local schools.

Now, perhaps we're biased, but we'd much prefer to see more money flowing into the county than less. And although the economy has the state in a bit of a pinch, that is all the more reason for the additional spending. More money for more projects translates into more jobs for local

residents. With that being said, we would be highly surprised to see the final budget include the full House package. The see the final budget include the full House package. The additional \$21 million is part of a \$1 billion state stimulus package for every community across the state. Including all of those projects in a way that is agreeable to Senate lead-ership would most likely require additional cuts from other areas of state government, and we fail to see where that

much fat can be trimmed.

Much fat can be trimmed. So we will most likely see some hybrid of the two plans, which won't include all of the spending proposals of the House plan, but more than that for which the Senate budget currently calls. While it would be difficult for us to look down the list


and recommend any for cuts, we do see one that we hope survives the budget knife.

survives the budget knile. A \$4 million appropriation for a new vocational educa-tion building is one that we most hope to see in the final version of the budget. While other projects on the list would provide benefits to Floyd County, a new voc-ed

would provide benefits to Proya County, a new voccut stimulus and long-term economic growth. The \$4 million construction cost would provide immedi-ate relief to stagnant economic conditions through jobs and the local spending those incomes would provide. More importantly, a new, modern voc-ed building would build for the surface building those building would build for the county's future by better equipping local students for good-paying jobs. Though we wouldn't like it, we could wait until better

times for some of the other projects. But the voc-ed propos-al could be one key to ensuring those better times get here sooner, rather than later.

from Jalazon Refugee camp the same day. "It is a struggle to stay peaceful while you are being stripped of your dignity and humanity on a daily basis," she said. Maria did not write her usual Easter letter this year. Instead, she for-warded a press release from Michael Nseir, Programme Executive of the Palestine Israel Ecumenical Forum (PIEF). The PIEF is a platform that rallies churches together to coordinate efforts and initiatives for a just peace in Palestine-Israel through non-vio-lence and rigorous dialogue. Nseir echoed everything Maria has said.

"Palm Sunday, Good Friday, Holy Fire Saturday, and Easter Sunday are the holiest days celebrated in Jerusalem for Christians...and they are being denied the fundamental right to freely exercise their religion because of road blocks in the old city, police of road blocks in the old city, poince presence with machine guns, and rude, hostile attitudes from police and Army officers. (Israeli-imposed) cur-fews and forced closures make move-ment almost impossible. "In sharp contrast, Israel allows Jews to freely access their temples," he said

Jews to freely access their temples," he said. Palostinians have now initiated a public debate about freedom of wor-ship in Jerusalem and Israel's unjust treatment of Christians as well as Muslims, whose Al Aqia Mosque has suffered constant settler aggressions against it. Israel's discriminatory and restrictive policies are being chal-lenged, and religious organizations in occupied East Jerusalem have embarked upon a legal process to pre-access to their churches and shrines. Palestinian Christians are also call-ing upon the international community, and particularly the greater Christian World, to put pressure on Israel to end its illegal occupation of East Jerusalem and stop Imiling Holy Land Christians and others from exer-

Land Christians and others from exer-cising their basic religious rights. We are part of that international community and 'Christian World' to whom these oppressed Palestinians -people like Maria - are appealing. Just as our country has committed itself to the rights of Jews in the Holy Land, so should we commit ourselves to the rights of Christians and all who live there and want peace. Jesus would not have had it any other way.





Hart County crash tops tragic week on state 2010. This is 23 fewer fatali-ties than reported for the same time period in 2009. There were 127 motor vehi-cle fatalities and 67 of those victims were not wearing seat belts. Twenty-six of those crashes involved a commercial motor vehicle. Thirteen fatal cräshes involved a pedestrian and one involved a secour. Five crashes involved a motor-cycle and three of those vic-tims were not wearing hel-mets. One crash involved an ATV and the victim was not wearing a helmet. A total of 30 fatalities have resulted from crashes involving the suspect-

FRANKFORT Preliminary statistics indicate that 25 people died in 13 sepa-rate crashes on Kentucky road-ways from Monday, March 22, through Sunday, March 28. Ten of the crashes involved motor vehicles and seven of those victims were not wear-ing selit betts. The seat belt status, of 13 victims is unknown. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Casey, Franklin, Henry, Jefferson (2), Kenton and Knox counties. The suspected use of alcohol was a factor in the Henry and Knox County crashes. Knox County crashes

Knox County crashes. Eleven people lost their lives in a motor vehicle crash that occurred on 1-65 NB in Hart County when a semi-truck crossed the interstate median and crashed head-on into a Mennonite church van. The truck driver and ten peo-ple inside the van perished at

the scene. The seat belt status of those victims is unknown at this time. Two children, ages 3 and 5, survived the crash and were transported to a nearby medical facility for observation. Two double-fatality motor







Kentucky spacecraft Frontier 1 in space

FRANKFORT, — Gov, Steve Beshear announced Saturday that Frontier 1, the spacecraft of Kenucky Space, was successfully launched and inserted into space raching an altinude of approximately 270 kilometers. The spacecraft, which weighs about four pounds, was launched at the NASA Wallops Flight Facility in Viroguida on a Terrier-ing the secting announce-ment shows that Kenucky is and scientific advancement, said Gov. Beshear, "This unique partnership among Kenucky's higher education institutions, state government and private industry shows that the Commonwealth is a

bastion of high-tech, 21st cen-tury learning, as well as limit-less economic opportunity." This mission represents the first time that Kentucky has ever developed, built and suc-essfully inserted a free-flying spacecraft into space. At T+72 seconds after. Jaunch, Frontier 1 (codename: ADAMASat) was successfully ejected from the NASA launch vehicle into space. After ful-filling its mission objectives Frontier 1 began the normal decay of its trajectory, bur-ning-up as it reentered the Earth's atmosphere. The spacecraft was designed and built in Kentucky by KS to test hard-ware and software subsystems that will be flown on an orbital satellite called KentuckySat 1

(KySat 1) scheduled to be launched with the NASA Glory Mission in November 2010.

Advances in micro-tech-nology and miniaturized sys-tems have made possible the development of small, but potentially high-value space-craft and payloads," said Kris Kimel, president of the Kentucky Science and Technology Corporation, man-aging partner of Kentucky Space.

aging partner of Kentucky Space. A team of Kentucky Space students and faculty mission advisors were on-site for the spacecraft integration, count-down process and launch. The students also managed ground stations at Wallops and were supported by other stations at Morehead State University of Loniversity of Kentucky and the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis. The Launch was broadcast live on NASATV. Kentucky Space has also recently formed a joint venture with NanoBacks LJ.C. a Houston-based aerospace company, to facilitate and undertake scientific research and related activities on the International Space Station (JSS). Kentucky Space is a non-

profit enterprise involved in designing and developing edu-cational, R&D and entrepre-Cational, R&D and entrepre-neural space platforms. It is a consortium involving students and the combined resolutces and capacity of the University of Kentucky, Morehead State University, the University of Louisville, Western Kentucky University, Murray State

University, the Kentucky Community and Technical College System, the Kentucky Space Grant Consetium, and Belcan with support from the Kentucky Council To Postsecondary Educaion. The managing partner and founder of Kentucky Space is the Kentucky Science and Technology Corporation.







Tomorrow's plant superstar: **Barley!**

by SANDY MILLER HAYS

You've got to admit, it's not every day that you come across a plant that can fill your gas tank and your lunch box, too. Yes, that sounds like the start of a "Saturday Night Live" skit, I know — but the scientists of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) say such a plant does exist, and in fact, we've been eating it for years. It's (drum roll, please)... barley! Yes, good old barley, that staple of beer brewing, candy making and veg-

Yes, good old barley, that staple of beer brewing, candy making and veg-etable scups, can also be used as a source of bloenergy. AFS scientists in California also are working on whole-barley (and whole-oat, for that matter) breads that could offer us a whole new taste sensation with a new array of health benefits to boot.

health benefits to boot. Let's start with the bioencrgy angle. The 2007 Energy Independence and Security Act requires production and use of 36 billion gallons of renew-able transportation fuels per year by 2022 (in other words, fuels made from something other than fossils). Right now, we make only 9 billion gallons, so we obviously have a long way to 50

so we doviously have a fong way to go. But the ARS scientists are gaining ground quickly with new sustainable technologies to convert varieties of both hulled and hull-bess winter "ener-gy"-barley into fuel ethanol. They're doing this work in a partnership with Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University.

Winginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. The idea is to help farmers from southern Pennsylvania to South Carolina develop a profitable two-year erep rotation of winter barley, com and soybeans. Winter barley is usually grown on land that would oth-ervise be left bare in the colder months; the barley plants serve as a cover crop, protecting soil from ero-sion and preventing the movement of fertilizers from crop fields into nearby waterways (such as the Clessneake Bay). And since these fields wated otherwise be standing barley for fuel production dessn't interfere with food production doesn't interfere with food

winter, growing the barley for fuel production doesn't interfere with food production. To protect the increasingly valu-able barley crop, ARS scientists in North Carolina are busy making crosses between hull-less barley and barley with resistance to Ug99, a frightening new form of stem rust that emerged from Uganda a little more than a decade ago and can inflict crop losses up to 100 percent. Once the researchers have devel-oped barley lines that have the desired disease resistance, they'll begin breeding plants to boost starch content and other characteristics to enhance ethanol production. Is there a marketing opportunity for growers of this winter barley'? Yes, a company called Osage Bio Energy in Glen Allen, Va., is well under way in Glen Allen, Ya., is well under way in Glen Glen, winter barley'? The attes.

in Glein Allen, va, is weil under wij in building the first major barley-to-ethanol production plant in the United States. To what about the lunch hox? ARS scientists in California are experimenting with making all-oat or all-barley breads that could give us antioxidants, fiber and other healthful components in a whole different array from the lineup offered by today's typical whole-wheat breads. The scientists have been experi-menting with a commercially avail-able, plant-derived substance called HPMC (an abbreviation — thankfully, for 'hydroxypropyl methylcellu-loss'') that's already widely used as a food ingredient — for example, as a thickener, among other roles. The idea is that HPMC, could serve as a substitute for guiten, which is a compound that's present in wheat but missing from other grains such as oats and barley. Gluten (as any home bread-baker




