MARTIN — Officials and employees of Saint Joseph-Martin held an open house for the new Saint Joseph Senior Renewal Center, located in the former Mountain View Clinic building in Martin, on Friday. Kathy Stumbo, president of Saint Joseph-Martin, explained the purpose of the center to those in attendance. "The Senior Renewal Center is an outpatient mental health program," Stumbo said. "We provide group, individual and family therapy to seniors that may be facing unique emo-

iors that may be facing unique emo-tional problems that make life abnor-mally difficult."

According to information provid-

ed by the hospital, some of the prob-lems that seniors may face include difficulty coping with change, trou-ble adjusting to retirement, loneli-ness and isolation, grief and loss issues, a strong sense of hopeless-ness often accompanied by suicidal thinking, trouble adjusting to declin-ing physical health and feelings of depression and anxiety. Patients can attend 1-to-3 days per week, as determined by medical direction, and will receive three 45-minute group sessions per day. The patients will also receive individual and fam-ily therapy and a combination of group and individual therapy to improve coping skills, gain insight into their illness and improve and

We all need to watch out for them young and old: a

teen-ager cruising the streets on a skateboard is no different from a younger child toting a back-pack and walking on the sidewalk

We urge drivers to pay attention to school zone speeds and signs, especially in the early morning and mid-after-noon when there is increased activity. Driving just 5 mph over the limit increases both the risk of hitting a child and

the severity of any injuries.

Be extra careful when driving in areas where children may be crossing the road. Pay attention to school bus lights, if they're flashing, slow down and stop until they

stop.

Furthermore, if they're walking then they should be warned to never – even in Eastern Kentucky strangers or approach an unfamiliar vehicle.

And talk to your children daily about their day at school, being sure to take issues of bullying seriously – it's another safety issue that needs to constantly be addressed.

This may all seem like common sense, but we more

Our rivers may not have entries, but they still have a lot of room to grow when it comes to moving the things we manufacture, and they can scale up with relatively little infrastructure cost. The Kentucky Association of Riverports also points out that one gallon of fuel can move one ton of cargo 59 miles by truck, but 514 miles by can move one ton of cargo 59 miles by truck, but 514 miles by

barge.
In a state with more miles of waterways than any other but Alaska—and the only state bor-

dered by rivers on three sides —
Kentucky not only knows how
to go with the flow, but how to
stop it as well.

Because of our dams, Lake
Barkley and Kentucky Lake in
Western Kentucky form the
biggest body of water you'll find
between the Gulf of Mexico and
the Great Lakes, while Lake
Cumberland is the largest manmade lake by volume east of the
Mississippi River.

Fittingly, Kentucky is also
home to the Association of State
Dam Safety Officials. Last year,
it reported that there are about
84,000 dams in the country, with
most in private hands. About
2,000 of those are considered to
have "high-hazard potential,"
meaning their failure could put
people's lives in danger.

Keeping these dams in propershape isn't cheap. The association said early last year that it
would take \$50 billion to adequately repair all non-federal
dams, which is up from \$36 billion in 2003.

Here in Kentucky, most of
the water we use on an average
day is not for drinking, but to
help generate electricity. Our
thermoelectric power plants use
about 80 percent of each gallon
we draw from our lakes and
rivers, while the public's drinking water supply is just about 12
percent. Industrial uses take 'up
five percent, and the remaining-

and mining.

The General Assembly has put a renewed focus on providing better water and sewer service to people across the state. Since 2000, we have budgeted about \$900 million for hundreds of projects, and one result of this is that few states have a higher percentage of homes receiving treated water.

When it comes to this resource, Kentucky can lay

When it comes to this resource. Kentucky can lay claim to some rather unique distinctions beyond the geographical highlights I mentioned. We are rightly called the Houseboat Capital of the World, for example, since about 80 percent of those sold in the country are produced right here.

Our water is some of the best-tasting as well. Earlier this summer, one Hardin County water district scored in the top five in this category when compared to other North America regional winners.

Another record that was ours—until last month—was the largest water balloon flight in the world. Brigham Young University pushed the University of Kentucky to seend place-when 4,000 participants at the Utah school threw 120,000 water balloons at each other in just six minutes.

It seems that when it comes to water, few states can find more — or better — uses for it than Kentucky.



Upcoming fall squirrel season looks promising

Hunting survey available online

FRANKFORT

Kentucky's fall squirrel season opens Saturday, Aug. 21 and the outlook is similar to last year.

"Squirrels are our most stable and abundant small game species," said Ben Robinson, small game biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Even a poor mast year is not going to be detrimental to squirrel populations."

populations."

This year, the 190-day season is split. The first segment of squirrel season opens Aug. 21 and closes for the opening weekend of modern gun deer season Nov. 13-14. Squirrel season opens again

opening weekend of modern gun deer season Nov. 13-14. Squirrel season opens again Nov. 15 and continues through Feb. 28, 2011. The daily bag limit is six squirrels. Last year's mast crop, the abundance of nuts and fruits produced by trees and other plants, determines this year's estimate of the number of squirrels available to hunters. "Last year's mast crop was rated poor to average," said Robinson. "Only 38 percent of white oaks observed had mast, 42 percent of red oaks, 27 percent of hickories, and 38 percent of beech."

Since 1953, widlife biologists have conducted a survey of Kentucky's most important producers of wildlife foods, determining the proportion of mast bearing trees. Squirrels rely on the mast from these trees during various times of the fall and winter. "Since we did not experience a failure of any of these important mast crops, at least some food was available to important mast crops, at least some food was available to squirrels throughout a major-ity of the winter months," said Robinson.

rei numing since leaves make it difficult to clearly see squirrels.

But, the abundance of leaves also provides hunters with some advantages: squirrels make a lot of noise when they jump from limb to limb, and rustling leaves help hunters locate squirrels in the crowns of tall trees.

"The leaves also give hunters some cover as they slip around the woods," said Robinson.

To help determine the health of Kentucky 's squirrel Hunting Cooperator Survey was developed in 1995 as a volunteer initiative. Biodesists use the collected

was developed in 1995 as a volunteer initiative. Biologists use the collected data to monitor squirrel population trends in Kentucky. lation trends in Kentucky. Each year, participating hunter cooperators are mailed a new hunting log, the results of the survey and a small gift for participating, such as lapel pin or ball cap.

Hunters simply record the information about their hunts as the season progresses, then mail their survey to the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife when they're, finished hunts.

mail their survey to the Kentucky Fish and Wildlife when they're finished hunting for the season. The mailing address is: No. 1 Sportsman's Lane, Frankfort, Ky., 40601. Logs must be sent no later than May 31, 2011.

The recently published 2009-10 Squirrel Hunting Cooperator Survey Report, compiled by Robinson, offers some interesting data on Kentucky's squirrel populations and the state's most avid squirrel hunters.

Here are some highlights:
The 109 squirrel hunters Early in the fall season, squirrels feed heavily on who participated in last sea-

hickories. A good hunting strategy is to look for trees with maturing nuts that squirrels are beginning to cut. Often these trees are on dry, upland sites, such as hilltops, or flat benches along the contour of ridges.

BETSY LAYNE — Beginning yesterday, offi-cials with the state highway department announced cials with the state highway department announced there would be no left turn coming down the hill from Betsy Layne High School, a spot that has given drivers problems in the past in terms of visibility.

"Sight distance is a real problem on this street," said Greg Couch, engineering branch manager for Highway District 12. "A vehicle can come around

Highway District 12. "A vehicle can come around the curve in the northbound lane in just a matter of sec-

onds. You can't see the traf-fic until you're already out in the road."

Barrels and cones as well as signs have been placed to notify drivers that they are to turn right only when pulling onto U.S. 23 from the street that leads to the hillton school.

the street that leads to the hilltop school.

Many drivers, Couch said, were already turning right and driving north until they reached the nearby IGA, turning there and then proceeding in the other direction to avoid the dangerous left turn.

"In fact, there is a sign coming of the hill from the school telling students not

to make a left turn into oncoming traffic to get in the southbound lanes," Couch said.

The sign was an indicator that school officials had

taken notice of the dangers of the left turn and Couch said that several others, including the district's magincluding the district's mag-istrate, school board mem-ber, school principal, the county schools superintend-ent and county judge, had all asked what could be done to improve the situa-tion.

"We hope that motorists will be sensible and observe the new traffic pattern," Couch said. "We know that


they will be much safer when they do."

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

The cancer question

by SANDY MILLER HAYS

It's a question that has haunted many a steepless hight. Why does a particular person develop cancer?

We all know a few horror stories along these lines: the 80-something who's smoked two packs a day since picking up the habit in World Wai II, and doesn't get cancer, versus the 26-year-old who never smoked a single cigarette and doesn't live to see 30. Or perhaps it's the middle-aged, overweight couch potato who's never given a thought to diet or exercise, and doesn't get cancer—versus the tennis-playn't get cancer—versus the tennis-play-ing fitness buff in her 30s who dies of

ing itness built in her 30s who dies of breast cancer.

No one knows the answer to these puzzles, but the scientists of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) are working on them. One of those scientists, based in Beltsville, Md., is taking the promising approach of probing the "layers" of factors involved in the development of the disease.

It's known that certain external risk factors increase the chance a person will develop cancer, Those factors include the molecules that we take into our bodies, including what we cat. Diet is nowhere near as simple as "the four basic food groups": It's a complex mixture of bioactive compounds that trigging the property of studies to suggest that diet can have a protective effect against some chronic diseases. But research is also under way to learn what dietary components are linked to causing chronic diseases.

Whether you're talking about fruits, veggies, beans, whole grains, seeds or muts, they all contain thousands of bioactive phytochemicals. Other compounds are found in some meats, poultry and fish. According to, research findings, some of these compounds turn on genes that help protect us against cancer, and turn off other genes that are linked to cancer promotion.

The bottom line is that there are no simple answers. Figuring out the benefits of consuming dietary compounds's a complicated mix of the compounds' concentrations, timing and, of course, their interactions with other compounds to the property of the compounds of the compound of the property of the property of the compound of the property of the pro

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



"American consumers are paying high prices for low-quality food, and so are our public schools," says Jane Hersey, director of the non-profit Feingold Association of the US.

The Feingold Association applauds all of the initiatives that are being taken to bring healthy foods to schools, and offers options that can be adopted by any school. But while many find the issue to be complicated, Hersey maintains that it really is quite simple.

supplemental antioxidants supplemental antioxidants such as vitamins C, E and beta-carotene, which are known to protect the protect tumor cells during chemotherapy or radiation therapy. Those scientists reviewed published data from randomized clinical trials addressing benefits versus risks of antioxidant supplement use.

Their conclusion: The use of supplemental antioxidants during cancer therapies should be discouraged because of the possibility of tumor protection.

The scientists' best advice: Eat a varied diet that provides adequate levels of all recommended nutrients from foods, without going wild on any single substance. Or, as the Roman

dramatist Publius Terentius Afer said some 2,000 years ago, "Moderation in all things!"
