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## Bank offers reward for robbery info

State Police, who are leading the investigation, \$2,500 of the reward will be paid after an arrest and the remaining \$2,500 will be given after the suspect or suspects are convicted.

## Hazard mayor dies

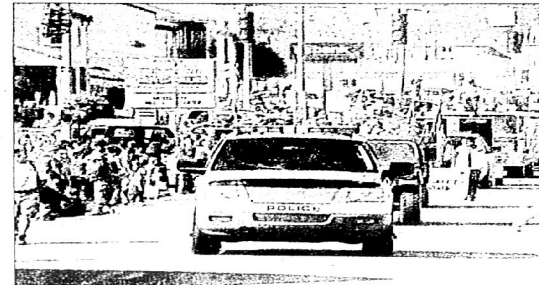
**HAZARD** — Hazard Mayor Bill Gorman died Saturday morning at home following a short illness. He was 86.

William D. Gorman's name was nearly synonymous with Hazard. A graduate of Hazard High School, he was a long-time civic leader well before being elected mayor 33 years ago. He helped organize the Buckhorn Watershed Association and was instrumental in helping to ensure the dam at Buckhorn was built. That dam resulted in the Buckhorn Lake State Resort Park, a project Gorman remembered fondly during an interview with the Hazard Herald in 2008.

The first shovel was turned at the Buckhorn dam site in 1956. Securing the dam was the culmination of a lot of work, Gorman explained, but it was something the county needed.

"In '53 we had sort of a, not a depression, but a recession in the county, and I'd been out in

## Backlog delays porn case

Donald J. Salisbury, 44, was arrested in February after the alleged female victim came to police and said she had discovered that Salisbury was in possession of a photograph

## 3 indicted for murder after 8 years

**INEZ** — One man indicted this week in a murder case dating back to 2002 are still being sought, while two others also indicted has been served the warrant against him in a Meade County jail.

Jimmy Cornette Jr., David Jude and Jerry Lee Stepp have been indicted and charged in the murder

eight years ago of Patrick Calvin Blackburn in Martin County.

The case was picked up in March by Kentucky State Police Det. Jason Dials, who took over as lead investigator. In the following months, the investigation turned up unspecified evidence that gave Dials enough to seek indictments against the three men.

Cornette was being held in the Meade County Detention Center

and officers served the warrant on him at that facility. However, as of Monday, Judge and Stepp had yet to be located, according to KSP Post 9 spokesman Shaun Little.

"At this time, David Jude and Jerry Stepp have not been located," Little said. "Both subjects have been entered as wanted persons and Kentucky State Police is still

## Green groups threaten coal lawsuit

**LONDON** — An assortment of environmental advocacy groups and other organizations have launched a campaign against two Eastern Kentucky coal companies for alleged violations of the federal Clean Water Act.

Appalachian Voices, Kentuckians For The Commonwealth, Kentucky Riverkeeper and Waterkeeper Alliance filed a 60-day notice letter of their intent to sue that cites 20,000 alleged violations in the last two years by International Coal Group,

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## Restaurant home to growing tribute to vets

**MCDOWELL** — It may not be the first thing you notice when you visit Brenda's Place, a restaurant in McDowell. You'll probably notice scents of burgers frying or pizza in the oven. But, eventually, at the far left end of the restaurant, the photographs will catch your eye.

The entire wall and part of an adjacent wall have been reserved over the past decade for photographs of military veterans. The photos range from World War II to the current war in Iraq and it started with the passing of a family member and a single picture tacked to the wall, said owner Brenda Hicks.

"When my brother, Jimmy, passed away in October of 2000, just a month after the attack in New York, I put his picture up on the wall to honor him," Hicks said. "When I did this, I also invited others who were vets or had family members who were in the military to bring in pictures and put them up, too, if they wanted."

The invitation caught on and now the restaurant has nearly 200 photographs on display, including a photograph enlarged and posted on the adjacent wall donated by local veteran Buddy Smith.

"Buddy has been very helpful, along with so many others," continued Hicks, who also has a picture of her son, Mark Frasure who served in the U.S. Army from 1985

until 1989, posted among the others. "He brought that picture and also often brings in other people to see the display."

Smith's donated photograph shows Smith with his "war buddies," as the handwritten caption reads, hauling by truck two German soldiers taken prisoner.

The German prisoners are tied to the front of the truck, Smith said, for a reason, as the Germans would often set wire traps for trucks traveling through open areas.

Other photographs show some uniformed officers and in others there are soldiers in the field,

leaning casually against trucks in the motor pool.

And Hicks says the display makes for a good addition when entertaining guests on other occasions.

"Up until probably a couple years ago, the First Baptist Church would use our pictures

for Veteran's Day for dinners here," said Hicks.

Hicks said the invite is still open for anyone who would be interested in adding photographs or other memorabilia, adding that it would soon result in an expansion of the display, one that started with a single picture and now

takes up three full shelves. "The point is this," said Hicks: "The Vietnam veterans were spit on and everything when they came back to the United States; but not here in the mountains. Here in the mountains they were treated like the heroes they were."

Gorman

the northwest and saw what water could do for the people," he said.

Gorman said not everyone was on board for the project, though, and it took a lot of convincing to get it done.

"When we organized it we started pushing the building of the Buckhorn dam," he remembered. "Everybody said we were crazy. It took us about five or six years, going before the Congress and testifying what the needs of the Kentucky River Valley were."

More than 50 years later, the dam has been responsible for over \$50 million in flood reduction, and the lake has brought thousands of visitors to Perry County. Water would remain a central issue for Gorman during his tenure in public office as well. He knew the importance of a good supply of water, telling the Herald during a 2007 inter-

view that a potable water supply was the "greatest need" for people in Perry County.

Working with county government, Gorman and the City of Hazard were able to extend a network of waterlines throughout Perry County, with a municipal supply flowing from the water treatment plant in Hazard.

"The judge, the fiscal court, the city commission and the mayor have a goal to try to see that the water is extended to all parts of Perry County. I think everybody deserves a good drink of water," he noted.

Gorman was also passionate about the eastern Kentucky region, a fact that wasn't lost on U.S. Sen. Mitch McConnell, who released a statement on Saturday.

"Mayor Gorman loved Kentucky as much as any man I have ever known," McConnell said. "His

decades of service to his fellow citizens of Hazard are unmatched and a testament to his humble and giving spirit. There was never a time that I have been with Bill or Nan that I wasn't greeted warmly and with a plan to work together to move Hazard forward. Kentucky has lost a great leader and I have lost a wonderful friend. Elaine and I send our prayers to Nan as well as the City of Hazard, which Bill lovingly served."

Mayor Gorman oversaw much of the City of

Hazard's growth in the past three decades, believing that the key to continued growth was to give the region's people a reason to stay.

"The whole intent of doing things is to improve the quality of life for the people, and to give their children jobs so that they stay in the mountains," he said.

Gorman helped move the Hazard ARH medical center to what is now Morton Boulevard, opening up a new area of the county that was previously unde-

veloped. He was in office when Jacklot Hollow became the Black Gold Shopping Center, and, more recently, during the construction of the Daniel Boone Shopping Center along the Carl D. Perkins Parkway.

He started the first broadcast television station in Hazard, with the call letters WKYH. In 1985 he sold the station, which now operates as WYMT-TV and is celebrating its 25th anniversary this year.

The Mayor also oversaw several other public projects

in Hazard, most recently the bridge on the lower end of Main Street that now bears his name.

He also successfully invited President Bill Clinton to Hazard in 1999.

But despite all of that development, Gorman said he didn't believe Hazard had yet reached its potential. He looked forward to not only a growing local economy, but one that would positively affect the region as well.

## Guest View

### Paul's support of school choice a good move

Republican Senate candidate Rand Paul told the Kentucky Chamber of Commerce something recently that caught our attention, namely that he supports giving students the choice as to which public school they wish to attend. Frankly, we agree, and it couldn't begin soon enough. School choice was one issue that popped up here in Perry County back in 2005, and has led to verbal scuffles and even legal action in other counties, most notably in our neighbor to the north, Breathitt County. But it's one issue that shouldn't be an issue at all. In a state that provides public school systems, paid for and propped up by tax dollars, our students should indeed have the option of which school they wish to attend. Here in Kentucky, that's not always the case.

Take for example a decision by the Breathitt County Board of Education to issue a reciprocal agreement that limits the number of students who can attend school in Perry County while living in Breathitt County. At issue is the state funding that accompanies each student. For every Breathitt student that attends school in Perry County, the Breathitt system loses the state funding that would have gone along with him or her.

In the case of these two counties, several students who live near the Buckhorn school are being prevented from attending classes in Perry County simply because they live on the wrong side of an invisible line. As a result, those students in high school must incur overly long bus trips to Jackson when they could be attending Buckhorn High School, which by comparison is only a stone's throw away. And this is but one example that comes from preventing school choice.

But, in truth, the Breathitt board is not to blame. They are simply following the framework the state's system of school law has set up. It's that system that needs to be tweaked. These students, if they so choose, should be able to attend Buckhorn. As it is, some of them simply could not in years past. It seems our legislature hasn't seen fit to give them that freedom, and that's a shame.

Though we ardently disagree with some of the things Dr. Paul has espoused while on the campaign trail, we equally applaud him for his attention to the issue of school choice. And we hope, if some of our legislative leaders in Frankfort are listening, that they can summon the political will to do something about it.

### A legislative perspective

Although the school year is still relatively young, some early report cards on the state's academic progress are starting to come in.

A recent legislative study, for example, brought together a wide variety of education rankings. This regularly compiled document is one of the best resources to see how Kentucky stacks up against other states.

It noted that we have made some major strides in key areas. Our fourth grade math scores, for example, jumped 10 spots from 2003 to 2009, even as most states stayed the same. Our high school students, meanwhile, led a welcome trend for much of the decade: A steady increase in both the number taking the difficult Advanced Placement courses used for college credit and the percentage of those getting a passing score.

There are other successes worth pointing out when comparing us to other states: Our high school graduation rate is well above the national average, and teacher salaries rose seven spots between 2002 and 2007, after taking into account geographical differences in cost-of-

living. This reflects the General Assembly's decision several years ago to bring these salaries more in line with the national average.

Many of the rankings are affected by two demographics beyond our control. Poverty remains a persistent challenge, which can be seen in the fact that nearly half of our student population qualifies for free or reduced-price lunch, and we have more rural school districts than most states, something that the legislative study said gives us "unique advantages and disadvantages."

The report also warned that some other rankings can be taken out of context. Consider the ACT and the SAT, the college-entrance exams used by many high school students. Most states favor one or the other, so a 50-state comparison in either test can be misleading.

Adding to that is the fact that Kentucky now requires all high school juniors to take the ACT, something mandated in only four other states. While this move gives us another national benchmark in which to gauge student progress, it understandably has caused our rank among the states to drop significantly.

With student progress in mind, the news in recent weeks has been mixed. On the positive side, the Council on Postsecondary Education is reporting that enrollment this

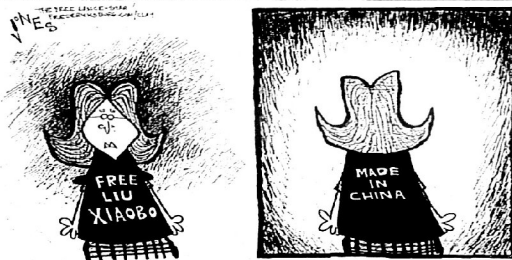
fall at Kentucky's public and private postsecondary schools has reached another all-time high: 271,000 students, or 40 percent more than were enrolled in 2000.

On the downside, however, only a third of last school year's graduating high school seniors were considered college-ready, and fewer schools are meeting the rising benchmarks called for each year under the federal No Child Left Behind act.

These are the challenges teachers and other educational leaders are tackling as we move forward in continuing to implement far-reaching reforms my legislative colleagues and I voted for last year. Once fully in place, this change will improve how we gauge student progress and bring all levels of education — from elementary school through college — closer together.

Overall, we have made tremendous strides during the last generation, but it will take an even more focused effort if we are to continue moving up the nation's ranks academically. Though it will not be easy, there are considerable reasons to believe we can do it.

### House week in review

State, federal and coal industry officials went before a state legislative panel last week to discuss federal water quality changes that some say have slowed and, in some cases, stopped strip mine permitting in Kentucky.

"The EPA views (the changes) as just a new interpretation of existing law," Commissioner Bruce Scott of the Kentucky Department of Environmental Protection told the Interim Joint Committee on Natural Resources and Environment about interim water quality changes—or "guidance"—made in April that Scott said are not legally binding to avoid conflict with federal law. Nevertheless, he said the changes have significantly impacted mine permitting in Kentucky.

"It isn't a legally binding document, but yet it is a document the EPA is using to guide reviews of states and respective districts," said Scott, adding that the permit slowdown has occurred even though the changes have not been finalized.

"The immediate impact of this guidance thus far has been a slowdown, basically, and in some cases has actually been a stoppage of the permitting

process as a result," said Scott.

The changes—which affect what are called "402" permits under the Clean Water Act dealing with discharge of water from mining or other operations—stem from a 2009 memorandum between the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Environmental Protection Agency and Department of the Interior that dealt with a review of mountaintop mining. Today, strip mine operations in Kentucky and five other Appalachian states are required to follow much tougher permitting procedures than other states.

Unhappy with the situation, coal groups and even states are showing their opposition to the EPA. Currently, litigation against the guidance has been filed by the National Mining Association and, as of yesterday, the state of West Virginia.

Responding to what Scott called a "sudden shift" in the permit process, Committee Co-Chair Rep. Jim Gooch, D-Providence, expressed concern. Also concerned is the Kentucky Coal Association—a voice for the more than 17,000 coal miners in the state. Lloyd Cress, the association's legal counsel, said the process requires mine operations to apply for 402 "individual" permits rather than "general" permits over which the federal government has less authority.

"This is an unprecedented intrusion by the federal government into the state's ability to

run their authorized Clean Water Act programs," said Cress. "I don't think you will find any other instance from the Clean Water Act in which the federal government has so intruded upon a function it has delegated a state to carry out."

Col. Keith Landry of the Louisville District of the Army Corps of Engineers, which has played a role in permitting changes under section 404 of the Clean Water Act by suspending general 404 permits for Kentucky and five other Appalachian states in June, also appeared before the committee. Section 404 of the Act deals with the effect of waste water discharge on streams and watersheds.

Since he took command of his district in 2008, Col. Landry said the number of 404 permits issued for coal operations per year have increased. The number of permits issued between 10 and 15 a year on average before he took command, but 43 permits have been issued for coal operations since, said Col. Landry. Thirteen of the permits have been in West Kentucky, 30 in East Kentucky.

Gooch said he expects Kentucky to take some kind of action on the matter, which might be addressed in the next legislative session beginning in January.

#### Elvis on aisle 3

If you ever happened to have the opportunity to follow my husband and me around the grocery store, you'd probably quickly come to the conclusion that we're a couple of absolute loons.

That's because at certain moments as we journey up and down the supermarket aisles, one of us will exclaim, "Look, Honey, it's Elvis!" and point frantically in the opposite direction, so that the other one will turn his or her back just long enough for us to snatch some desired but perhaps forbidden treat off the shelves and stash it in the bowels of the shopping cart. (Of course, neither of us is fooled by this ploy, but we always turn around and look just for courtesy's sake.)

Most of my husband's "Elvis sightings" tend to occur in the neighborhood of the snack cakes, but I most frequently spot Elvis in the pickle-and-olive aisle. I'll admit it, I never met a pickled vegetable I didn't like. I've even been known to sip dill pickle juice as though it were a fine liqueur.

Although I have consumed, in my lifetime, my fair share of pickles (and probably several dozen other people's shares, too), I've never come across a phenomenon in which the pickles in the jar look a little red.

But this can happen as a result of benign spoilage bacteria in the pickles. According to scientists with the Agricultural Research Service (ARS), some species of Lactobacilli, which are food-related microorganisms, can cause the red discoloration when they come in contact with tartrazine, which is a yellow food-coloring agent.

But the scientists of ARS say that Lactobacilli can be somewhat like a person's character — an interesting mix of some bad and some good.

During testing, the ARS scientists discovered that several of the Lactobacilli species have the ability to modify azo dyes, which are the dyes used by the textile industry to give those gorgeous warm reds, oranges and yellows to fabric. If the dyes aren't treated somehow after use, they can flow right into the textile wastewater streams.

Although many azo dyes are non-toxic, some have been found to be mutagenic, which means they are capable of inducing a genetic mutation or speeding up mutation. That's why researchers and others have expended considerable effort to identify microorganisms capable of degrading the azo dyes in wastewater streams from the textile industry. But

this discovery by the ARS scientists is the first report that food-related microorganisms can transform azo dyes.

If food-grade Lactobacilli capable of breaking down a range of azo dyes were identified, they could become the "overnight stars" of choice for use in wastewater treatment. But as with most success stories, this hit actually has been a long time in coming.

How long ago? "Raiders of the Lost Ark" was the hot new movie everybody was dying to see back when ARS scientists first fingered Lactobacillus casei as the cause of that red-colored spoilage in jars of pickles.

But that wasn't the end of the story. When another outbreak of the spoilage occurred a few years later, the culprit that time was a different member of the Lactobacilli family — L. paracasei — that caused the funny color when FD&C Yellow No. 5 (also known as tartrazine) was added to the brine solution. Commercial dill pickle makers use either this dye or turmeric to give a yellowish tinge to the brine. In the more recent round

of studies, the ARS scientists isolated Lactobacilli from spoiled jars of hamburger dill pickles and used those isolates to inoculate non-spoiled jars of hamburger dill pickles. The jars that contained brines with tartrazine developed the red hue on the pickle skins, but the jars that had the turmeric or no added coloring did not.

The scientists tested seven different treatments in their search for a way to stop pickles from developing that rosy blush. They found that adding a type of salt called sodium benzoate prevented bacterial growth

in the pickle jars, disappearance of the tartrazine, and development of the red spoilage. They say this could be a practical way for pickle makers to prevent that red-colored spoilage in the hamburger dill.

Now, if you'll pardon me, I believe I just saw Elvis headed toward Aisle Seven ...

# Two face federal marijuana charges

**PIKEVILLE** — Federal prosecutors indicted a Pike County man and woman this week on conspiracy charges of distributing marijuana.

According to a joint indictment filed in U.S. District Court in Pikeville on Oct. 7, Cathy Wright White and Danny White allegedly conspired to distribute 100 or more kilograms of marijuana in Pike County beginning around January 2007, continuing until Dec. 12, 2008.

A second count in the indictment names only Cathy Wright White as having done so individually on Feb. 13, 2008, leading to a second count against her of distribution.

Warrants were issued against Cathy Wright White and Danny White following their indictments this past week, while a notice was

filed on the same day in their case of a related prosecution.

Records on file in federal court in Pikeville, though not explicit in how the two cases are related in exact terms, refers to a case against John Bentley, who recently entered into a plea agreement with federal prosecutors.

Bentley had been facing in his own federal indictment dating to January 2009 a count of conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute marijuana and aiding and abetting as well as a charge of transporting with intent to promote the distribution of marijuana.

In November of that year, Bentley entered a plea agreement that saw the transporting charge dismissed in return for his cooperation and admitting to the conspiracy charge.

In that agreement, Bentley admitted that in December 2008 a man

named Jeremy Stewart hired him and another unnamed person to travel to Texas to obtain approximately 1,600 pounds of marijuana from a Bobby Fairchild.

In his statement, Bentley said Stewart established contact with Fairchild, a resident of Oklahoma, in January of 2007 and agreed that Fairchild would supply Stewart with marijuana or act as a middle man or "broker" on shipments to Stewart and that Stewart would then distribute or see over the distribution of the marijuana in Kentucky.

In December, the same month Bentley admitted to becoming involved in the shipments, an undercover Drug Enforcement Agency agent had made contact with Stewart to arrange the delivery of the 1,600 pounds of marijuana.

Stewart arranged for him to drive a van to Texas and pick up between 600 and

800 pounds of the shipment, Bentley said in his agreement, adding that Stewart provided him with credit card information to rent a U-Haul to bring the shipment back to Kentucky. As part of the shipment deal, Stewart gave the undercover officer Bentley's phone number

and in phone calls later, arranged to meet him at a business location in Anna, Texas.

When Bentley showed at the location and moved to the back of the U-Haul to get the rest of the shipment after showing the undercover officer five pounds of marijuana, he was then

taken into custody.

Bentley has waived his right to an appeal and agreed to plead guilty to the conspiracy charge, in addition to further agreeing to cooperate with federal officials in gathering further information about the case.

Investigators worked in cooperation with bank officials to release video surveillance still-shots this week showing the suspect who actually entered the bank.

The still-shots are of the suspect entering the bank wearing what appear to be bandanas wrapped around

his head and face and then a second shot at the counter where he demanded money.

located in Knott and Perry counties, and Frasure Creek Mining.

According to information provided by Appalachian Voices, a group located in North Carolina that started the investigation, the alleged violations include doctoring water pollution reports, failing to conduct tests and exceeding permit pollution limits.

"The sheer number of violations we found while looking over these companies' monitoring reports is astounding," said Donna Lisenby of Appalachian Voices. "It shows a systematic and pervasive pattern of misinformation. These companies are making a mockery of their legal responsibility under the Clean Water Act and more troubling, their moral obli-

gation to the people of the state of Kentucky."

Ted Withrow, a retired state employee who worked with water quality and a member of Kentuckians for the Commonwealth, said that Frasure Creek Mining Company self-reported mineral discharges more than 40 times the legal limit in 2009. Withrow said the discharge can be toxic to both aquatic life and humans.

"Our state officials have closed their eyes to an obviously serious problem," Withrow said. "These are not small exceedances, some are over 40 times the daily maximum. This should have been a red flag. The Clean Water Act allows citizens to bring polluters into court when government chooses to look the other way. In Kentucky, our

Department of Natural Resources and Division of Water are required to provide oversight of the permits they issue to the coal industry to ensure compliance. We intend to do what our government won't, that is, enforce the law and put an end to these illegal practices."

Under the Clean Water Act, the companies have 60 days to respond to the allegations made in the notice letter.

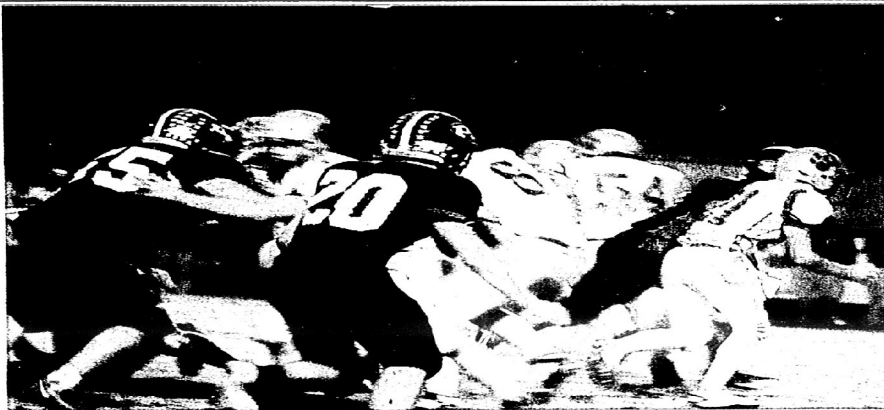

Jamerson also made two catches for the Blackcats.

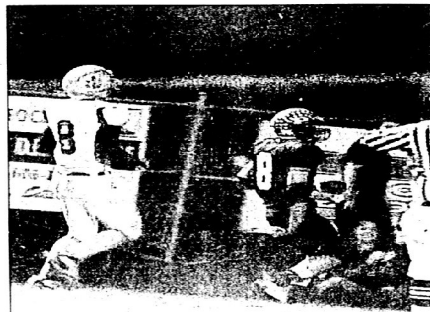

Crisp also rushed for a touchdown in the Blackcats' district win.

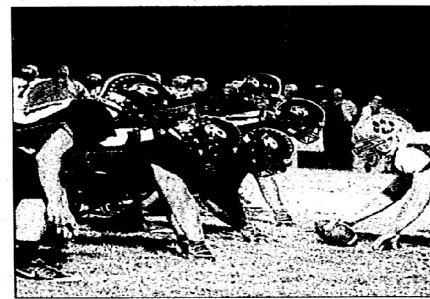

**MOREHEAD** - The Ohio Valley Conference (OVC) has announced its slate of games across the ESPN family of networks, and Morehead State men's basketball will be appearing at least twice with the possibility for as many as three more nationally-televised games as well.

figuring out their daily patterns. Birds are regulated by sex and key on food sources.

"In the fall, turkeys spend a lot of time in forests feeding on acorns," said Steven Dobby, wild turkey biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "This fall's mast crop looks good, so they won't have to move around much to find food."

Setting up a portable blind near areas where turkeys feed and waiting for their early morning arrival is one of the most effective fall hunting strategies. Hunters who don't know a flock's whereabouts on the daily route a flock takes between roosting and feeding areas must first locate some birds. Typically, that takes quite a bit of walking.

"In the fall a lot of turkeys are taken opportunistically by archers hunting deer," said Dobby. "It's hard to pin down the number of archers just going after turkeys."

Two shotgun seasons for turkeys are slated for this fall. The first early fall shotgun turkey season runs from Oct. 23-29, while the second runs from Dec. 4-10.

The season bag limit is four birds, but no more than two may be taken during archery season. Hunters may take two turkeys during shotgun season and only one turkey may have a beard length of three inches or longer. Only one turkey may be taken per day during fall turkey season.

Hunters bagged 6,589 birds during the 2004-05 fall turkey season, setting the fall harvest record.

"That year, we had a statewide mast failure," said Dobby. "Turkeys were moving around a lot, looking for food and came in contact with hunters. That same year we had a record deer harvest."

Kentucky possesses an estimated 250,000 turkeys. Flocks are well established in all 120 Kentucky counties.

Hunting opportunities abound for fall turkeys in Kentucky. Yet, Kentucky hunters take only about two percent of the available flock on average.

Looking for a hunting challenge this fall? Try wild turkeys.

# UK Football: Cobb claims two more honors

**LEXINGTON** - University of Kentucky wide receiver/quarterback/kickoff returner/punt returner/holder Randall Cobb has received two more honors for his four-touchdown performance Saturday versus Auburn.

Cobb is one of four players named as "Paul Hornung's Most Versatile Performers of the Week" by the Louisville Sports Commission. The LSC is sponsoring the inaugural Paul Hornung Award for the most versatile player in college football.

In addition, Cobb received one of five Southeastern Conference "helmet stickers" bestowed by Chris Low, the SEC head writer for ESPN.com.

"Was there a better player anywhere in college football Saturday?" Low wrote.

On Sunday, Cobb was named the National Wide Receiver/Running Back of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards.

Cobb opened the game with a 36-yard kickoff return into Auburn territory, then concluded the possession with a two-yard touchdown run. Later in the game he added a six-yard touchdown pass to freshman tight end Jordan Aumiller, a 16-yard TD catch from Mike Hartline and a one-yard scoring run.

In the process, Cobb tied the Kentucky career touchdown record with his 32nd TD. He also was the first UK player since Shane Boyd in 2003 to run for a touchdown, catch a touchdown pass and throw a TD pass in the same game. Cobb rang up 207 total yards during the game, including 47

rushing, 68 receiving, 86 on kickoff returns and six passing yards.

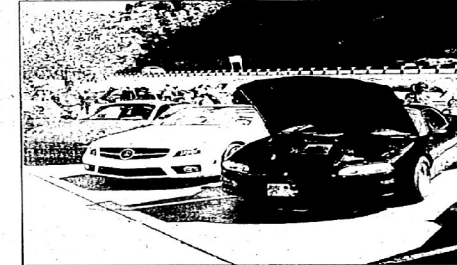

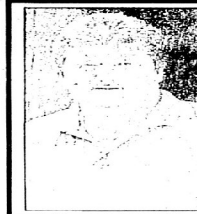

To avoid its dangers, always make sure that any natural gas appliances in your home are properly adjusted and vented to the outside...so they'll burn safely and efficiently.
- (4) SUFFOCATION**  
Natural gas can cause suffocation if it replaces air containing oxygen. (Only air that has oxygen can sustain life.) This is another reason why natural gas should never be allowed to leak from appliances or build up in an enclosed area or room.

**FOLLOW THESE COMMON SENSE SAFETY RULES... IT'S UP TO YOU TO USE SAFE GAS APPLIANCES AND TO USE GAS APPLIANCES SAFELY!!!**

- (1) KEEP COMBUSTIBLES** such as papers, fluids, paints, curtains and rags away from furnaces, water heaters and gas ranges and dryers.
- (2) TEACH CHILDREN** never to light or play with the controls of any gas appliances.
- (3) KEEP PILOT LIGHTS** of your gas range lit. If you put them out to save energy, a dangerous gas build-up can occur if someone accidentally turns on the range.
- (4) KEEP GAS RANGE CLEAN** — make sure burner bowls are free of used matches, grease, paper, etc.
- (5) AND, NEVER USE YOUR GAS RANGE** to heat your home or apartment. This practice creates a serious fire hazard and puts you and your family at risk from dangerous carbon monoxide fumes.
- (6) MAKE SURE APPLIANCES ARE VENTED** — Natural gas needs air containing oxygen to burn safely and efficiently. Without enough air, dangerous carbon monoxide is produced. For this reason, always make sure that your gas furnace and water heater are vented to the outside of the building. If you're not sure your appliances are vented properly, have them checked by a qualified heating contractor or plumber.
- (7) KEEP FLUES AND CHIMNEYS CLEAR** — Have your fluepipe and chimney checked to make sure they're not blocked with debris such as nests, branches, or ivy. (Your heating contractor can inspect and clean fluepipes for you.)
- (8) SIGNS OF POOR FLUE VENTILATION** — Indoor wetness (condensation); unusual smell in your home that doesn't go away; sick houseplants; yellow or wavering appliance flames; soot in your home; pilot light that keeps going out.

**CERTAIN OLDER GAS CONNECTORS MAY BE DANGEROUS!**

Gas connectors are corrugated metal tubes used to connect gas appliances in your home to fuel gas supply pipes. Some older brass connectors have come apart, causing fires and explosions resulting in deaths and injuries. These older brass connectors have a serious flaw in the process used to join their tubing to their end pieces. Over time, the end pieces can separate from the tubing, and cause a serious gas leak, explosion, or fire. To our knowledge, these dangerous uncoated brass connectors have not been made for more than 20 years, but many of them are still in use. The older these connectors get, the greater the possibility of failure.

Although not all uncoated connectors have this flaw, it is very difficult to tell which ones do. Therefore, any uncoated brass connector should be replaced immediately with either a new plastic-coated brass or a new stainless steel connector. Connectors can wear out from too much moving, bending, or corrosion. Connectors should always be replaced whenever the appliance is replaced or moved from its location.

**WARNING:** Only a qualified professional should check your connector and replace it if needed. Don't try to do this yourself! Moving the appliance, even slightly, whether to clean behind it or to inspect its gas connector, can cause the complete failure of one of these older weakened connectors, possibly resulting in a deadly fire or explosion.

**DO NOT MOVE YOUR APPLIANCE TO CHECK THE CONNECTOR!**

**HOW DO I KNOW IF A GAS HAZARD EXISTS??? — YOUR SENSE OF SMELL SHOULD TELL YOU**

- (1) A GAS LEAK IS POTENTIALLY VERY DANGEROUS!** — Gas may leak from faulty appliances, broken pipes or broken mains. Make sure all members of your family know what to do if they smell gas.
  - IF THE ODOR IS STRONG:**
    - Do not light matches.
    - Do not turn lights on or off.
    - Do not operate any controls or pull any plugs from outlets.
    - Do not use the telephone.
    - Notify everyone in the building or house to leave immediately, and leave the door open.
    - If possible, ventilate the building by opening doors and windows, starting where the odor is strongest. Do not re-enter the building for this purpose.
    - Call the utility company or fire department from a nearby building or house. Do not use the telephone in your house.
    - Do not re-enter your home until the utility company or fire department has released you to do so.
    - Never take chances! If your safety is threatened, get out quickly.

**HOW TO RECOGNIZE A GAS LEAK OUTSIDE HOUSE OR BUILDING — Gas leaks outside are uncommon, but it is a good idea to know how to recognize them. Common signs include:**

- 1) A gas odor.
  - 2) A blowing or hissing sound.
  - 3) Dirt being blown or thrown into the air.
  - 4) Water bubbling or being blown into the air at a pond.
  - 5) Fire coming from the ground or burning above the ground.
  - 6) Brown patches in vegetation on or near gas pipeline.
- If you detect any signs of a gas leak outside, call Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission immediately.

**NOTICE TO PRESTONSBURG CITY'S UTILITIES COMMISSION NATURAL GAS CUSTOMERS ABOUT CUSTOMER SERVICE LINES**

1. Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission does not maintain customers' service lines beyond the gas meter setting. Customers are responsible for properly maintaining and repairing their service lines.
2. If customers' buried piping is not maintained, it may be subject to the potential hazards of corrosion and leakage.
3. Buried gas piping should be:
  - I. Periodically inspected for leakage.
  - II. Periodically inspected for corrosion if piping is metallic.
  - III. Repaired if any unsafe conditions are discovered.
  - IV. Repaired, located, inspected and maintained by plumbers or heating contractors.
4. When excavating near buried gas piping, the piping should be located in advance, and the excavation done by hand. Safety comes first with Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission. Below are some of the steps taken by Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission to insure the safety of our employees and customers.
  1. Continuous patrolling of gas system.
  2. Monitoring pressures at various points in gas system.
  3. Annual/ semi-annual leak surveys.
  4. Immediate response to any reported problem.
  5. Proper operation and maintenance of system.
  6. Continuing education of gas pipe line employees, including emergency response to gas emergencies/ accidents. Together with the help of our customers we can maintain a safe and reliable gas system.

**NOTICE TO ALL CONSTRUCTION AND EXCAVATION COMPANIES**

In accordance with federal and state regulations governing natural gas pipeline safety, Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission is pursuing a damage prevention program to minimize accidents and/or disruptions that could involve its underground pipeline facilities. If you observe any type of construction or excavation, or if you plan to do any work requiring digging near a company pipeline, please call the Prestonsburg City's Utilities Commission so that we can send qualified personnel to locate and properly mark the exact location of the pipeline. Knowing the exact location of the underground pipeline will reduce the possibility of property and/or personal and financial loss to both parties.

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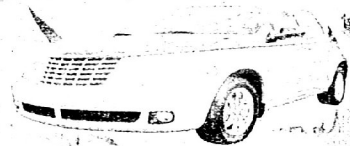
