

# rmer resident charged with sex abuse

PRESTONSBURG — A former Floyd County resident is in jail on a \$150,000 cash bond after being arrested on multiple charges of sex

abuse and sodomy.

The case against Charles
Brandon Hughes, 22, of Pine Top,
formerly of Harold, has been
scaled, but officials say he is
charged with three counts of
sodomy and three counts of sexual

abuse of a victim under the age of 12.

Hughes, who was indicted on the charges on Sept. 28, was arraigned on Nov. 2. A pretrial conference is set for Jan. 5. Cases that involve juvenile vic-

tims are often sealed, and no fur-ther information is currently availa-able about Hughes and the charges that he faces.

Hughes is currently being housed in the Floyd County Detention Center.



# Murder, rape trial set for Feb. 21

PRESTONSBURG — Tony Ray

A motion hour was held in the case

Tackett, 48, was arrested in
November 2006 after an eight-month

located human remains on a strip mine
in Harold. The remains were identified
as Margaret Hall, 56, of Tram, Hall had

Tackett was charged with murder,
first-degree rape and first-degree unlawful imprisonment.


# Suit filed following crash with coal truck

# Social Security fast-track disability processes get even faster

New rules will further speed benefits to tens of thousands of Americans with disabilities

Astrue, commissioner of Social Security, today announced that the agency has published final rules that will further reduce the time it takes to decide applications for disability benefits from those persons with the most severe disabilities—a process that currently takes less than two weeks on average. The new rules alfow disability examiners to, make fully favorable determinations for adult capses under the agency's ave... disau... to make fully ta to make fully ta determinations for adult cases under the agency's Disability

Determination (QDD), Compassionate Allowance (CAL) processes without medical or psychological assultant approval. It also medical or psychological consultant approval. It also will help the agency process cases more efficiently as it will give medical and psychological consultants more time to work on complex cases where their expertise is most needed.

"The new rules we are publishing today will help us get disablity benefits to the most severely disabled Americans even faster," Commissioner Astrue said.

"This year, more than 100,000 people benefited from our fast-track disability processes and received decisions in a matter of days rather than the months and years it can sometimes take. I am pleased that our fast-track processes will now be even faster and help speed much needed benefits to our most vulnerable citizens."

Under Secial Security's QDD process, a predictive computer model analyzes specific data within the electronic disability file to identify cases where there is

a high likelihood that the claimant is disabled and we can quickly obtain medical evidence. The CAL process currently identifies 88 specific diseases and conditions that clearly quality for Social Security and Supplemental Security Income disability benefits and can be fast-tracked. The final rules, 20 CFR Parts 404 and 416. can be accessed through the Federal Register online at www.regulations.gov. They will be effective on November 12, 2010.

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

# A time for compromise

As had been expected, Republicans made sweeping gains in last week's elections and now sit in the driver's seat in terms of

So, in light of these developments, the question then becomes hat will Republicans do with the power they have been granted

by the people?

One would hope that they would wield it wisely, using their ability to essentially shut down Congress as a bargaining chip to force both sides to sit down and work together in a spirit of consensus and compromise. One would hope that Republicans would show true strength and use their influence not for payback, but to set aside two decades of ever-increasing divisive ness (for which both sides hold responsibility) and get to work on the people's agenda.

Hope, but not expect.

There is good reason for pessimism to be found in both rhetoric and history. The vows of Republican leaders over the past week to essentially derail the Obama agenda point to a renewed GOP game plan of gridlock. And lest we write those comments off as mere bluster, we need only to look back at recent history to realize the full weight of those threats.

When Republicans swept control of Congress with their PContract with America" in 1994, one would have thought that the days of the Clinton presidency were coming to an end. Clinton, however, surprised Republicans by showing a willingness to work with them, and several key aims of the "Contract" were enacted, tempered by Democratic goals. Still, one cannot recall that era without remembering budget stalemates and government shutdowns brought on by a refusal of either side to blink on certain points. blink on certain points.

The result? Republicans had to share credit for their accomplishments with Clinton, but took full blame for obstructionism.

Clinton coasted to re-election two years later.

There is no reason to think Republicans did not learn from that experience, but from their recent boasts, it sounds as if they learned the wrong lesson. One would have to expect more, not less, obstructionism in the works, and there is little hope that either side will have any significant legislative achievement to hang its hat on over the next two years.

We think that unwise. At a time when the national economy is

inally starting to show some momentum, a prolonged stalemate in Washington can only serve to delay recovery.

And, if that is the plan, we think it will backfire. Voters elected Republicans to pursue some GOP initiatives and curtail some Democratic ones. They did not vote for a government shutdown.

# A legislative perspective

Of all the holidays the nation celebrates each year, only one calls on us to pay close attention to the clock: Veterans Day.

We pause on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month because, in 1918, it marked the formal end of World War I. President Woodrow Wilson hoped it would be 'the war to end all wars,' and while that did not prove true, the 23 years between then and our entry into World War II remains the longest peacetime span in our country's history.

Only one American soldier from World War I is still with us today Frank Buckles, now 109 and living in West Virginia. Just 16 when he joined he lied about his age he sailed to Europe on the same ship that had rescued survivors of the Titanic five years earlier.

While November 11th was initially set aside to honor those who took part in World War I, he day's focus was broadened in 1954 to include all veterans. Kentucky, not surprisingly, has a long record of doing more than her fair share for our country. About 84,000 Kentuckians served in World War I, and more than three-and-a-half times as many answered the call of duty during World War II. Tens of thousands more joined their ranks in Korea, Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan and stand

of duty during World War II.

at the ready at Fort Knox, Fort
Campbell and dozens of other
installations across the
Commonwealth.

Since the beginning of the
Revolutionary War, 42 million

Kentuckians.

they deserve. It has dedicated

Memorial in Washington, D.C. recapional in washington, D.C., for example, and made it possible for older veterans to receive their high school diplomas if they were otherwise unable to finish high school because of their service.

finish high school because of their service.

Last year, my legislative colleagues and I exempted all military pay from the state income tax, and this year we made it possible for all veterans who are permanently and totally disabled to stay up to three nights for free at our state parks each year. We also initiated a new program to connect combat veterans who have been arrested with programs designed to help them overcome such things as post-traumatic stress disorder.

Over the last two decades, the

Over the last two decades, the General Assembly has built three nursing homes dedicated solely to veterans, and it also authorized a series of cemeteries for them. The fourth opened a little more than a month ago, and a fifth in Southeastern Kentucky is planned in the near future. Our goal is to ensure that no Kentuckian is more than 75 miles from one of these cemeteries.

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# 8 participate in Governor's Scholars

Eight students from the Floyd County School District were selected earlier this year as Governor's Scholars for 2010, and the students completed a five-week residency at three colleges in the state as part of the program.

The Governor's Scholars were Jay Alex Hartgrove and Lauren Taylor Mullins, from Allen Central High School, Wilson Kingsley Allen, Kaitlyn Brooke Minix

and Hannah Blair Walker, from Prestonsburg High School, Joseph Brandon Caldwell and Heather Ariana Little, from South Floyd High School, and Harmeet Bhgrath, from the Piarist School.

The five-week program was held on the campuses of Bellarmine University, in Louisville, Centre College, in Danville, and Murray. State University, in Murray. As part of the Governor's Scholars program, the students lived in college dorms with separate quarters for

An estimated 26 million to 57 million Americans are insulin-tesistant.

"Fatty liver" may sound like a joke, but it's anything but funny. The liver condition that the team tracked is actually called "non-afco-holic fatty liver disease," and it results from an accumulation of excess fat in the liver. This, too, can cause diabetes and obesity, and the affected liver tissue can harden and scar, sometimes leading to cirrhosis of the liver of liver cancer.

The ARS scientists conducted an 8-week test with 50 laboratory mice that indicated that DHA protected against both CLA-induced insulin resistance and CLA-induced fatty liver disease, and no protection a gainst CLA-induced fatty liver disease, and no protection at all against insulin resistance. How does DHA do its magic? One clue may be a recently discovered hormone called adiponectin. This hormone is produced by fat cells in adiponettin. The ARS scientists noticed that the mice in their study who ate a diet containing both CLA and DHA had higher levels of adiponectin than did mice who were given feed that contained CLA, but not DHA. It may well be that boosting adiponectin levels could be an important mechanism by which DHA

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helps protect us against insulin resistance. But the scientists would certainly like to know more. You'll want to stay tuned on this one--and in the






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
