**10 die on state roads**

Preliminary statistics indicate that 10 people died in nine separate crashes on Kentucky roadways from Monday, Nov. 1, through Sunday, Nov. 7.

Eight of the crashes involved motor vehicles and five of the victims were not wearing seat belts. Single-fatality crashes occurred in Boyle, Jefferson, Knott, Madison, Martin, Meade, and Washington counties. The suspected use of alcohol was a factor in the Boyle and Madison County crashes.

One double-fatality crash occurred in Calloway County and both victims were wearing seat belts.

One pedestrian involved fatal crash occurred in Warren County.

Through Nov. 9, preliminary statistics indicate that 647 people have lost their lives on Kentucky roadways during 2010. This is 25 fewer fatalities than reported for the same time period in 2009.

There were 501 motor vehicle fatalities and 265 of those victims were not wearing seat belts. Sixty-nine of those crashes involved a commercial motor vehicle. Forty-nine fatal crashes involved a pedestrian and two involved a scooter. Seventy-five crashes involved a motorcycle and forty-three of those victims were not wearing helmets. Fifteen crashes involved an ATV and thirteen victims were not wearing helmets. Five crashes involved a bicycle. A total of 130 fatalities have resulted from crashes involving the suspected use of alcohol.

**PRESTONSBURG** — A former Floyd County resident is in jail on a \$150,000 cash bond after being arrested on multiple charges of sex

abuse and sodomy. The case against Charles Brandon Hughes, 22, of Pine Top, formerly of Harold, has been sealed, but officials say he is charged with three counts of sodomy and three counts of sexual

abuse of a victim under the age of 12. Hughes, who was indicted on the charges on Sept. 28, was arraigned on Nov. 2. A pretrial conference is set for Jan. 5. Cases that involve juvenile vic-

tims are often sealed, and no further information is currently available about Hughes and the charges that he faces. Hughes is currently being housed in the Floyd County Detention Center.

## Murder, rape trial set for Feb. 21

**PRESTONSBURG** — Tony Ray Tackett, the man charged with the 2006 murder of Margaret Hall, is set to go on trial in Floyd Circuit Court on Feb. 21.

A motion hour was held in the case on Friday, with Tackett's defense attorney asking for a witness hearing.

Tackett, 48, was arrested in November 2006 after an eight-month investigation by police. In April 2006, officers with the Kentucky State Police located human remains on a strip mine in Harold. The remains were identified as Margaret Hall, 56, of Tram. Hall had been reported missing on March 30.

Tackett was charged with murder, first-degree rape and first-degree unlawful imprisonment.

According to reports from the initial

**INEZ** — A Warfield man is dead and another man is charged with murder after an accident in Inez on Saturday.

Fred Marcum, 40, was killed in a two-vehicle accident on Route 2032 just before 3 p.m. on Nov. 5.

According to the police report, Sherman Perry, 38, of Pilgrim, was operating a 1998 Ford Ranger when he crossed the center line and traveled into the path of a vehicle driven by Marcum, resulting in a head-on collision.

## Suit filed following crash with coal truck

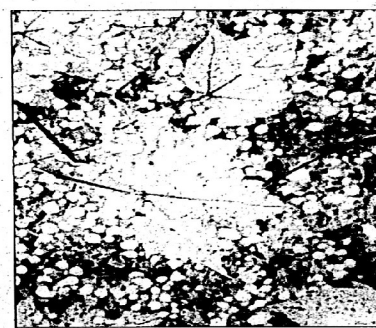

**PIKEVILLE** — A Prestonsburg man has filed a civil lawsuit against Chaney Enterprises, a Pikeville-based company, after an accident involving a loaded coal truck on Sept. 1.

Jason Smith, 33, filed the suit in Pike Circuit Court. In his complaint, Smith alleges that he received, "serious, permanent and life-altering injuries" as a result of the accident.

According to information provided by Kirk Law Firm, "In the early morning darkness on Sept. 1, 2010, Defendant's driver, Cecil Stone, operated Defendant's loaded tractor-trailer down Robinson Creek, and, when Stone reached the junction with U.S. 23, he failed to concede the right-of-way to Plaintiff, who was operating his vehicle south on U.S. 23 in a safe and reasonable way, and Stone, perhaps because he was in a

# Social Security fast-track disability processes get even faster

### New rules will further speed benefits to tens of thousands of Americans with disabilities

Michael J. Astrue, Commissioner of Social Security, today announced that the agency has published final rules that will further reduce the time it takes to decide applications for disability benefits from those persons with the most severe disabilities—a process that currently takes less than two weeks on average. The new rules allow disability examiners to make fully favorable determinations for adult cases under the agency's Quick Disability

Determination (QDD) and Compassionate Allowance (CAL) processes without medical or psychological consultant approval. It also will help the agency process cases more efficiently as it will give medical and psychological consultants more time to work on complex cases where their expertise is most needed. "The new rules we are publishing today will help us get disability benefits to the most severely disabled Americans even faster," Commissioner Astrue said.

"This year, more than 100,000 people benefited from our fast-track disability processes and received decisions in a matter of days rather than the months and years it can sometimes take. I am pleased that our fast-track processes will now be even faster and help speed much needed benefits to our most vulnerable citizens."

Under Social Security's QDD process, a predictive computer model analyzes specific data within the electronic disability file to identify cases where there is

a high likelihood that the claimant is disabled and we can quickly obtain medical evidence. The CAL process currently identifies 88 specific diseases and conditions that clearly qualify for Social Security and Supplemental Security Income disability benefits and can be fast-tracked.

The final rules, 20 CFR Parts 404 and 416, can be accessed through the Federal Register online at [www.regulations.gov](http://www.regulations.gov). They will be effective on November 12, 2010.

who strive to eat a healthy diet can sometimes miss essential nutrients. Therefore, nutritional supplements, when taken appropriately, can be bene-

ficial to almost anyone's diet.

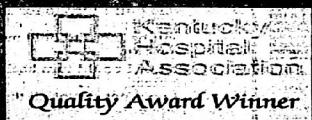

## Our View

### A time for compromise

As had been expected, Republicans made sweeping gains in last week's elections and now sit in the driver's seat in terms of setting the national agenda.

Though they only took a controlling share of the House of Representatives, they now hold unbreakable filibuster power in the Senate. Nothing, it would seem, can come out of Washington without express Republican approval.

In the meantime, Democrats, always a more motley band than their GOP counterparts, appear ready to backpedal, distancing themselves from the same policies they had embraced over the past two years.

So, in light of these developments, the question then becomes, what will Republicans do with the power they have been granted by the people?

One would hope that they would wield it wisely, using their ability to essentially shut down Congress as a bargaining chip to force both sides to sit down and work together in a spirit of consensus and compromise. One would hope that Republicans would show true strength and use their influence not for pay-back, but to set aside two decades of ever-increasing divisiveness (for which both sides hold responsibility) and get to work on the people's agenda.

Hope, but not expect.

There is good reason for pessimism to be found in both rhetoric and history. The vows of Republican leaders over the past week to essentially derail the Obama agenda point to a renewed GOP game plan of gridlock. And lest we write those comments off as mere bluster, we need only to look back at recent history to realize the full weight of those threats:

When Republicans swept control of Congress with their "Contract with America" in 1994, one would have thought that the days of the Clinton presidency were coming to an end. Clinton, however, surprised Republicans by showing a willingness to work with them, and several key aims of the "Contract" were enacted, tempered by Democratic goals. Still, one cannot recall that era without remembering budget stalemates and government shutdowns brought on by a refusal of either side to blink on certain points.

The result? Republicans had to share credit for their accomplishments with Clinton, but took full blame for obstructionism. Clinton coasted to re-election two years later.

There is no reason to think Republicans did not learn from that experience, but from their recent boasts, it sounds as if they learned the wrong lesson. One would have to expect more, not less, obstructionism in the works, and there is little hope that either side will have any significant legislative achievement to hang its hat on over the next two years.

We think that unwise. At a time when the national economy is finally starting to show some momentum, a prolonged stalemate in Washington can only serve to delay recovery.

And, if that is the plan, we think it will backfire. Voters elected Republicans to pursue some GOP initiatives and curtail some Democratic ones. They did not vote for a government shutdown.

### A legislative perspective

Of all the holidays the nation celebrates each year, only one calls on us to pay close attention to the clock: Veterans Day.

We pause on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month because, in 1918, it marked the formal end of World War I. President Woodrow Wilson hoped it would be "the war to end all wars," and while that did not prove true, the 23 years between then and our entry into World War II remains the longest peacetime span in our country's history.

Only one American soldier from World War I is still with us today: Frank Buckles, now 109 and living in West Virginia. Just 16 when he joined - he lied about his age - he sailed to Europe on the same ship that had rescued survivors of the Titanic five years earlier.

While November 11th was initially set aside to honor those who took part in World War I, the day's focus was broadened in 1954 to include all veterans.

Kentucky, not surprisingly, has a long record of doing more than her fair share for our country. About 84,000 Kentuckians served in World War I, and more than three-and-a-half times as many answered the call of duty during World War II. Tens of thousands more joined their ranks in Korea, Vietnam, Iraq and Afghanistan and stand at the ready at Fort Knox, Fort Campbell and dozens of other installations across the Commonwealth.

Since the beginning of the Revolutionary War, 42 million Americans have given their time, their talents and, if necessary, even their life and limb on our behalf. More than half of those soldiers are still with us today, including 339,000 Kentuckians.

The General Assembly has worked hard over the years to ensure these men and women are given the respect and care they deserve. It has dedicated money to the World War II

Memorial in Washington, D.C., for example, and made it possible for older veterans to receive their high school diplomas if they were otherwise unable to finish high school because of their service.

Last year, my legislative colleagues and I exempted all military pay from the state income tax, and this year we made it possible for all veterans who are permanently and totally disabled to stay up to three nights for free at our state parks each year. We also initiated a new program to connect combat veterans who have been arrested with programs designed to help them overcome such things as post-traumatic stress disorder.

Over the last two decades, the General Assembly has built three nursing homes dedicated solely to veterans, and it also authorized a series of cemeteries for them. The fourth opened a little more than a month ago, and a fifth in Southeastern Kentucky is planned in the near future. Our goal is to ensure that no Kentuckian is more than 75 miles from one of these cemeteries.

### The benefits of two parties

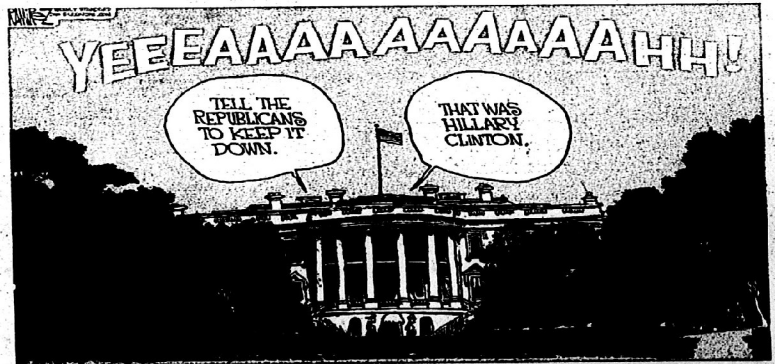

# Mongiardo, Kentucky Center for School Safety announce statewide Child ID initiative

Veterans Day may be a holiday, a time away from school or work, but it is so much more than that. If you cannot take part in one of the many ceremonies scheduled in our community and across the country, I encourage you to take at least a few moments to recognize the countless sacrifices that paved the way for the freedom we enjoy today.

If you know a veteran, please take the time to thank them for all that they did for

us, and if you are a veteran, always know that your service will never be forgotten or taken for granted.

No one summed up that feeling better than General John "Black Jack" Pershing, who gathered his troops in France on November 12, 1918, one day after the end of World War I. What he told them could be said to any veteran: "Your deeds will live forever on the most glorious pages of American history."

## Medicine

is the multivitamin," says Betz.

There are many essential vitamins and minerals found in multivitamins that can be difficult to attain solely through one's diet. The health benefits of these nutrients are hard to ignore. Calcium makes your bones stronger. Vitamin B12 gives you more energy. Vitamin D boosts your immune system.

"Overall, the multivitamin is the single most diverse supplement you can add to your diet," said Betz.

However, not all multivitamins are made equal. "Many multivitamins contain synthetic nutrients instead of natural ones, which are harder for the body to absorb," explains Betz. He recommends taking an all-natural multivitamin derived from actual food sources so the body can absorb a much larger percentage of its nutrients.

Another important nutrient we should be supplementing our diets with is fat. According to Betz, it is a common misconception that fat is bad for us when, actually, quite the opposite is true. "The body uses fat to do everything from building cell membranes to performing key functions in the brain, eyes, and lungs. Fats also play a vital role in our cardiovascular health as well as in the maintenance of our skin and hair."

"The problem with fat is that people eat too many trans fats, often found in processed food, that not only raise cholesterol, but also increase the risk of heart disease," says Betz.

Healthy fats, such as monounsaturated fat, polyunsaturated fat, and the super-healthy fats omega 3 fatty acids, can actually improve the overall health of the heart.

"When combined with exercise, taking an omega 3 supplement can also combat

the problem of high triglycerides and low, good (HDL) cholesterol - another common medical problem caused by diets high in trans fat," says Betz. Therefore, our diets include a good amount of these healthy fats.

"Fish oil, which contains concentrated omega 3 fatty acids, is perhaps the best nutritional supplement for healthy fats," adds Betz.

Another good dietary supplement to consider is protein. "Protein is one of the body's main building blocks for muscle, bone, skin, and other tissues," says Betz. Often found in the form of powders or shakes, protein supplements repair muscles and help the body recover from exercise. It is important to make sure our diets include a good amount of these healthy fats.

However, that protein supplementation can be harmful to certain populations, especially those with diminished kidney function.

"Before adding protein, or any other nutritional supplement to your diet, you should check with your doctor to make sure it is safe for you."

Preventive medicine is just one aspect of care osteopathic physicians (D.O.s) provide. D.O.s are fully licensed to prescribe medicine and practice in all specialty areas including surgery. hurry to get his cargo to market, pulled his loaded vehicle on U.S. 23 in front of Plaintiff, causing a violent crash which caused serious, substantial and permanent injuries to Plaintiff, who, finally released from a hospital, now requires a wheelchair and a caregiver."

The injuries that Smith allegedly sustained in the accident exceed \$10 million, according to the suit, and Smith will require future hospitalization and

medical treatment. The lawsuit also alleges that, since Cecil Stone was paid by the load of coal delivered from a mining site to market, there was an incentive for the driver to hurry.

Smith is also asking for punitive damages because Stone allegedly breached various safety laws in his operation of the truck, and a trial by jury and other relief which is deemed just and proper by the court.

# County gets \$10K planning grant

**SOMERSET** — The Floyd County Fiscal Court has been named as one of the 11 communities and organizations in southern and Eastern Kentucky to receive Appalachian Regional Commission grant funding from the Center for Rural Development.

Floyd County received \$10,000 to develop a recreational master planning project that will result in the coordinated development of properties across the county. The plans include trails for biking, hiking, ATV and horseback riding, and recreational facilities that will include a community park built on land donated by a local coal company. A community center with recreational amenities is also expected to be incorporated into the recreational planning project.

The Knott County Fiscal Court also received a grant in the amount of \$8,000 to recast the vision for the Kentucky School of Craft, a program under the direction of Hazard County Community and Technical College.

"Good planning and partnerships are vital to making our region competitive," said U.S. Rep. Hal Rogers. "In talking with the local government leaders each year, I hear about great visions and strategies that could benefit our rural communities. Thanks to the ARC and the Center for Rural Development, those communities can receive the jump-start funding they need to plan their work and work their plan."

Rogers and Lonnie Lawson, president and CEO of the Center for Rural Development, presented \$89,500 to the winning communities during an awards ceremony held in Somerset on Nov. 5.

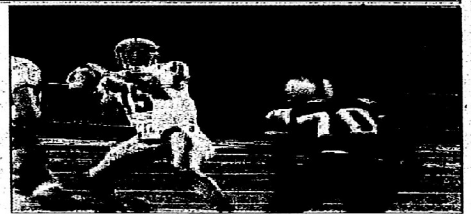
Hazard owned a commanding 31-0 advantage at the end of the first quarter. The Bulldogs then carried a 50-0 lead into halftime.

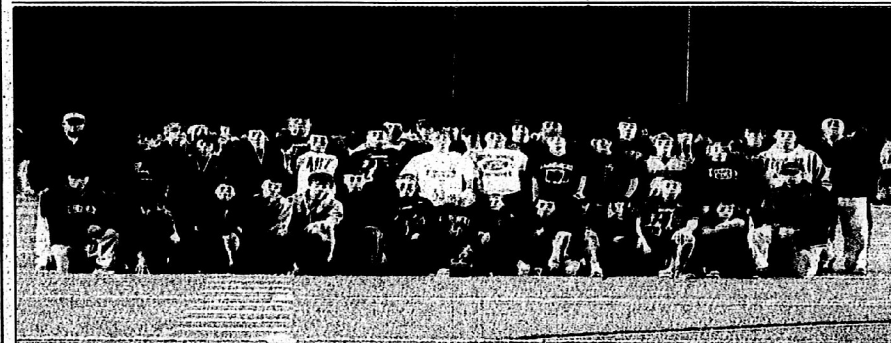

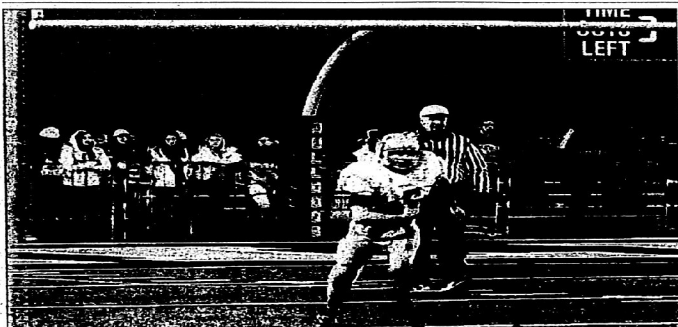
**Blackcats capture Floyd, Big Sandy championships**

**Bears get first win of the season over West Virginia Tech**

**PIKEVILLE** - A nine-game losing streak came to a merciful end for the Pikeville College football team, which knocked off WVU Tech 40-36 Saturday afternoon at the W.C. Hambley Athletics Complex.

Pikeville (1-8) picked up its first win since a 20-3 win over WVU Tech last Nov. 7 and now stands 1-4 in the Mid-South Conference East Division.

WVU Tech (2-7, 1-4) will return home next Saturday to end its season with a game against Campbellsville University.

As has been the case for most of the season, it was a record-breaking day for sophomore quarterback Trevor Hoskins. He threw two touchdown passes on the day, giving him a school record 23 on the season. And his 15 completed passes gives him 186, two more than the previous school record in a season.

The downside for Hoskins was four WVU Tech interceptions, giving him 18 on the season, also the most in school history.

The teams made hay on the ground. For Pikeville, junior fullback Ezekiel

White was pressed into full-time service and made the most of it, finishing with 125 yards on 25 carries for his first career 100-yard rushing day. Hoskins added 60 on 15 carries and two scoring touchdowns.

WVU Tech also had a seldom-used player stand out carrying the ball. Senior Jamel Shelton, who had 12 carries all season, gained 157 yards and scored twice on 25 carries on Saturday.

His play, combined with junior quarterback Michael

Scott's three touchdown passes, nearly gave the Golden Bears their first win in five tries over Pikeville since joining the league in 2006.

Early on, it appeared Pikeville would run away with it. Hoskins hit freshman Jordan Amis from 30 yards out and freshman Thomas Weeks from 28 yards to make it 14-0 after a pair of Ryan Wilson extra points with 4:48 left in the first period.

For both Amis and Weeks, it was their seventh receiving touchdown of the season. Wilson, a freshman from Crestview Hills, booted a 39-yard field goal before the quarter ended to give the Bears a 17-0 lead after one period.

But Tech wasted no time getting going in the second period. On the first play from scrimmage, Scott hit senior Kashif Walls from 39 yards out for a score. Amis responded by taking the ensuing kickoff 88 yards to a touchdown, but the Golden Bear combo of Scott-to-Walls answered with a 29-yard scoring pass, and then, with 2:09 to play before recess, Shelton scored on a five-yard run to make it 24-21 at the half.

Pikeville scored first in the third period on the first of two Hoskins scoring runs, this one from a yard out, to make it 30-21. But the extra-point was blocked and picked up by freshman Sygvan Hudson at the 13, who returned it 87 yards to give Tech the two-point conversion and draw it within a touchdown at 30-23.

Less than four minutes later, the touchdown came on a 28-yard Shelton run, and Zach Christians' kick tied the game for the first

time at 30 with 3:08 left in the third.

Pikeville, however, regained the edge for good with 33 seconds left in the frame when Hoskins scooted 24 yards for the score. After booting the PAT, Wilson added a 21-yard field goal with 9:52 remaining to make it a 40-30 game.

Tech closed out scoring with 4:13 to play when Scott again hit Walls, this time from 25 yards out. But the extra-point resulted in a scramble by holder A.J. Schmidt, who was tackled to keep it a four-point game.

Hoskins' favorite target on the day was junior Axel Rivas, who caught six passes for 27 yards. Amis finished with 96 yards on four catches and the score.

In addition to Shelton's 100-plus-yard rushing game, Walls had 115 yards and three scores on five catches through the air.

Tech was led defensively by junior Jon Culbertson, who had eight tackles, including seven solos, and blocked a kick. Hudson and sophomore Jerome Blyden had seven tackles each.

Pikeville was led by senior linebacker Anson Cunningham's nine solo tackles. The day gives him a career total of 260 total tackles, leaving him 13 shy of the school record heading into his Senior Day game next week against Kentucky Christian. Senior tackle Travis Norris had seven tackles and moved into third place on the all-time list.

Pikeville's game with KCU will kick off at 5 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 13. Senior Day festivities will begin at 4:40 p.m.

### EVERYBODY'S SCIENCE

#### Bring on the party platters.

I haven't had an opportunity to test this theory, of course, but I'm reasonably certain that if my husband were stranded on the proverbial desert island with nothing more than plenty of hot coffee and smoked salmon, I don't imagine that he'd be terribly upset.

I, too, am a huge fan of smoked salmon. It's more than just a party-platter favorite; you can fold it into a cream sauce to spread over fettuccini, bake it in a delicious "dinner pie," whip it up into an incredible spread, or make your own seafood chowder with a minimum of culinary expertise.

Best of all, you can pat yourself on the back for being health-conscious while enjoying this wonderful treat (well, we won't go into the health merits of cream sauces and some of the other ingredients, but trust me, the salmon is very, very good for you).

Never thought of smoked salmon as "health food"? You might want to think again, because salmon—along with anchovies, mackerel, herring, and albacore tuna—is rich in healthful natural compounds known as omega-3 fatty acids. You've probably heard that these substances are good for you, but the scientists of the Agricultural Research Service (ARS) have been busy pinning down exactly why they're so good for you.

For starters, the ARS scientists have been delving into the secret relationships between three fatty acids whose names sound like a bowl of alphabet soup: risk amok, CLA, DHA and EPA.

The specific type of CLA—short for "conjugated linolenic acid"—that the scientists have been studying is known as "trans-10, cis-12 CLA," and it's found in partially hydrogenated vegetable oils and some dietary supplements. The scientists' particular interest lies in how this version of CLA interacts with the DHA and EPA from fish oils.

What's so fascinating about how CLA, DHA and EPA play together? Results from a few studies conducted by researchers elsewhere have indicated that feeding fish-oil supplements in conjunction with CLA supplements to lab animals prevents certain harmful side effects attributed to CLA. Those side effects, none of which you'd want include insulin resistance and fatty liver.

What the studies didn't reveal was whether it was the fish oils' DHA, EPA or the combination of both that provided the protection against the side effects of CLA.

Why is insulin resistance so worrisome? This is a condition in which the body

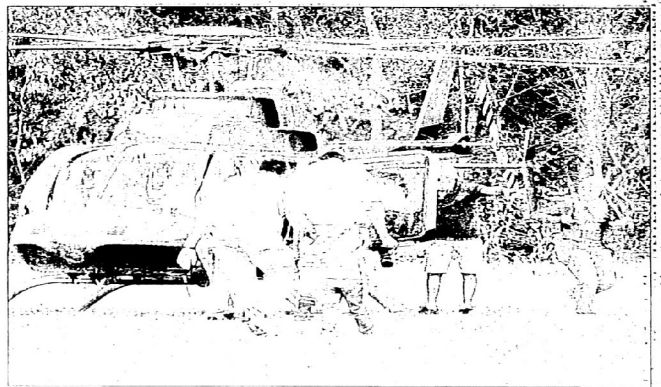
the car show by "burning out" for the crowd.

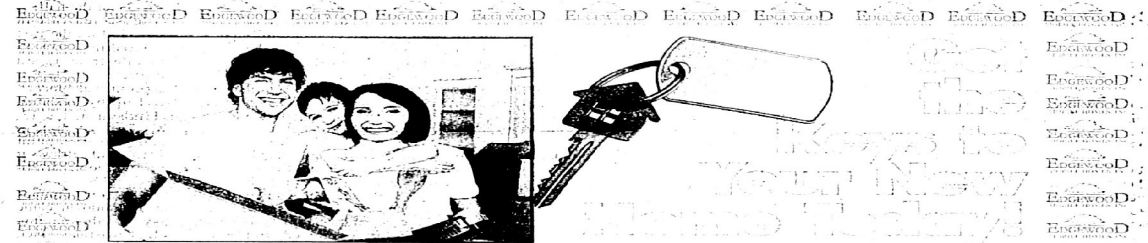
According to Leslie Nelson, public relations director and president of the PTO, the main attraction at the festival was helicopter rides provided by Willard Kinzer and David May.

# 8 participate in Governor's Scholars

Eight students from the Floyd County School District were selected earlier this year as Governor's Scholars for 2010, and the students completed a five-week residency at three colleges in the state as part of the program.

The Governor's Scholars were Jay Alex Hartgrove and Lauren Taylor Mullins, from Allen Central High School, Wilsley Kinley Allen, Kaitlyn Brooke Minix

and Hannah Blair Walker, from Prestonsburg High School, Joseph Brandon Caldwell and Heather Ariana Little, from South Floyd High School, and Harnett Bhgrath, from the Piarist School.

The five-week program was held on the campuses of Bellarmine University, in Louisville, Centre College, in Danville, and Murray State University, in Murray.

As part of the Governor's Scholars program, the students lived in college dorms with separate quarters for

men and women during the five-week residency. The students also had the opportunity to hear well-known speakers, watch films, take field trips, and participate in special events and recreational activities.

The Governor's Scholars program was established in 1983. The program provides academic and personal growth in a challenging, non-traditional environment that balances a strong liberal arts program with a full curricular and residential life experience.

isn't able to efficiently use its own insulin, which is a hormone, to remove glucose (sugar) from the bloodstream. If that situation goes unaddressed, insulin resistance can lead to diabetes and a harmful buildup of glucose in the bloodstream. An estimated 26 million to 37 million Americans are insulin-resistant.

"Fatty liver" may sound like a joke, but it's anything but funny. The liver condition that the team tracked is actually called "non-alcoholic fatty liver disease," and it results from an accumulation of excess fat in the liver. This, too, can cause diabetes and obesity, and the affected liver tissue can harden and scar, sometimes leading to cirrhosis of the liver or liver cancer.

The ARS scientists conducted an 8-week test with 50 laboratory mice that indicated that DHA protected against both CLA-induced insulin resistance and CLA-induced non-alcoholic fatty liver acid. Unfortunately, the EPA offered only partial protection against CLA-induced fatty liver disease, and no protection at all against insulin resistance.

How does DHA do its magic? One clue may be a recently discovered hormone called adiponectin. This hormone is produced by fat cells in adipose tissue, and low levels of adiponectin have been associated with insulin resistance. Scientists know that CLA depletes the adipose tissue that cranks out the adiponectin--and happily, DHA restores adipose tissue, thus indirectly increasing the levels of adiponectin.

The ARS scientists noticed that the mice in their study who ate a diet containing both CLA and DHA had higher levels of adiponectin than did mice who were given feed that contained CLA, but not DHA. It may well be that boosting adiponectin levels could be an important mechanism by which DHA

helps protect us against insulin resistance. But the scientists would certainly like to know more.

You'll want to stay tuned on this one--and in the meantime, enjoy your smoked salmon!

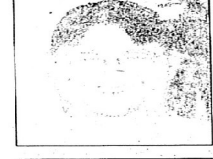

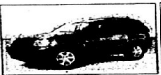

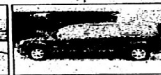
